A Message From Rabbi Robert Wolkoff



So the title of this article could be, “Fools rush in where angels fear to tread.” (Alexander Pope). The other day, someone asked me if I could write a letter. About what?

There is a young Jewish woman who divorced her husband in civil court 4 years ago. The husband has refused to give her a *get*, a Jewish bill of divorce. As a result, the woman is now an *agunah*, “anchored,” unable to move on with her life. The husband, our congregant tells me, is studying in a yeshiva.

Could I write to the yeshiva about the situation?

Sure, I said. This is a terrible thing, and the husband shouldn't be allowed to go on with business as usual until he mans up and does the right thing.

So I write the letter.

Little did I know...

The next day, two things happen. The first is that a parent at my kids' school thanks me for the letter. How in the world does she know about the letter? Turns out, the wife put it on her Facebook page (you can find it at setgitalfree.com). And it now has 620 “likes.”

That's the good news.

The bad news is that the same day I start receiving harassing phone calls from a bunch of yeshiva bochers. Cursing, ugly comments, calls in the middle of the night, etc. Apparently, they think that calling me is more important than studying Torah—which speaks volumes. And apparently, they think they know something about halachah—but are entirely lacking understanding of the meta-halachic values that are supposed to guide our behavior.

Put it this way: They have all the cans in the six-pack, but they're missing the little plastic thingy that keeps them all together.

“The little plastic thingy” is values, values like recognizing that “great is human dignity.” Doing things “for the sake of peace,” and “to prevent enmity.” Avoiding situations “where there would be suffering.” And, above all, “Doing the right and the good.” And the scariest thing is that many of them expressed the view that the husband is doing a public service, because it will teach women not to act like the wife has acted.

Oy.

And somebody is going to make a shidduch for guys like this?!

Pity their wives.

Just to be clear, nothing I am writing here should be seen as an attack on Orthodoxy. I spoke to two of my Orthodox colleagues recently, and their immediate and passionate reaction was that the husband's actions were shameful and he should give his wife the *get*. And, in fact, the most remarkable aspect of this whole affair is the nobility of the wife, who is completely loyal to a halachic system that is betraying her.

This is a *shande*, a true shame.

As it turns out—I didn't know any of this when I wrote my letter—the husband and wife both come from the nobility of American Orthodoxy. The list of rabbis who have been enlisted in this fight looks like an all-star team of yeshiva scholars. Which only increases the sense of revulsion at what is going on. The Psalms teach us that “The Torah of the Lord is perfect, it is a comfort to the soul.” There is nothing in this whole mess that is “a comfort to the soul,” and for every day that this goes on, the Torah is diminished that much more.

PS: Just so you know, within Conservative Judaism there are two ante-nuptial agreements which prevent a bride from being put into this horrible situation. I won't perform a wedding without them. But at the end of the day, the thing that matters is not the sophistication of our legalities. It is the elegance of our ethics.

Why go to Minyan, really Why?

I have taken on the challenge of reinvigorating our daily minyan.

Our daily services provide an opportunity for us to express our essence as a Jewish community. I have observed that the most compelling reason for most of our congregation to attend a "daily minyan" is to honor the memory of a dear one.

There are few of us within the community who pray with a daily minyan. It is likely that there are many of us who are using other sacred portals such as meditation, strengthening their spiritual connections in a variety of methods.

Anyone who does something positive should be lauded. Proudly displaying your mezuzah on your home and teaching your family about our heritage are important and I'm convinced that if you are a member of B'nai Tikvah you are confident in your identity.

Monday-Thursday & Saturday evening minyans have fallen upon hard times. I will be forming a working group with the blessing of the ritual committee, to explore and to focus on the spiritual desires of our community.

It is clear that when there is a reason to attend a service, our community is very supportive. Examples of this include **Sundaes on Saturdays** at my home, and most shivah minyans.

I believe that our lagging service attendance has less to do with inconvenience and more to do with the inaccessibility of prayer and the meaning of prayer in our lives. But this is just my opinion.

I see this project as a refocusing of our attention. Sunday night's minyan has a near perfect record of fulfilling a minyan thanks to the community that was built and maintained by Jeff Schwartz, our Sunday minyan leader. Our morning minyans, Thursday morning's at 7:30 AM and Sundays at 9 are also very well attended, partly due to a group of regulars who value friendship and who are grateful for each new day.

Some suggestions we may explore to help enhance our week-day services is to incorporate personal and communal prayers of healing. We can also share personal revelations about our spiritual encounters, brief prayer insights presented by Rabbi Wolkoff, or occasionally we can add meditative singing to our prayer experience.

I hope to share my vision for deepening our engagement as a congregation, and a commitment to bringing meaning, relevance and joy to the practice of Judaism and prayer in particular. Let's be certain that these are the core qualities of our community. I believe that we must work tirelessly toward a world in which Judaism is central to the lives of Jews everywhere, starting with our own congregation and community, and is a profound and positive force for humanity. We must work vigorously in pursuit of that goal, and help B'nai Tikvah evolve and seek new ways to raise the bar. We will need to reach deeper to serve our own congregants, while also looking beyond our walls, and that we need to continually redefine what it means to be Jewish today.

