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#### SHAVUOT

Shavuot commemorates the awesome event experienced by the children of Israel seven weeks after the exodus from Egypt when they camped at the foot of Mount Sinai somewhere in the Sinai Peninsula. This event was the Revelation, when God's will was revealed to Israel. It marked the declaration of the Ten Commandments. Though these commandments do not constitute the entire Torah, which consists of 613 commandments (taryag mitzvot), they were its foundation. These Ten Commandments also became the moral bedrock for much of western civilization.

While the exact manner of this communication between God and man is not known and was always subject to various opinions by the great thinkers and Sages of Israel, it was an event of awesome proportions and a unique spiritual experience that indelibly stamped the Israelites with their unique character, their faith, and their destiny.

In the prayerbook, this festival is referred to as z'man matan Torataynoo, "the season of giving of our Torah," for this is the dominant theme of the festival. The everlasting significance of this theme is emphasized by the answer to the question of why this festival is not called "the season of the receiving of our Torah" instead. The answer is that while the giving may have taken place at one time and the occasion can be commemorated, the receiving of the Torah by Jews must continue to take place every day and everywhere.

The name Shavuot, by which name the Torah refers to the festival, means simply "weeks" and is derived from the fact that it is observed after seven full weeks of counting from the second day of Passover. The Talmud used the name Atzeret (which implies a concluding festival) by which to refer to it, an indication that the Sages regarded it as tied to and concluding the festival of Passover.

Its significance as an agricultural festival in the land of Israel is also reflected by two other names by which this festival is known: Hag Hakatzir, "the Festival of the Harvest," for it marks the harvesting of the wheat, the last grain harvest of the season, and Yom HaBikkurim, the "Day of the First Fruits," for it also marks the beginning of the fruit harvest and was the occasion for the bringing of the first ripe fruits to the Temple as an offering of thanksgiving.

We then continue with a Tikkun Layl Shavuot studying, discussing and engaging in dialogue until midnight. Refreshments will be available all evening as we celebrate the anniversary of God giving the Torah to our ancestors.

#### Ice Cream Kiddush

On Wednesday and Thursday, May 26 & 27 we hold our special "ice cream kiddush" in honor of the Festival of Shavuot. We will have make-your-own sundaes with all the toppings. Join us for services, and the special kiddush that follows.

#### **Shavuot Observances**

€ On Shavuot, we read the Book of Ruth. Just as Israel entered the covenant at Sinai, so Ruth entered the covenant through personal conversion. Just as the greatness of the Torah was revealed to Israel at Sinai, so is it revealed to all strangers who come to join the Jewish people with committed hearts.

€ It is fitting to read from the Book of Psalms on this day, which is considered by our tradition to be the Yahrzeit of King David.

€ Flowers are placed in the synagogue to remind us of the wilderness at Sinai.

€ Attend holiday services with your family.

Many families decorate their homes with branches and flowers to honor the Shavuot harvest. Because the words of the Torah are "sweet as milk and honey," it is the custom to eat dairy food such as blintzes and cheesecake. Those who have gardens, or live near a farm, pick and enjoy their own bikkurim - first fruits - such as strawberries, peaches, or other summer crops.

Just as farmers long ago shared their harvest with the poor, today we show our concern by collecting food and money for tsedakah.

We welcome Shavuot by reciting blessings over candles, wine, and hallah.

We thank God for life, for Torah and teaching, and for the harvest foods we will share.

#### Cantor Bruce Rockman

Stop.... take a moment to clear your mind...relax...take a deep breath...smile...unwind. I have a gift for you, or I should I say God does.

A few weeks ago Rabbi Eligberg offered us an opportunity to receive just such a gift, the joy of a restful Shabbat. We were reminded of our weekly opportunity to slow-down. He offered that the gift of Shabbat could be our opportunity to refresh our lives physically and spiritually. Take 24 hours and rest, he said. As our Rabbi stated, God created the entire world in six days and rested for one, Shabbat. It certainly would be nice for us to take him up on his offer.

