#### RABBI ELIGBERG SPEAKS

#### Passover = Pass[on & hand]over<sup>©</sup>

Dear Haverim,

When the Torah speaks about the mitzvah of Pesach, the text speaks in very personal terms. Lots of "you" and "your". The Torah presumes that your celebration of this festival will be remarkable and noteworthy; that it will prompt your children to inquire regarding the pageant that is unfolding before their eyes. Once having captured the curiosity of our children and evoked appropriate questions from them, the Torah bids us to answer by saying, "This is because of what God did for me when we left Egypt."

For the generation who received the mitzvot from God at Sinai, this was an easy and personal statement. Having been eyewitnesses to the miracles of the Exodus they could relate their experiences of that historic era. Those Israelites could articulate the suffering of they endured at the hands of the Egyptians and the sense of futility that surrounded all they did. For them, it was a simple act of memory to describe the hopefulness that greeted Moshe's arrival and the crushing dejection that came with Moshe's initial failure to liberate the people. Our ancient ancestors could easily recount the unfolding of the ten plagues, the debilitating effect they had on the Egyptians and the growing sense amongst the Israelites that salvation was at hand. Their frenetic departure from Egypt and flight into the wilderness, indelibly etched in their mind's eye, came trippingly off their tongues; the elation of being free still challenging the speaker to find adequate articulation even after many years. Even the most challenged of our Israelite ancestors could speak about the Exodus with the magical word, "I" - an "I" that gave them authenticity and authority. It was the "I" of an eyewitness, unimpeachable and irreplaceable.

That reality notwithstanding, the Torah commands us to answer the questions put to us by our children with the very self-same "I" and "me". This is what God did for me when I was brought forth out of Egypt." We are commanded to speak as eyewitnesses to events that are handed down from generation to generation in the words of our tradition and teachings. The Torah challenges to make the reality and the experience of these events our own - to learn how to speak of them in the first person. This is perhaps the greatest challenge in preparing for Pesach.

Embedded in this challenge is the key to grasping one of the central and essential themes of Pesach - K'lal Yisrael (Jewish nationhood). The Torah and the Haggadah remind us that the Jewish people have existed as a recognizable community from the moment of Exodus until the present. As a people, we are a continuous and self-replenishing entity. As a part of this enduring entity, replete with collective memory - we were slaves, we were liberated, we were brought forth, and we were chosen.

Viewed through the prison of Jewish peoplehood, our national history becomes our life story. The Seder celebrant exists as both a unique individual in a specific time and place but also as part of a "great link" where time and place are without meaning. The ancient Jewish metaphor used to express the connec-

tion between generations is the "chain of tradition". The Seder celebrants are at once the beginning, the end, and the middle link in that chain. As parents, we are the end of the chain that reaches back through the generations to the Exodus. Our children are the beginning of the chain that reaches into the future. All of us at the Seder, parent and child together, converge to create the present, to forge the middle link that is the crucial nexus of past and future.

Whether the future finds inspiration and hope in the past and whether history prods us to purposeful action before God in the future, is dependent on what we create around the Seder table in the present. To forge strong links in the chain and insure that the Jewish people will remain a strong and self-perpetuating entity, we must acculturate and socialize our children into the history and tradition of that entity. We need to inculcate them in the language and vocabulary of our people, to enable them to speak with the "I" of our ancestors.

On Pesach we remember that our ancestors were forced to build sterile edifices of bricks and mortar as tributes to dead kings who were buried with their possessions and past. More importantly, Pesach teaches us that our children are the building blocks of our future – an indispensable necessity for perpetuating the lofty and enduring values upon which our heritage rests. "Destiny, we intuit, is rooted in history, tomorrow is yesterday's child."<sup>2</sup>

With blessings for a happy and kosher Pesach, Rabbi David M. Eligberg

#### Our Seder Was Fit for a King

It's time to wake up. IT'S TIME TO WAKE UP! WAKE UP!!!! We hear but do we listen? I hear my parents telling me it's time to wake up for school. The clock radio plays, the bus is coming, the train is leaving, time for school, time for work, gotta get up. We awaken each morning, we thank God for another day, our strength and spirit renewed and prepared for a new day of challenges. Just that simple and it's just another day. Not so quick, Pesach is coming and it's really time to wake up.

What do you think the message of Pesach is? We were chosen by God, who decided that Moses, Aaron, and Miriam would lead us out of Egypt to fulfill His promise to our patriarchs. We were going home. We recall our plight as we recite the Passover story.

