RABBI ELIGBERG LEADS

The Art of Public Prayer

For me, any discussion of prayer evokes the words of our teacher, Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, of blessed memory. Heschel in his writing is able to capture both the mystery and the difficulty of prayer. Heschel states that: "To pray is to regain a sense of the mystery that animates all beings, the divine margin in all attainments. Prayer is our humble answer to the inconceivable surprise of living. It is all we can offer in return for the mystery by which we live." (1) The quotes on prayer are primarily from Quest for God: Studies in Prayers and Symbolism by Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, chapters one and two.

For Heschel, the source of prayer stems from our sense of awe and wonder at reality. Achieving this in isolation is not always easy. Often, by placing ourselves in the proper setting for worship, by surrounding ourselves with others who are reaching out to the source of holiness in our midst, we can find ourselves moving along a path into the presence of God.

To pray then is rooted in our desire to be brought to God's attention; to be listened to and understood; to realize that we are a divine concern. Prayer offers the opportunity to reaffirm that beyond the maelstrom of reality, the Holy One cares about what happens in our lives; that God walks with us on our journey.

Let us reflect with Rabbi Heschel on what impact prayer can have in our lives and our community.

"Prayer clarifies our hopes and intentions."

"Prayer teaches us what to aspire to."

"Prayer is a way to master what is inferior in us, to discern between the signal and the trivial, between the futile and the significant"

"Prayer makes visible the right and reveals what is hampering and false."

"Prayer is an invitation to God to intervene in our lives..."

"To pray is to dream in league with God, to envision His holy visions."

"Worship is a way of seeing the world in the light

"Prayer takes the mind out of the narrowness of self-interest, and enables us to see the world in the mirror of the holy."

"To pray means to bring God back into the world... To pray means to expand [God's] presence."

"Prayer is an answer to God: "Here am I."

May this be our answer to the Holy One calling out to us and may we find ourselves, fellow travelers along the pathways of prayer.

EXPANSION UPDATE

From Mitch Frumkin, President

So what do you see when you look at the two pictures on this page? What I see is a few wooden stakes which represent the building corners of our upcoming expansion!

While the last 10% of the approval process is taking longer than the other 90%, we are finally beginning to see the light at the end of the tunnel. Believe it or not, the easiest part of any project of this type is the construction which we anticipate will begin in May.

Just last week a meeting took place at the offices of



the Department of Environmental Protection in Trenton to present the proposed location of the expansion relative to the previously approved wetlands line. Based upon this meeting, it appears that all questions have been answered and all we have to do is submit our formal application and wait for our permit from the DEP to begin building. That is the good news. The bad news is that, as with any governmental process, although the actual review may take a few hours, the process will take

weeks. By the time you read this, the application should be submitted and the wait begins.

In addition to the finalization of our plans with the DEP, we are also busy meeting with banks and receiving proposal for the financing discussed at the Congregational Meeting this past December. We have also begun an in depth review of



the bids submitted by the two low bidders and will be meeting with them in March in order to make our final decision. Our preliminary review of the bids indicate that there has been no real change in the pricing structure since the project was initially bid last year.

While I hate to be too optimistic, I think that a groundbreaking in the early spring will become a reality!!

Get your costume, grogger, and masks ready, and plan to join us for a wild Purim celebration at the synagogue on Sunday morning, March 16 beginning at 11:00 am. The celebration of Purim, one of the most joyous and fun-filled holidays of our Jewish year will start with a performance by the **Sons of Tikvah Band**. After the concert join us as we continue our fun at the synagogue-wide carnival and costume parade at 12 noon. On Monday, March 17, the Religious School will host a Purim Pizza Party at 6:00 pm. Following the party, at 6:30 pm, will be the reading of the Megillah.

The Megillah tells the story of the deliverance of the Jews of Persia from the destruction planned against them by Haman, vizier of King Ahasuerus. This feat was accomplished by the monarch's Jewish wife, Esther, and her cousin, Mordecai. There is no merrier occasion in the Jewish year than Purim. Tradition dictates that on Purim we must observe "Shalach Manot," the sending of gifts to friends and to the poor as a token of deliverance and to add to the joy of everyone at this festive time. Tradition also says that we should be so intoxicated with merriment at this season that we fail to distinguish between the cursing of Haman and the blessing of Mordecai.... **\text{\text{\text{\$\text{

◎ THEFT OF PURIM REVEALED ◎

Two of the University of Dublin's most noted anthropologists, Dr. Patrick Fitzmorris and Dr. Morris Fitzpatrick, have announced the findings of a 20-year study: Purim is really an Irish festival. That's why it always takes place around St. Patrick's Day.

"A festival involving a McGillah has to be Irish," said Dr. Fitzmorris. "You can't convince me otherwise," Dr. Fitzpatrick added. "I have to conclude that the Jewish people have stolen the ancient Irish festival and renamed it Purim.

Originally known as O'Purim, the celebration was based on the life of an orphan colleen, Esther McGillicuddy, who happened to be a kosher caterer serving royalty. Esther's uncle, Morty McGillicuddy, wanted her to marry Shamus O'Haman, the Meyer of Clare.

The wedding was called off when O'Haman was jailed for watering his rum and selling it to the British Navy. But the tradition stuck and since watered rum is known as grog (no joke, folks), O'Haman became the first grogger.

The claim has created an uproar in the Jewish Community. Dr. Paul Burganschweros, president of the Conservative Congregation of Galway Bay, Our Lady of Perpetual Nachas, said, "We will get our holiday back." Patrick Moskowitz of the Tipperary Shul, a long way from Dublin, declined comment until he could discuss the matter further with his parliamentary representative, Lord Ian Draycup.