You authorized the sale of our parsonage, and we followed through by selling it above our asking price. We renegotiated the contract with our caterer, ensuring constant monthly cash flow without sacrificing revenue. We trimmed office expenses without compromising our services.

We restructured our Religious School and Nursery School administration and look forward to hiring a single Education Director to oversee both programs. We asked everyone, from our clergy to our members, to make sacrifices. Working together, we have vastly improved the financial health of our congregation and we are so proud of each and every one of you as we work together to assure that B'nai Tikvah remains the strong vibrant community we all love.

Coming up on February 15, we will hold our annual fundraising gala – a masquerade ball, honoring Marc and Bobbi Binder. The Binders have individually and as a couple done so much over two decades to help our congregation to thrive: from Family Shabbat to serving on our Board of Directors and countless committees, teaching Torah reading, participating in minyanim, and so much more. They have touched hundreds of lives in our community, and it is OUR honor to recognize their tireless contributions. Please make sure to support this wonderful event by attending that evening, sponsoring an ad, bidding on an auction item, and congratulating Marc and Bobbi for all they have done and continue to do. As the Jewish and secular years march on, we hope that we all fulfill the promises that we made to ourselves in September and in January. SHIVA ETIQUETTE

Over the past number of years I have lead many Shiva minyons at the homes of congregants who have lost a beloved member of their family. The family expects the Rabbi and the Cantor will attend to the families needs by meeting with them prior to the funeral and coming to their home during the Shiva period to give comfort and solace to the mourners. The family requests that an appropriate "Jewish" funeral be performed and that an appropriate period of Shiva be observed with the Synagogue providing prayer books and congregants to lead services at the house of mourning.

I have observed that on several occasions the bereaved family have either, without thought or without caring, served one or more of the following items which violates the laws of Kashrut which I believe is inappropriate.

1. Putting out platters with meat and cheese on the same platter.
2. Putting out platters containing pepperoni, ham and other non-kosher items.

I understand that many of these platters are brought to the Shiva house by friends and family, but they should be inspected before being put out for consumption.

I believe that for the days that Shiva is observed consideration should be given not to offend those who come to give comfort.

If you are a family member or friend and see this type of behavior occurring I believe you should let the bereaved family know that the items should be removed.

Dear Fellow Congregants,

For those of you who don't know me, my name is Shelly Talmud and I've been a member of the B'nai Tikvah family for 22 years. I want to talk to you about the war on terrorism, the security of Israel, and the safety of my own son, Adam, currently serving in the Israel Defense Forces (IDF). Altogether, these important issues have motivated me to organize a fundraiser on behalf of Israeli soldiers on Sunday, January 26, 2014 at B'nai Tikvah.

My life took a big turn last year when Adam left our East Brunswick home to join the IDF. Adam has instilled our family with pride for his commitment to Israel and anxiety for his safety. As he became an IDF soldier, our eyes were opened to the fact that many of a typical soldier's basic needs are unmet by the IDF. We realized that in order to keep Adam, and "all of our sons and daughters," well supplied while serving in the army, we needed to help.

This past summer I heard attorney Nitsana Darshan-Leitner, founder of Shurat HaDin (Israel Law Center) speak about her group's successes in combating terrorism by suing Islamic Jihad, Hamas, Hezbollah and other terror groups and governments on behalf of Israel's victims of terror. Shurat HaDin has successfully frozen over \$600 million in assets, putting a massive roadblock in the path of terror funding. Her presentation was powerful, with a clear message of strength and perseverance. I was so inspired by Nitsana I felt it was important for others to hear what she had to say.

What better way to help the men and women defending Israel than to share the work of an activist battling terrorism on a different but no less important front. I promise you, Nitsana is a speaker NOT TO BE MISSED!

Mili Rosloff - A Love Story, a Happy Life, and a Sad Story

CHAPTER ONE - A Love Story Begins

There is a book called "The Notebook", which was subsequently made into a movie that came out in 2005 that parallels our story and that of many couples who have had a strong marriage and who have had to watch and deal with the painful and tragic deterioration of one spouse gradually declining into the hell of mental and physical deterioration, while the "stronger" one has to fight to keep up his or her strength and morale while fighting a losing battle to hold on to the other as long as possible.

I met Mildred - I'll call her Mili here as that is how she preferred to be known, in 1939, when she was only sixteen years old. Mili and her friend Blanche would walk to school together to James Monroe High School in the Bronx, New York. Blanche suggested that Mili stop in to her house some time to meet some of her friends. Life was much less formal in those days. Telephones were not common in working class homes in the Depression years, so dropping in on friends unannounced was the usual way of visiting. Blanche's home was the meeting place for many neighborhood and school friends, so I was not at all surprised to see a new face there.

