#### RABBI ELIGBERG SPEAKS

Dear Haverim,

"Or, it could have ended like this." That was how the makers of the movie Clue introduced the alternative endings to their whodunit mystery. Along those lines, I would like to give you an alternative ending to the sermon I gave on the first day of Rosh Hashanah. As you may recall, I introduced you to an entire team of Jewish super heroes:

**Shofar**, whose piercing blasts of sound disorient villains. **Minyan**, who can create nine copies of himself, enabling him to outnumber his

arch-enemies, and always be sure of having a quorum for prayer.

The Kotel. Found in the tunnels under the Temple Mount, this living rock appears ageless and indestructable but loses strength as he moves farther from Jerusalem.

Matza Ball hurls energy plasma balls that cause his enemies to either float or sink.

**Shamash** uses his ability to create and control fire to prevent forest fires and protect the environment.

Magen Avraham (Shield of Abraham) wields an unbreakable shield bearing the Divine Name in pur-

suit of justice.

The Tallit. Wrapped in his remarkable prayer shawl whose tsitsit can stretch to

great lengths to ensnare evildoers.

Ner Tamid, an energy matrix that draws power from the mystical kabbalistic spheres to serve humanity.

**Barak**, whose ability to control the weather allows her to harness the forces of nature in the battle against evil.

The Bubbe, also known as the Geriatric Avenger relies on the contents of her Utility

Apron - Marror spray incapacitates enemies; Quick-drying Haroset stops foes in their tracks; Super-absorbant Sponge Cake drains opponents energy; and Chicken Soup Anti-toxin - in her quest to perfect the world.

Lulav, vibrates to create waves of energy that overwhelm villains.

*Etrog*, breaks off the pitom to activate small concussive grenades that stun opponents and leave them smelling lemony fresh.

What is it about super heroes that gives them their enduring popularity? Why do young children tie towels around their necks and pretend to fly? Or stage ninja turtle battles in the family room? What draws us to more vicarious means of simulating superpowers such as computer and role playing games, reading comic books or watching movies?

NPR Commentator John Hodgman, in a This American Life segment entitled "Invisible Man vs. Hawkman" discovered to his dismay that the motivation was purely selfish. Interviewees all demonstrated envy for superpowers, especially those of flight and invisibility. Not a single person interviewed indicated that they would use their powers to help others; they would only help themselves.

I would like to suggest a more positive reason for the enduring allure of superheroes. Superheroes represent ideals to which we all aspire. They reflect a selfless commitment to do-

ing good in the world, not in pursuit of reward, but as a recognition that their powers and abilities demand that they be used in the service of others.

In recent weeks, the natural disasters that have affected the Gulf coast have given us many examples of heroic behavior. No acts of superhuman strength. No exercises of cosmic

powers. No expressions of . Just ordinary human beings doing their best to help others in incredibly trying conditions. Average people demonstrating extraordinary compassion and kindness to others in desperate need. Men and women who recognized that they could make a difference by simply doing what was within their power.

In Pirke Ayot we read, "When there are no worthy persons, strive to be a worthy person." The Sages understood this as a challenge to each of us to do our best; to fulfill our potential, to rise to the occasion. They

suggested three ways to meet this challenge.

"In a place where there are no people to assume responsibility for communal affairs, try to be the person [who takes on that responsibility]." Our community is blessed with many people who have taken on the mantle of leadership but we need everyone to step up so that we can accomplish all the goals and meet all the dreams that we have for ourselves.

"If there are no people to study Torah with or from - then study Torah on your own to the best of your ability so that you will be a person versed in Jewish tradition." We live in an era where the study of Torah is easier than it has ever been. Technology has made it possible for us to always find partners in study. The only requirement is that we make the commitment to pursue our studies.

"In a place where there are not many Jews, do not hesitate to be recognized as a Jew." Perhaps the greatest challenge is to accept being recognized as different. To live by a different calendar, to observe holidays that are out of the mainstream, to assert our Jewishness with pride, those are expressions of Jewish personhood that our youth need to see. Those are what real Jewish heroes look like. They live their Jewish commitments visibly and with pride, serving God, the Jewish people and the world.

### RABBI ELIGBERG SPEAKS

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## Tishre/Heshvan Dates in History

30 Tishre - Hadoar, the first Hebrew daily newspaper in America, appeared onNovember 1, 1921.

4 Heshvan - The oldest existing tombstone in New York stands in the Spanish and Portuguese cemetery on the Bowery at the grave of Benjamin Bueno de Mesquita, who died on October 24, 1683.

