RABBI ELIGBERG SPEAKS

BE PREPARED!

With appreciation to Tom Lehrer and apologies to the Boy Scouts and visa versa.

Be prepared! Be prepared! As through life you march along. Be prepared to hold your mahzor really well While you stand for so long that you're feet begin to swell.

Be prepared! To face up to last year's sins. Rosh Hashannah is the season for admissions. Keeping them all hidden where you're sure that they will not be found. Is a plan destined to failure when the Holy One's around. And then you can't ask to be spared. Be prepared!

Be prepared. That's what these Holy Days demand, Be prepared! And review each word and deed. It's time to pray and hear the shofar blast. To God we are bidden to return at last.

Be prepared. And be careful that you do Your good deeds for there's someone watching you. If you're looking for adventure of a new and different kind. This season invites you to explore the Jewish stuff that's on your mind.

Don't be nervous, don't be flustered, don't be scared. Be prepared!

Dear Haverim,

Every year, as the High Holy Days approach, most people I meet ask me the same question, "So, Rabbi. Are you prepared?" By prepared they mean: Have you finished writing your sermons? Have you been practicing your shofar blowing? Is everything in order in the synagogue? Are you prepared for what you need to do as our rabbi on the High Holy Days?

While this is important, it deflects the question of if I am ready for the High Holy Days. Being prepared in this context is an existential question about the status of my relationship with God. Being prepared is really a reflection of where I am in the process of T'shuva (of turning or transforming). It is a reminder that the High Holy Days are part of a process, not an event; a process whose success is a reflection of my level of preparation.

I cannot simply wake up on the first day of Rosh Hashannah, go to the synagogue and check my Day Timer: 1 Tishre Rosh Hashanah – Tasks: Do T'shuva. True T'shuva is a process that takes time and patience; that demands honesty and commitment. Judaism recognized this by designating the month of Elul - the month prior to Rosh Hashannah - as a period of preparation; as a time to begin the process of introspection, contemplation, and self-examination that are the essential stepping stones for T'shuva. In Hebrew, this process is called Heshbon Hanefesh - an accounting of the soul - a spiritual self-audit. Only after doing the hard work this entails can I speak of being prepared for the High Holy Days, of being engaged in the T'shuva, of working to create my best self.

This is the unique challenge and incredible opportunity that this season of the year gives us. Our tradition recognizes that on life's journey there are many paths available to us - some move us along and closer to the goal of walking with God; oth-

ers lead in directions that divert us from our ultimate goal. T'shuva calls on us to get off the path that has led us away from godliness, from our tradition and possibly from our people. T'shuva offers us the oppor-

tunity to turn back. It is a reminder that taking the wrong turn can be nothing more than a detour on our life's journey - that we can still choose a different path.

At the end of the Book of Bamidbar (Numbers), the Torah repeats all the places where the Israelites camped on their journey from Egypt to the Land of Israel. The list ends with the Israelites on the verge of entering the Promised Land. Our teacher, the Ba'al Shem Tov commented on this verse that "just as the Israelites had 42 stations on their journey so too each person has 42 stations in life." The words of the Siftei Tzadikkim can help us understand this enigmatic teaching. He suggests that as the Israelites wandered in the wilderness, each station brought them closer to their dual goal of entering the Land of Israel and of becoming God's people. For us the High Holy Days are like stations marking our progress on the long and winding road that makes us aware of the presence of the holy in our lives and leads us into the presence of the Holy One.

To help us on the journey, we add a special Psalm to each morning and evening service to focus our attention; we sound the shofar each morning to rouse ourselves to action. Lastly, we hold a special service called S'lichot. Held late at night, it is designed to help us gather the forces of T'shuva, so that we are prepared to confront where we have been in the past and move toward what we can become in the future. I look forward to preparing for our journey together.

Selichot: Gefilte Fish and Ethical Wills

Join us on Saturday night, September 24, 2005 at 9pm for an introspective Selichot program leading into Selichot services at 11:30PM.

