THE RABBI SPEAKS Rabbi Michael Goldstein

A Different Four Questions

Although it is barely Purim as we read this, Pesach is soon! The 1st Seder happens Monday night, April 2nd. Party well at Purim, but then it is time for us to begin our preparations. Pesach requires a head start and I mean more than just cleaning. We also need to prepare mentally and intellectually for the Seder. My suggestion is to approach our preparation the same way we would a business presentation to a new client. We do our research. We consider what approaches will hold the client's attention. We decide about how long will the presentation be. We prepare whatever visual aids will be helpful in making our point.

Use these same methods to prepare the Seder. Above all else, don't just sit down at the Seder table, open the Haggadah and start reading! A successful seder requires forethought, participation, inspiration and a little humor. Finally, a successful seder benefits from a good Haggadah. My two favorites are The Feast of Freedom by the Rabbinical Assembly and The Family Participation Haggadah: A Different Night by The Shalom Hartman Institute. Both are available on-line or in Jewish bookstores.

Now, about those four questions I refer to in the above title. We all know the famous Four Questions as written in the Haggadah. Hopefully, your children and grandchildren have learned them in Hebrew School and will lead everyone at the Seder table in a rousing chorus. But these are not the original Four Questions from the original seder. The original Four Questions were only three and were as follows: 1. Why on this night do we eat only matzah? 2. Why on this night do we dip twice? 3. Why on this night do we roast the Pesach (lamb) offering? As we can see, this is a substantially different set of questions. WHY?

First of all, these questions, that have their origin in Mishnah Tractate Pesachim, were suggestions for how to tell the Pesach story and how to explain the rituals and foods of the Seder table. The questions evolved as the nature of the Seder table evolved. Asking about maror/bitter herb substituted for the Pesach (lamb) sacrifice after the destruction of the Temple (70CE) made it impossible to offer and therefore to eat at the Seder. The question about reclining on this night

was added at a later date to emphasize the concept of being a free people.

There is an interesting Talmudic anecdote told about the sage Abbaye when he went to a seder at the home of his teacher, Rabbah. When the dish with the Pesach foods was removed from the table, Abbaye exclaimed, "We have not yet eaten. Why have they taken away the dish?" Rabbah replied: "You have exempted us from reciting Mah Nishtana" (Pesachim 115b). From this incident, we learn that the most important thing at the Seder are the questions we ask. Whatever we do is intended to encourage and stimulate questions. Every question is relevant and the more questions the better the Seder.

Let's Make a Difference!

We listen to the story of Esther, we feast, we acknowledge friendships and relationships with joy and warmth and we must give gifts to raise the spirits of those who are not fortunate, as we are!

We are celebrating Purim this weekend which means that Pesach is lurking around the corner. As with so many of our holidays, there are a series of common elements, practices and celebrations in each. In each we thank God for saving us from our oppressors, each holiday expresses our goal to be a nation, in each as we celebrate with feasts, we are reminded to help those less fortunate than ourselves.

During my years at B'nai Tikvah, I have experienced and can attest to the generosity of spirit and giving to those less fortunate. The sisterhood's program for Mishloach Manot is incredibly successful. The purpose of these gifts is to increase love and friendship between Jews, thereby dismissing Haman's accusations that there is strife and dissention among Jews. This is an ideal opportunity to repair broken relationships by sending packages to people with whom one has ill feelings. This public exercise is a perfect opportunity for each of us within the synagogue to recognize and show our appreciation and friendship to our fellow congregants, while helping us improve our existing relationships.

Not to be confused with *Mishloach Manot*, the gifts of at least two types of food that we give to friends and acquaintances, is *Matanot La'evyonim*. This is the second of four distinct mitzvoth that we carry out on Purim. The other two are reading or hearing the Megillah (Scroll of Esther) and rejoicing with the Purim Feast.

"They are to observe these as days of feasting and gladness, and for sending delicacies to one another, and giving gifts to the poor." (Esther 9:22)

Depending on your perspective, Gifts to the poor or *Matanot La'evyonim* is probably the most socially critical mitzvah you can do. Food pantries in our area are critically low.

There is no greater joy than gladdening the hearts of orphans, widows, and needy people. One who does so is likened to God, as it says about Him "to revive the spirit of the humble and to revive the heart of the downtrodden" (Isaiah 57:15).

Both North and South Brunswick have programs to feed the needy. In North Brunswick you can bring

donations to the municipal building on Hermann Road, there is a food pantry in the basement of the building. In South Brunswick the food pantry is located in the Community Center. Both pantries are stocked for emergencies for any township resident in need. Food is provided throughout the year by generous donations from area businesses, schools, service groups and individuals. The products that are always needed include: cereal, parmalat milk, peanut butter, jelly, snack foods, pasta and sauce.

As the Hagaddah tells us, Kol dichfin -- All who are hungry, let them come and eat.... We shall continue to bring pride, heart, and neshama, spirit, to our movement as we take heed of those words this Pesach, and every day before that, starting now, with Purim.

