THE RABBI SPEAKS Rabbi Michael Goldstein

“Bringing Our First Fruits”

“Did anyone order the fruit basket? I need to take it to synagogue with me tomorrow. How can I go to Shavuot tefillot (services) empty handed? I’ll be embarrassed!” -- The above is a scenario that I wait to hear some day. It is inspired by what is at the core of the festival of Shavuot. Our ancestors made the pilgrimage to Jerusalem, climbed the steep hill leading up to the city, then up the southern steps of the Temple Mount, finally coming into the outer courtyard of the Temple. In a very long line, they waited their turn to present the best of the first Spring harvest: fruits, barley, winter wheat, firstlings from the flocks. As they approached one of a long row of Kohanim (priests), they handed over their offerings and said,

“My ancestor was a wandering Aramean. He went down to Egypt with meager numbers and sojourned there; but there he became a great and populous nation. The Egyptians dealt harshly with us and oppressed us...The Lord freed us from Egypt with a mighty hand and outstretched arm...by signs and wonders. He brought us to this place and gave us this land...Wherefore I now bring the first fruits of the soil which You O Lord have given me.”

This declaration is exactly the words of the Torah (Deuteronomy Chapter 26) and each pilgrim said these same words.

With the destruction of the Temple in 70CE by Rome, we stopped bringing bikkurim (first-fruits) to Jerusalem. We substituted prayer as our offering. But, Shavuot remained a time of great celebration. The practice of setting aside bikkurim was renewed with the resettling of Israel by Jewish pioneers in late 19th and early 20th Centuries.

We too can be a part of the bikkurim. If you come to Shavuot services on Tuesday night, May 22nd, you will see two large, beautifully decorated baskets sitting at the center of the bimah. We encourage you to bring first-fruits in the symbolic way of non-perishable food items for those in need. We will pass these along to food pantries in our area. In particular, try to bring protein foods, breakfast cereals and paper products. These are always in need. These free- will offerings will be our way of keeping the tradition begun by our ancestors almost three thousand years ago. We

also encourage you to make monetary donations to MAZON, to area food banks or to international hunger relief organizations.

It is most important to join together at Tefillot (services) that night. Finally, we can come prepared to offer God our heartfelt thanks for enjoying enough resources to meet our needs. This offering comes in the form of prayer, both printed in the Siddur and issuing from the heart.

I look forward to giving thanks with you and to celebrating our blessings and good fortune. Look in this HaKol for the exact schedule of services for Shavuot, including Yizkor. Oh, and we are serving cheesecakes and ice cream afterwards.

Welcome Back and Join Us

We're back! The Sons of Tikvah Band has been practicing and we are ready to play for you again. Starting on April 27, and on the fourth Friday evening of May (25) and June (22), at the special time of 7:00 PM, the band will add our special brand of music & ruach, spirit, to help us begin our Shabbat with warmth and excitement.

Shabbat, it is a precious gift from God, a day of great joy eagerly awaited throughout the week, a time when we can set aside all of our weekday concerns and devote ourselves to higher pursuits. It is said "more than Israel has kept Shabbat, Shabbat has kept Israel."

As you may know it isn't typical for our congregation to add instrumental music to our services. And what we are doing with our Friday Night Plugged-in service **is not** a violation of traditional Shabbat observance. We begin and end "Kabbalat Shabbat" before Shabbat begins.

When we introduced this special service a few years ago it was intended as an experiment. We wanted to find out if this radically different style would be meaningful to our congregation. Simply stated, would more people come to services? Would the music be the powerful tool that we hoped it would be to engage more people in the overall observance of Shabbat?

Well the jury is still out. We are not sure if these services have accomplished all or some of our goals. Although initially, we had a large increase in attendance when we presented this special service, turnout at subsequent Friday Night Plugged-In services were about equal to our normal Friday night services. The attendance at an average Friday night service is 40-50 people. Sometimes fewer congregants attend services during secular holiday weekends and many more are in attendance when a special event is scheduled.