We will be watching the movie Gefilte Fish, which explores three generations' perspective of Judaism and how it changes from one generation to the next. Following the movie and discussion we will have the opportunity to discuss what we would like to leave our children and grandchildren in the form of an Ethical Will. By reading ethical wills from the Bible as well as some contemporary ethical wills, we will learn how important it is to leave behind not just material possessions, but our ideas, values and messages to future generations. Everyone will be given a template to create their own ethical will.

Continuing with the theme of change and the future, at 11:15 we will change the coverings on our Torahs and podiums to get the ready for our High Holy Days, leading directly to the dedication of any new memorial plaques followed by Selichot services. Light dessert will be served during the program.

Tashlich

We will be performing the ceremony of Tashlich on the first day of Rosh Hashanah. This ritual, often referred to as the casting away of our sins, is observed by approaching a moving body of water. In our case it will be performed at Oakeys Brook at the Brunswick Acres School in South Brunswick. We will toss the breadcrumbs, of whatever type you choose; descriptive information will be available at the Synagogue in September. We will recite Psalms as well as the verses "You shall cast all their sins into the depths of the sea" (Mica 7:18-19). We look forward to seeing you at this very moving and fun part of the Holiday.

Use Your Time Wisely

Each year we remark that the holidays are early or as is the case this year, they are late. Because the Jewish calendar is based on the cycles of the moon, a leap year includes an additional month as we experienced this past year, thus pushing our High Holy days forward on the secular calendar.

So how was your summer? Are you ready for new challenges and experiences? It always seems that there just is not enough time, don't you agree? This year our calendar is spread a bit. Back-to-school is a full month prior to Rosh Hashanah. Thanks to the calendar adjustment we have plenty of time to prepare for all of the upcoming events in our lives, don't you agree?

I don't know about you, but I still get a little bit anxious this time of year, looking forward to the unknown with wide eyed anticipation and a wince of concern. The past few years have been momentous for me and my family. Stacey and I have been blessed and thank God for our growing family. To say the least, we have been blessed by God in so many ways and we so appreciate our riches, at times I wonder how could I be so fortunate?

It appears that we have this extra time to prepare for the Yamim Noraim, the Days of Awe. Actually the ten days that include Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur is itself a period of preparation. Most of us plan our lives based on the secular calendar which thankfully is providing us this extra prep-time. How can we use it wisely?

STOP READING! ANSWER THE QUESTION! Please take a few minutes to reflect:

What use have I made of my time? Have I used it well or badly? How can I prepare for another good year?

Most of us are very grateful to God for our gifts, but recognize that we must be proactive in our search for a fulfilled life. You work hard, you sacrifice and you live by the values of our heritage. These ten holy days are also known as the *Ten Days of Repentance, Aseret Y'mei Teshuvah*. It is a time for us to return to God and the God's way. It is an opportunity to return to the right road.

As we pray, we request that God hears us. We are thankful to God for all of our joy but we are all aware that in life we are guaranteed to experience sadness and loss. We can be challenged by illness and uncertainty. Life isn't always easy. So as we begin anew, back to school and work. Your job description may have changed; you may have a new job or a new role as a stay-at-home parent, perhaps you have the responsibly to for an infirmed friend or family member. Yet we want to remain unfaltering in our faith.

The Psalmist's prayer recalls "O teach us to count our days that we may get us a heart of wisdom." As Rabbi Ben Zion Bokser wrote, "...it does not really mean to count days. Anyone can do that. It is rather a prayer to make the days count. That is indeed the supreme wisdom of living."

Select "Board Minutes"... Select year (1999 - 2005)... Select desired report by month.

Q. Who can access these reports?

A. Anyone who is a member of the btannounce group.

Q. I receive the CBTnewsletter each week but, I can't log-in. A. Any of the group's moderators (Hadas, Marty Abschutz, Dan Greenberg, or Gary Bergman) can add recipients to the group's email list but, that alone does not make you a member of the group. For security, you need a Yahoo-id to prove you are who you say you are.