Our routines, our lives just don't seem to work this way. Life is so complicated, so busy. We actually feel guilty taking time off, especially when it is not planned, such as a vacation, if then. How can you ignore your responsibilities and give yourself a day off every week? Besides, if you did take the time, is the synagogue the place you would chose to spend it?

Take 24 hours and rest, ... Our routines, our lives just don't seem to work this way. Life is so complicated, so busy... I would like to motivate you to give Shabbat a serious try. If Shabbat is already meaningful to you and a part of your family's routine, then I would like to hear about your Shabbat experiences and pass your knowledge along.

Most members of our synagogue are not Shabbat observant. Some say it is overwhelming, unable to follow the service, and for many, an inconvenience, they don't have the time. How ironic. Some would prefer spending some extra free time being active, shopping, or hanging out with friends.

This article is not about making anyone feel bad, or is it to list what you can or cannot do on Shabbat. There are how to, why to, when to and where to books galore about Shabbat; web sites to guide you, rabbis and cantors to guilt you; I mean to teach you. I would like to motivate you to give Shabbat a serious try. If Shabbat is already meaningful to you and a part of your family's routine, then I would like to hear about your Shabbat experiences and pass your knowledge along.

It is my approach to compliment you for what you are doing and not be critical for what you do not do. Still, I am not saying that we as a congregation are near to fulfilling our religious obligations or spiritual goals. We can all learn and grow spiritually. To do this, I think we need to help one another. The observance of Shabbat is a great way to succeed.

One of our USYers remarked to me, how good she felt walking to shul with her friends at a USY convention. It was difficult to put into words, she said, but I think she described the essence of Shabbat very well. She told me that although it was different to her, it made her feel proud to be Jewish and it

made her feel like she belonged. She continued, it was a new experience but it made her feel comfortable. This young lady has begun her spiritual journey. Young people can be more open to new experiences and able to take more chances. We can learn lesson from them.

During a trip to Israel a number of years ago, an observant Jew confronted me. He asked about my level of observance. He advised me to stay home on Shabbat rather than drive to the synagogue. He felt that God would forgive for not praying with the community. I am sure that he was right. God is good, and certainly forgiving. Our movement allows us drive to the synagogue, if it is the only practical way to get there. I felt a powerful need to pray with my friends on Shabbat and this was for me the only realistic approach I had.

I am grateful for the Conservative movement, because it has been my guide for spiritual growth. Today, Shabbat is more complete for me; now I walk to shul on Shabbat and on Yom Tov. I have made decisions in my life to make this possible, but only one step at a time, and not by myself. I have received support from friends, my family, and from my Rabbi. Thank you.

If you would like the same support and assistance, I'm ready to help. Lets get together and talk about it.

Worship the Lord in gladness; come before God with joyous song.

I am most proud of this program. My family and I look forward every year to the arrival of this group. I have always believed that having a friend in Israel is a most important way for a Jew to be connected to our homeland. This is a great opportunity for our kids and our host families to have a friend from Israel, and to learn first hand what it

means to live in Is-

I will never forget a couple of years ago when we hosted the daughter of a childhood neighbor. When I called him to tell him that his daughter arrived safely, his wife got on the phone and she

told me that she is so happy that Adi is with us for the next three weeks because she doesn't have worry about her going to a mall and being blown up. She said "at least for the next three weeks I know she is safe." How awful to hear these words coming from a mother's mouth.

America is the only friend in the world Israel has. Every time I visit Israel everyone asks me "What do the Americans think about the situation in the Middle East?" You would be amazed how much most Israelis know about us. Most

Israelis are more curious and concerned about American politics than most Americans. The reason is very simple – a decision made in Washington could affect every Israeli in his/her day to day life. One of the reasons that America is Israel's best friend is because of the Jewish community in America. Our involvement in politics and our contribution to the American economy and culture is one of the reasons both countries share the same values.

