A New Season

THE RABBI SPEAKS Rabbi Michael Goldstein

“A Visit is Worth a Thousand Words”

In January, I wrote about Tu B'Shevat and the ways that it links us with the Land of Israel at a time of year when we are far more preoccupied with winter. I also discussed the Seven Species of the Land, set out in the Torah as the most representative produce of Biblical Israel and the origin of the famous phrase, “a land flowing with milk and honey.” I was in Israel with my family for ten days in February and as always, we made it a point to see things that we had not previously seen. For example, we went into the desert north of Eilat and learned about the ecology and history of the area. When we recently came to the Torah reading about constructing the Mishkan/Tabernacle, my son remembered that we had seen acacia trees, the wood used to make the altar. He made an instant connection and had a vivid image to use as a reference.

I mention this example since we all have an opportunity to help make it possible for more teens and young people to travel to Israel and see it firsthand. Through participation in an organized program (and there are many worthy ones), they will experience the richness of Israel in all its aspects. They will experience its history and its natural wonders, its blend of cultures and its modern political and economics successes, its rural tranquility and beauty and its pulsing urban rhythms. Any number of studies have shown that even a short time spent in Israel positively influences Jewish identity. The late teens through twenties are the most formative years of a person's Jewish identity and so the most appropriate time for a first visit to Israel.

Unfortunately, one of the main reasons that young people do not visit Israel at this time in their lives is the cost. The reality is that travel to and in Israel, providing the kind of guided, supervised experiences that any parent would want costs money. The Jewish community is aware of this reality and doing something about it. The Jewish Federation of Middlesex participates in the Passport for Israel program. Although a national initiative, here it is a matching program allying the UJA-Federation and individual congregations. Subventions are available to help make an Israel experience affordable. Bnai Tikvah recently agreed

to increase its contribution to match an increase in UJA-Federation's grant. Now, we must raise the increased endowment that will make our contribution possible. When you receive a letter asking for your help, please respond positively. The individuals spearheading this effort feel so strongly about this that they personally covered the cost of the mailing. Let us now do our share.

We speak about Israel in our religious schools, from the bimah and in other forums. Our teens can learn a lot this way. However, as anyone who has visited Israel even once will attest to, a visit is worth a thousand words.

My family joins me in wishing you a very Joyous Pesach!

New Beginnings

In Judaism there is always time to get it right. Ours is a religion of kindness, personal connections and of spiritual fulfillment. One of our favorite activities is making resolutions, new year's resolutions in particular. You are wondering why I'm writing about this now? Well, the Jewish month of Nisan, the month in which we celebrate Passover is the first month of the year "Adonai said to Moses and Aaron in the Land of Egypt, 'This month shall be for you the beginning of the months; it shall be for you the first of the months of the year.' " (Shemot, 12:1-2)

The first commandment given by God to the Jewish People was to establish the beginning of the Month of Nisan (which wasn't yet called "Nisan," but, rather, the First Month). We celebrate Rosh Hashanah in Tishrei (September or October), the Jewish New Year, when we ask to be judged kindly by God. Tu B'Shvat, the agricultural New Year, a great time to give thanks and resolve to take better care of the environment. Even Hanukkah is a sort of "New Year", a time to resolve spiritual rededication.

To me, as we clean and prepare for Pesach, we have a very critical new beginning. We celebrate being a new people. We were slaves, now we are free. Free to do what ever we want, free to make good choices. So many opportunities, but do we take advantage of these many chances? We are free to resolve to be the best people, to do so much to improve our world.

When you clean your home and put away the chametz until after Pesach, why not give an extra large donation to a food bank, or bring some cans to my office, so I can bring them to a food bank for you. You can even give to the food to the needy by designating a portion of your "scrip" purchase for a food bank.

It seems to me that we are blessed in so many ways but that we do not make a large enough contribution of time and energy to needy causes. I really don't know about you, but I know I can do better.

The great Chasidic rabbi, the Baal Shem Tov, stood outside the local one room shul on the eve of Yom Kippor. He saw God's Angels flying above

the little shul, with their hands covering their ears. Suddenly the great rabbi heard what the people inside were saying "Please help me make more money...tell people to like me better...", all their prayers were for their personal glorification. When the people invited him inside the packed shul, he walked away and prayed to God for forgiveness in the nearby forest .

