# RABBI ELIGBERG SPEAKS

Dear Haverim,

As the month of June unfolds many of us begin to look for that great summer read; the book or books that we promised ourselves when we could sit back, grab some sun and enjoy a real page turner. With that in mind, I would like to invite you to join me in reading a classic. Some or all of it may have been required reading when you were in school. Parts of it have been made into successful movies and plays. It has inspired countless numbers of authors and artists who used its characters for their literary and artistic purposes. Quotes from it pervade our culture and our language. I am not referring to Star Trek or Star Wars, to the Simpsons or Monty Python, all of whom, I would agree, have achieved a certain iconic status in our society. No. I am referring to the original classic, the one that still sells more copies than anything else, the Bible and specifically the Torah.

Beginning at Sinai, when our ancestors heard the Divine Utterances and entered a unique relationship with God, through the years of wandering in the wilderness where Moshe taught them Torah, continuing during the period of the prophets who exhorted the people to fulfill their sacred potential, to the days of Ezra who taught Torah and made it available to every Jew, across the generations of rabbis, sages and scholars who pored over every word of Torah, finding meaning and guidance in their lives and direction for the Jews in their communities until our day. In the words of Torah we heard the echo of God addressing us directly. We read the responses of our ancestors to the realization of living in the presence of the Holy One and formulate our own.

This month, as we celebrate the moment of the Giving of the Torah on the festival of Shavuot, I invite you to join a very special reading group - Perek Yomi: A Chapter a Day. Sponsored by our Torah Lishma/Adult Education Committee and the Religious Activities Committee, the Perek Yomi experience will begin on the evening of the first night of Shavuot, Sunday June 12 as part of our Tikkun Lel Shavuot pro-

We will begin at 8:00 PM with the brief Ma'ariv service that welcomes the holiday followed by a traditional and festive dairy dinner. At 9:00 PM we will read the first chapter of the Book of Genesis using the type of guided reading questions that will accompany each chapter. After reading, we will have the opportunity to share thoughts, insights and questions about the text. At 10:00 PM we will break. Those who wish to remain for further in depth study of the chapter are welcome to do so as the Tikkun will continue until midnight.

Participants in the Perek Yomi group will then continue to read a chapter a day of the Torah. To help preserve the feeling of being part of a group as we had on the first night, groups of eight to ten readers will be formed. These groups will meet once a month to share their encounter with the text with each other. The day and time for each group will be set once people have signed up to participate. In addition, Gary Bergman has created a space on our website where anyone involved in Perek Yomi can post a question, comment or

thought about the material we are reading.

Looking into the future, on Tuesday, December 13, we will join together for a special siyyum, a festive celebration marking the conclusion of our the reading of the Torah, the Five Books of Moses, in our Perek Yomi program.

I look forward to reading, studying and learning a chapter a day of Torah with you.

### FOR THE PEOPLE OF THE BOOK: PEREK YOMI

Just as our ancestors read from the Tanakh each day, there are many reasons why we must do so as well.

First... to benefit from Jewish wisdom and guidance as contained in the mitzvot interwoven into this timeless text. As Jews, we want to know God's plan, which gives meaning to our lives.

The Tanakh is a tapestry containing the threads of God's plan.

Second... to discern the midot, or values, that distinguish us as Jews. Jewish values are unique -- but they are not transmitted genetically.

The Tanakh is the ultimate source of these values.

Third... to become familiar with the architects of our religion and the times in which they lived. We are who we are because of our history. The promise of Israel; the Exodus and the Temple; the Exile and the Prophets; all play a major role in defining Jews and Judaism.

The Tanakh makes it possible to "experience" our history.

Fourth... to be guided by the ethics and moral standards that challenge us to become God-like in our daily behavior. Jewish ethics are not time bound. They are Divinely inspired, but they are not inaccessible.

The Tanakh makes it possible to be touched by Divine inspi-

Fifth... to become enriched by the pattern of Jewish living. While its seed was planted in Biblical times, Jewish living has evolved through the ages. Judaism as we live it and celebrate it today is the fruit of that seed.

The Tanakh is the primary source that stimulated Rabbis and Sages throughout the ages to envision Judaism for their own generation. The Tanakh is our Jewish birthright.

Finally... we must read the Tanakh so that we can be lifted from viewing the world as it is, to a perch where we can glimpse a vision of what we can help it to become. Through seeing the universe from the mountains on which Abraham and Sarah, Moses and Miriam, stood, and through feeling the passion of Esther, Ruth, David and Solomon, our lives take on a new and important meaning, a sense of purpose.

The Tanakh blends holiness and humanity. It challenges us to live our lives so that we will make a positive difference to others.

# Good Night... Laila Tov!

What a busy year it has been. Stacey and I are still spinning with joy. Our new addition Rafi and big sister Bashe are typically keeping us on our toes and we love every minute of it! When your greatest guilty pleasure in life is a good night sleep you know you have children. This means different things to each of us, as our children continue to reach new milestones. Whether it's taking their first steps, getting their driver's license, teething, or getting braces, the first birthday party or a bat mitzvah, when all is said and done, we hope our children will allow us a rare good night's sleep.

Every student and their families whom I prepare for bar or bat mitzvah are unique and the same. One can't really say that they know how someone else feels, although they may have had similar experiences. Yet we teach and learn from these shared experiences. The movie "Groundhog Day" tells a story about a person who is given the opportunity to relive one day in his life, over and over, until he gets it right, until he becomes a whole person. I often equate my experience teaching b'nai mitzvah students with this movie's premise. I'm still trying to get it right. Our goals change as we grow and I consider how successful I have been teaching your children?

