RABBI ELIGBERG SPEAKS

Israel, Democracy and Conservative Judaism

Dear Haverim,

Read this only if you want to make a difference. What you choose to do when you get to the end of this letter will have a significant effect in Israel and on Jews around the world. That is power. To understand how you came to possess this power, we need to look briefly at the history of Israel and Zionism.

In 1897,
Theodore Herzl
convened the First
Zionist Congress
in Basle, Switzerland. Delegates
representing
twenty-two countries came together
to create the
equivalent of an

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international Jewish Parliament. Successive Congresses of the World Zionist Organization, (WZO) have convened ever since and in June, 2006 the 35th Zionist Congress will take place in Jerusalem. The Congress has great influence on the global Jewish agenda and the allocation of the Jewish Agency for Israel's (JAFI) budget of over 300 million dollars.

Delegates are chosen by election, with over 300 representing Diaspora Jewry joining almost 200 Israeli delegates. The United States sends the largest contingent, outside of Israel, with 145 delegates. The Conservative Movement is represented by MERCAZ Olami, our Zionist political organization, with chapters around the world. The largest branch is MERCAZ USA. In the last two Zionist Congress elections (1997 and 2002) MERCAZ USA maintained its position as the second largest American Zionist Organization, receiving about 25% of the vote. This percentage, however, is smaller than the number of Conservative Jews in the United States.

Conservative Jews are strong supporters of Israel and elections to the Zionist Congress afford us an opportunity to express our pride in Israel in a way that reflects our Movement. This is also our unique opportunity to impact on Israeli society. Progress in the struggle for religious pluralism in Israel has often come as a result of decisions made at the World Zionist Congress. Our participation strengthens Israel as a Jewish, Zionist and democratic state. It also benefits us with official representation on key decision-making bodies of the WZO and JAFI.

Conservative/Masorti Jews around the world profit directly from our presence in the WZO, JAFI and at the World Zionist Congresses. Masorti institutions in Israel receive direct allocations and indirect subsidies of over 1.7 million dollars. This funding supports Masorti institutions such as the Schechter Institute, TALI Schools, Masorti congregations and Kibbutz Hanaton. It represents a significant portion of Masorti Judaism's budget. An additional? million dollars

goes to support the spiritual and educational needs of Masorti/ Conservative Jews outside of Israel. Jewish Agency funds support Conservative Movement programs such as USY's Nativ Year Course, Ramah Seminar and the Conservative Yeshiva in Jerusalem, as well as providing shlichim and teacher training for our youth programs, day schools and summer camps.

Exercising your power is easy. Voting in the Zionist Congress elections is a two step process – Registration and Balloting.

- 1. Registration: Any American Jew 18 years or older can register to vote either by mail or on-line. Registration began on July 1st. Mail-in registration ends on January 15, 2006, while on-line registration will continue until February 15th. There is a nominal registration fee of \$7 for adults and \$5 for students. Registration forms are enclosed as a separate flyer.
- **2. Balloting:** Ballots will be mailed to registered voters starting in mid-November. Ballots must be received by the end of February 2006. Again, voting may be either by mail or on-line.

While you are focused on the Conservative/Masorti community around the world, I would urge you to support them directly as well, by joining MERCAZ (www.mercazusa.org) or by including the Masorti Foundation amongst your acts of tzedakah (www.masorti.org)

RABBI ELIGBERG SPEAKS

Hannukah: 8 Actions in 8 Days

December, 2005

This Hanukkah, join Jews around North America in 8 simple actions to conserve energy, slow global climate change, and save you money!

Day 1: Replace an outdoor light fixture with one that has a motion-detector. Outdoor lights that are left on all night waste electricity, increase your energy bill, and add to night-time "light pollution." A fixture with a motion-detector will turn on only when needed.

Day 2: Make a plan to decrease your car use. Automobiles emit greenhouse gas emissions (CO2 and NOx) and contribute to U.S. dependence on foreign oil. Examine your driving habits and see if you can tele-commute, walk, bike, take public transit, or combine errands to reduce the amount you drive.

Day 3: Make your own Hanukkah gifts! Take a photo and design a frame for it, knit a scarf for the winter, or make a set of beeswax candles. Use recycled materials if you can. You can find lots of great books about homemade gifts in your local library.

Day 4: Eat less meat and buy organic, locally grown foods. Large-scale meat production uses a huge amount of natural resources, particularly grain, topsoil, and water. Eating organic food is better for your health since it reduces your exposure to pesticides and antibiotics. Buying food grown close to home supports family farms and reduces the amount of energy used to prepare and transport food.

