WORDS OF THE RABBI *Rabbi Robert Wolkoff*

The Holidays Are Over - Now What?

Well, the holidays are over. For some of us, they were inspiring. For some of us, they were empty. For some of us, they were joyous. For some of us they were lonely. For some of us, they were invigorating. For some of us, they were exhausting. There are as many reactions to the holidays as there are Jews.

Actually, there are even more, because, of course, we can always argue with ourselves when there's nobody else around! One Jew, two opinions. For me, personally, the holidays were all of the above and more.

But one thing is clear. There are a ton of holidays in the Hebrew month of Tishrei, and there are none in the Hebrew month of Cheshvan.

Now what are we supposed to learn from that?

To my mind, it has a lot to do with what it means to be a "religious" person. There's a lot of confusion about this. Some think that if you look like you just got of the boat from Europe, you must be religious. And for others, it's "orthopraxis"—doing things like keeping kosher and keeping shabbat. And for others, it's being a morally exemplary person, and so on.

But after a moment's reflection, we can see that these definitions are inadequate. "Traditional" appearance may be an ethnic marker that somebody is Jewish—you don't see many Eskimos wearing a shtreimel these days—but that tells us nothing about a person's spiritual life. Halachic behavior tells us about what a person does with their body. What's going on in their soul remains a mystery. And we all know people who are very decent and wonderful to be with, but who do not perceive themselves as being "religious" at all.

So what does it mean to be religious, and what do the holidays, or lack thereof, have to do with it?

It appears to me that we are meant to learn something from the contrast between the enormous intensity of the holidays, and the "normality" of the time after the holidays. Our lives are extremely "event" oriented. Our calendars are overfull, and we run from one appointment to another, filling our days with one "thing" after another. If any particular event is uniquely powerful, perhaps even transformative, we don't even have time to notice because we're too busy rushing to the next thing. And, naturally, we're already late.

And on the rare occasions when we have "nothing" to do, we—literally—don't know what to do with ourselves.

So during Tishrei we hardly have time to breathe, since there's so much going on. And then, during Cheshvan, our Jewish life lapses into routine (a.k.a.

carpool tunnel syndrome) or, worse, collapses altogether.

But from the perspective of a religious Jew, there really isn't any spiritual difference between Tishrei and Cheshvan. On the 10th of Tishrei, Yom Kippur, we live in a world of Torah and mitzvot. Every action is under scrutiny. Every action links us with all of the Jews who came before, and all who will come after. Every action is an opportunity to feel the closeness of G-d. Everything we do helps us achieve atonement and at-one-ment.

A month later, on the 10th of Cheshvan, we still live in a world of Torah and mitzvot. Every action is under scrutiny. Every action links us with all of the Jews who came before, and all who will come after. Every action is an opportunity to feel the closeness of G-d. Everything we do helps us achieve atonement and at-one-ment.

Put in another way, for the religious person, something is obvious that is not obvious to everyone. It is, in the words of Alan Jones, that "everyday events are the means by which G-d tries to reach us," and, consequently, it is through our everyday actions that we can try to reach G-d.

We could even say that, as important as the 10th of Tishrei was, the 10th of Cheshvan is even more important. We all know where to find G-d on the 10th of Tishrei. The 10th of Cheshvan reminds us that, in the words of our father Jacob, "G-d was in this place, and I didn't know it." And that is the essence of becoming a religious Jew.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE *RUTH ANNE KOENICK*

Every year on the Sunday before the secular New Year, the New York Times publishes my favorite edition of the Sunday Times Magazine. Not because I can eke out one more square in the crossword puzzle, nor because I can finally afford one of the homes listed in the back, but because the entire edition is dedicated to the eloquently written stories of people who died during the year. Although some are the rich and famous, some the infamous, they are interspersed with unrecognized names of people who have made a profound difference in their community, in the world and ultimately in your life and mine. So I begin by sharing two of those stories with you today. (Since I teach a course on ethics I want you to know that some of the words are taken directly from the magazine.)

Irena Sendler, a Catholic Polish woman in her 30's organized an underground network of dozens of women, a network that communicated by secret hand signals, safe houses and a conspiracy of silence that saved 2,500 Jewish children from a sure Nazi death. As women, they were able to carry children and swaddled infants with a sense of normalcy in a world that was anything but normal. Out of the Warsaw ghetto, mothers handed over their children, choosing who they thought could safely be transported to a new home. Sendler often returned to a home where the parents had disagreed about giving up their child, or a grandmother had refused to let a baby go, only to find the apartment empty as the entire family had been deported. Irena said that before her father died from typhus, he told her that if she saw someone drowning, don't stop to ask questions, you just jump in and jump in Irena did. As an elderly unsung hero, Sendler balked at being portrayed as something special. Instead she said that the first acts of courage in saving a child were when the Jewish mothers and fathers kissed their babies one last time to give them a chance to live.