5 Heshvan - On November 5, 1655, Jacob Barsimson and Asser Levy of New Amsterdam petitioned for the right to stand guard and be relieved of the special tax imposed on Jews in lieu of guard duty.

10 Heshvan - Asser Levy was granted a butcher's license on October 15, 1660. The supply of kosher meat in New Amsterdam was thus assured.

11 Heshvan - Abraham D. Beame, the first Jewish mayor of New York City, was elected on November 6, 1973.

13 Heshvan - The first Jewish prayerbook printed in America was published on October 23, 1760.

16 Heshvan - General Ulysses S. Grant, on November 9, 1862, issued the first in a series of orders barring Jews from entering the military department under his command.

17 Heshvan - Rabbi Sabato Morais, one of the founders of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America and its first president, died on November 12, 1897.

19 Heshvan - The first B'nai B'rith lodge was organized on November 12, 1843 in New York.

20 Heshvan - On November 4, 1974, Richard Stone was elected U.S. senator from Florida. He was the first Jewish senator from a southern state since the Civil War.

23 Heshvan - The American Jewish Committee was organized on November 11, 1906. The objectives of the American Jewish Committee were "to prevent the infraction of the civil and religious rights of Jews, to alleviate the consequences of persecution, and to afford relief from calamities affecting Jews."

Defense of civil rights and welfare were the major causes which stimulated American Jewish communal activities in the 19th century. The board of Delegates of American Israelites, the first Jewish communal public-relations

body, was organized in 1859 for the purpose of defending Jewish civil rights throughout the world. The Russian pogroms of 1903-1905 led to the formation of the American Jewish Committee. World War I led to the formation of the Joint Distribution Committee and the American Jewish Congress.

24 Heshvan - Kehillath Anshe Ma'arav (K.A.M.), the first Jewish congregation in Chicago, was established on November 3, 1847.

26 Heshvan - The first anti-Semitic attack over a radio network in the U.S. was broadcast by Father Coughlin on November 20, 1938.

I heard so many people say they don't ever recall such a rainy Yom Kippur.

Perspective, keep it in perspective, that's what I kept telling myself as I cleaned-up the flood that the Yom Kippur rains created in our basement. The damage was not terrible. We lost a three week old hot water heater, some posters and children's books were soaked, the carpet smells and our bookcases and

cabinets are a little warped and soggy. Hopefully our insurance will cover the most of the cost of the damage. Still, you can't imagine how upset I was when I discovered the mess in our basement. Or maybe you can, because you've had a similar experience.

Birkat Ha-Gomel is... "recited by one who has recovered from a serious illness, returned from a long journey, or survived a life-threatening crisis (including child-

birth)." If you have had such an experience, you can request an opportunity to receive an alliyah and recite this blessing of gratitude to God.

Praised are You Adonai our God, who rules the universe, showing goodness to us beyond our merits and bestowing favor on me.

Retired Rabbi Isidoro Aizenberg was recently asked to lead the High Holiday services for Biloxi's Beth Israel Congregation. Devastated by Hurricane Katrina, their synagogue was destroyed and relocated to a chapel at the local Air Force base. During the service Rabbi Aizenberg recounted. "As a congregational rabbi for three decades I often witnessed people asking to say the Birkat Ha'Gomel,....But in all those years I was never part of a community where all its members stood up to recite this blessing in unison...

For as long as I can remember I have asked in the course of our services "Who shall live and who shall die? Who by fire and who by water?" But never before did these words affect me with such profound poignancy. While joining in the U'Netaneh Tokef I continued asking myself, "And who in the congregation lost their home and who did not? And who is despairing and who has gained the strength to rebuild? And who is asking if there is a God in the world and who has been left with faith unscathed?" I don't have answers to these questions. What I do hope, however, is that by our presence and by joining the community in the High Holiday prayers, we offered this congregation a measure of emotional support and the validation of the millennial principle that all Israel are responsible one for another."

A second conservative congregation was nearly destroyed by the hurricane. Shir Chadash in Mataire, Louisiana, just outside New Orleans, was flooded with more than 12 inches of water by Hurricane Katrina and its aftermath, and just about everything the water touched was destroyed. Newly appointed Rabbi Ted Lichtenfeld has helped lead this congregation trough its loss. Although they temporarily relocated to Houston for

Rosh Hashanah the community was able to worship in their own synagogue for Yom Kippur. Rabbi Lichtenfeld has roots in our community and has been shuttling between New Jersey and Louisiana. Ted and his wife Miriam are about to become parents for the second time. The family is currently living in East Brunswick with her parents as they await the blessed event. Miriam is also a Rabbi and has taught adult classes at

B'nai Tikvah. We can only imagine the stress the affected families are experiencing. What can we do? The obvious is to give money and thank God for our good fortune. Keep life in perspective. I'll still get upset if my basement floods again, but I will also remember that there are so many with much greater challenges. I promise to help those who are less fortunate than I. We all know that we can do more! The monumental losses felt around the world do not make our

personal problems and losses less consequential. But participating in the recovery of the victims will make are lives more meaningful and help us fulfill our responsibility and our destiny as a Jews, the children of Israel.