We have a strong nucleus of Friday night regulars, who participate in the service and include this service in their weekly routine and observance of Shabbat. After a short period of time in which our attendance had ebbed a bit, attendance has actually risen and stabilized in recent years.

The Conservative movement is rooted in tradition and embraces change. This service is an example of this. Limited instrumental music has been played for many years in Conservative

synagogues. For example in 1950's and early 1960's an organ was used at Congregation Beth Mordecai, a Conservative synagogue in Perth Amboy, and many others. Today, many synagogues regularly have a service like our Plugged-In service, and they continue to use the instruments on Shabbat.

We are typical American Jewish community; most people are comfortable with their level of observance. Some may look to do more in an ideal circumstance, but on the whole, most of our congregation is happy with their personal observance. With change comes responsibility, with commitment comes growth. The rabbi and the cantor are here to lead you and yes, also to challenge you. I think that this experiment can work if we together decide to meet this challenge wholeheartedly and with the understanding that want to get closer to God.

ANOTHER VIEWPOINT

A Patriotic Pesach

If you happen to be at a cocktail party sometime, and the subject comes up as to which is the oldest American veterans organization recognized by Congress (okay, so it ain't very likely to come up, but anyway) you can make some money by betting that it's the Jewish War Veterans of America. It has happened from time to time that after the Civil War of the 1860's, some loudmouth ignoramuses complained that the Jews eschewed their responsibilities by not enlisting in the Union Army.

Well, it just so happens that there were Jews on both sides of the infernal fraternal fracas and to prove their patriotism, Jewish veterans of the Union Army formed what is today known as the Jewish War Veterans of America (JWV).

Following is a brief summary of the determination of a group of Jewish soldiers to hold a seder in the spring of 1862.

J. A. Joel and twenty of his Jewish comrades in the 23rd Ohio Volunteer Regiment obtained permission from their commanding officer to absent themselves from duty for a few days to observe Passover. They spoke to the camp sutler (provider), a Jew, who was going home to Cincinnati for Passover. The sutler sent them seven barrels of matzo and several Passover Hagaddot.

They had to apply Yankee ingenuity to obtain the rest, which meant finding meaningful substitutions, such as a brick for charoses to symbolize the hard work of the Israelite slaves, and apple cider instead of wine. But they were able to find a lamb to replace the lamb bone, and not knowing which part was suitable for the seder plate, they put the whole lamb on the table. The matzo, chicken and eggs were the only conventional items, but the important thing was that they had a meaningful seder.

Things went well until they came to the part about the bitter herbs. The weeds that they found to substitute for the maror was so bitter that some of them drank all of the cider at once instead of over the four separate times and got so drunk they had to be carried back to camp, and as the story goes were left in the arms of Morpheus.

There, wrote Joel, "in the wild woods of West

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



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

Those that know me, recognize I'm not an observant Jew – more of a “cultural” one. Admittedly, I can't read Hebrew at the speed of most, nor am I intimately familiar with many of the prayers. However, I decided to read Torah for my daughter Jessica's Bat Mitzvah in an effort to share the experience with her, and create a more spiritual connection for me. I didn't realize what a tremendous experience it would become.

I have not read from the Torah since my Bar Mitzvah, some thirty years ago. Although the thought of reading Torah was certainly intimidating, I wanted Jessica's Bat Mitzvah to have religious significance for me as well as for her. I also believed reading Torah would create a bond between Jessica and me – did it ever!

Since I do not know how to read trope (the symbols in the Torah which indicate how each word is sung), Cantor Rockman recorded a CD with my multiple verse Torah portion. I had to memorize the Cantors tone word for word. I probably played this CD hundreds of times, since my memory is not what it was when I was 13 years old. When I believed I had “mastered” my torah portion (about two weeks prior to the Bat Mitzvah), I began to practice with Jessica. Now for the first time in our 13 year relationship – our roles were reversed and she became my teacher. Jessica was initially quite kind, and tried to delicately correct me. But our sessions became more intense, entertaining, and outright funny. Jessica teased my inflection, corrected my Hebrew, and made fun of how I bobbed my head while singing certain words. We had so much fun and so many laughs while I practiced my portion. We spent a lot of time together helping each other prepare. Jessica and I bonded during this time – and this experience is one which neither of us will ever forget.

