RABBI ELIGBERG SPEAKS

One of my earliest memories connected to Israel is sitting along contact with other Jews who are committed to Israel and that with the rest of the school, on the floor in the upper lobby of the show ourselves as supporters of the State of Israel. Seeing Jewish Day School I attended, raptly watching a small black and white television projecting into our midst scenes of the Six Day War. This vigil became part of our daily routine. There was the anticipation of marching down the hall; the break in our normal routine that helped us feel the sense of moment, the historical significance of the events we were watching. I can still see in my mind's eye the reaction of my teachers to the capture of the Old City and the tears that flowed watching

Moshe Dayan surrounded by Isaiah and Jeremiah, King David and King Solomon, Ezra and Nehemriah, Hillel and Shammai, a veritable army of Jews across the centuries, approaching the Kotel. For a fleeting moment it felt like we too could reach out and touch those sacred stones, that we too were coming home.

This was not the first time my classmates and I were brought together because of the State of Israel. There had already been years of assemblies to celebrate Yom Ha'atzmaut (Israel Independence Day) and the Israeli songs we learned in preparation. There were countless little leaf stickers that we bought to help plant trees through the Jewish National Fund. There were pictures and posters of Israel in every classroom and filmstrips teaching us about life in Israel. its cities and its kibbutzim. In the years that would follow, I remember going to rallies and marching in parks and on city streets, to show our support for Israel. Standing proudly with my school and Jews from everywhere in our local community made our connection to Israel - the land and the people - an ineradicable part of our identity. Israel was home and haven. Israel was the culmination of the Zionist endeavor and the fulfillment of centuries of prayer.

While it is true that our perception of Israel then was often of a mythic and heroic nature, we were also actively engaged in Israeli culture, people and life. The Israeli-Palestinian struggle has meant a generation of Jews has grown up with images of terrorist attacks in Israel and army incursions into Gaza. The image of Israel has been undercut and left many American Jews feeling ambivalent or worse. For the generation that was coming of age after the Six Day War in 1967, one in four was visiting Israel. In 2002, the number was one in eighteen. While the number has increased slightly in the last year or so, it is a far cry from what it was and more significantly what it needs to be. A generation ago, going to Israel to visit, to study, to work was the next stage in our evolving relationship with Israel. The desire to set foot on the soil of our ancestral land was the product of years of experiences that built our sense of connection to that place and its people.

It is our responsibility to create for our own young people that awareness of belonging to something greater than our local Jewish community and a sense of connection to the land of Israel. In part, we can use the same building blocks that worked in the past - collective participation in events that bring us into

many of you at the Walk for Israel last month is a wonderful step in that direction. We have the opportunity to do much more in the weeks ahead. First, is the celebration of Yom Ha'atzmaut, Israel Independence Day; let's use it as an opportunity to learn how Israel can be a center of our Jewish identity and how we can become partners in the continuing dream to build up the land as a place of safety for all its citizens and a reflection of Jewish values. Second, is the Israel Bonds Break-

> fast, which even if you cannot attend, serves as a reminder that we invest the Jewish future through our investment in the State of Israel. Finally, there is the Salute to Israel Parade on June 5th in New York City. Last year a small group of us went to watch and cheer on the marchers. This year we need to give ourselves and our young people the experience of marching with thousands of

other Jews along Fifth Avenue through a corridor made up of almost a half million Jews. It is an indelible and indescribable experience.

B'nai Tikvah's Israel Youth Exchange Program has given many of us the opportunity to develop close personal contacts with Israelis from Ramla. They have taken us into their homes when we visited Israel and we have been enthusiastic in showing them our hospitality when they have visited us. It is these very people whom we support through our strong participation in the Salute to Israel Parade. Marching shows our friends in Israel, millions of Israelis we do not know and the whole of American society that the Jewish community here stands together in support of Israel.

I look forward to marching with you!

By following these guidelines, you will help yourself and your family in times of great joy, or moments of crisis and stress.

As Rabbi, it is my desire to attend to your lifecycle needs. These include births and weddings, funerals and hospital or home visitation of the ill. In order for the Bikur Holim Committee, the community and myself to be of help to you, we must be kept informed. Please take a moment to read through these steps, and keep this page in a handy place. Rabbi David M. Eligberg

ILLNESS:

In case of illness and/or hospitalization, please notify the synagogue office at 732-297-0696.