Half a world away and two decades later, Mildred Loving, wife of Richard Loving, sat down in 1963 to write a letter to the ACLU. With pen and a piece of lined loose leaf paper, she told a story starting with my husband is white and I am part Negro and part Indian. Growing up in rural Virginia, Mildred was courted by Richard beginning when she was 11 and in spite of their segregated community, they fell in love and in 1958, married in Washington, DC. Upon returning to a state that prohibited mixed marriages, three police invaded their bedroom and arrested them, keeping her in a rat infested cell for 5 nights and holding him only overnight for after all, he was white. Back in DC, they knew they could never return home or even visit their families for a holiday or family celebration, so Mildred wrote the ACLU asking if there was some way they could just visit relatives. In 1967, Chief Justice Earl Warren handed down an opinion striking down the Virginia law saying that the freedom to marry has long been recognized as one of the vital personal rights. In the years after, Richard and Mildred turned down all requests for interviews, believing that it wasn't their doing, it was God's work.

Something about these two stories, stood out to me as a clear connection to each other and to us as Jews. Their quiet demeanor in helping to repair the world, their strong belief in God, ordinary people, extraordinary acts. Their stories are our stories for one doesn't need a paid ad in the Harvard Crimson to know that people question the legitimacy of the Holocaust, one doesn't need to read that well respected organizations want to add the name of Israel to the list of terrorist countries, nor do we need to listen to the ranting of the Iranian president to know that our history is intertwined with the history of those who are discriminated against by the color of their skin, by who they love and the religion they practice.

Email Problem Solved – Well, sort of...

We know that some congregants have been turned off by receiving too many emails from the synagogue, and we're taking steps to address that. But, the main reason why the statistics are below our expectations is that many people just aren't receiving them.

Our mailing list was transferred to the new system (Constant Contact) from our old Yahoo account (btannounce) so, the only explanation for congregants not receiving new messages is that the mail is ending up in their spam filters. If you have not been receiving the official announcements from the synagogue or the Religious School in the past month, you need to check your junk mail folders and flag at least one message as being from a "safe sender".

Different mail systems and spam filters use different terminology to categorize why and how such mail is hidden from you but, since you now know there is legitimate mail coming from the synagogue office (President, Webmaster, or School @bnaitikvah.org), you should have an idea where to look for it and how to give it "normal" status.

Some congregants made a mistake and clicked the "opt-out" box at the bottom our email. The "Constant Contact" service will not allow us to send mail (of any sort) to someone who opted out of the system. To get back on the list, you have to go through a re-verification process. We cannot do this for you. To get back on board, or to sign-up with a new address, start by going to bnaitikvah.org/cbtnews.html and fill-in the form.

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ANOTHER VIEWPOINT

B'nai Tikvah's Thirtieth Anniversary

This year, 2009, is the thirtieth anniversary of the merging of three congregations into what is now Congregation B'nai Tikvah, formerly known as the Jewish Community Center of North and South Brunswick.

I find it hard not to stop and think about what it took to create this congregational facility. Do you ever stop and look around you when you enter a public library and ask yourself, my goodness, what planning and work and time it must have taken to create this place?

Who donated the land, or was it purchased, and how was the money raised? How many hundreds of hours must have gone into the meetings and discussions as to what should the building look like? Should it be one story or two? Should it be red brick or yellow? Street entrance or side? Children's section in the front or in the rear? Separate play section for the very young children or integrated? Should staff offices be upstairs or down?

What kind of air conditioning or heating plant, fire protection, emergency exits, moveable book islands or fixed? What kind of lighting, free use of copy machines or charge by the sheet? Who is going to be the architect and does he or she have experience building a library? Has anyone gone to see his past work or spoken to the architect's former clients?

Who were the committee people who did the spade work? How did they deal with the inevitable disagreements among the planners? Were there any real fights? One can imagine the fire works over whether to have a small theater set up for lectures, and who would pay the cost of providing the necessary equipment and furnishings for these additions? Is it an unnecessary luxury or something that should be included in any modern facility?

Printing Pages and Forms

With thanks to Kim Riemann for suggesting the idea and showing me how it could be done, you can now print pages from our website in a format that makes sense. Printed pages will be automatically centered without the left index column and all the decorative graphic snippets will be suppressed.

As with any other significant programming change to the website, this automatic feature requires that the web components be freshly loaded from the website and not reused from cached files saved on your computer from a previous session. To insure this, simply hit the F5 key on the current page before you print it.

It is also now possible for us to design pages that contain lots of information but, can be printed with all the pertinent information appearing on a single page.

President's Message

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I struggled for a while on how this connects to B'nai Tikvah until a friend called and joined the annual chorus of "have you written your speech yet". She suggested the concept of "it takes a village" and so it is that theme connected to the kindness and strength of others that binds our stories together for when one group is discriminated against, all of us are.

For many of us, B'nai Tikvah is the essence of "it takes a village" for it takes more than us alone to live our lives, to raise our children, to care for each other when someone is sick, to join together to celebrate a simcha, and to come together when someone dies. We are a communal group and we are a caring community.