Israel has always opened its arms to displaced Jews from all over the world – from Russia, from Ethiopia, from Argentina. And tiny Israel would be there if anything ever happened to the Jewish community in the U.S. The strong friendship goes in both directions. I encourage all of you to take a moment in temple, or wherever you might meet the group from Ramla to make a new friend from Israel.

In order to continue to support this program, we are starting a new tzedakah fund, the Israel Exchange Fund. I hope that this fund will one day help make the program a true exchange program, when we are able to send the youth of B'nai Tikvah to Israel, as our friends in Israel have been able to send their children to us. Please remember this new fund when you make your next contribution to B'nai Tikvah.

#### From March, 2004 Board of Trustees Meeting

#### Administration VP Report Dan Greenberg

Hearty Mazel Tov to Bruce and Stacey Rockman and their families on the birth of Bashe. The Cantor will be taking off about a week; sincere thanks to all who are helping out with Shabbat services and daily minyans.

Long Range Planning: Continuing the process of forward thinking, At the March Board meeting we split into five separate groups, each looking at a different aspect of the questions and problems that were presented by Cyndi Kleinbart at the last Board meeting.

Maintenance has become a major issue. We are simply unable to keep up with the amount of work that needs to be done given the current number of hours that we contract for. We need to consider funding at a rise in the number of hours that we have custodial staff on duty in order to meet the needs of the congregants, the school staff and children and the caterer. This will be done at budgeting time.

Office Software: Because of the limitations inherent in TempleSoft (the

software used to drive our entire 'back office') and the lack of available support, we have spent many hours researching and looking at alternatives. We are satisfied that the best option on the table is ChaverWare, which are in the process of acquiring.

Pew Repairs: We are aware of the problem with the pews – the fabric is loose in many places and the pews themselves are not solidly attached to the floor – and are attempting to resolve the problem as quickly as possible – the upholsterer is scheduled to be here to complete the job this week.

#### Activities VP Report Gary Bergman

Programming: Nurit Brown is planning for a night of Israeli Dancing on Thursday March 11. Next month we're bringing back "Presidents and Their First Ladies". Bill & Sue Wills will portray Theodore & Edith Roosevelt.

Website/Communications: The website is being reorganized into many smaller sections. By de-consolidating

various topics, it is hoped that subjects will be easier to find and that pages will load faster with dial-up access.

Adult Education: Attendance at Adult-ed classes is increasing as more people find out how good it is this year. Jeff Schwartz, Arie Behar, and Dr. Azzan Yadin are to be commended for their efforts. Our next program, on geneaology, will be presented by Joel Gerbman. Helene Tinkel has put together an excellent program for late march and has asked that we publicize it as a "parent and child" event.

**Social Action:** Advertising is being prepared for the Passover food drive as well as getting a flier distributed to our religious school students.

Toys that were donated at our synagogue's Chanukkah party as well as the collected party items from our drive went to Homefront. #### How is the HaKol Produced?

When we meet someone new in the Congregation and mention we are the HaKol editors, we are often asked "Do you do that professionally?" When they find out we don't do anything like this for a living, the next questions are how did we learn it, is it a lot of work, and what kind of equipment and software do we use? Sometimes it's just curiosity, but a lot of the time the questions are related to a need someone has to do similar things at work or for another organization.

We came up with a new HaKol layout two years ago after looking at newsletters from other synagogues and non-profit organizations, and talking with the previous editor, who was a huge help in the transition. Nancy did have magazine and book editing/layout experience prior to our becoming the HaKol editors. Since we are editors, not writers, the HaKol would not be the informative bulletin it is without contributions both from those who write the regular columns, and from congregants who submit event information and articles relevant to our Jewish community. We appreciate all of their work, especially from those that meet the deadline on time every month.

The HaKol is produced in Microsoft Publisher, which we had no experience with prior to becoming the HaKol editors. Publisher meets our needs, and it's easy to learn. The only other popular publishing software used by professionals is an expensive, powerful program called Quark Xpress.

