RABBI ELIGBERG LEADS

The Art of Public Prayer

Dear Friends,

For the past several issues of Hakol, I have focused on the importance of communal prayers and the need to strengthen our daily minyan. This month I would like to continue that discussion by focusing on several ideas raised by Rabbi Lawrence Hoffman in his book "The Art of Public Prayer - Not for Clergy Only."

"Our days are filled with rituals, one following on the heels of another, as we carve up time and compartmentalize it around events that involve us...Ritual is how we play out pre arranged scripts of behavior to shape specific durations of time...Without ritual there would be no meaningful use of time...Rituals require ritualizing groups."

Hoffman raises our awareness of the abundance and importance that rituals play in our daily lives, how they help us arrange our lives into important building blocks of existence. For these rituals to be effective they must be both routine and familiar. This is true whether the script of the ritual is brand new or inherited from our past. It is the incorporation of these ritual moments that help us move from activity to activity with a greater sense that what we do in our lives matters and allows us to experience the emotional importance of the moment.

The daily ritual of worship helps us focus on the accomplishments of the day ending or focus on the wondrous potential for the day that lies ahead. By coming together as a group for public prayer we not only have this personal experience but we are transformed from individuals into a community; a community of worshippers that allows us to connect to the shared values and experience that we all hold in common.

"Ritual is not the result of faith, but one of its courses - that is why we need good rituals. Ritual's power lies in its artistic capacity to present an alternative world where time and space unfold in structured ways that indicate pattern, plan, and purpose. Faith derives from trusting that the universe in which we live is meaningful and ordered, as opposed to being random, chaotic, and accidental."

The very fabric and structure of the daily liturgy are designed to convey this powerful message. Beginning with God, the Creator and enduring force for order in the cosmos the liturgy moves from the transcendent God of the universe; to God as Liberator, reflecting the national experience of the Jewish people in history; to God of Revelation, the One who reveals the essence of the Divine Presence; to the God of Sinai, who gives us the gift of Torah as a blueprint for a society that reaches out to the Holy One; and finally to the God who is near to the heart of every person who approaches the Divine Presence - whether one approaches with joyous celebration; whether one comes limping into the presence of the holy one in need of healing; whether one comes burdened by daily travails; or whether one approaches with uncertainty and skepticism. The liturgy is meant to be a series of stepping stones leading to the abode of God.

"Each worship service is a rereading of a sacred script and the establishment of a sacred reality, a world that did not exist until we willed it to, one that we establish anew with every sacred performance. Part of the script rehearses history as we choose to see it, the people of the past as we care to recollect them, and a selective perception of the events that made us what we are."

Shevat/Adar 5763

The daily ritual of worship helps us focus on the accomplishments of the day ending or focus on the wondrous potential for the day that lies ahead.

The experience of worship and the liturgy of the service ground us in our common past, root us in our shared history and give context to each of our lives. But it is not by looking backward that the worship experience has it's most significant impact but rather it is by it's exhortation that we take this awareness with us as we think about ourselves and our lives. "Similarly, we recite creeds that inspire us and commands that exhort us, until in the end; the fullness of the liturgical vision becomes so plain that it cannot be denied. We are committed to this sacred way of perceiving reality, and we leave worship with a sense that the world is shaped differently than it was when we entered. Saying it has indeed made it so."

Let us join together in finding this sacred path into the Divine Presence so that there is no longer exists a dichotomy between the real self and the worshipping self, between our reality and the world envisioned in our prayers.



A Family Discussion Topic: Lashon Hara—Hurtful Speech

OUR CHILDREN'S WORDS

Lashon hara is so pervasive, and so potentially (and ofttimes) hurtful, that Jewish tradition, suggests it was the cause of God's permitting the destruction of the Jerusalem Temple in 70 CE...which underscores why Judaism continues to zealously urge our curbing hurtful speech. Children rely upon us to guide them along their paths to worthwhile lives. Helping them to understand the power of words is a critical responsibility of ours. Any opportunity we have to review words chosen by our kids should not be missed. How did Sara speak to her best friend about another girl she dislikes? How did Shmuel recount to you another child's misbehavior in class? How did Batya address her brother in a moment of anger? Each of us, teachers and parents, should try to help our kids grow in their awareness of the power of words, and their sense of responsibility for how they use them.



CEMETERY UPDATE

Congregation B'nai Tikvah maintains cemetery privileges at no cost for members in good standing and their immediate families in the Washington Cemetery, 104 Deans Rhode Hall Road, just off Route 130 northbound. However, certain regulations and requirements must be met in order to take advantage of these privileges.