This concept was reinforced for me this past year as I share with you two more recent stories. As some of you know, in late January, my daughter in law Lisa, the woman who last year made me a grandmother, who gave birth to the lovely Mackenzie Barbara Herman, experienced a serious medical problem. Although she is fine now, during the first few months after it happened and as recent as last night, members of this congregation ask about her recovery, not always from people I have a close intimate relationship with, not necessarily people who I talk with on the phone or get together with for a cup of coffee, not even just those that I have friended on facebook, but the diverse group of people who make up the village that you and I are part of. In fact, when I could barely get the words out of my mouth for a mishebarach, my friends, the women who populate my personal village, volunteered to say her name so she would be on the list. Each of us in this sanctuary today, has similar stories where the members of this congregation have stood by you, stood for you, and stood with you.

One Shabbat in March, when I returned home from shul, my husband Paul met me at the door to tell me that my long time close friend had died overnight from ALS better known as Lou Gehrig's disease. A young woman with two young sons, her death left a hole in my heart and the hearts of her friends and family. Nine years before her death, her husband converted to Judaism. Riki and I had often talked about marrying outside of our faith, as both of us had weathered the emotional and substantive challenges that decision brought to us. When I asked Riki's husband why after so many years of marriage and of life he made this decision, he said, we have a child and it takes more than us to raise him.

Randy Pausch, the Carnegie Mellon professor who is well known for The Last Lecture said that we cannot change the cards we are dealt, just how we play the hand, and Riki's husband made a life changing

The **BOOK OF ESTHER** is read on Purim – it is the story of a woman's courage and determination to save her people. The **BOOK OF RUTH** is read on Shavuot – it is the story of a woman's choice to convert to Judaism and her dedication and commitment to her new family. And The **BOOK OF LAMENTATIONS** is read on Tisha B'Av– it is a series of sad and heartrending readings.

These books, along with the **TORAH, TALMUD, TANAKH** and **HAGGADAH** are filled with explanations, lessons and guidelines. Our Jewish books have something for everyone. So come inside the treasure chest of Jewish books and have fun reading and learning about life, love, customs, history, identity and family.

She was overwhelmed with positive emotions about the kindness of people who do not know her family. She referred to all of you as angels sent by God to help others on this earth. Her family is very grateful for all of the gifts especially for the winter clothes. Her husband has been wearing his winter boots and coat daily. She is enjoying cooking in her pots. She only had one pot and it would take her a long time to cook because she would have to cook part of a meal, wash the pot, then cook the rest of the meal. The children love their toys. Thank you for bringing joy and comfort to this family.

Another Thank you note: “This family has never experienced such great generosity. The mother told me she was happy to see that her children finally have toys to play with so they are no longer bored at home. The teachers were commenting that they noticed the children’s self esteem improve when they came to school proudly dressed in their new clothes. The children are now appropriately dressed for the weather and are even wearing socks which were noticeably missing prior to receiving the gifts. They sleep much more comfortably at night with their new blankets and their heater.....” This is why we run this program...to make a difference in peoples’ lives.

Who are these families? These families are all in need. They are referred by various sources including Jewish Family Services, local welfare directors, school social workers and senior centers.

decision on how to play his hand. A few weeks ago, I was at my doctor's office for my annual physical. As we talked, she came up with a list of things I should change in my life during the coming year. I told her that her list is far too hard, that I'll never be able to do all of those things in just one short year. She looked at me, this nice Jewish doctor and said...Ruth Anne, you are president of a synagogue, it will be the longest year of your life. Since I clearly have a little extra time this year, I ask myself how do I want to play this hand I've been dealt. There is a story about Yeshiva University deciding to field a rowing team. As some expected, they lost every race even though they practiced for hours every day. Finally, they sent the captain Morris Fishbein to spy on Harvard, the perennial champions. Morris schlepps off to Cambridge and hides in the bushes next to the Charles River, carefully watching the Harvard team practice. After a week, Morris returns to Yeshiva and announces that he has figured out their secret. His teammates shout "Tell us! Tell us!" and Morris replies "We should have only one guy yelling. The other eight should row." It is interesting how elusive some answers are even when it is right in front of your eyes. And how simple it seems when we all work together with no one being more important than anyone else.

I started thinking about how to play my hand long

before I met with my doctor, starting when my mother died in 1995. My father had passed away almost 20 years before and almost all of my family lives in Maryland so I no longer had a place to go for holidays. I needed a place to call home and I found that place here because even though I am not a long time member, I have found sanctuary at BT. I often think about how bleak my life would be if I didn't have this community, this village to be part of, and some of what motivates me to volunteer is a commitment to make sure that this community is always here for you, for me and for generations to come.

This past year the Federation conducted a demographic study of Middlesex County. The voluminous report is rich with information and we learned for example, that there are about 56,000 Jews living in Middlesex County and there are 10,000 children under the age of 18, but only 8,400 are being raised Jewish. I am not suggesting that everyone in this room who can have more children do so in order to assure that more are raised as Jews, although it is certainly an option, but I am suggesting that we work together to enhance our religious school, bring more Jewish children and families in through the nursery school, and that we, as a village, commit to keeping BT the community it is and can be.
