From Rabbi Robert L. Wolkoff

Where Was G-d?



"It is not why I suffer that I wish to know, but only whether I suffer for Thy sake!" So said Rabbi Levi Yitzchok of Berditshev, one of the greatest of the Chasidic masters.

As we approach the anniversary of Kristalnacht, the pogrom that foreshadowed the Holocaust, it is natural for us to question how our suffering could have happened. Where was G-d in all of this?

Shall we say that G-d is not actively involved in the lives of individuals, but rather only with the broad patterns of life and existence? Then why do we pray, with at least some expectation of being heard? Why do we mention the names of specific people in need of help or healing if G-d doesn't deal with specifics?

Shall we instead say that G-d is indeed actively involved with each of us as individuals? Then must not G-d be held accountable for six million individual deaths, and suffering beyond measure? And considering the impersonal, mechanical style of the Nazi death machine, can we truly say that our suffering was for G-d's sake?

Shall we say that it was not G-d who was ultimately responsible, but rather human beings? But then how do we explain G-d's intervention in Egypt to free us from slavery? And how, looking at the other end of history, can we believe in a Messiah who will transform the world—but wouldn't come to Auschwitz?

Or shall we perhaps say that we overestimate the strength and power of G-d? Maybe G-d wished to prevent Auschwitz, but couldn't; wished to intervene, but lacked the ability to do so? Perhaps G-d was suffering with us, maybe even more than we did!

There are no answers, only questions. But there is something holy about those questions. They reflect the truth of another great Chasidic story. On one occasion, Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel of Apt cried for hours and hours, so great was his love for Israel, and so deep was the pain he felt at Israel's suffering. It happened that Reb Sussya of Anipol was visiting Apt that day, and he came to console the Apter. "Did not G-d command us to be joyful?" asked Reb Sussya. "Sussya, Sussya," replied the Apter, "what will become of you? Do you not feel the dreadful suffering and the bitter persecution to which the people of Israel are subjected?" "Yes," replied Reb Sussya, "I feel them. But it is written in the holy Zohar that G-d inflicts on mankind only as much suffering as it can endure."

And in that, I think, there is some small comfort—enough, at least, to give us the strength to keep on questioning.

I Can Do Better



As our calendars approach the end of the most deadly year in the history of our country, I imagine that it will be difficult to celebrate Thanksgiving. Our congregational family is not immune to the pandemic. We have experienced the loss of loved ones and our community has been rocked by our inability to gather; all of our celebrations have been subdued.

Still, we look for the silver lining, we are thankful to all of our congregational professionals and volunteers who continue to maintain the mission of B'nai Tikvah, to build a Jewish community that is open and caring through the understanding of our tradition.

Our tradition teaches the world exists because of three things: *Torah* — Jewish learning, *Avodah* — worship, and *Gemilut Hasadim* — acts of loving kindness.

Although our current crisis challenges us, we can certainly continue our mission. We look for a silver lining, as we Zoom services, Zoom religious school and Zoom acts of kindness. You probably agree with me that performing these functions are less effective than when we engage with each other, but they are possible.

I fear that many of us will be passive. As I analyze my engagement in our traditions, I recognize that we are dealing with a moving, changing target. As long as we believe that the pandemic will end sooner rather than later, we may spend too much time on the sidelines and our instincts will dull. How many Zooms can the kids take? Gathering is too dangerous! There is so much great TV these days!

Our tradition teaches the world exists because of three things: *Torah* — Jewish learning, *Avodah* — worship, and *Gemilut Hasadim* — acts of loving kindness.

It is important that we each examine our personal commitment to our traditions. Do you engage in Jewish learning? Are you developing a personal relationship with G-d? Are you committed to doing acts of kindness?

I'm confident that many of our congregational family are continuing their wholehearted engagement in acts of kindness, raising awareness for worthy causes such as our USY food drive and "Making Strides Against Breast Cancer." These are quintessential Jewish charitable initiatives. But this is not the entire story.

I suspect that most of us find the other two stated Jewish traditions, learning Torah and worship, less exciting and engaging than doing acts of kindness. Organized events, where we can be with others, Continued on page 7