As parents we try to instill Judaism into our childrens lives, and expect their commitment in becoming a Bar or Bat Mitzvah. My wife Lisa and I believe in leading by example. By reading Torah, I demonstrated to Jessica my commitment to Judaism, and therefore could expect the same of her. While encouraging Jessica to practice her Torah and Haftorah portions, I practiced my portion. I led by example.

Jessica was a shining star at her Bat Mitzvah service. She rose to the challenge and was flawless. She made her entire family so, so proud of her

accomplishments, and of the young woman she had become.

My Torah reading went pretty well. I think I may have skipped a word, or mispronounced another – but it didn't matter. I had a spiritual experience – felt closer to G-d. I write this article with the hopes I can inspire other parents to share my same experience.

I encourage those parents with B'nai Mitzvah children to read Torah at your child's Bar/Bat Mitzvah – it is a spiritual, moving experience! You share a spiritual connection, commitment, bond, and a lifetime memory with your child and G-d - at least I did!





Virginia, away from home and friends, we consecrated and offered up our prayersthere is no occasion in my life that gives me more pleasure and satisfaction than when I remember the celebration of Passover of 1862".

There were about 8,000 Jewish soldiers in the Union army and approximately 1,500 in the Confederate army. In researching this story, I came across a letter dated April 24, 1864 by a Jewish Confederate soldier, Isaac J. Levy of the 46th Virginia Infantry, in which he describes how he and his brother observed Passover during the Civil War. Isaac writes that they observed the festival in a "truly orthodox style", including kosher beef.

Isaac Levy was killed at Petersburg on August 21, 1864 at age 21. He is buried in the Hebrew Cemetery on Shockoe Hill, Richmond, in the Levy family plot.

And oh yes, I and both of my brothers were in the various branches of the military during World War II and my youngest brother Joseph was also a medic in the Korean war.

Let there be no question that one can be an observant Jew and an American patriot at one and the same time.

SHAVUOT QUESTIONS

The holiday is called the time of the giving of the Torah, rather than the time of the receiving of the Torah. Why is this?

Why is it customary to stay up the entire first night of Shavu'ot and study Torah, then pray as early as possible in the morning?

Why is it customary to eat a dairy meal at least once during Shavu'ot?

Why is it customary to adorn the home and synagogue with fruits, flowers and greens?

Let us also remember that we cannot be truly free men, nor would we be worthy of such freedom, unless we take upon ourselves to observe and do all that G-d commanded us in His holy Torah. Like our ancestors at Mount Sinai, we also must proclaim: Naaseh vnishmah -- we will do and learn; and only then will we have lasting freedom.

THE VAV ABOVE

For many centuries it has been the common practice to start all columns in the Torah except five with a word beginning with the letter vav. The letters vav which stand at the heads of the columns are known as the vavei ha-amudim ("the columnar letters vav"), and are associated in the tradition with verse 27:10 of Exodus, in which the term vavei ha-amudim (translated as "the hooks of the pillars," or "the hooks of the columns") is used in connection with the instructions being provided for the building of the court of the Tabernacle.

Five columns of a Torah start with letters other than vav. These letters, when read in sequence and then terminated with a vav (so that they create

a mnemonic phrase), spell out the two word b'yah sh'mo ("Whose name is the Lord," Ps. 68:5). The letters constituting the two words b'yah and sh'mo are bet-yod-he and shin-mem-vav respectively, and are written in most Torah scrolls emanating from western regions — i.e., in Ashkenazic scrolls — in this order: bet, from Bereishit (Gen. 1:1; and since Bereishit is the first word of the Pentateuch there is obviously no way of starting the first column of a Torah with any other letter than a bet); yod, from Yehuda (Gen. 49:8); he, from habaim (Ex. 14:28); shin, from sh'mor (Ex. 34:11); mem, from mah (Num. 24:5); and vav, from va-aidah (Deut 31: 28).