I sat down next to her and asked the usual things like "how do you know Blanche" and so forth, and it turned out that she already knew my brother Reuben. They had graduated together in the same Junior High School class. We didn't stay long at Blanche's house as it was a school day and Mili had to be home early.

I walked her home and up two flights to her family's apartment. She put her key into the door lock and turned around to bid me goodnight. I was already smitten. There was something different about Mili. A combination of sweetness and grace, intelligence without condescension, and, she was very pretty. I desperately wanted to kiss her, but I was so afraid of doing something stupid that I just turned around and ran down the stairs. I glanced up at her for a moment as she looked down at me with the stare that says "What's the matter with him?"

Soon I began calling on her and made friends with her family. Fortunately they took a liking to me (I worked hard at trying to be likeable). Mili made it plain that although she liked me as a friend, she was not interested in having me as a steady boyfriend. I persisted and her mother and Aunt Helen would counsel me to be patient. After all Mili was still very young, and to give her time.

I had no choice. I would see Mili whenever I could. I was just two years older than Mili (our birthdays are just two days apart) and after I finished High School, I worked unhappily in the fur trade. There was talk of a war brewing in Europe. We all felt it was only a matter of

time until America would become involved. I was preparing myself to go into the Army Air Force. In the winter of 1941 -1942 I left home to go to Maine to attend a work study course in aircraft engines and followed up with more work-study courses at Middletown Air Depot in Hershey, Pennsylvania near Harrisburg.

Our romance took a turn for the better during the period that I was home between Maine and Pennsylvania. One evening a group of friends and I, boys and girls, went to a neighborhood ice cream parlor for sodas. Money was scarce in those days. A nickel was the dollar of the day. Five cents would get you onto a trolley car or a bus. A dime would buy you an eight inch kosher hot dog that stuck out on each side of the bun, and the charge for an ice cream soda - two scoops of any flavor with a pile of fresh whipped cream and sprinkles in a huge curved glass that sat in a metal cage-like holder was also just ten cents.

We sat around the tables gabbing until a bag lady came in with her hand out. The boys had already spent their money for sodas for themselves and the girls. Kids make jokes to hide their embarrassment and so they made wise cracks about the bag lady because they had no money to give her. I saw that Mili was upset at our friends behavior, added to her pity for the beggar, it took all of the pleasure out of the treat and she stood up to leave. I still had a few cents left. I gave it to the woman and left with Mili. As we walked out of the store she took my hand, and looking back over time I always felt that was the magic moment that our lives were bonded.

In early 1942, during my stay in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, I lived in a rooming house, run by the landlady Ethel, a prudish old maid, where I made some very good friends among the other young men who also worked and took classes at the Middletown Air Depot. One of these fellows, George Laickan, was a bit older than the other boys and we hit it off from the start. George got married that year and brought his bride Esther back to our rooming house in Harrisburg. We had to make a few changes in sleeping accommodations so that they could have a room to themselves, and Esther became our mascot and den mother.

I talked so much to Esther about Mili and eventually as our friendship matured, Esther decided to invite Mili to come to Harrisburg for a weekend as her guest. Poor George! Just married and he had to give up his bed and spend two nights cramped into a bed with me and another fellow while Mili slept with Esther.

Poor Ethel! Our landlady had never had any female roomers and now with two of them in her house at the same time she was certain that the devil was at work here. Our landlady had a way of making us feel deliciously wicked even though we were as innocent as babes. Later, George and Esther and Mili and I reminisced about that story for many years. Fifty years later, and 3000 miles apart we were still in touch until both George and Esther passed away.

A few months later, when I returned from Pennsylvania, I asked Mili to marry me.

Old Phone Scam Resurfaces

Ever get a phone call supposedly from a Microsoft technician who asks you for access to your computer? If you were suspicious of a scam and refused, good for you. Unfortunately for those who were caught off-guard, the outcome was disastrous.

The early version of this scam, simply allowed them to gain access to any personal information you may have on your computer, such as bank and credit card accounts.

The latest round of these scams encrypts your Windows account, preventing all access to your machine until you purchase a decryption key for hundreds of dollars. In a recent episode, I was unable to help one of our congregants as the system even prevented me from running the Recovery Console off an original CD. We had no choice but to re-install Windows from scratch, resulting in the complete loss of data. Fortunately for the congregant, their data was not worth the ransom fee demanded by the scammers.

There is also a new strain of viruses that can cripple your computer in a similar manner.

I can't emphasize enough, how important it is to back up your sensitive data on one or more external flash drives that are not continually plugged into your machine.



They cooked in the kitchen in a big kettle that always hung over the fire. Every day they lit the fire and added things to the pot. They mostly ate vegetables and didn't get much meat. They would eat the stew for dinner leaving leftovers in the pot to get cold overnight and then start over the next day. Sometimes the stew had food in it that had been in there for a month. Hence the rhyme: "peas porridge hot, peas porridge cold, peas porridge in the pot nine days old."
