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# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE Arie Behar

### **Keeping Hanukkah in Perspective**

It is always very difficult for me at this time of year. It is only the middle of November and already I feel bombarded with Christmas. Everywhere around me everyone is so consumed with this magical, commercial holiday. It makes me feel like a stranger, an outsider. Every year I am also shocked by the celebration of Hanukkah in this country, and its elevation to the level of Christmas. I cannot get used to the idea that everyone around me, including my Jewish friends, are busy shopping, trying to be included in the larger celebration. It is even more difficult for me to see many of my Jewish friends get sucked into this holiday, wanting to be so much a part of the Christian world that they forget the true meaning and the real story of Hanukkah.

Hanukkah should be considered a minor Jewish holiday. As someone who grew up in Israel, I don't remember celebrating Hanukkah the way it is celebrated here. The holiday falls in the winter and lasts for eight days, and therefore served as a winter break from school. For me, and everyone who comes to this country



from Israel, all the festivity surrounding Hanukkah is quite strange and even unacceptable.

As a parent, a neighbor, or consumer, I can see the need to adopt some Christian traditions such as exchanging gifts with friends and giving year-end gratuities. But gift giving at this time of year is definitely not a Jewish tradition and is popular in this country only. It is not the way we celebrated as kids in Israel, and it's disturbing for me to see every year.

Hanukkah is about religious freedom. It is about a heroic struggle to keep a unique identity and the sacrifices made to retain this identity, and not adopt the customs of the larger world. Wouldn't our Christian friends and neighbors appreciate us more for NOT adopting their traditions, but retaining our own? In contrast to the initial struggle of the Jewish Maccabees to fight to maintain their identity, here in this country we are willing to submit all too quickly. When I go out at this time of year and am greeted with Happy Holidays, I wonder where this person was in the fall when the Jews were celebrating their major Holidays, the *hagim*. Hanukkah is a small and largely insignificant holiday in the middle of a very significant Christian holiday. It is not, and should not, be the Jewish Christmas.

### ISRAEL EDUCATION INITIATIVE: PROPORTIONALITY

Israel seeks peace and is still waiting for a Palestinian leader in the mold of Anwar Sadat and King Hussein to step forward and end the violence and resume negotiations. Until that happens, Israel must take prudent security measures to protect its citizens.

How do you determine the proportionate use of military force? When Palestinian terrorists plant bombs at Israeli shopping malls and kill and maims dozens of civilians, would the "proportionate response" be for Israelis to plant bombs in Palestinian malls? No one in Israel believes this would be a legitimate use of force. Thus, Israel is left with the need to take measured action against specific targets in an effort to either deter Palestinian violence or stop it.

What would America do if terrorists bombed civilian targets? After 9/11, we saw that America took the same type of action as Israel by launching military strikes against the terrorists. U.S. forces used overwhelming force and, though they never targeted civilians, some were inadvertently killed. Israeli soldiers do not deliberately target noncombatants. The murder of innocents is the goal of Palestinian terrorists. IDF activities are governed by an overriding policy of restraint, the requirement of proportionality and the necessity to take all possible measures to prevent harm to innocent civilians.

No innocent Palestinians would be in any danger if the Palestinian Authority took steps to stop terrorism. Israel would have no reason to take military action if its citizens were not under constant threat.

No innocent Palestinians would be in danger if terrorists did not deliberately hide among them. If the peaceseeking Palestinians prevented the terrorists from living in their midst, Israel would have no reason to come to their neighborhoods.

It is a tragedy whenever innocent lives are lost, and Israelis have consistently expressed their sadness over Palestinian casualties. By contrast, when innocent Israelis are murdered by terrorists, Palestinians hold rallies to celebrate the murders. As a democracy, when Israeli soldiers make mistakes in battle, they are called to account for those errors. On those occasions when Palestinian noncombatants are unintentionally injured, investigations are launched and the Israeli public debates the military's actions. According to the rules of engagement for Israeli troops in the territories, the use of weapons is authorized solely in life-threatening situations or, subject to significant limitations, in the exercise of the arrest of an individual suspected of having committed a grave security offense.