Q. How does that work?

A. When you apply for a Yahoo-id, you give them your current email address. Yahoo sends a confirmation email that you must reply to. By replying to that message, we now can be sure your Yahoo-id and password really match your email address.

Q. What do I do with my Yahoo-id and password?

A. You can give your Yahoo-id to anyone you wish (and do not forget it) but, keep your password strictly to yourself.

Q. What if I forget my password?

A. No problem, Yahoo can send it to your registered email address anytime you request it.

Q. I don't want any new email addresses or receive any additional junk mail.

A. When you apply for your Yahoo-id be sure to UNCHECK any requests for a Yahoo email account or offers from other vendors.

Q. I have a Yahoo-Id but, I still can't log-in to the "btannounce" website. It says I am not a member of that group.

A. The email address associated with your Yahoo-id could be different from your CBTnewsletter subscription, especially if you have one or more B'nai Tikvah alias names. Contact Gary.Bergman@bnaitikvah.org (732-246-7285) and we'll get it resolved.

STRATEGIC THINKING 101

I think about Israel a lot, and like most of us, my attention tends to focus on the news of the day. Lately it is about the Gaza disengagement plan and the effect it is having on Israeli society. But, current events quickly become old news as the next significant situation arises. Recently, I received a communiqué from the Israel Foreign Ministry that contained a link to the Jewish People Planning Institute's report that addresses the long term strategic issues facing Israel and we Diaspora Jews. www.jppi.org.il

"The 2005 Annual Assessment Executive Report: Facing a Rapidly Changing World" provides an updated view of the challenges, threats, and opportunities confronting the Jewish People. As presented to the weekly Israeli Cabinet, it is a concise evaluation of the state of the Jewish people including various demographic issues, fertility policy, and the status of Diaspora Jewish communities. It also contains a series of recommendations on immigration policy, a wider role of Jewish people considerations into government decision-making, building up Jewish identity in the Diaspora, and a multi-year science and technology policy for Israel.

The section of the report that I found most thought provoking had to do with the relatively recent growing awareness by the Israeli government that their decision-making process does not take into consideration broader Jewish People issues beyond a narrow ideology. That ideology concerns the "relationship between Israel and the Jewish People, which regards aliyah as the main answer to the problems of the Jews in the Diaspora, and support for Israel as the essence of Israel-Diaspora relations." This mind set is now slowly changing as "the meaning of 'Israel as the State of the Jewish People' includes more elements of responsibility for the Jewish People as a whole."

Jewish Continuity as an example of a "Jewish People issue" is one of the main concerns shared by both the Diaspora and the State of Israel. Their approaches to the issue are vastly different. Israel's ideological approach to addressing the problem is focused on *aliyah* as the ultimate counter measure to all of the pressures threatening Jewish continuity. This is in contrast to Diaspora programs such as Birthright or our own B'nai Tikvah Youth Exchange trip to Israel, where the motivation is to reinforce Jewish identity through exposure to Israel. The report makes numerous recommendations as to how the Israel government can make positive contributions to "the existence and future of the Jewish People, wher-

ever they are."

The report is like a "State of the Union" address for the Jewish People. I urge you to read it as a resource to enhance your understanding of your Jewish identity in today's world.

These families live a distance from our area and would otherwise be saddled with costly hotel bills in order to be near their sick children.

Kathy invited me to tour the house and have a chat. My kids, Gabe, 8, Hannah, 5, and I visited with Kathy for an hour. We learned that all the appliances were donated, almost all the furniture was donated, and all the rooms were decorated by volunteers. When my son asked to see the 6 guest rooms, Kathy told him that we couldn't because they were all filled. This was "unfortunate", my son replied.

We learned about the variety of volunteer opportunities available and I left knowing that we as a family and we as a congregation could do much in the way of performing mitzvot for this wonderful organization.