### THE OFFICE VOICE

Although the High Holidays will be behind us by the time you read this article, I would like to take this opportunity and thank all the members who made it possible.

When you arrived for services on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, what you saw was the wrapping on the package. What you didn't see were all the preparations and time that went into the package to make everything look festive and for everything to run smoothly.

At the time when most people are just starting their Summer vacations, we at the office start preparing for the High Holidays. This year, we were lucky - the High Holidays were later than usual. On the other hand, we had the additional tasks of preparing the New Wing for the Grand Opening.

We began with all the items that are not time sensitive such as copying and cutting the tickets, preparing the covers for the Memorial Book, preparing the High Holidays pledge cards and any other forms that can be prepared and copied in advance. The High Holidays pledge cards must be stuffed in envelopes with the name of the member on the outside as well as the inside and then kept in alphabetical order.

Our next step was to mail out different forms to the members of the Congregation. For example, some of these forms are the order forms for the Memorial Plaques and the Memorial Books. As the Memorial plaque orders are received, they are faxed to the company that does the engraving. It takes 6-8 weeks for the engraving company to prepare the Memorial Plaques. For them to be ready by the High Holidays, we must fax them by a specific deadline. The Memorial Books are prepared mostly in-house. There is a lot of work involved in putting all the information together, editing it properly and proofing it.

The next stage in the preparations is setting deadlines and preparing lists for the distribution of the tickets. Envelopes were stuffed with the correct number of tickets for each family.

About 4-5 weeks prior to the Holidays we started working on the physical preparations of the building and the arrangements for the services. We contacted the North and South Brunswick Police departments regarding traffic arrangements, a personnel company regarding the people we hire to check the tickets, and ordered the special white Kippot we use on the High Holidays. I am sure that there were few more items I forgot to mention here.

As the Holidays got closer, there was less to prepare. At this point, we made sure that everything and everyone would arrive on time, resolved unexpected problems and primarily answered a lot of phone calls from congregants with questions regarding their tickets, guest tickets and any other issues that may arise. Since the attendance at services during the High Holidays is so high, there are many more questions than usual.

On the Sunday before Rosh Hashanah, we started actually setting up the chairs, stacking the High Holiday Siddurim, setting up the Baby Sitting Classrooms and changed the appearance of the Sanctuary and the Ark. We also performed the last minute system checks to ensure that everything was working properly. It was only 5 years ago that, after checking all the systems more than once, we found that the Rabbi's microphone was not working during the final sound test on the evening of Rosh Hashanah! We were able to fix it but it was a close call.

We at the office couldn't possibly get all this ready for the Holidays without the help of numerous volunteers. We are thankful to anybody and everybody who helped!! Those who stuffed envelopes, those who cut cards, and those who helped us mail the HaKol out in the middle of all this. There are also those volunteers who were here on Sunday morning before Rosh Hashanah to set up the chairs and the books and those who were here the same Sunday morning to clean the Arc, change the Torah mantles and polish the Silver. There are far too many to mention them all here by name and I am sure I would not be able to do it without omitting one or two people, which I wouldn't like to do. We at the office know who you are and appreciate your help more than you think!

So the next time you attend and take part in the High Holidays services, please don't take it all for granted. Please think about all that is involved in preparing for this special time and give silent thanks to the many volunteers who worked to make the High Holidays services so special for all of us.

# ISRAEL TASKFORCE Alan Kane, Chairperson



Thirty four year old Tali Hatuel, the mother of four daughters, was eight months pregnant with her first son.

On the morning of May 2, 2004, she was on her way from her home in the settlement of Katif, in the Gaza Strip, to Ash-

ment of Katif, in the Gaza Strip, to Ashkelon, to protest Prime Minister Sharon's disengagement plan.

Tali, like many of the settlers in the West Bank and Gaza, was involved in a campaign to go door to door in Israel to convince Likud governing party members to vote NO in the upcoming referendum. Her husband David, the principal of a high school in Ashkelon, was planning to meet his family so together they would make their views known.

