Another Viewpoint



I Wish, I Wish, I Wish

My trip last year to Israel for Passover left me with some mixed feelings. Some good, some not so good. Feelings of pride and disappointment. I looked around at the growth and modernization, at the beauty of the land, and at the disappearing but inevitable loss of historic landscape that must be sacrificed to make room for human habitation.

My trip to the Wall was an unambiguous expression of Jewish delight in our being. The plaza was filled with all kinds of visitors. From hippy to Conservatives to Haredi. Entire families, children, baby carriages, wheel chairs, and plain chairs. Men and women (separated by the mechitza of course) so thick at the Wall that it took patience and determination to get close enough to place a message into the cracks.

Despite the intensity of the swaying and praying at the Wall there was almost a circus like atmosphere about it. It was joyous. It was exhilarating and I felt privileged to be there once again.

On the other hand, disturbing to me is the apparent increasing secularization of the Jewish people and the schisms among the religious, non-religious and anti-religious residents. The drift away from religion by so many, and the animosity toward the religious and Ultra Orthodox.

Given that the Ultra Orthodox tend to take advantage of the law and seek public support of their large families, which understandably irritates the hard working and tax paying population that runs from Modern Orthodox to reactionary anti-religious, it seemed to me that the divide is so great as to make the split in the American political landscape almost collegial by comparison.

The secularization of Israel and the movement away from Judaism disturbs me. How can there be a Jewish state without religion? My own Israeli family has changed since making aliyah over thirty years ago. When my daughter lived on a little moshav in the desert, she and her daughter would light candles on Friday nights and recite the blessings. Today no one gives any thought to the fact that the day of rest was a new social innovation introduced and mandated by the Torah.

I was challenged by some of the other guests at the Seder as to why religion was necessary at all when there are so many good people who are not religious. In other words one does not have to be religious to be a good person. So how do you define a good person? Someone who keeps his TV volume low so as not to disturb the neighbors? Or someone who only beats his wife occasionally? Well and good, but where is the commitment? Our religion demands a commitment. Thou shalt not murder, or allow another to do so.

We all to some degree pick and choose what we deem important to us, but in the heat of argument, the fact that the standards and behavioral parameters are spelled out in the Torah seemed to get lost. After a time I had the oddest feeling that I was a missionary here among the native Hebrew speakers, most of whom had bible training as part of their education.

To counter their arguments I wish that I had thought to point out that he (or she) who saves even one life has the same merit as saving the whole world. I gave as good as I got, but wish I had remembered to say that our religion also tells us that we are responsible for the widow and the orphan, the sick and the poor. I wish that I had reminded them how much of our modern law stems from the Torah.

I wish, I wish. Well, maybe next time.



A Message From Our Co-Presidents



*And let them make Me a sanctuary that I may dwell among them.
Exodus 25:8*

On February 6 and 7, we gathered together to celebrate Shabbat in our newly renovated sanctuary. While the Sanctuary Committee was responsible for the planning and selection of paint, pews, ceiling, fabric, lighting, carpet and every other detail of the sanctuary renovation, we did not see the newly decorated room complete until we walked in during the first weekend in February.

Wow! It was absolutely overwhelming to see the result of months of planning, hours of meetings, thousands of emails and phone calls, meticulous attention to our budget and a seemingly infinite number of details. Everything looked so clean and fresh. The wood beams on the ceiling against the new beveled white panels looked elegant and dramatic. The beautiful woodwork of our Aron Kodesh “popped out” from the blues used behind it and many people commented that it seemed to be floating in the sky. Alongside the light walls, the stained glass windows looked even brighter, with each symbol of our heritage radiating colorful light onto the Bima. The pews not only looked fabulous and welcoming, but they felt incredibly comfortable. Our new Torah covers were perfectly coordinated with brand new lectern covers – all made by our congregants. When we opened the ark during services, its interior – so carefully restored by members of B’nai Tikvah – appeared all the more stunning.

The Lord spoke to Moses, saying: Tell the Israelite people to bring me gifts; you shall accept gifts for Me from every person whose heart so moves him. Exodus 25:1-2.

And these are the gifts that you shall accept from them: gold, silver and copper; blue, purple, and crimson yarns, fine linens...Exodus 25:3-7

While the gifts that helped make this renovation and the purchasing of a new Torah possible were not precious metals and fine linens, the generosity and kindness of the members of Congregation B’nai Tikvah made these projects come to fruition. Some congregants gave of their time and some made financial contributions; we all shared our gifts to support the refurbishing of the center, the very heart, of our building. We will have wonderful memories of the Shabbat weekends in January of 2015 when we prayed in the Kiddush room – with cocktail tables serving as makeshift pews, and our Torah surrounded by the beauty of nature. While many people enjoyed the intimacy of these alternative services, we are simply thrilled to call everyone back to our new sanctuary and say “Welcome Home!”