After all of the cleaning, shopping and preparing the Seder is a feast fit for a king. Is that all there is? After all the work, you feel like a slave. But it's all worthwhile, you spend

time with your family and the Seder is fit for a king. Stay up late, prizes for the afikomen, the kids are so cute and the delicacies, your Seder was fit for a king.

This morning, as I prayed, I was searching for just the right words of inspiration. I was looking for words that we read in our daily prayers regularly but we do not always pay attention to in our daily lives. Like you I am consumed with my life, my family and my friends. I say prayer to God for them when they are not feeling well; I do nice things for them and I care for them.

My simple point is that we always have to try harder and do more for others. In our daily prayers we ask God to save us. God is our shield. God responds to us, as God redeems us from Egypt... "Speak your desire and I will fulfill it" as the prayer continues "we are truly blessed people who are privileged, blessed the people whose God is the Lord. I have trusted in Your love; may I rejoice in Your saving power. I shall sing to the Lord, for He has been bountiful to me." These verses should not be taken out of context. We also read in the morning and begin our evening prayers with "V'hu rachuum...God, being merciful, grants atonement for sin and does not destroy. Time and again He restrains wrath refuses to let rage be all consuming.

From these words we recognize that the promises made by God to us can be understood to mean that we are privileged to know God and responsible to do his work on earth. We were sent out into the wilderness so that we would know how it feels to be homeless. We do not want to share our challenges just to complain. We want to do acts of kindness

so the discrimination and hate that we have felt are not experienced by others. We as a people have experienced so many difficulties and yet we continue to thrive because we contribute so much to the world. Still we can always do more. The official CBTNewsletter is separate from our "eGroup", which is an open and uncensored voluntary list for members of the congregation. Of course, we'd like you to become a member of that group too, to exchange ideas, post personal classifieds, calls for help, etc.

Also, there is no extra charge for more than one e-mail per family! Being an egalitarian synagogue, we'll gladly send e-mails to husbands *and* wives, or to both home and work, if you so desire.


#### **BOARD MEETING MINUTES ARE ONLINE**

#### ISRAEL BONDS UPDATE

#### LITTLE BOY, LITTLE BOY

Dear Paul and Nancy

While rummaging through Mili's things I came across the attached story. Although she wrote it in 1991, I think it is as apt today as it was then. Thanks, Aaron

In early June of 1977, I was en route home to the United States, back to my job and husband, after a visit to my daughter's home in the Negev. For the past three weeks, I had helped care for my beautiful new baby granddaughter and her "big" brother, my not quite four-year old adored grandson. He'd greeted the new baby's arrival by coming down with chicken pox on the very day she was born, so I had been busy, but enjoyed the visit, for it was a happy, if hectic, time.

Leonardo da Vinci Airport in Rome, where I had to change planes, was very modern in design, decorated in deep Colors, and with lavish use of Italian tiles. The in-transit lounge was very much like others the world over, except that the signs were written in Italian. 1 was amused to note that the ladies' room, which was spectacularly and luxuriously tiled in dramatic shades, was lacking toilet tissue, as it had been on my previous visits. Woe to the female user who did not have a supply of facial tissues in her purse, I mused! One more annoyance for the traveler...

The wait, unscheduled and prolonged, seemed endless and dull. The leather seats, as in most airports, were saddle shaped and uncomfortable even after a short period. Waiting for a long time was made tiresomely miserable for it was impossible to assume an easy position. After several hours, I was beyond travel. weary, for I had been awake since the chilly pre-dawn. I'd had an emotional farewell with my family, and then departed for the three hour trip from the desert to the airport near Tel Aviv.

I felt increasingly aimless and spent as the hours crawled by at the airport in Rome. Fervently, I hoped the plane to the States would be uncrowded, so that perhaps I could fold down the arm of the adjoining seat and nap on the tedious journey home.

By now, I had desperately exhausted the attractions of the duty-free shops. I had purchased the international edition of the <u>Herald Tribune</u>, and had read every line, even to the masthead and the

classified ads. Listlessly, I contemplated another trip to the ladies' room to inspect hair and lipstick, for it seemed preferable to buying and eating a candy bar, with unneeded calories.

Idly, I took to watching the other occupants of the glassed in waiting area. My eye was caught by a compact bundle of energy; a small boy, not unlike my grandson in size and build, with similar intelligent, dark eyes. Boys of 3 or 4 are seldom still. This one was spinning repeatedly about until he staggered, reeled, lost balance, and then lurched with a thud into the heavy glass wall, his long, colorfully striped robe flying about.