# **RELIGIOUS SCHOOL REPORTS**

#### What Is Chanukkah?

The Hebrew word Chanukkah means "dedication." The holiday is a joyous eight-day celebration by which Jews commemorate the victory of the Maccabees over the armies of Syria in 165 B.C.E. and the subsequent liberation and rededication of the of the Temple in Jerusalem. Unlike most Jewish holidays, Chanukkah is not Biblically based. The historical events upon which the celebration is based are recorded in I and II Maccabees, two books contained within a later collection of writings known as the Apocrypha.

The story of Chanukkah is well known to most of us. In the year 168 B.C.E., the Syrian tyrant Antiochus Epiphanes sent his soldiers to Jerusalem. The Syrians desecrated the Temple, and Antiochus declared that Judaism was to be abolished. He attempted to force a foreign type of worship (the Hellenistic worship of Zeus) on the Jewish people. This was part of his strategy to unite his subjugated nations for a final war with Rome. Most of the Jews, especially the upper-class communities, assimilated and accepted Antiochus' demands. But the Maccabees would not assimilate. That small band achieved the spiritual victory of remaining Jewish and the military victory of defeating the Syrian Greeks.

The story of Chanukkah, though more than 2000 years old, is a modern story for modern Jews seeking to know who we are and what Judaism means. It is a story of the reassertion of new Jewish nationalism, of the dangers of unchecked assimilation and of intolerant fundamentalism. It is a story that calls upon Jews everywhere to reaffirm our Jewish identities and loyalties while, at the same time, acknowledging positive influences that work upon us from other cultures.

#### **About Our Customs and Rituals**

Originally, the eight-day Feast of Lights was intended to parallel the eight days of Sukkot. The books of Maccabees made no mention of the beautiful legend concerning the jar of



oil which has come to be a part of Chanukkah. Several centuries later the story of the cruse of oil emerged in the Talmud.

Long ago, two great academies argued over how many candles we light each night. The School of Shammai reasoned that since the oil in that long-ago legend lessened as the days passed, so, too, should the number of candles. Shammai's students began with eight candles the first night, and lit on less every night. But the theories of Hillel and his students won out, and we now light one additional candle each night, thus continuously increasing our light and joy.

## USY ACCEPTS NORTH BRUNSWICK TOWNSHIP PROCLAMATION

North Brunswick Township mayor-elect Mac Womack presented members of United Synagogue Youth - Hagalil Region with a Proclamation during a North Brunswick Township meeting on Monday, Nov 3, 2003. Accepting the Proclamation on behalf of N/S Brunswick USY are Rafi Glazer and Hannah Ehrlich, N/S Brunswick USY Co-Presidents, and Shai Romirowsky, NJ Hagalil Regional President.

The Proclamation will help to raise awareness and increase USY membership as part of "Membership Awareness Week, November 9-15." This is an international campaign for the USY organization, and members of the executive board of the NJ region are coordinating efforts with local chapters to launch this program statewide.

United Synagogue Youth Organization, informally known as USY, is the high school youth group of the Conservative Movement of Judaism. The HaGalil regions has 42 chapters with over 1500 members in both high school and middle school groups. HaGalil region includes two-thirds of New Jersey.

North/South Brunswick USY meets at Congregation B'nai Tikvah twice a month for a variety of social, educational, and community service programs. This chapter has been honored with several coveted awards including Chapter of the Year, Most Improved Chapter and Individual Program Awards. The chapter sponsors Social Action activities; programs on timely topics such as youth violence, anti-Semitism, and Israeli Awareness; and participates in the annual Chanukah Party and Purim Carnival. Thousands of good people from New Jersey, 11 other states, Canada and Israel came out to show their support for the college's Jewish students, and for Israel. Your donations helped pay for the staff and technical support for the Hillel sponsors.

**Israel:** On the cusp of the Iraqi War, Tali feared especially for the safety of her autistic son, Alon. If a chemical attack were to occur Alon would be unable to wear the regulation gas mask. Your contribution to the Middlesex County Federation's Israel Emergency Campaign helped to pay for 232 custom-made gas masks—for Alon and other autistic children, for the frail and elderly, for people with respiratory problems. These special gas masks provide something even more precious than protection against chemical warfare evidence that New Jersey Jews care for their Israeli cousins.