Drop off your food donation at the synagogue and tell the office that I said that I, the cantor, will be glad to deliver your donations to either pantry. You or the staff can store the food in my office. Let's make a difference!

Worship the Lord in gladness; come before God with joyous song.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE Dan Greenberg

"rejoice, celebrate, learn, have fun"

On the front cover of the Shabbat flyer that is distributed every Friday night and Saturday morning at synagogue is the phrase "We invite you to rejoice, celebrate, learn, have fun and grow with us." Well, we really mean it, and I want to share with you one of the ways that we are putting it into practice.

Last month, Congregation B'nai Tikvah inaugurated a new program that I believe has the potential to help people grow than almost any other single program that we have hosted recently at our synagogue: the B'nai Tikvah Learners Service. Of course, we need your participation to make that happen!

The Learners Service is designed to be an introduction to prayer, for those who never learned how or why, or for those who forgot because Hebrew school was so long ago, or for those who simply are uncomfortable or unfamiliar with the Sabbath service. It is held twice monthly on Shabbat mornings, starting at 9:30 AM and ending promptly at 10:15 AM. The service is led by a congregant: Howard Waksman, who has spent many hours preparing materials for the course, and we are very grateful to him for making the effort.

After the casual, relaxed discussion in the Beit Midrash (where Junior Congregation is held), attendees are cordially invited to the main sanctuary to join the regular service. Of course, no one is forced to make the leap, and indeed, it may be several months before you feel comfortable enough with the tunes and melodies and structure of the service to come into the regular service.

One of the complaints I hear most often from congregants is that they don't want to come to synagogue because they don't understand what's going on. They don't know why we stand when we do, or why we kiss the fringes of our tzitzit during the Shemah, or what the basic structure of the service is. This Learners Service is an attempt to overcome that problem. No question is too trivial; none is too silly to ask. And absolutely no one will laugh at you. All that will happen is that you will gain a better understanding of what the service is all about, how we pray, and why we pray the way we do.

So if you have found yourself asking some of these questions, watch the email announcements for the March dates. (If you don't get the announcements, please send an email to webmaster@bnaitikvah.org and Gary Bergman will be happy to help you get set up.) And join Howard and others as you grown spiritually at Congregation B'nai Tikvah.

At the February Board meeting, the Board voted on a motion that I asked to be brought before them regarding the release of email addresses of members. The question came up when the Sisterhood asked me for the data base of all the email addresses we have in our system.

Initially, I didn't see a problem with it but when I thought about it again, I decided that it might be a problem. Members who give their email address to the office or put it on their Membership Registration Form give us their email address because they expect emails from the Office. I didn't think that expanding the distribution of this list should be taken lightly.

The Board's decision was that the data base of email addresses should not be given out to anybody within the organization (Sisterhood, Men's Club, etc.) or outside the organization. While the discussion was taking place at the Board meeting, I thought that it would be a good idea to write this article and clarify some things that have to do with this decision.

The first point I wanted to bring up is that if you gave your email address to us and think that this way the Sisterhood, the Men's Club, or any other sub group has it, this is not the case. If you are interested in them having your email address, you will have to give it to them separately.

The second point, related to the first one, is that if you give us your email address it is safe with us! It is much easier and much more cost effective for us to send an email to the entire congregation than to send a letter via the USPS or even to place phone calls. The Synagogue is considered a business and we are paying for each phone call we are making by the minute. Sending emails is free.

Most of you probably know that we have two list serves. The one is the more formal and official one that serves for announcements from the office or from the Webmaster about Synagogue events. The second one is more social and each one of the members can post emails to the group. This second list has jokes, information about cars or any other items for sale, sometimes job offers, or anything else that members feel like sharing with each other.

If you are not already registered to the list serves, especially to the official one (CBT News), you might want to reconsider and register. You will receive information from us much more efficiently

and we promise that your email address will not be shared with anybody. The information we send out on this list is limited and we are trying not to overwhelm your incoming mail box.

If you are interested in sharing your email address with us, please contact the Office or Gary Bergman, our tireless Webmaster at: Webmaster@bnaitikvah.org.

If the reason you are not sharing your email address with us is because you don't have one and you would like to, you may contact Gary Bergman as well to coordinate with him the possibility of receiving a used computer and training on how to use it.



As the generation of Holocaust survivors passes on, opportunities to hear first-hand testimonials are vanishing. Documentarian Albert Maysles and New York Times reporter Andrew Jacobs have teamed up to create a film in order to capture a piece of history. On April 11th, Andrew Jacobs will be at B'nai Tikvah with a clip of the movie, Four Seasons Lodge (which he is directing), for us to preview and to voice our opinions about. Some of the survivors may attend as well.