Instantly, the similarly dressed young woman sitting nearby surrounded by an untidy mound of bundles grasped his arm and pulled him firmly towards her bosom, her expressively plump face showing stern displeasure and exasperation. She muttered angrily at him as she did so, and while I could not understand the words, I recognized the language as Arabic.

The boy, his soft features handsomely resembling hers, leaned sulkily against her, looking chastened, his eyes liquid and round as grapes. He did not, however, stop glancing around restlessly, seeking a diversion. But alas, there seemed nothing sufficiently distracting enough to engage a small boy's interest.

I could have used some diversion myself, I grumbled to myself, as I empathized with the child. Momentarily, I was cross, irritated, and resentful about the long wait. Despite the noise of a babble of tongues surrounding me, I could detect none with an American accent, and I felt cut off and bored.

By this time, the boy was off and twirling again, and so doing, he collided with one of the steady stream of newcomers to the lounge, who smiled and gently steadied him before he could fall. The mother, looking more harassed, called to him in harsh tones. Head hanging, he returned to her side, his embroidered brimless cap slightly askew. This time, the dark complexioned older woman in the black dress and black scarf seated next to the mother joined in the scolding, and her unrelenting face showed her strong displeasure.

I thought of my beloved grandson, who sometimes seemed to be pure mercury as he energetically rushed about both outdoors and in. The picture book and assortment of small playthings he took on trips would surely

have become stale by now, and he, too, would be seeking activity after the interminable wait in this bland, confined atmosphere.

Suddenly inspired, forgetting my lethargy, I rummaged in my oversized travel purse, past my tickets, baggage checks, passport, compact, and wallet. Finally, I located one lone paper-wrapped stick of American gum. Smiling, I leaned forward and held out the stick to the boy, questioning the mother's permission with my eyes and a gesture. She smiled gratefully, as did the older woman, and we all nodded as the now cheerful, animated small boy took the gum and smiled widely. He spent some time carefully removing the wrapper, and popped the treat into his mouth, content for a while.

Soon, at last, my flight was called, and I left, small carry on bag in hand. The boy grinning his good-by. His relatives, too, smiled, and the mother gave a small, warm, wave.

Later, somewhere over the snowy Alps of Europe, I enjoyably lingered over my memories of my grandson, picturing his absorbed pleasure as he play with his toys, recalling his many imaginative questions as I spun him fanciful tales at bedtime. I hugged the memory of darkly fringed shining eyes, his chubby, busy legs, his pronounced love for airplanes. I wondered what his future life might be like in his adopted country.

As an infant only a few weeks old, he had unknowingly lived through a Middle Eastern war. Some day, then far off, ho would be eighteen and subject to compulsory military service. He would be a soldier or sailor, a participant, no longer the unaware spectator he had been in infancy.

I thought of the boy playing in the airport. In about 14. years, he would be 18, and he, too, would probably be a conscript for his people.

Huddled in a thin airline blanket, a freezing finger of fear clutching at my heart, I stared at the snow covered peaks below the plane and shivered. Unbidden, the thought flashed into my mind, "Little boy, little boy, will you try to kill my grandson?"

Almost fourteen years later, I am still haunted by that memory, fear clutching ever more chillingly at my heart.



The supermarket scrip committee (a/k/a the committee) will gladly accommodate large orders when called in prior to pick up.

Historically, the pre-Pesach weeks are busy

for the committee and large quantities of scrip

are sold. In order to guarantee your large order,

contact the committee ASAP with your requests.













The best ways to do this are the internet (www. bnaitikvah.org) which includes an order form, contacting Rachel Shaneson (chairperson) at Rachel Shaneson@bnaitikvah.org, phoning the synagogue office (during office hours) or visiting the scrip table in the lobby of the new wing during religious school hours each Sunday. Credit cards, checks and cash (you know, the green stuff) are acceptable forms of payment for the scrip from A&P, Acme, Pathmark, Shop Rite, Stop and Shop and Wild Oats.

So whatever your needs for the holiday, don't buy a thing from these aforementioned stores without a sufficient (dayanu) amount of scrip; otherwise, look out for those locusts, frogs and other plagues!

<u>This month's hint:</u> Like each and every month, remember those whose needs may overshadow yours. Contact your town's food pantry and either ask what they need to meet their goals for holiday foods and such or just buy duplicates of what you may be getting. 