DEATH:

Even before making funeral arrangements notify Rabbi Eligberg at the synagogue office at 732-297-0696 or directly at home, 732-940-1973. Rabbi Eligberg will assist and guide you in making proper arrangements for the funeral.

In the event that you cannot reach the Rabbi, contact the local funeral home and begin to make your arrangements. Please, if Rabbi Eligberg is going to officiate at the funeral, do not finalize the funeral time until the Rabbi has contacted you. At most this will be a few hours.

In the event that Rabbi Eligberg is on vacation, Cantor Rockman is on call, as well as other local Conservative Rabbis. Their names can be obtained by calling the synagogue office, an officer of the synagogue, or the Ritual Committee Chairman.

It is also appropriate to contact Rabbi Eligberg whenever tragedy or trauma occurs. Please contact him irrespective of the hour, at 732-297-0696 during office hours or at home 732-940-1973. On Shabbat and Yom Toy the Rabbi does not use the telephone. Therefore, you can convey information to him on these days at the synagogue during scheduled service times, by calling him immediately after Shabbat or Yom Tov, or by going to his residence at 16 Gwyn Avenue, North Brunswick.

SIMCHAS:

For joyous occasions in your life, please share your naches with the rabbi. Inform the Rabbi about births, engagements, weddings and other noteworthy moments in the life of your family. The Rabbi will help with arrangements for information regarding a mohel, a baby naming, coordinate a pidyon haben (the redemption ceremony for firstborn males), schedule an aufruf (to celebrate the forthcoming marriage), weddings and bring the richness of Jewish traditions and mitzvoth into your simcha.

Get turned on at FRIDAY NIGHT PLUGGED-IN!

Friday Night Plugged-In has been a fun experience at B'nai Tikvah. During the months that we welcome Shabbat a little later in the day, we have the opportunity to come to the synagogue a little earlier in the evening and include instrumental music within our service. I hope you have had the opportunity to attend a few of these special services. 6:30PM is a family-friendly time; it affords us the opportunity to greet the Sabbath Bride with joyous music and celebrate her with a delicious Shabbos dinner befitting the occasion. The time is also good for younger families who likely will eat their dinner before they arrive. It's perfect timing, especially if you celebrate this beautiful family holiday of rest and joy.

Throughout our country, there are Friday night services like ours. In many of these congregations, attendance at these services has much more than doubled their regular attendance. At these synagogues, the music has reinvented the Friday night service and the Shabbat experience in these communities. In New York's B'nai Jeshurun, many Jewish singles and families attend and socialize following the service. Friday night services start at 6:45 every Shabbat.

The purpose of getting a large numbers of people to these services is not so that you can enjoy a musical performance or that you meet your future mate. These may be wonderful fringe benefits, but certainly this is not our sole purpose.

In describing themselves on their web site, B'nai Jeshurun states, "BJ is a Jewish community built on the belief that we must strive to be a kehillah kedoshah, a holy community.

We ask that each member of BJ commit him or herself to probing and relevant study, prayer with true intention, meaningful observance and acts of loving kindness that bring us closer to the repair of the world.

Please join us as we continue the quest for increasingly meaningful ways to serve each other, our community, our world and God."

This is similar to the goals of our mission statement, but much more direct. "To foster a vibrant egalitarian Jewish community founded in the religious customs and traditions of Conservative Judaism; offering excellent Jewish education and community activities for all ages with commitment to Israel and Jewish communities throughout the world."

Our statement is an offer and our ideal. B'nai Jeshurun goes farther. Their statement is an expectation of their members and invites people to commit to these important Jewish values. There is nothing there that we also don't already believe in and attempt to do, but our level of commitment and accomplishment are not as great.