B'nai Tikvah's requirements:

- The deceased must be Jewish by birth or by conversion in accordance with the Halachic standards of the Conservative movement. The Rabbi is the final arbiter of those standards.
- Contiguous graves may be reserved by immediate family members at a cost of \$50 per site.
- Congregants may transfer ownership of a grave to a family member (if the grave is reserved for \$50 or if purchased for \$500), but the grave cannot be sold on the open market.
- Congregants may not transfer their entitlement to a grave as a congregant in good standing to anyone else.

Washington Cemetery requirements:

- "No material other than Barre granite shall be used for monuments footstones, bases, etc. except by written approval of the [Washington Cemetery's] Board of Trustees."
- "No single headstone greater than four foot six inches in overall height including base and six feet in width whose base is not wider than seven feet will be permitted on


any lot, plot or graves except by written authorization of the Cemetery's Trustees...."

- "A monument taller than 4'6" (fifty-four inches) overall (from ground level) may be erected on the payment of \$500 for each foot (12") or portion thereof for a single monument stone not to exceed 28 inches in width. Said price is posted in the Cemetery office. The over-height fee for a double monument stone shall be twice the over-height fee for a single monument stone. Said fee will be deposited into the Cemetery's Maintenance and Preservation Trust Fund. This fee will not reduce the standard or current foundation charge and Maintenance and Preservation charge."
- "No photographs may be attached to any monument or above ground structure."
- "No monument, effigy, enclosure or structure whatever, or any inscription can be placed in or upon any lot, plot, or grave which shall be detrimental, improper, offensive or injurious to the appearance of the surrounding lots, plots, or graves, or grounds. Such violations shall be determined by The [Cemetery's] Board of Trustees and they shall have the right to enter upon such lot, plot or graves and remove any offensive or improper object, without notice, at the expense of the lot, plot or grave owner, without liability."



REFLECTION ON "RAISE OUR VOICES FOR ISRAEL"

Squeezing into the crowded lobby of Temple Emanu-El in Edison for the sold out "Raise Our Voices For Israel" concert on January 11, I was immediately met by a sense of anticipation and excitement. The lobby was packed with musicians entering, choirs rehearing, and community members trying to reach the seating area.

It seemed as if everyone I knew was there: the people I work with; the people I pray with; the people I folkdance with; the woman who sewed the costumes for last year's Purim spiel (satirical play) at the Highland Park Conservative Temple; and even the neighbor from down the street I had first met when he was walking his dog. It was truly a community effort. Synagogues from all over Middlesex County had joined together for a musical fundraiser for the protection of Israel's children. The "standing room only" conditions brought new meaning to the term "close-knit" community.

The program consisted of a mixture of speakers and performers, and featured the Sons of Tikvah band, song leader Eric Komar, and an impromptus *horah* through the aisles led by B'nai Tikvah Administrator Hadas Elami. Organizing Committee Chair, Harry Bernstein, read inspiring letters from community leaders including Governor McGreevey. Barbara Spack, a national vice president of Hadassa spoke on ways to support Israel's image in the media. Israeli vendors presented displays of Judaica and secular merchandise for purchase. Choirs, klezmer musicians, and B'nai Tikvah's own Diane Uniman all poured their hearts out in song.

This was a crowd that was ready to sing. We sang out American songs of peace as fervently as we sang *Am Yisrael Chai* (The People of Israel Live). As the Sons of Tikvah led us in a rousing *Od Yavo Shalom Alenu* (Peace Will Come to Us Soon), I could almost feel the longing and sense of urgency in the audience.

While the performances were terrific, the emotion and spirit that pervaded the event went far beyond the music. Together Orthodox, Conservative, and Reform Jews waved Israeli flags and belted out *Bashanah Haba'ah* (In the Coming Year). I was struck by the uniqueness of this situation. How frequently in the past had 500 (let alone a mixture of Orthodox, Conservative, and Reform) Jews sat in the same room and agreed on anything?

But the imperative to protect Israel's children was something that we all could agree on. In fact, we agreed to the tune of approximately \$35,000. Every person in the room, according to Harry Bernstein had made a contribution. Even the performers (who all offered their talents for free) had purchased tickets.

Before intermission, Cantor Rockman reminded the audience to visit the Israeli vendors using the words: "Go forth and buy!" Now the crowd that had been caught up in song became a mob looking to buy their way to Israeli security. Strangers brushed shoulders as they tried to navigate the