None of us can be arrogant enough to think that we do enough for our fellow man. We can all do better, let's give it a try. Everything is new, its Pesach we are like newly freed slaves in a world with too many opportunities, to do good or not. So, go, start again, begin a new.

My vows to the Lord will I pay in the presence of all His people, in the courts of the House of the Lord, In the midst of Jerusalem. Halleluyah! (Psalm 16:19)

Good Guys, Bad Guys, Saints, and Sinners

A friend of mine, George Risha, a Lebanese Christian, read an article in the Jerusalem Report Magazine, that I had showed him, and he told me that he was amazed that the writers were even more critical of the Israeli leadership than he was, about their conduct of the recent Lebanese war.

My friend has been working for the U.S. government as an Arabic translator in Iraq these past 3 or 4 years with the United States military. He was surprised that the Israelis had not mopped up the Hezbola terrorists in short time. But even more enlightening was his delight in seeing that Israeli journalists could take the government to task, and that reports could severely criticize their conduct of the war with no concern about being arrested or "disappeared" or found in a ditch with a hole in their head.

"That's real democracy" he said with a smile. I reacted to his smile with one of my own. Yes, Israel is a democracy with all of the warts and blemishes and human frailties that contribute to or detract from government of and by the people. Although our form of government in America differs from Israel's in that we have a presidential rather than a parliamentary system, in both cases, the governments are elected by and are accountable to the people.

We have only to read the newspaper and other media to find that no form of government is proof against infiltration of frauds, biases, thieves, exploiters and sex abusers. Our own beloved country has had (and continues to have) its share of political scandals during our entire history of two hundred plus years. Some have gone to jail, and some have been sued, but no one gets kidnapped or "disappeared" for political opinions in America, except by individual extremists.

And so it is in Israel. As we have all heard it said, for every million Jewish citizens, you have a million presidents. And so, with G-ds' help and our prayers, may it long continue.

"Program Note" (for those of you who haven't heard and as a reminder to those that have) - A&P has recently announced intentions to acquire Pathmark. The specifics of this deal have not been announced. When they are the supermarket scrip committee will be able to implement any changes that result in this new blending of two major supermarket chains. We will also be able to tell you if the scrip from these two stores will be interchangeable, whether Pathmark's name and brands will be absorbed by A&P, any local store closings, etc. Until such time the scrip from these two chains remain separate as well as available.

from this world, but by how much he gives back.”

Q. How do you “chill out”?

Q. Who was/is the greatest influence on your life?

A. My father, Frank Katz. “He grew up during the Depression, and was a veteran of WWII, Korea, Vietnam, and the 1973 Yom Kippur War.” The “toughest” man, physically, I ever knew, but one of the nicest. He always instilled in my brothers and sisters and me how important it is for family to stick together. “Righteous” was the most-used description at his funeral (August, 2003). “If I can be, at least, half the man my father was, I would consider my spiritual life a success”

Q. When you’re together with your family, what do you do?

A. We enjoy many things as a family, “but one of the simplest and, I feel, the most important is having dinner together to share our respective day with each other.”

Q. If you were to be elected President of the United States in 2008, what issues would you focus on and how would you try to achieve your aims?

A. “Being an employee of a company that was located at the World Trade Center, I think it important to continue to be pro-active in the fight against terrorism. I believe that additional investment

must be made to wean the U.S. off its dependency of fossil fuels. Re-establish the GOP in the grandeur of Ronald Reagan.”

Q. Which personal imperfection do you plan to correct...someday?

A. “I grew up in a family where my Bubbe always said, “eat up tantala.” She was “a great cook”, I was her best customer. Now that I’m married to a great cook and not as active as I used to be, you do the math.”

Q. If your values and actions can help to change a person, what do you want him or her to emulate?

A. “There are three types of people in this world; those who make it happen, those who watch it happen, and those who ask, what happened? My advice would be: don’t let life pass you by; make it happen.
