A Message From Rabbi Robert Wolkoff



Sometimes, irony is almost too delicious. A few days ago, UNESCO passed a draft resolution which denies by omission the ties between Jews and the most sacred Jewish sites in Jerusalem. The words “Temple Mount” or “Har Habayit” never appear in the resolution, nor does the word “Hakotel.” The “Western Wall plaza” appears exactly that way, in quotes, as if to imply that the name is somehow colloquial. This in contrast to the “Al Buraq plaza,” which in the UNESCO document is not in quotes, as if it is somehow the official name for the site. In fact, “Al Buraq” is a new and entirely artificial Arab expression whose sole purpose is to avoid saying “Hakotel” or “Western Wall plaza.” (Please recall, until Jerusalem was reunited in 1967, there was no plaza there at all, just the Western Wall that had been used by the Arab occupiers as a public urinal.)

The UNESCO document has been roundly condemned by Israelis of all political stripes, by American Jewish organizations to the right and the left—when was the last time you heard uber-liberal Peter Beinart and conservative Morton Klein of the Zionist Organization of America agree on anything? And perhaps we could just sum it up with the title of an article by David Harsanyi: “The United Nations Is Run By A Bunch Of Depraved Totalitarians, Villainous Barbarians, And Anti-Semitic Scum—Just a friendly reminder.”

On the other hand, the nonsense from UNESCO gives us the opportunity to understand something about ourselves. I am writing this article hours after the second day of Sukkot. This morning, we circled the sanctuary in a “hoshanah” procession. During the procession, Cantor Rockman recited a poem, an alphabetic acrostic. Twenty-two sentences—aleph, bet, gimel—and every one a different, and loving, description of Jerusalem, and in particular the Temple Mount. “The world’s corner-stone...the chosen home...exquisite Zion...the place to which the world turns.”

Pretty peculiar considering that we supposedly have no relationship to the Temple Mount. Note the irony. It’s just ridiculous to try to “refute” or counter the UNESCO statement. After all, the Temple Mount is the largest sacred precinct in the world, last modified 2000 years ago to support the hundreds of thousands of Jews who were coming to the Temple for festival observance. The idea—promulgated by the Palestinian leadership—that there never really were any Temples, would mean that Jews built this massive structure in the hopes that 700 years later the Muslims would build a mosque and a shrine on it and rename it “Haram al Sharif.”

Sure.

Far more important is for us to remember who we are, where we come from, and our age-old pledge to hold Jerusalem higher than our highest joy.



Jewish learning does not stop at age 13, when a child becomes *bar mitzvah* or *bat mitzvah*. But if you think this essay is about learning programs for our post-*b'nai mitzvah* teens – think again.

As a people, a culture, and a religion, Jews place a high value on life-long learning. Our Religious School teachers are excellent examples of living a life of Jewish learning. They continually stretch their own knowledge to make their classes more interesting and more meaningful. One of the most rewarding aspects of my work is connecting teachers with new resources and with information and ideas that are new to them. When teachers also are learners, they create better classroom experiences and also enrich their own Jewish lives.

Of course, this means that all the parents of children in our Religious School, and their grandparents too and any other Jewish adult in their lives, are Jewish learners as well. I have a feeling that this is easily forgotten in the press of everyday life. I know that, before I was a professional Jewish educator, if someone had said to me that I needed to find time for continued Jewish learning – while I was working full-time, raising three children, running a household, and basically just trying to keep my head above water on a daily basis – I likely would have scoffed. There was no time for adult learning classes – I barely had time to make dinner! There was no time for Jewish book clubs – I couldn't even find time to work out! There was no time, period.

So it is perhaps ironic, that as a Jewish educator now, it is my responsibility to tell busy parents they should make time for Jewish learning. How to do this, knowing what I know about what it is like to be raising a family today?

I think the secret lies in Jewish learning that is relevant and meaningful and that fits well with the life you already are living. *Jewish learning that is connected to the life you are actually leading, and that is a source of interesting ideas and conversation rather than a source of additional stress, is not only a worthy goal but an attainable one.* And it occurs to me that I can do the same for our parents as I do for our teachers: If you take seriously the *idea* that Jewish learning is important, but find it difficult to put that idea into practice, I can be a resource to help make Jewish learning happen in a way that makes sense for you as incredibly stressed and busy parents.

On the first day of school, there was a sign-up sheet asking for names of people who would be interested in some classes during Religious School hours. I am exploring how to offer classes of interest during a time when most of you already are here. I also have excellent books that I am happy to lend out, and tons of websites I can share when you need questions answered or you want to learn more about something your children are encountering in Religious School. And, of course, engaging with your children about their Jewish learning will likely provide you with some new ideas and knowledge, and, perhaps, spark questions of your own. This is natural learning that can enrich your own Jewish experience. I hope you will access it, enjoy it, and allow me to be a part of making it happen for you.