Patiently, I work with the children to improve their Hebrew reading ability, I coach them to lead their congregation in prayer and teach them the necessary skills to chant biblical texts. Throughout, the focus is on preparation for their big day. I assure them that they will have a great day. In the end, I am proud as a parent when I see your children flourish in front of our eyes. End of story...well not so fast.


We are taught by the rabbi's that "On three things the world stands, On Torah, on worship or sacrifice and on doing acts of loving-kindness." We teach our children to live by these Jewish values, and we reinforce it by teaching them a song. I really like the song, not to be sarcastic, but teaching the song is only the beginning. So when the students arrive to study with me, am I merely teaching them a song? What values will

they learn from me.

With great enthusiasm I discuss doing a mitzvah project with each student and their families. I am aware that a large number of b'nai mitzvah take these values very seriously and we've discussed their progress. But you know, we all have very busy schedules, how much time do any of us have available to volunteer, and how much follow-up do I do? In the halls of our religious school, the walls are covered with information about charitable organizations. Each year our ten year-old, gimel students create these posters as a part of

their mitzvah projects. Mrs. Kanarek and her staff help raise the awareness of our children. What is the next step? The next step for me is to teach and inspire my children, and yours, to live by these three things, Torah, Worship or Sacrifice and doing Acts of Loving-kindness, and for me to be a good example. Only then, will I have a good night sleep.

From the May, 2005 Board Meeting

### **Daniel Greenberg** VP Administration

House & Grounds: Thank you to Arie Behar and his company First Property Management for patching the worst of our parking lot potholes, for the cost of the materials alone.

We are still trying to set up half of the old youth lounge as a permanent chapel. We have permanent pews that are being donated to us - the good news is that all we have to do is pick them up. The bad news is that we have to go to East Rockaway, NY (about 5 miles past JFK Airport) to get them. We have the use of a truck; what we need now are people to help. PLEASE CONTACT JEFF CADOFF OR DAN GREENBERG TO VOLUNTEER YOUR TIME. We will try to arrange for a Sunday morning.

There will be a presentation at the Board meeting (by Ben Shapiro) of alarm alternatives for the new wing.

Budget: Budget Committee continues Sunday nights.

Religious Activities: The Siddur dedication service is set for June 10th. Plaques will be put in the new Siddurim before that.

#### Upcoming programs:

- 1. Yom Hashoah program on May 4th. South Brunswick Clergy Association plus CBT will be presenting a remembrance program at CBT.
- 2. Yom Ha'atzmaut program on May 11th "A Taste of Israel" featuring Israeli food, snacks, drink and an Israeli movie. There is no charge for this event, but we have asked for RSVPs to help us gauge the amount of food that is needed.





My first black friend was a Boy Scout. We lived in a mostly Jewish middle class working neighborhood. Robert Maxwall was the only black kid that I knew. He was the scribe in our Scout troop, probably because he was the brightest and most studious of the boys. Except for Robert, all the other kids in our patrol were Jewish, and when we would attend the weekly patrol meetings in each others homes, other than a quick "is anybody hungry", the parents paid little attention to us. I remember my Pop's smile of surprise the first time that Robert came to our house, but he made no comment. At the time I gave it no thought at all, other that I was glad to have this smart kid in out patrol. Only much later did I understand why the first time that we met in Roberts home, we were greeted with wide welcoming smiles.

We learned the scout motto and the pledge by heart, and repeated them at the appropriate times as part of the ritual, and without realizing that we were doing so, we became indoctrinated and habituated to cooperation, responsibility and inclusiveness of others. We learned to do things for our mutual benefit and gained stature and approval for community work.

Our patrol's elected project for one year, was to build a large flying model of a Piper Cub. The model would have a wing span of five feet and would be, for us, very expensive. (A nickel was worth more than a dollar today.) To raise funds we ran a raffle. To have it printed we convinced a local printer to do the job with the understanding that he would get paid from the proceeds of the raffle, and with the remainder, after awarding the prize, we bought the plans and supplies for the model.

We cut up the plans and split up the job among the members of the patrol. The wings, body parts and tail assembly were all built separately and when we were ready, we brought the parts to one house and spent an entire Sunday putting them together, The cabin windows were made from cellophane salvaged from cigarette packages, but we could not af-


ford a gasoline engine so we powered the here in North Brunswick, at the intersecpropeller with yards of a special rubber string.

This was a lesson in cooperation that remained with me for the rest of my life. It sparked my interest in aviation, and led from the event, local parents were asked to my becoming a crew chief at Foster Field, Texas during World War II.

### SHAVUOT: ITS MEANING AND MESSAGE TODAY

Although we do not often think about the origins of Shavuot, the Torah refers to a harvest festival when farmers would make pilgrimage to Jerusalem to offer a tithe of their first fruits or first barley grains to the Temple. Like most Jewish holidays, we tend to think more about the historical significance than the earlier agricultural meaning. Our rabbis did just that by giving Shavuot another name, Z'man Matan Torateinu, Season of the Giving of Our Torah, associating Shavuot with the day when the people accepted the Torah.

The earliest reference to Shavuot as Z'man Matan Torateinu is in the Talmud. By forging a link between the giving of the Law at Mount Sinai and the earlier harvest festival, the Rabbis were able to give greater significance to the festival. The celebration of this major event in our history reestablishes the covenant between God and the Jewish people. This year we celebrate the holiday of Shavuot on Monday, June 13 and Tuesday, June 14. # Israel Bond Breakfast at B'nai Tikvah - A Big Success! Almost \$400,000 Raised!