RABBI DAVID AND JODI ELIGBERG

State of Israel Bonds is privileged to pay a well-deserved tribute to Rabbi David and Jodi Eligberg in recognition of their steadfast devotion and tireless efforts on behalf of the Jewish community and the State of Israel

Rabbi David Eligberg has served as the spiritual leader of Congregation B'nai Tikvah since August 1995. Prior to coming to B'nai Tikvah he served congregations in Levittown, PA, Pomona, NY and Woodmere, NY. He was born and raised in Montreal, Canada. Rabbi Eligberg graduated from the Joint Program between the Jewish Theological Seminary and Columbia University in 1981, with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Jewish Studies and in Political Science. He received his rabbinic ordination and Master of Arts in 1985 from the Jewish Theological Seminaiy. As a student he received various awards including prizes for Talmud, leadership in student affairs and intellectual ability.

Rabbi Eligberg currently serves the New Jersey Rabbinical Assembly as its first vice-president and chair of the Giyur (Conversion) Committee. He also serves on the Giyur Committee for the International Rabbinical Assembly. Rabbi Eligberg is the treasurer of the South Brunswick Area Clergy Association and is the rabbinic co-chair of the Jewish Federation of Greater Middlesex County's Israel Task Force. He also serves on the board of the Jewish Federation of Greater Middlesex County and the South Brunswick Community Resource Team. Rabbi Eligberg has served previously on the Middlesex County Human Relations Council and the Clergy Advisory Council for The Sharing Network.

Rabbi Eligberg reflects his creativity through the use of props such as a giant laptop computer, billboard signs and giant gift boxes during sermons; puppets and storytelling; original plays such as "Greekbusters", "It's Hannukah Charlie Brown" and "Purim Rock", and board games — regular and life-sized.

Jodi Eligberg was born in Brooklyn and raised in East Brunswick. She graduated from the University of Michigan in 1992 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology and received her law degree from New York University School of Law in 1996. She clerked for now District Judge Naomi Reice Buchwald from 1996-97 and then worked as an associate in the litigation department of Greenbaum, Rowe, Smith, Ravin, Davis and Himmel from 1997-99.

Jodi became a Music Together teacher in 2003 and worked for

two semesters prior to the birth of their third child. Jodi currently serves on the Board of Directors for Jewish Family Service of Southern Middlesex County and is the chair of Solomon Schechter Day School of Raritan Valley's Recruitment Committee. Previously, Jodi served as the chair of the Community Service Committee of the synagogue's nursery school and was a member of the Central New Jersey Jewish Home for the Aged's Auxiliary Board. She has also been a member of SSDS-RV's Education Committee, and B'nai Tikvah's Social Action Committee. Jodi was also a member of B'nai Tikvah's Makhela and a graduate of the first class of the Hadassah Leadership Academy.

For the past five years, Rabbi David and Jodi have spent several weeks each summer at Camp Ramah in the Berkshires, where David serves as a visiting rabbi and Jodi works in the camp office. Rabbi David and Jodi have three children, Sarah (6), Yonatan (4) and Miriam (6 months).

We salute Rabbi Eligberg and Jodi for their unwavering commitment and we call upon their friends and family to join us in honoring them.

Guest Speaker

GIL ELAN Lt. Col. (ret.), IDF Middle East Analyst

A widely regarded expert on Israel and the Middle East, he has extensive experience as a former Israel Defense Force combat commander, as well as in the international arena.

As a senior reserves briefing officer with the IDF, Lieutenant Colonel Elan, now retired, was frequently called to active duty to lecture visiting dignitaries and politicians on various aspects of Israel's security concerns, military strategies and regional threats.

Following the 1982 war in Lebanon, he served as commander of the IDF Spokesman ~ unit in Beirut.

Educated in London and Tel Aviv, Gil Elan has been interviewed on numerous radio and TV shows, has published articles and columns on the Middle East, and hosted a popular radio talk show.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE Arie Behar

It was 3:15 am when my cell phone woke me up. My wife was calling from the other side of the Atlantic, (at 8:15 pm, home in New Jersey) to tell me it was time to climb Masada. It was dark and cold outside and the desert mountain cast a large shadow over the Dead Sea. I found my way, with the help of a full moon, into the rooms of the sleeping kids, and woke them up to start our day. At 4 am we were on the bus driving south from Ein Gedi, along the Dead Sea to the base of the fortress, ready to climb 3000 ft to the top of Masada.