Editing of photos and graphics is done in Adobe Photoshop, a professional digital image-editing package, which Paul had been using for a couple of years. Currently the Ha-Kol is put together on a hot new Dell Precision workstation, but last year it was done on an older 1.4ghz computer with 384 MB of RAM. The only other hardware required is a good business-grade scanner, a printer and a CD burner.

At least 150 e-mails are involved each month, typically over a period of about ten nights. Roughly half are incoming and half are outgoing. In addition, we forward every e-mail submission to our webmaster so he has the information for the B'nai Tikvah website.

Very little paper is used in producing the HaKol, since most of the submissions are sent via e-mail and almost all the layout, formatting and editing is done in the computer. Usually only one proofreading copy is printed for production, and then only the pages needing final changes are reprinted so that we have a proof to take to the printer with the CD.

The HaKol is printed by Minuteman Press in Manalapan. It is not printed from a paper copy, but directly from our Publisher file (typically a 60 to 80 megabyte file) which is burned onto a CD and usually slipped under the door at the printer late at night along with the printed proof!

Hadas and the office staff oversee the mailing, usually with the help of volunteers. If you have any questions about how the HaKol is produced, feel free to call or send an e-mail.

#### Statement by Daniel Taub, Director, General Law Division, Ministry of Foreign Affairs at Press Conference of Israeli Delegation



The Hague, 23 February 2004

The suicide bomber who blew up the number 14 bus in Jerusalem yesterday, murdering 8 people, and wounding more than 50, was a member of Yasser Arafat's own Al Aksa martyrs brigade. Could anything be more shameful than recruiting, inciting, and paying the murderer of 8 children - students, parents, the brother-in-law of Israel's commercial attache here in the Hague? Could anything be more shameful than that? And the answer is yes, there is something more shameful: To do all this and then come to the city of The Hague, to ask the United Nation's Court of Justice to censure the victims of terror for trying to defend themselves. To come to the 'Palace of Peace', to the 'Court of Justice', on the very morning that the victims are being buried and mourned, murdered by Arafat's own henchman, to attack Israel for building a fence which might have saved their lives.

That is why Israel is not in the Court today. Because along with the states of the Quartet, with the host state Holland, and with the bulk of the democratic world which has urged the Court not to hear the case, we know that ultimately this issue, like all the other tough issues between us and the Palestinians, will have to be resolved through compromise and negotiation. It certainly won't be resolved by sending one-sided questions to the Court that seek to put those defending themselves from terrorism on trial, but not the terrorists. And when we see the list of states that have chosen to play along - those champions of human rights: Sudan, Cuba, Saudi Arabia - itself building a massive fence to stop infiltration from Yemen, we know we were right to stay away.

We did not want to build this fence. It's ugly, it's expensive - even though its temporary, and it causes genuine hardship to many Palestinians which we must take every measure to ease. That's why we did not build it for over two and half years of Palestinian violence, why we waited while 935 Israelis were killed. Until we could wait no longer. Until March 2002, a month in which 37 terrorist attacks in 31 days murdered 137 people, including the Passover night massacre. We could wait no longer because the fence works. Not a single suicide bomber has succeeded in crossing the fence between Israel and the Gaza Strip. In those areas of the West Bank where it has been constructed, the fence has already brought down suicide attacks by some 30%. We recently caught two suicide bombers on their way to blow up a High School in the north of Israel, only because of the fence. The simple truth is that the fence is saving lives.

But it has a humanitarian impact. In the Palestinian presentation before the Court there were so many factual distortions that, tragically, they disguised the fact that there is genuine hardship caused by the fence. And it's our responsibility to do everything we can to ease this - even if it means creating over 40 agricultural gates, building underpasses to connect Palestinian areas, running buses to help the 61 kids who are separated from their schools, replanting tens of thousands of olive trees, and building new infrastructure for the Palestinians where this can't be included in the fence, like the kidney dialysis center we have just built at Mukassat hospital. But in our concern for the quality of life of the Palestinians, we cannot forget the right to life of Israelis. The fence, and the hardship it causes, is reversible. Lives lost to terrorism are not.

