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B'NAI TIKVAH FAMILIES "ADOPT" ISRAELI TEENS FOR PASSOVER & BEYOND

If you have never been involved in the B'nai Tikvah Israel Youth Exchange Program, you are missing out on an experience that is culturally and socially enriching, providing a special, unforgettable connection to the State of Israel and to the kids who are part of the program.

The Youth Exchange Program started seven years ago when B'nai Tikvah member Arie Behar, a native of Ramla in Israel, coordinated a visit of Israeli teenagers from Ramla to stay with host families from B'nai Tikvah. Each year that we have hosted the Ramla students has brought improvements to the program, and an unforgettable experience for the visiting teenagers and the host families. The program was started at the time of the second Intifada as a way of giving Israeli teenagers a glimpse of American Jewish life and to bolster relations between Israeli community and ours. It has proved to be fabulous for the guests and host families alike.

WORDS OF THE RABBI Rabbi Robert Wolkoff

Freedom. What is it all about?

On the holiday of Shavuot we read the remarkable Book of Ruth. A mere four chapters long, it is a masterpiece of unparalleled literary economy. In one of the most dramatic passages in the book, Naomi tells her widowed daughter-in-law Ruth to approach the noble Boaz—a good match for her in the middle of the night, "uncover his feet," and "do as he instructs." Ruth does as she is bidden by Naomi. When Boaz awakes, he reminds Ruth that there is another potential suitor who according to halachah must be given the first opportunity to "redeem" Ruth. Boaz will confront him in the morning, he explains; in the meantime he advises Ruth to sleep soundly, confident that it will all work out. Which it does.

What an odd episode! Naomi's advice to Ruth is hardly a lesson in modesty (tzniut)! We would not expect to hear such brazenness suggested in any Jewish context, much less in the Bible itself. And how are we to understand Boaz? A powerful man, no longer young, has a beautiful woman literally throwing herself at his feet—and he tells her to get a good night's sleep?

Something truly extraordinary is going on here. And what is that? It is an dramatic commentary on, and elaboration of, those words by which Ruth converted to Judaism: "Your people will be my people, your G-d will be my G-d." She did not fully understand her own words. Neither, as it turns out, did we.

Ruth was a Moabite—biblically speaking, the lowest of the low. She was, in addition, the impoverished widow of an impoverished expatriate Jew. In other words, she was from so far out on the other side of the tracks, she couldn't see the tracks from there. Boaz, on the other hand, is just the opposite. He is from the mightiest of the mighty, a wealthy and respected landowner from the tribe of Judah. His very name, in Hebrew, means "He has power"!

It doesn't take a rocket engineer to guess what would normally happen when a man this powerful meets a woman this vulnerable.

But, wonder of wonders, look at what Boaz does instead: He provides for Ruth economically, protects her from sexual molestation, respects her dignity, arranges for her long-term welfare (even if it meant losing her to another), and, finally, becomes her husband.

A beautiful romance, to be sure, but more: a testimony to the noble ideals of the Jewish people. And this is what Naomi understood. She can send Ruth on a, shall we say, indelicate errand because she trusts in the strength of Jewish values. These teach us to respect other human beings, no matter how widely separated they are in power and status.

Because of Judaism, Boaz is not an exploitative pig. Because of Judaism, Ruth is not "trailer-park trash". They are human beings created in G-d's image. When Ruth and Boaz see the dignity with which they treat one another—and when we, the readers, see it—the true and extraordinary character of the Jewish people is revealed. In her (and our) identification with our people and its ideals, we are led to consider that higher force that has helped us to transcend our baser nature and aspire to moral excellence.

And thus we come to understand, much more profoundly than before, the prophetic power in Ruth's words : "Your people will be my people, your G-d will be my G-d."

One final note: Ruth and Boaz become the grandparents of King David, and thus the greatgrandparents of the Messiah. We learn from this that the key to redemption lies, on the one hand, in transcending the temptations of power, and, on the one hand, in overcoming the thrall of despair. Indeed, this is what Judaism has always called upon us to do. Surely a fine object for our consideration during the summer months ahead.