Minutes after she left the settlement gate in her white Citroen, with her daughters Hila, 11; Hadar, 9; Roni, 7 and Meirav, 2, a roadside bomb exploded near her car, wounding the passengers. Two terrorists from the Islamic Jihad approached the stalled vehicle and shot, execution style, each of the occupants of the vehicle – a pregnant mother and, one by one, each of her four daughters.

A group of Israeli soldiers on patrol heard the shots and came running. They engaged the two terrorists in a brief gun battle and killed them both.

Over the past five years, we have heard hundreds of similar stories. In addition to the almost two thousand Israeli citizens who have lost their lives in this recent intifada, we sometimes forget the nearly twelve thousand who were injured, many with substantial, life changing losses – the loss of an eye, an arm or leg – the loss of a dance at a child's wedding, the loss of seeing or holding a new grand-child. These injuries have strained Israel's infrastructure: the medical costs; disability costs, and loss of income due to decreased productivity.

The recent intifata has handicapped the Israeli economy. In addition to the increased security costs associated with the intifata, and decrease in revenue from tourism as a result; Israel has a new bill to pay – the relocation of nine thousand settlers from Gaza. The settlers each need a new home, and means to earn a living. We all saw the pictures of Israeli soldiers and police dragging settlers from their homes. Now these settlers need to start

over and build new lives.

Removing the Jewish communities from the Gaza Strip and northern Samaria means:

- 42 day-care centers, 36 kindergartens, seven elementary schools, and three high schools have been closed
- 5,000 schoolchildren have started the school year in new schools
- 38 synagogues have been dismantled
- 166 Israeli farmers have lost their livelihoods - plus some 5,000 of their Palestinian workers
- 48 graves in the Gush Katif Cemetery, including those of six residents murdered by terrorists, where exhumed and moved to Israel.

Disengagement will cost Israel an estimated \$2 billion - about 3.5 percent of the 2005 state budget.

The cost of family relocation alone is estimated to be nearly \$1 billion. This will come from an annual state budget of about \$59 billion.

- In addition, the IDF will spend some \$500 million to remove military bases and equipment from the Gaza Strip.
- To cite just one example, the demolition and removal of rubble from some 3,000 homes and public buildings will cost an estimated \$25 million.
- In the context of Israel's 2005 state budget, the estimated \$2b. cost of disen-

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gagement is equivalent to about half the country's annual health budget or approximately one third of the budget for educa-

This Rosh Hashana morning we have to ask ourselves, who is going to pay to rehabilitate David Hatuel's life - the father who lost his entire family that day? Who is going to pay for the construction of what many call the "Life Saving Fence" the security fence that surrounds the Gaza Strip and the West Bank? Who is going to pay to resettle the Israelis who were forced to leave Gaza?

Prior to the disengagement the American government promised Israel \$2 billion to pay for the cost of removing and resettling those in Gaza. Now, after the devastating hurricanes that hit New Orleans and the gulf coast, the American government has told Israel that they are unable to deliver on the promise at this time. Israel's citizens are already strained by paying taxes of almost 60% of their income and struggling with an economy damaged by the intifata. Recent surveys show that a

third of Israel's citizens live below the poverty line.

I believe that Israelis are our brethren, as are all Jews around the world. In a time of sion fund. need, families help each other. It is time for us to help our brothers and sisters in

The Israel Bond program is not charity, it is an investment in the future of Israel. The financial return of the Bonds is competitive in the marketplace. Israeli Bonds are bought as investment vehicles by unions, retirement funds, and many organizations seeking stabile, long term investments.





# **SOCIAL ACTION**

#### THE CLOTHESLINE:

The cold weather is just around the corner and with it comes another opportunity to serve the less fortunate through The ClothesLine. The ClothesLine is a mobile clothing bank (a 1977 school bus, seats removed, retrofitted with shelves and clothing racks) started four years ago to serve the needy of Middlesex County. It is a collaborative project of Middlesex Interfaith Partners with the Homeless (MIPH), Elijah's Promise, Inc., and several civic groups and businesses.

Each house of worship "adopts a month" during which the congregation is responsible for collecting excellent clothing (no stains, rips, missing buttons, broken zippers, etc.), blankets and small toys. Then that congregation handles the sorting and sizing, helping with distribution, and straightening /re-stocking the bus after visits.

Clothing is distributed to 600-1000 people each month in three locations: New Brunswick, at Elijah's Promise Soup Kitchen; Perth Amboy, at Glad Tidings Ecumenical Church; and Edison, at the Edison Job Corps Academy.

B'nai Tikvah has once again adopted the month of November to collect, sort and distribute the clothing. Due to scheduling constraints, we will actually be collecting clothing in October.





The families of these students sell scrip from Lox, Stock & Deli and our patronage would assist them meet their annual sales' goals. 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