This was the first time that Alan and the kids had climbed in the dark. We walked quietly on the Snake Path in order to be aware of our surroundings. The full moon aided our navigation, and allowed us to see the Dead Sea and nearby mountains as they got smaller and smaller. Each one of us, in our own way, became awed by both the natural beauty and the historical events of 2000 years ago at this place.

As we approached the Eastern Gate, a large yellow ball made its way across the sky. We gathered together around the Israeli flag at the top of the mountain and shared the sunrise together. The flag, the sun, the scenery, and the knowledge of history around us came together at that moment and resembled the strength and spirit of Israel.

We walked to the old temple, and met a group of 40 boys and girls, age 13, preparing a B'nai Mitzvah assignment. Many of them were Ethiopian. For some of us it was our first experience with black Jews. Their presence showed us that Israel can be a home for Jews from all over the world. At the end of their ceremony the group sang HaTikvah, and we stood with them and sang along, most with tears in our eyes.

I told our group the story of Eliezer Ben Yair, the leader of the Jews, who in the year 70 AD, gathered 960 of Masada's defenders, and explained to them that the Romans, who had besieged the fortress of Masada for three years, would break the walls the next day. Nothing could be done to stop them. Instead of becoming Roman slaves, he asked the group to burn all their possessions so they would not fall into Roman hands. He specified that the food and water should remain untouched, to show the Romans that there had been sufficient food and water for three years. He asked every man to kill his wife and children, and then the men drew lots to determine who among them would kill his fellow man. In the end only Eliezer remained, and he killed himself. The Jews died as free men.

Our small group of Jews from B'nai Tikvah felt that we were free men and women too, connected to our religion through our history, our faith and our new country. This story from our past, our hike and the sunrise and the HaTikvah, made us determined to remain strong and proud Jews, and not allow the Masada story to happen again.

The members of our group were Alan Kane (co-chaperone), Leah Behar, Mara Gittleman, Allison Baer, Matan Griffel, Dan Goldstein and Matt Biderman. We succeeded in making the Israel exchange program a true exchange program this year by staying with our friends in Ramla. I am ready to work on a trip for next year in the spring. If you or your high school aged child is interested, contact me, and feel free in the coming months to talk with any of the group about their experience.

We are pleased to announce the formation of a new membership group in our synagogue. LETTERS TO THE EDITORS

To state that any branch of Judaism is better than another is divisive. To say that Conservative Judaism is better than Orthodoxy is to claim that my religion is better than my parents' and my grandparents' religion.

To be sure it is different. My grandparents would have looked askance at my driving to shul on the Sabbath or eating in a non-kosher restaurant even if it were only a vegetable plate. My father could translate from the torah directly into Yiddish or English at about the same rate that I read the New York Times, but my forebearers' idea of morality was not much different from mine.

Conservative Judaism to my mind, is a rational way to keep our religion on a modern track and still hold on to our traditional values and to "be a light unto the nations ". But that is also the way our Reform and Orthodox siblings see themselves. No one actively participates in religious activities unless he or she feels that this is their best place to be. (Exceptions can be made for those who live too far from a house of worship that would be preferable to them, and must settle for what is convenient or available.)

When we, or anyone for that matter, take the position that ours is the only way to live and worship, we denigrate our brothers and sisters and even our ancestors, who sometimes willingly gave up their lives to protect their religious beliefs as they knew them. Conservative Judaism makes complete sense to me. It is liberal enough to permit each congregation to have the latitude to make certain adjustments and still hold on to halachic traditions. This suits me very well. But to tout my way as the best, inferring that mine is the only true way, then I create another fork in the road away from the unity of the Jewish people.

If we are not careful, if we find it easier to mouth off about coreligionists' views on religion or politics, rather than debate them in a rational manner, we could, someday find ourselves like some other religious groups, so badly splintered that we forget that we are all descended from the same family, and, God forbid, turn on each other. In the past when I entered a Synagogue for the first time, no one ever asked me if I was Orthodox or Conservative or Reform. I pray that no one ever does.

If Judaism is to have a future, we must respect all its people and all of its branches, even if they seem a little strange to us, and strive to have them do the same. I can hear you better when you talk then when you scream.