After Considerable Thought the Answer is...

If I asked you what the purpose of the synagogue is, you would likely think that I was asking you a loaded question. What does he want me to say? Or, you may think that my question if overly broad. I asked one person and she replied, what do you mean...it's different for everyone. That is a fair response, because it is basically true. Each of us looks to our Jewish institutions to fulfill different needs.

I started asking this question before I had formulated my conclusion or had a concrete vision of an answer. One thing I am sure of is that people are unclear about their opinion and are uncomfortable articulating their position.

The word "synagogue" is Greek and means "assembly", a place to gather, where the various religious and social needs of the Jewish community are met.

The web site, Jewishvirtuallibrary.org describes, our movement, Conservative Judaism as such "The name derives from the idea that the movement would be necessary to conserve Jewish traditions in the U.S., a culture in which Reform and Orthodoxy were not believed to be viable. Conservative Judaism attempts to combine a positive attitude toward modern culture, acceptance of critical secular scholarship regarding Judaism's sacred texts and commitment to Jewish observance. Conservative Judaism believes that scholarly study of Jewish texts indicates that Judaism has constantly been evolving to meet the needs of the Jewish people in varying circumstances, and that a central halachic authority can continue the halachic evolution today."

So, after considerable thought and unsatisfied with compromising and carefully worded responses, I realized that the answer to my question is obvious and complicated. The answerer to my question is clear to me. The central purpose of the synagogue is for it to be a place where the presence of God is embodied, and where that Presence is a meaningful guide for our lives. The synagogue is a place where people should be mindful of and are guided by the high spiritual principles that God and Judaism embody. Whatever your reason for attending a synagogue, for services, musical programs, social affairs or sports activities; every conversation can be inspired, by God.

We are stimulated by our synagogue in so many ways, the work we do here is because of the

gratitude we have, for God's presence. Though we may have different approaches, we welcome different points of view and respect the varied paths taken to reach and determine our personal spiritual destination.

It's all about God, take it to heart.

Worship the Lord in gladness; come before God with joyous song.

A Mother's Day Gift

Mother's Day is not a joyous day for me. My mother died 49 years ago, and Mili, the mother of my children died almost three years ago. Yet, it's not all pain.

My mother, Fanny, was my father's best friend and confidante, and Mili was mine. In every strong marriage there are times when the wife must be a mother to her husband, and the husband must also be at least at certain times, the father to his wife. I don't want to go into all of the things that Mili did for others at this time, other than to say that a good sense of humor is a good lubricant to keep a marriage running smoothly.

Alzheimer's, Dementia and Parkinson's are not diseases that come on strongly like the flu with a high fever. Slowly, insidiously, little things occur, that only in retrospect begin to fall into place. Eventually, enough changes in personality occur to create suspicion that something is amiss. Then the trips to the doctor and specialists and denials that this can't be happening to us. How could Mili, with the highest IQ of anyone I ever knew forget how to balance her check book? This careful and conservative driver knocks down a street sign pole. Eventually, you have to accept the reality.

The mood swings begin, and the cheerful upbeat demeanor changes to periods of anger at imaginary slights. When the wandering events began I could no longer leave her alone. When I had to go grocery shopping we went together. Mili would wheel the cart while I took things off the shelves and I would ask for her approval before I dropped them into the cart. While I tried to keep our lifestyle as near normal as possible and tried to keep up her morale by joking (she could still laugh when she knew I was being silly) but things were


As summer approaches, we are starting to gear up for the new year - new events, new programs and, of course, new members.

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





good grades, be proficient in English, have received recommendations from their teachers and/or school principal and have satisfied a community service requirement. Finally, the students chosen are those considered to be the best student "ambassadors" to represent their city and the State of Israel.

This year, the host families were provided with their guests' names and e-mail addresses in advance of their arrival. Many of us got to "know" each other through e-mail and sent each other pictures. This made the transition easier when the kids arrived.

