'Rejoice In Your Festival So That You May Truly Be Happy"

What is the Holy One trying to teach us by these words of Torah? At first reading, this command regarding the festival of Sukkot seems a bit odd. Alone, amongst the Pilgrimage Festivals and the other Holy days listed in the Torah is this instruction about how we are to feel as we celebrate the festival.

What makes Sukkot different from other holy days that we are commanded to be joyous? Our sages of blessed memory emphasized this in the liturgy calling Sukkot z'man simchatenu - "the season of our rejoicing".

I believe that if we look at the observances of Sukkot and the values which underlie them, we will find the answer and a significant lesson. The most obvious of Sukkot observances is the construction of a Sukkah. Building a Sukkah requires us to plan, to gather our materials, to set aside time for putting it up, and to decorate it. A few prayers for nice weather are often included here. Once we have done all this our Sukkah is ready for our family and friends to enjoy.

Why do we leave our comfortable homes, build Sukkot that often test our ability and the laws of physics, and risk the vagaries of weather? We have all been taught that we are reenacting the wandering of our ancestors in the wilderness on their journey from Egypt to the Promised Land. Our Sukkot are a visual echo of the tents that our ancestors dwelt in for forty years. The fragile nature of the Sukkah emphasizes the dependence of the Israelites on the Holy One. We have also been taught that dwelling in the Sukkah allows us to "reexperience" the sense of anticipation of our ancestors as they camped out in their fields during the harvest season. An abundant harvest was truly a time of great joy and an occasion to express their gratitude to God.

There is a third and less well promulgated message. Moving from our homes filled with amenities and gadgets to the Sukkah and its more rustic environment reminds us that we can make do with less. Our abundance of material things is not an ultimate measuring stick of happiness or successful living. On Sukkot we are commanded to set aside the clutter of things and to make room for something more valuable time. This is why Sukkot became known as the "time of rejoicing".

Just as our ancestors recognized the importance of the harvest back then, the Torah instructs us to recognize the importance of the work that we engage in today. The Torah and our teachers also wanted us to understand the importance of time and committing time to celebrate that which is ultimate in our lives.

The enigmatic verse we began with is really a simple instruction: "Rejoice in your festival". Take the time that really celebrating demands. Make the time to do what is ultimately essential. Create the space in your lives-physically and otherwise to share with people whom you cherish most. Then "you may be truly happy!"

For centuries, Jews have invited Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Aaron and David to join them at their holiday table. Today, many of us extend that invitation to include Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel, Leah, Miriam, Deborah and Esther. Each night, as we prepare to eat in our Sukkah we invoke their presence, giving each, in sequence, top billing.

In addition to these ancestral ushpizin, a nice dinner table activity can be to go around the table and have people invite a guest from Jewish history and explain why they would like to meet that person.

"In Praise of Continuing Education"

One of the highlights for me, of this past summer, was my attendance of the CAJE (*The Coalition for the Advance-ment of Jewish Education*) conference at Ohio State University. Attending these special gathering of Jewish educators is energizing infuses me with greater enthusiasm and grand plans. These meetings provide me with a muchappreciated charge.

During my three days at CAJE, I had the opportunity to study with 3 renowned individuals; Rabbi Elliot Dorff, Rabbi Stuart Kelman and with Debbie Friedman. Each of these charismatic teachers approached the same subject matter from their particular strength. Through an array of techniques including text study, music and movement, participants attempted to personalize the prayers that we know so well.

The essence of being Jewish is transmitted through the siddur. Through their collaborative efforts the class left with new perspectives and appreciation for prayer. I cannot place into words the profound affect that their passion for teaching sacred texts, and their love of God and Judaism has had on me. I wish you too, at some time, will have an opportunity to have a similar experience.

Well, maybe you can. Debbie Friedman is coming to us! Thursday November 6, 2003, at 8PM, Debbie Friedman is coming to the State Theatre in New Brunswick. "Referred to as the "Joan Baez of Jewish Song," this singer, songwriter, and guitarist has become a treasured part of the Jewish music landscape. Infused with Judaic expressions that rest on a pure voice, Debbie's songs, such as "And The Youth Shall See Visions" and "Mi Shebeirach (The Healing Prayer)," will touch your soul and warm your heart."

Rabbi Elliot Dorff, of CAJE and the University of Judaism in Los Angeles says "Debbie Friedman's music defines what contemporary expression should be - meaningful, uplifting, deeply traditional and yet new and modern, good for both body and soul. God has blessed us a thousand fold by giving us Debbie Friedman."

Debbie Friedman herself explains "My objective is to involve people in the experience. I try to make prayer user-friendly. Because the music is in a familiar genre, people are able to make the connection between the music and the text. The real power is in the poetry of the liturgy, how moving and stirring it can be, connecting us to our deepest and most precious ideas, hopes, and fears."