Day 5: Give your furnace a tune-up. Forty percent of home energy use is for heat. An inefficient heating system can waste 30-50% of the energy it uses. Oil furnaces should be serviced annually and gas furnaces every two years. A heating technician can do the tune-up for \$50-100.

Day 6: Save paper by sending environmentally-friendly Hanukkah e-cards. To create an e-card, visit care2.com. Or, if you're feeling artistic, make your own paper cards with recycled paper.

Day 7: Wash a full load of clothes and use cold water for the rinse. Washing machines use 32-59 gallons of water per cycle, so waiting until you have a full load of clothes will save both water and energy. A warm water wash and a cold rinse will clean nearly all clothes well.

Day 8: Question: What three things can you give, which once you give them, will give back to you at least as much and perhaps more of what you gave? Answer: Knowledge, light, and love.

RABBI ELIGBERG SPEAKS

Highlights from American Jewish History

30 Heshvan – American forces marched into New York on November 25, 1783. The Jewish residents, who had fled the city in 1776 because of their revolutionary sympathies, were able to return soon after the retreat of the British.

1 Kislev – The first Jewish social and civic club in America was founded in Newport, R.I. on November 25, 1761.

2 Kislev – The General Assembly of New York, on November 15, 1727, passed an act permitting Jews to omit the phrase "upon the faith of a Christian" from the oath of abjuration.

3 Kislev – Emma Lazarus, Jewish American poetess, died on November 19, 1887.

5 Kislev – The Hebrew Education Society met in Philadelphia on December 4, 1864, and resolved to establish a Jewish Theological Seminary, the first in America.

9 Kislev – The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee for the relief of Jewish war sufferers was established on November 27, 1914. The Joint was organized on the eve of Sabbath Va-Yetzei. It was in the portion of the Bible read that week that the classical expression of Jewish voluntary giving was first enunciated: "And of all that You give me, I will set aside a tithe for You" (Genesis 28:22).

11 Kislev – The charter of Yeshiva College was amended by the New York State Board of Regents on November 16, 1945, making it the first American university under Jewish auspices.

Christian universities were closed to Jewish students throughout the Middle Ages. There were very few exceptions to this rule. The most famous schools were in countries from which Jews had been expelled so that Jewish students had no access to them. Furthermore, universities were primarily ecclesiastical schools,

closely linked to the Church, and as a result, Jewish students were inevitably excluded, even in countries where Jews enjoyed the right of residence. The University of Padua, Italy, was a notable exception. From the middle of the 16th century it attracted Jewish students from all over Europe. The University of Leyden, Holland, adopted a similar liberal policy in the 17th century. The earliest known effort to establish a university under Jewish auspices was made in Sicily. King John granted authorization, on January 17, 1466, to open such a school but the project never materialized. Rabbi Abraham Provençal attempted to found a Jewish university in Italy in the 16th century, but he too failed.

The first Jewish university was established in Jerusalem. It opened on April 1, 1925. Yeshiva University was the first Jewish university in American, established in the tradition of the American pluralistic cultural pattern.

12 Kislev – Solomon Schechter, discoverer of the Cairo Genizah and founder of the United Synagogue of America, died on November 19, 1915.

19 Kislev – Herbert H. Lehman, prominent leader of American Jewry, first Jewish governor of New York, died on December 5, 1963.

23 Kislev – An agreement signed upon the surrender of Muslim Granada to the Castilian Christian forces on November 25, 1491, provided for the peaceful departure of Jews and Moors from the province.

26 Kislev – The Touro Synagogue of Newport, R.I., the oldest existing synagogue in the U.S. was dedicated on December 2, 1763.

27 Kislev – The synagogue of Congregation Beth Elohim, the fourth oldest in the United States, was dedicated in Charleston, S.C., on December 19, 1794.




A lot of volunteers made this room possible! They helped in a multitude of different ways, but each one of them helped in some way to bring it all together.

Spammers and other threats to your computing safety are increasing daily. These culprits rely heavily on "human engineering" to get you to open messages that infect your computer. E-mail containing generic messages are your biggest clue, such as: "You have just received a virtual greeting from a family member!"

If you received a gun in the mail, would you point it at yourself and pull trigger? Don't open attachments out of curiosity and never enter personal information on a website that was linked from an email message.