The aim of the fence is simply that; to save lives. In fact it is to slow down the terrorists by up to 15 minutes, to enable the defence forces to stop them. And a fence along the Green Line, which runs through villages and valleys

with high ground on either side, would simply not do that. Which is why the fence diverts at points on both sides of the Green Line.

We're not trying to establish a border. If anything, it's the Palestinians, who insist the fence be built on the 1967 line who are trying to do that. We know that the future border between us has to be negotiated. That's what it says in all our agreements, in United Nations resolutions 242 and 338, and in the Road Map. The Palestinians can't have it both ways. They can't not fight terrorism and insist that we accept their maximalist position on the border negotiations. At this very moment we know that terrorists are putting together the next suicide bomber belt aimed at the heart of one of our cities, at a restaurant, a mall, a bus. With a Palestinian leadership doing nothing to stop them, the fence is the only thing standing between those terrorists and our families. But there is a better way. For the Palestinians to do what they've promised to do again and again. Not to send questions to the Court that ignore their obligations, but to fulfil them. But nowhere in the three hours of Palestinian statements before the Court today, was there any mention of any Palestinian responsibility. Not a mention of the Israeli-Palestinian agreements in which they undertook to arrest terrorists, stop incitement, collect illegal weapons. Not a whisper about the first line of the first phase of the Road Map, which requires them to take immediate action to dismantle the terrorist infrastructure. Because ultimately, Court or no Court, no leadership can evade responsibility. And as soon as there is a Palestinian leadership which accepts its responsibility, which talks to its own people about the need for painful concessions, as every Israeli leader for the past decade has done, a leadership like President Sadat of Egypt, like King Hussein of Jordan, then we will be able to stop building fences and start building bridges.

# THE OFFICE VOICE

Shalom,

A topic which often comes up in questions and in every day life here at the Synagogue is that of maintenance.

I don't know if most of you are aware that during the week there is only one person who performs all the cleaning and maintenance in the building. Most of you may see the weekend help that we have here which includes 2-3 people depending on the event and the day. During the week, one person working 8 hours a day is in charge of cleaning the main synagogue areas, bathrooms, kitchen, offices, etc. This same person also cleans the classrooms, often more than once a day when the same classroom is used by 2 or more different classes, and the school bathrooms. In addition to all the above, this one person is responsible for setting up for all the meetings and special school programs. His maintenance tasks, in addition to all that, include replacing light bulbs, minor plumbing repairs and other repairs that are required in an active building such as ours.

It is a lot for one person to accomplish! The only way we can make it work, at least to the best of our ability, is by knowing the needs of the different groups and organizations far in advance. In order for one person to accomplish all the setup and changeovers required, I need to know at the beginning of the week what meetings and events are in store. Then I try to use the same setups more than once or attempt to find easier ways to convert to another setup to free up time for other tasks.

On the weekends we have a little more help. The people who work here on the weekend are not here during the week. In order for me to instruct them on what needs to be done, I need to have the information in advance, so I will be able to communicate it to them. Every weekend Ed Molina, our maintenance company owner, receives a detailed instruction sheet from me with everything that needs to be done over the weekend. If I don't receive your requests on time, I can not include them in my instructions.

This column barely scratches the surface of this topic. Related items include coordinating schedules with the Caterer as well as those of our internal groups and organizations. Stay tuned for more on this subject next month.

#### A Passion for Truth

There has been so much discussion and debate about religion since *The Passion of The Christ* opened. By now, you may have seen the movie, certainly read the reviews and engaged in conversation over it. In any case, it is causing quite an uproar.