We have a rare opportunity to experience, in my judgment, one of the most important voices in Judaism today. More than the queen of Jewish music, Debbie is a modern prophet. She has the unique ability to communicate and inspire us through prayer and her own words. Debbie is down to earth and true gift from above.

The High Holy Days are just about over. We have all resolved to become better people. With renewed dedication, we search for teachers that can inspire greater spirituality. To paraphrase one of Debbie Friedman's songs

"Oh, the water in the well and the healing in the well...the women and the water and the hope that's in well..."

The Well is coming to us; we must take advantage of this opportunity. You can purchase tickets from the State Theater. I will also try to arrange for a special B'nai Tikvah section at the concert.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

This year my wife Amy and I took our eldest daughter, Maya, up to school for her first year at college. Those of you who have gone through this experience probably remember this day as a day of mixed emotions - both happy and sad. We were very happy for her, ready to be independent and on her own in a fabulous environment. At the same time we were very sad to say good bye even if it's only for the few months until her first break. I can tell you that for me and Amy it was a very emotional day.

Although the number of Jewish students at her college is relatively high, Maya will be exposed to all kinds of new people. But this exposure will include a growing disease on campus these days. An old disease named "Anti-Semitic." She and thousands of other Jewish students will face something that my daughter growing up in central New Jersey has only read about as a faraway problem that will never affect her.

All around us in campuses across the country "Anti-Semitic" is the new in thing. It began with support of a Palestinian State alongside Israel, progressed to a Palestinian State instead of Israel, and has resulted in a demand for the destruction of the Jewish state altogether. The supporters of the Palestinian state will claim, on campuses filled with impressionable young people, that Israel is a brutal state that denies the Palestinians basic human rights. They will say that they don't have any issue with the Jewish faith, it's only the Jewish state they have a problem with. They will say that the Israeli army is a brutal regime that kills and tortures innocent Palestinian people.

All of these false accusations camouflage the underlying message: the destruction of the State of Israel. Unfortunately young people on college campuses are not familiar with the facts and begin to believe these misrepresentations. And therefore a growing number of students across the country are taking sides with the wrong camp.

The anti-Israel group understands that the next generation of voters and leaders can be found on campus today. They are making an extra effort to get their message across. They find a group of intelligent and ideological kids and they pour a tremendous amount of resources into recruiting these kids with great success. Sadly, some of the leaders of these organizations are Jewish students, motivated by a twisted ideology.

In order to stop these trends we must be active and committed, and know the facts. We must start teaching our children the truth at an early age, so they are equipped to combat the spread of lies. We, the Jewish communities, have to support the people in Israel and our college kids by participating in every organized rally or community event, and demonstrate, with our families, our commitment to Israel.

I urge you to come and participate in an Israel solidarity rally - the Israel Inspires Weekend, starting



Seven Strategies For A Successful School Year

Jews, as a people, are an extension of the Jewish family just as the synagogue is an extension of the Jewish home. Therefore, as a religious school, we seek to include families in the educational process along with their children. A strong and cohesive partnership between the school and the home must be nurtured to foster successful growth in learning and to promote Jewish identity. There are many opportunities available for family involvement:

- 1. Take an interest in the materials and books that your children bring home. Use the outlines you received to discuss the work of the class. Review booklets and parent pages sent home from school. Encourage and support your child in his/her homework. Showing interest will increase motivation.
- Keep abreast of the activities and programs that our school offers. Read our regular reminders and be alert to the notices sent during the year. Respond promptly to RSVP's and permission slips. Your support will aid to smooth running and efficiency of our school.
- Bring your child to synagogue. Attendance at worship services will facilitate learning and mastery of prayers.
- Involve yourself in classroom activities. Your participation will send the message that your child's Jewish education is important.
- 5. Volunteer! Serve on the religious education committee. Help with our special programs, make phone calls, provide refreshments, assist with class Shabbat dinners, promote tzedakah projects or substitute teach. There is much to do and help is always needed. Be a strong visible presence or work behind the scenes, but show your child that you support the school.
- 6. Perform mitzvot and serve as a role model to your child. When children see parents taking an active role in the community as Jewish doers, it creates an image that children will strive to emulate. Watch for monthly memos from our Social Action Committee that will detail opportunities for families to perform mitzvot at home and offer assistance in school projects.
- 7. Study! There are many learning opportunities at the synagogue available for adults. Also, join our PACT (Parent and Child Together) programs. When a child is proud of his/her parents accomplishing educational goals, then a model has been set forth which encourages the child to achieve.

Children learn by example, emulating the models that we create. Our actions are the best teachers of all. What is important to us will be important to our children. Accept our challenge to become partners with us to instill Jewish pride and the curiosity to learn, as we transmit to our children the warmth and beauty of our heritage. I expect you will find the experience thrilling, exhilarating, and satisfying. I look forward to seeing everyone on many occasions throughout the year.