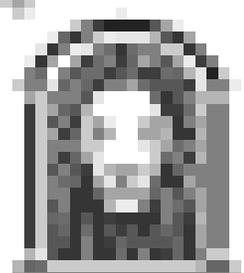





Wrap-Up of the 2015 World Wide Wrap

A new record was set on Superbowl Sunday, but it had nothing to do with football. On Sunday morning, February 1st, 2015, the B'nai Tikvah family joined the Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs and a record number of Conservative Jews across the globe who participated in the 15th annual World Wide Wrap. This signature event, which began in 1999 with the release of the instructive film, *The Ties that Bind*, provides the inspiration for men and woman to adopt the ritual mitzvah of putting on tefillin in their daily lives.

The local minyan and breakfast, sponsored by the B'nai Tikvah Men's Club, set a record as well. More than 60 people gathered in the Kid-dush room, with 25+ wrapping themselves in tefillin. Rabbi Robert Wolkoff could not recall a time when more people gathered together here for this event.

Rabbi Wolkoff detailed the symbolism that when the Hebrew letters align, each participant "becomes a living mezuzah." Cantor Bruce Rockman encouraged all to continue in this practice throughout the year, and especially honored nine congregants who regularly attend Sunday morning minyans. All are invited to attend with the Cantor on any Sunday morning at 9:00 a.m. in the Beit Midrash.

Steve Katz, Men's Club President, commented that "the numbers today reflect a resurgence in interest and Men's Club leadership within the younger generation." Part of that resurgence comes from Craig Cohen, who was recently honored as the local Men's Club Man of the Year for his planning and fundraising efforts. "We're planning one or two more events through June with the goal that this will help build momentum into next year."

Also stepping up is Mark Rones, V.P. of Planning. He's looking for more active Men's Club members, and will be setting monthly Sunday morning Board Meetings with bagels and coffee provided. Emails will be going out to all current and prospective Men's Club members about upcoming meetings.

A: I currently have pieces on exhibit in three separate shows; a small local show for the South Brunswick Arts Commission, a show at the Printmaking Center of NJ, and one at the Monmouth Museum. Many of my works are published on my website: phil-welscher.artistswebsites.com.

Q: Are you in shows like this all the time?

A: To be in three shows running concurrently is unusual. For a long time I had stopped showing to focus on that food, shelter, clothing, tuition thing but, I'm trying to stay out there now.

Q: Do you have a favorite medium to work in?

A: I work mostly in colored pencil and pastel. I do more digital rendering and image manipulation now as well. I have a piece, "In Concert" on my site for instance, in which the foreground image was completely digitally rendered and then combined with photographic background elements.

Phil had to correct me when I referred to some of his works as drawings, when they are actually considered "paintings in pencil".

He explained that the difference between a painting and a drawing is not based on the specific medium nor tools used but rather the way they're used. "There are a lot of people out there who draw with a brush."

Phil has won juried awards at national and international shows, such as the Washington Square Exhibition, Long Beach Museum, The Colored Pencil Society of America, and been published in two books on colored pencil.

Rather than settling for a career as a starving artist, Phil worked in the field of print advertising production for such companies as J. Walter Thompson, McCann Erikson, Gray Advertising, and ran the production for the gold card promotions at Chase Bank.

You probably have seen advertising materials that Phil produced at some point, either in your mailbox, on a billboard, mall display, or other advertising media. Phil has his name on two printing industry patents for methods for creating certain types of promotional materials.

The work depicted below is entitled "L'dor VaDor" (From Generation to Generation), a mix of Colored Pencil and Pastel. A scribe imparts stories and lessons about the torah as he works, connecting the next generation to the text that has connected so many generations before. Contrary to my initial belief, any resemblance of the child depicted in the drawing to a member of our congregation, is purely coincidental.



Phil's most noted work, in my opinion, is a piece entitled "The Collective Memory", currently on display at the Monmouth Museum in Lincroft through March 8th. It's a work in colored pencil about a person learning to chant haftarat and the feelings of connection with history evoked through the act of reading on Shabbat. Phil used pre-WWII images of shtetl Jews, based on works by Roman Vishniac and merged them with his own reference materials recognizable to members of our congregation.