The film is in Aramaic, very long, violent and bloody and is still attracting crowds of people. However, what happens when the movie is pressed onto DVD and gets translated into a hundred languages and distributed widely. THEN it will start being shown in just about every Christian religious school classroom in America, and across the world. Why? Because, it'll be the coolest, most high-tech, graphically sophisticated version of Jesus' life and death that will be available. And that's when the potential of problems will begin and the increase of anti-Semitism may be on the rise.

The American Jewish Committee has done very good work with Christian groups in Europe explaining what is hurtful to us, as well as what is untrue about passion plays that depict the life and death of Jesus Christ. It is clear that Mel Gibson's version is 1) inaccurate, 2) based on a particularly anti-Semitic version of The Passion and is 3) insensitive to hatred and violence it may arouse.

Jesus' story is important to Christians as Mt. Sinai is to every Jew. We have no right to ask that they not tell their story. We can however, respond to the film with facts and not just emotion. To our students who are so very involved in this dialogue, I encourage you to talk to your contemporaries about the text of the Gospel, not the vile hatred of this passion play. Remember this:

"Believe those who are <u>seeking</u> the truth, be careful of those who claim to have <u>found</u> the truth."

If at any time in the future there are issues relating to the film, please feel free to contact me.

#### Yom HaShoah

Know where you came from so that you know where you are going.....

Each year, we stop to remember where we came from as we reflect on the darkest genocide ever known to the world. On the 27<sup>th</sup> of Nisan (Sunday, April 18) we will mark the occasion of Yom HaShoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day. On that day, we will pay respect and mourn the loss of six million Jews.

Soon after Yom HaShaoh, Yom HaZikaron (Sunday, April 25), Israel's Memorial Day arrives. On this day we commemorate the heroes who lost their lives fighting to establish a safe homeland for the Jewish people. Israelis visit Mt. Herzl (Israel's equivalent to Arlington National Cemetery) and have a moment of silence and reflection.

A day later, we celebrate Yom HaAtzma'ut, which is Israel's Independence Day (Monday, April 26). We rejoice in the fact that a tiny minority of people, who survived centuries of persecution, have their independence and their own land. For us, Jews who are living in the Diaspora, these April days give us a chance to think about our relationship to Israel and whether or not we visit. So many tragic events and disappointments have occurred this year. Too much war, too much loss, too much pain. Not enough talk, reflection, and mindfulness. The images of war in the media frighten us to the point of indecision. But hopefully, this will not continue. Not only do we care about our friends and families in Israel, but selfishly, we want to return to sending our children and ourselves to Israel. Let us all do what we can to return there often. I commend Rabbi Eligberg for taking a group of congregants to Israel. I wish the entire group a wonderful adventure and safe journey. May they go from strength to strength.

During the month of April, with these days of emotional highs and lows, let us not forget where we came from. Says Rabbi Zera, "The air in the land of Israel makes one wise." (T. Baba Batra 158b) May the day soon come when the unnecessary cycle of violence ends and we can all enjoy peace in our homeland.

# Purim in Israel— Where Else Does an Entire Country Devote a Week to Being Completely Silly?

"When I grow up I'm going to be Christian," announced my 4 year-old daughter Ariella after learning that Halloween isn't a Jewish holiday. (She doesn't yet know the word, "Pagan.")

Trying to change her mind, I pointed out that Judaism had an equally—if not better holiday—Purim. I reminded her of some of the merits of Purim (from a 4 year-old's perspective): coming home from nursery school to find mishloah manot (packages of sweets) in assorted sizes and colors on her doorstep; dressing up in fancy costumes and making as much noise as she wanted; baking and eating hamentaschen; going to carnivals, and coming home with goldfish. (I may be wrong, but I don't believe that anyone has ever said, "trick or treat" and ended up with a goldfish in her or his goody bag.)

Still Ariella remained unconvinced. In her opinion, Halloween was better because it involved more candy. She had made her decision. She was going to convert; the Jewish future would have to fend for itself.