In the 1970s, nearly 100 Jews from Germany and Poland, men and women who survived the Nazi death camps, created a sprawling retreat in the Catskill mountains of New York, a place they called Four Seasons. Without setting out to do so, they created a community made up entirely of other Holocaust survivors, people who would never flinch hearing about the camps, the nearmisses with the Gestapo, the numbing tales of loss. There, amid 40 acres of forest and fastidiously maintained lawns, they swam, hiked, cooked and cracked Yiddish jokes without apology.

Please experience this piece of history at B'nai Tikvah on April 11th.

YOM HASHOAH OBSERVANCE APRIL 15, 2007

In accordance with legislation, the state wide Yom HaShoah (Holocaust) Commemoration program will be held on April 15, 2007 at 1:30 p.m. at the Monroe Township High School Auditorium (located on Perrineville Road in Monroe Township). The New Jersey Commission on Holocaust Education in coordination with The Henry Ricklis Holocaust Memorial Committee and The Jewish Federation of Greater Middlesex County have joined together to remember and honor the victims of the Holocaust. The public is invited to share in these observances. Philip Kirschner, Chair of the New Jersey Commission on Holocaust Education will be the Master of Ceremonies.

The Keynote Speaker will be Helen Rosenzweig, a Holocaust survivor and Monroe Township resident. At the age of 14, Helen was forced to serve as a housemaid for the infamous Camp Commandant Amon Goeth. Featured in the film "Schindler's List," Helen will speak about Goeth and relate how she met Oskar Shindler in Goeth's villa and how he eventually saved her life.

Governor Jon Corzine and Mayor Richard Pucci will present proclamations naming April as Holocaust Remembrance Month and the Temple Beth Shalom Choir of Manalapan, under the direction of Cantor Ruth Katz Green, will sing two commemorative pieces. Author and survivor Judith Sherman will read an original poem and Survivor Carl Lustbader will pay tribute to the Six Million by singing "The Partisan Song". Carl has regarded this as his solemn pledge and obligation throughout these many years.

Memorial candles may be kindled from 1:00 p.m. to 1:30 p.m. and will cease when the program starts. Admission is free.



A "Backwards" Day-- Jewish Style

Often our students come to school with mismatched socks and shoes, shirts on backwards or inside out or sport other ridiculous clothing combinations. Why? The answer is always the same, "we had backwards day at public school." With this activity, it is understood, everyone has a chance to break out of the doldrums, to disrupt normal patterns and bring a sense of levity to the school year.

On Sunday, March 4th, the Jewish world has our own "Backwards" Day. For one day, everything is upside down and crazy. Rabbis read mixed-up prayers while dressed in costumes, cantors sing funny songs and biblical stories are told in parody. It may seem irreverent but that is exactly the point and the traditional nature of Purim celebrations.

Purim is the one day on the Jewish calendar that is an occasion to wildly celebrate our people's deliverance from what was certain destruction. We rejoice Esther's courage and Mordechai's wisdom and applaud the fact that Haman's plan was foiled. Each year we celebrate the deliverance of the Jewish people from the hands of all the Hamans and Hitlers who have sought to destroy us. We laugh in the face of anti-Semitism and, at least for one day, blot it out of our lives with noisemakers, laughter and joy of being Jewish. Purim, in fact, is our day to have fun and let go.

This joyous holiday is not celebrated alone; it is meant to be shared with others. When Mordechai established Purim as "a day of feasting and merrymaking," he also made it "an occasion for sending gifts to one another and presents to the poor" (Esther 9:22) This tradition is known as *shalach manot*. As we rejoice in our people's deliverance from the enemy, let us not forget those who depend on us for their deliverance from the enemies of hunger, cold and poverty. Each and every day we have opportunities to blot out the evil in our world through acts of tzedakah, *justice*. On this Purim, may we deepen the true joy of our merrymaking with *shalach manot* and share our bounty with others.

Chag Sameach! May this celebration of Purim be a happy and joyous one for you. So, too, may it bring joy to our world.

Remember to BOO, HISS and SPIN YOUR GROGGER for Haman, HOORAY for Mordechai (our hero) and WHISTLE for the beautiful Esther. Purim is a fun holiday when we read the megillah, eat hamantaschen, dress in colorful costumes and start preparing for Pesach.







Rite and Stop&Shop all of the Passover products will be on display. It seems every year the companies develop and introduce new items that are now Kosher for Passover. I think part of the explanation is this: to induce us to purchase early (and maybe often) these new foods prominently displayed so that we are enticed to buy them before anyone else can grab them. The early bird DOES get the worm, otherwise we snooze, we lose. Now we buy these novelties fast and we decide, while I am here, I might as well get some, if not most, of my Pesach items. Might as well get it out of the way. Ok. You buy them. Next week, you are shopping again and what do you see? Pesach items; maybe some new ones and maybe the same ones are there. You go down the aisles and you begin to think. Did I buy enough matzo meal? Do I need gelfilte fish? What if so and so forgets to bring their promised items? That is when you grab some more Pesach items. When you get home, it seems that your shelves are bulging like the supermarket.
