RABBI ELIGBERG SPEAKS

CELEBRATE PURIM WITH FLAIR

and candies.

Purim is celebrated on the 14th of Adar, the day after the great battle described at the end of the Book of Esther. In Jerusalem, Purim is celebrated the next day, the 15th. This is because it was (and remains) a walled city just like the city of Shushan in which these events unfold. The Jews of Shushan had to defend themselves for an addiional day before they were able to celebrate their redemption.

The carnival spirit rules on Purim. Everyone is expected to make this day one of general merriment. Costumes and masks, games and activities all help create a feeling of gaity and celebration.

There are four Mitzvot associated with Purim:

1. Reading Megillat Esther (The Scroll of Esther) out loud: The Megillah (Scroll of Esther) is read in the synagogue at the evening and morning service of Purim. It is the custom to use Noisemakers (Graggers) during this reading. Every time Haman's name is mentioned, people use the Graggers to drown out mention of his name.

2. Rejoicing and Having a Festive Meal: What's a holiday without food? It is customary to have a Seudat Purim, a festive meal beginning late in the afternoon of Purim. To add to the joyous nature of the holiday people compose silly songs, prepare plays loosely based on the Purim narrative, write parodies of kiddush and other prayers and indulge their funny bones.

A three-cornered Purim delicacy known as "Hamantash" is, according to custom eaten on Purim. The "Hamantash", a German word meaning "Haman Pocket" is usually filled with poppy seeds, dates, nuts, raisins, jams, chocolate chips or prunes.

3. Mishloach Manot, Giving Gifts of Food: Also called "Shalach Manot", it is the practice to emulate the Jews of the days of Esther who after their redemption exchanged gifts of food. It is traditional to give foods that require no further preparation such as Hamantashen, dried fruits, nuts,

4. Matanot La-evyonim, Giving to the Poor: A special remembrance of the poor is customary on Purim. On an occasion of joy it is but natural that we should share our happiness with others. It is noteworthy that this mitzvah was so important that even the poor were required to give to those less fortunate than themselves.

Ten Moments in Jewish History For The Month of Adar

Adar 3 The building of the second Temple of Jerusalem was completed in 515 B.C.E.

Adar 6 The first printed edition of the complete Pentateuch, with vowel signs, accents, Targum Onkelos (an Aramaic translation), and Rashi, was published in Bologna, on January 26, 1482.

Adar 7 The first Jewish Sunday School in the United States was opened in Philadelphia on March 4, 1838.

Adar 12 Dedication of the Temple built by King Herod the Great at Jerusalem, 19 B.C.E. (Zikhron Yemot Olam).

Adar 15 The first advertisement offering private Hebrew instruction in an American publication was inserted by Abraham Cohen in the Pennsylvania Packet on March 1, 1790.

Adar 17 Legal status was granted to the Jewish community of Spain on March 21, 1965, for the first time since the expulsion in 1492.

Adar 18 David Emmanuel the first Jewish governor of the United States was sworn in as governor of Georgia on March 3, 1801.

Adar 19 The capture of En-Gedi by Israel, on March 20, 1949, brought to a conclusion the military engagements of the War of Independence.

Adar 23 The Second Temple was dedicated in 516 B.C.E.

Adar 27 At a historic White House ceremony on March 26, 1979, Mr. Begin and Mr. Sadat signed a peace treaty.

Instead of trying to force children into an adult prayer structure, the rituals of Purim teach children that prayer can involve movement, drama, story, and--most liberating of all--noise. About this carnival-like celebration, the Book of Esther says, "there was light and gladness, happiness and abundance." Purim is a day of feasting and merrymaking (and, for adults, a rare day where it's OK to toss back a few drinks). The psalmist writes, "Make a joyful noise to God." **Rabbi Sandy Sasso**

Purim is an important holiday, it is about redemption and religious freedom and tolerance, and, don't you agree, it's about fun!

Recently I was having a conversation with a couple of congregants about our summer camp experiences. The conversation was both nostalgic and enlightening. Remember how you looked forward to see your summer friends and how much you missed them when you got home? Purim is the same. We look forward to dressing up, making so much noise that we can't hear Haman's name uttered, (among others). Carnivals and music by The Sons of Tikvah Band, every year Rabbi Eligberg surprises us with more fun than the year before. Purim plays, pageants, Popeye, Pluto, Mickey, Minnie and the Cat in the Hat, such great Jewish memories. Purim celebrations are the kind of Jewish experiences that your children will be able to share and shape their future.

So when you think about fun in your life, just like those great summer time memories, Purim may just be your cure for the winter blues. And who or what will that Rascally Rabbi dress up as this year? Don't miss out...it's about fun!!!