Prior to the conversion conversation, I was tutoring a student in preparation for his bar mitzvah which was scheduled to be held in Israel on the Shabbat preceding Purim of this year. Less than one month before the bar mitzvah, my husband and I decided to plan a family visit to Israel to coincide with the event.

We arrived in Israel on February 26, a bit more than a week before Purim, and we were immediately struck by the numerous signs advertising Purim festivals. Billboards on the way to the hotel announced Purim celebrations with well-known Israeli entertainers. Days in advance of Purim, we saw costumed children, teens, and adults traveling presumably to parties. At a restaurant, we were informed of an upcoming "Purim Party," boasting half-price drinks.

Stopping in a shopping mall, it was impossible to miss the fact that it was the Purim season. Colorful, sparkling costumes, magic wands, fairy wings, and face-paint dominated the shop windows and walkways. Even the supermarket sported party favors, groggers, fresh hamentaschen (called ozney Haman or "Hamen's ears" in Hebrew), and commercially wrapped packages of mishloah manot.

When the big night of the Megillah reading arrived, we were prepared. We joined friends from Haifa at the Masorti (Israel's version of Conservative) synagogue, Kehillat Moriah, where my husband had pre-arranged to read Megillah. Ariella was disguised as a "cat fairy" and David and I joined in with matching silly hats and tee-shirts. We spent the evening listening to (and drowning out) the Megillah reading, singing, and eating with a crowd of clowns, ninjas, animals, and assorted storybook and television characters. (Periodically, the Rabbi would throw candy at the congregation—this made my daughter very happy.)

The next morning, we returned to the synagogue for Megillah reading, followed by children's activities. We decorated and wrapped packages of mishloah manot for tzdakah, played theatre games, sang songs, and had a delicious lunch with pita and humos, borekas (salty cheese-filled triangles in pastry dough), and of course, hamentaschen.

Later that afternoon, we packed our bags in the rented car, and began our journey southward. On the way to the hotel, we found a shopping mall so that we could make a quick stop to buy fruit. Our "quick stop" turned into a three-hour visit. During this time we received mishloah manot from the Chabad rabbi who was stationed at the mall with a Megillah scroll so that he could catch some chilonim (secular Jews) and enable them to do the mitzvah of hearing the Megillah read. We thanked him for the sweets and informed him that we had already heard the reading that day.

We were just about to leave the mall when Ariella spotted a bunch of children in costume congregating in front of an 8-foot long piece of wood with a picture of a pasture painted on it. In front of the wood was a clown who was about to perform a children's play. The next thing we knew, Ariella was sitting on the floor with twenty or more other preschoolers watching and participating in the show. At the end of the performance, Ariella received a balloon and a chocolate coin. (It was nice not to have to check for kosher certification.)

I am happy to report that as a result of this trip, my daughter has reconsidered her decision to abandon Judaism. In fact, not only is she planning to remain a member of the tribe, but she now wants to move to Israel ("because you get more sweets there").

On one point, my daughter and I are in agreement—there is no better place to spend Purim than in Israel.

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





#### Past President's Report Mitch Frumkin

Construction: Due to the delays in the project we have changed our meeting schedules with the Contractor and the Architect, to save costs. If we were to continue to use the Architect as we previously had, the additional cost would be approximately \$40,000. With the revised schedule, it will be approximately \$15,000. Effective immediately, the Contractor will be meeting with Mitch, Arie and Paul on a weekly basis to discuss the progress of the job. The Architect will perform periodic field inspections as necessary. Their primary role will be to approve each month's payment requisition as well as to approve all shop drawings. They will also be involved in an "as needed" basis.

Schedule: Due to the winter weather as well as coordination issues with the Contractor, the anticipated completion date has been moved to July 2004. The Contractor issues are primarily related to cash flow as well as the original mason deciding not to complete the work and a new mason has been hired. Over the last few weeks a number of meetings have taken place with the Contractor. Although we have not gotten ahead with payments, we have changed the payment process to protect ourselves further. This also protects us as we will know all contracts for materials and labor.