If you feed them, they will come (or.... The History of Friday Night Family Shabbat Dinner

B'nai Tikvah holds a monthly service at 7pm geared towards families with children between the ages of 2 and 7 (although younger children do attend). What many of you may not know is that this service has been going on consistently since the fall of 1994. It was started as a way to give our children a service that they could attend at a convenient hour with our friends and theirs. Back then, the main attendees were people who knew us and hung out with us. One year Marc decided to take a break and Barry Safeer stepped in, as did Jackie Master. When our three children became too old to attend, but too young to keep at home alone, Karen Cohen took over (thanks for that!!). A few years ago it dawned on Marc and me that we could take the service back

over and we asked Karen if she would mind stepping down, which she graciously did.

We had a small but consistent turn out each month. The feedback we received was that it was difficult for two working parents to make it home from work, feed their young children and make it to the synagogue by 7pm for

services. It was suggested that we feed everyone at the synagogue and follow with services. We now have 30 to 40 people joining us at Friday night dinner each month (October saw 54 people). Our menu is child-friendly and the atmosphere is relaxed. I look at the "regulars" as if they are part of my family, a little upset when they cannot attend, and a little sad when their children become too old to attend. I love when new families join us.

We combine the traditions of a Friday night meal, blessing the children, the wine and *challah* and *benching* after dinner with the realization that we are dealing with children who cannot sit still for very long. We have had grandparents bring their grandchildren and have had a multigenerational blessing over the children. Sometimes the children get up and run around, things get spilled. I always remind the parents that the most important thing is that their children are in attendance.

Marc and I would like to thank everyone for their continued support of this program. The first candle of Chanukah, our joyous Festival of Lights, is lit on Sunday evening, December 25. Yes, Chanukah is very late this year! We light an additional candle each night as we celebrate the victory of the Maccabees over the Syrian-Greek army of the tyrant Antiochus.

Chanukah is, of course, more than a holiday com-

memorating a military victory. Though technically a minor holiday, Chanukah is not even mentioned in the Bible, today it is a major family celebration. As we exchange gifts, join in playing dreidle, lighting candles, and eating latkes, we remember that the Maccabbees' struggle of long ago is still our challenge today.

- ☐ Mitzvah Night: Choose old toys, books, games that you don't use anymore; wrap them and deliver them to the needy.
- □ Book Night: You probably already purchased your Chanukah books at our Jewish Book Fair, but, if not, visit the School Office to pick up some Jewish stories. Potato Pancakes All Around, by Marilyn Hirsh, and the Power of Light Eight Stories for Chanukah by I. B. Singer, are both highly recommended.
- ☐ Activities Night: With stickers, construction paper, stampers, markers and paints, create Chanukah greeting cards to be sent to friends, relatives or residents at the Buckingham Place Adult Center..
- ☐ Baking Night: As a family, bake cookies, make marshmallow dreidles or Chanukah chocolates.





Potato latkes will be frying in many homes during the holiday, so get some scrip from your favorite stores, make a list of the ingredients you need for those tasty tater pancakes and go to the stores.

The supermarket scrip program is one of Congregation B'nai

Tikvah's fundraisers where 5% of the sales helps our synagogue's economy. A&P, Acme, Pathmark, Shop Rite, Stop & Shop or Wild Oats are the participating stores. Purchase the scrip by: Visiting the scrip committee's table during Sunday religious school hours, going on line at www.bnaitikvah.org (both an order form and credit card form are available), coming to or phoning the synagogue office (during business hours) or contacting the scrip committee, chaired by Rachel Shaneson at Ra-

chel.Shaneson@bnaitikvah.org. The scrip committee will make arrangements with you for FREE delivery, when requested. Orders exceeding \$1000 are gladly accepted when made in

advance. Scrip may be purchased with cash, check or credit cards.



This month's hint: This month's tip is more like a "did you know that?" Yes, did you know that supermarket scrip makes a fine present? College students, elderly relatives/ friends, teachers, etc. will all be able to use and enjoy this type of present. They, like us, do have to eat too, you know. Further, did you

know that some of your favorite supermarket scrip may be used at other stores, not just for the ones you think. For instance, Stop & Shop may also be used at Giant, Super G, Grant Food Stores, Martin Food Markets and Tops Stores. Wild Oats scrip may be redeemed at Henry's Farmers and Sun Harvest stores. Acme scrip cards are also good at Albertson's, Jewel-Osco, Osco Drugs, Savon and Shaw's. Finally, and this is a biggie: A&P scrip is also accepted at Waldbaum's, Super Fresh, Farmer Jack, Sav-a-Center, Food Emporium and Food Basics USA. Now that you know supermarket scrip is good at more locations, think about those who live within shopping distance of any of these facilities, buy the scrip cards and spread them out far and wide!