Dr. Jeffrey Shandler, Ph.D. in Yiddish Studies from Columbia University, has written several books and lectured widely on modern Yiddish culture, American responses to the Holocaust, and the role that broadcasting, film, photography, and other media play in modern Jewish life.



His translations of Yiddish literature have been aired on National Public Radio and published in "The Forward". Dr. Shandler has curated exhibitions for The Jewish Museum in New York, the National Museum of American Jewish History in Philadelphia, and the YIVO Institute for Jewish Research.

Dr. Shandler, a scholar of modern Jewish culture, is an assistant professor in the Department of Jewish Studies at Rutgers University and acting director of the Allen and Joan Bildner Center for the Study of Jewish Life at Rutgers during the 2004-2005 academic year. He has been a visiting scholar at the Center for Religion and Media at New York University and has taught at the Jewish Theological Seminary, Tel Aviv University, and Vassar College.

"Oedipus Wrecks," a 1989 film by Woody Allen is about a guilt-ridden, middleaged attorney who is reticent about his Jewish identity and whose life is made miserable by his embarrassing and manipulative mother. BOARD AND VP REPORTS From the February, 2005 Board Meeting

House & Grounds: General satisfaction has been expressed by many with responsiveness and quality of our snow removal service, which as you may remember is new this year. Please forward all comments – both positive and negative – to House & Grounds (Jeff Cadoff) or to VP Administration (Dan Greenberg). As we move into budget process, we will need to contract for next year and would appreciate the feedback.

Thanks to the hard work of Ben Shapiro, we were able to secure some gently used office furniture, which will be used to make the office look and function as a more professional environment. It will be installed upon completion of the Cantor's new office. Thank you letters will be sent to the company that donated the furniture; special thanks to Ben for locating, securing and obtaining everything.

Construction of the Cantor's new office (which is being carved out of the old youth lounge/library) continues. We expect that it will be done in the next 4 - 6 weeks.

Hadas has been able to secure pews that were being discarded from another synagogue. These pews will be permanently installed in our new chapel, which will be created out of the remainder of the old youth lounge/library space. We are looking for a team of volunteers willing to give up the better part of a Sunday to drive out to East Rockaway, Long Island (just past JFK airport), load approximately 15 sets of pews (each set is 4 - 5 seats) onto a truck, drive back to CBT, and unload them into the synagogue. Due to logistical issues, this expedition will be scheduled for sometime AFTER the new wing has been opened. Please let Jeff Cadoff or Dan Greenberg know if you are at all interested in helping out. Thanks to Hadas for getting hold of these!

As part of the new chapel, we are going to try to assemble a group of folks interested in designing and building (yes, building) a new ark for the chapel. Stay tuned for more details. Anybody interested please contact Jeff or Dan.

As anyone who has walked through the temple entrance in the past few weeks has no doubt noticed, the tiles installed by the caterer have become a severe hazard due to shifting of the concrete underneath. They have made arrangements for the tiles and underlying concrete to be removed in the next few days. Replacement material will be discussed at tonight's meeting.

In order to prevent unauthorized and unnecessary access to the school wing on Shabbat, the security door between the two wings will be automatically locked at 1PM each Saturday.

Budget: Our veteran budget wizards (Marty Abschutz & Marc Dillman) are gearing up to begin the process. The first meeting is tentatively scheduled for March 13th. COOPERATION OF ALL COMMITTEE CHAIRS, VP's, AND EVERYONE HOLDING LINE ITEM AUTHORITY IS ESSENTIAL. Please start thinking about your budgets NOW, and start getting ready to submit a clear, defensible request.

Décor: The Décor Committee has approved the caterer's request to drape the Social Hall at his own expense.

Religious Activities: Shabbat Shirah was a major disaster. Despite checking with the caterer as to availability of the date, somehow the program was planned for Saturday night at the same time that the caterer had an event booked. We are still not positive how that happened; they claim that our office messed up, we are sure that the blame can be laid at their feet. In order to prevent the conflict, we ended up canceling the Shabbat Shirah celebration, for which so many people had worked very hard. In any event, as it turns out, we would have had to cancel it anyway – that was the night of the major snowstorm (the party at the temple was cancelled also). In order to prevent a reoccurrence of the communication breakdown, we have instituted new coordination procedures between the caterer and the office. We are confident that the risk of a similar conflict in the future has been minimized.

The campaign to purchase the new Sim Shalom Siddurim is ongoing. The cost is \$30 to dedicate a new Siddur and \$21 to move a dedication from an old Siddur to a new one. We will continue to use the existing Siddurim in the religious school as well as in junior congregation and also for our daily minyan.

Personnel: We are still completing the job description for the part-time bookkeeper position. We now expect to have the position filled by March 1.

WHAT IS PURIM?

Purim, one of our most joyous holidays, commemorates the deliverance of the Jews of Persia from the destruction planned against them by Haman, vizier of King Ahasuerus. The deliverance was accomplished by that monarch's Jewish wife, Esther, and her cousin Mordecai. These events are related in the Biblical Book of Esther, which is read in the synagogue on Purim.

PURIM: FACT OR FICTION

Some scholars question the historical accuracy and the authenticity of the Purim story as told in the book of Esther. In examining the evidence pro and con, it is important to keep in mind that the significance of the message for Jews may far outweigh the question of historical accuracy of the account. Looking beyond the legendary nature of Purim, the holiday speaks to the historic experiences of antisemitism and persecution. The themes of deliverance from one's enemies and exoneration from the falsehoods which were used to justify their destruction strikes a responsive chord. It gives expression to the deep yearning that the age old experience of hatred and prejudice will come to an end.

WHAT IS A MEGILLAH?

It is the Hebrew word for scroll. Megillah Esther is the Scroll of Esther which contains the story of Purim, read on Purim in the synagogue.

WHAT IS THE SPIRIT OF PURIM?

There is no merrier occasion in the Jewish year than Purim. Tradition has it that we should be so intoxicated with merriment at this season that we fail to distinguish between the cursing of Haman and the blessing of Mordecai. The Hebrew expression for "fail to distinguish is '*ad lo yada*', referring both to the Purim carnival and to the idea of letting go joyfully.

"Shalach Manot," the sending of gifts to friends and to the poor, is obligatory upon all Jews as a token of deliverance and to add to the joy of everyone at this festive season.

SO BE HAPPY IT'S ADAR, and celebrate PURIM!!

P.S. No one is commanded to eat a Hamentasch, but who could turn one down?

So enjoy and have fun!! CHAG SAMEACH!!







WHY ARE THERE TWO ADARS? HAPPY LEAP MONTH!

Ever wonder why some Jewish holidays "come early" or late, relative to the civil calendar? Curious about why there are two months named Adar on the calendar on the Hakol back cover?

The Hebrew calendar is a lunar calendar based on 19-year cycles. The Hebrew month is defined as the period from one new moon to the next. For these calculations the length of a month is 29 days, 12 hours, and 793 halakhim (1/1080th of an hour). A year in the Hebrew calendar is normally twelve

In the Hebrew Calendar, an extra month is added in each of the seven leap years of the 19-year cycle.

months: Tishrei, Cheshvan, Kislev, Tevet, Sh'vat, Adar, Nisan, Ivar, Sivan, Tammuz, Av, and Elul. Because a lunar month is not an exact whole number of days, the length of the months can be either 29 or 30 days. A typical year alternates 30- and 29-day months, beginning with Tishrei, which is 30 days.

Here's where it gets a little complicated: An extra month is intercalated in seven of every nineteen years (years 3, 6, 8, 11, 14, 17, and 19). In leap years, Adar is replaced with Adar I and

Adar II. Adar I is 30 days and Adar II is 29 days. Therefore, every 19-year cycle contains 235 months.

To further bring the calendar into alignment with the lunar cycle, a year may need to be shortened or lengthened by one day: Kislev may be shortened to 29 days, or Cheshvan may be lengthened to 30 days. Thus, there are six types of vears:

- Defective common years, with 353 days .
- Regular common years, with 354 days .
- Excessive common years, with 355 days
- Defective leap years, with 383 days
- Regular leap years, with 384 days
- Excessive leap years, with 385 days

The cycles of years and months in the Hebrew and civil calendars are so close that the two calendars diverge at the rate of only 4.5 days every 1000 years. Now you know!





Feedback Committee: Attached is the proposed FBC Charter for comment by the BOT. The committee shall consist of four to six members appointed annually by the President. " If the Board feels that we should make the change, it will require a Bylaw change since the committee will not only be dealing with the Clergy.

Nominating Committee: The Nominating Committee has met two times. Our first objective was to develop procedures for moving forward which we have done. The second was to interview presidential candidates which we have also done. Based on this, it is my pleasure to announce that Danny Greenberg has been asked to accept our nomination for President which he has accepted. We will now begin the process of reviewing all open EC and Board positions in order to establish a slate for presentation at the next Congregational meeting. It is also a recommendation of the

Committee that the BOT consider a Bylaws change which would establish a "First Vice Presidents" position which would be filled by the person who would be next in line to become President. It is felt that this will help alleviate our ongoing leadership progression issues. I would look for some comments on this recommendation to see if the Board would support such a Bylaw change. This position would not follow any particular VP's position but would be assigned to whatever person the Committee feels should be in this role.

College Program: The College Committee will soon be sending out Purim packages to all of our registered college students.





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