The group of eleven Israeli teenagers arrived with their adult chaperone, Igal Cohen, at B'nai Tikvah on Sunday morning, April 13th. Igal has been involved in the B'nai Tikvah Youth Exchange Program for a number of years and is now well known to members of the community. Igal is a manager of Matnas, a community based social program in Ramla, where he oversees community centers and is involved with social programming for all age groups, including sports, cultural events, holiday programs and community related activities.

The kids arrived with great excitement, for most of them this was their first trip outside of Israel, and their first trip to the United States. The group consisted of seven girls and four boys between the ages of 15 and 17. On the day of their arrival, the host families met their guests at B'nai Tikvah and took them home for a hearty breakfast and a get-to-know-you session. Most of the B'nai Tikvah host families have teenagers themselves, whose excitement matched that of the newly arrived Israeli guests. After settling in, the guests and their hosts organized various activities spenting Sunday afternoon walking around Princeton or Rutgers, going shopping, or attending host children's sporting events and even sitting in on Hebrew school classes at B'nai Tikvah. It was great fun watching the Israeli teens getting excited about the simplest things that we all take for granted.

After the first day hanging out with their hosts, the Israelis' schedule rapidly became hectic and jampacked. On Monday, they traveled to Canada where they toured Niagara Falls and Toronto, and stayed three nights with Israeli families living in Vaughan, a suburb of Toronto. Vaughan is a sister city of Ramla, with an established community of Israeli families. This arrangement allowed the teens to feel at home, while getting their first exposure to North America. They had great weather, loved the sights and were overwhelmed with Niagara Falls. They returned to B'nai Tikvah on Thursday night, the host families picked them up and went home for dinner and lots of conversation about their trip and upcoming activities. On Friday morning, the Israelis went to school for the day – either to South Brunswick High School, or to Rutgers Preparatory School, where they shadowed the host teenagers in classes and activities. The Israelis all had lots to say about their school visits. Those who went to South Brunswick High School could not believe the size of the school and the vast number of students. Those who went to Rutgers Prep were welcomed by the faculty and administration, and got to know other students in what is a smaller and very diverse school community. On Friday night, the guests and host families had Shabbat dinner at B'nai Tikvah (kosher Chinese food!) and attended services.

During that first weekend, the guests, now very much a part of their hosts' families', spent time together and attended the first and second Passover Seders with their host families. Our guests told us all about the Seders at home in Israel, the different foods eaten at their homes and the different traditions celebrated as part of their Passover observance.

After the Seders were over, the Israelis took trips to Washington, D.C. and New York City, seeing the sights, going to museums and getting the flavor of those fabulous cities. A high point of the week was the day spent at Great Adventure and shopping at the nearby outlets. Some of the host family kids accompanied the Israelis to New York and Great Adventure, which cemented the connections and made for an even better time.

We all learned from our guests how different life is in Israel, but teenagers are teenagers, and the guests and our own kids discovered they have many things in common. At the end of the two week trip, it was hard for all of us to say goodbye. The Israelis really touched our lives and showed us that we are connected in many ways even though we are a world apart. Those in our B'nai Tikvah community who are traveling to Israel this summer plan to visit Ramla and reconnect with their Israeli "sons" or "daughters."

Those of us who have been involved in the Youth Exchange Program in the past, as well as the new host families, under the able leadership of Alan Kane along with the Youth Exchange committee members, are looking forward to continuing the program, and to welcoming the involvement of new B'nai Tikvah families. It is an especially great experience for families with teens who are in the same age group as the guests. beginning to get out of control.

On one occasion when I took her to the supermarket she begged to stay in the car and promised to wait there for me. I quickly grabbed a few things and got back to the car as soon as possible only to find her gone. Panic!

Where to start looking? The highway was nearby, the parking lot full, the store bigger than a city block. I pulled out my cell phone and dialed 911. A policeman showed up a few minutes later and signaled to follow him. My heart beat like a hammer as I followed the police car back to my home. There sat Mili in a chair in front of my door.

As I got out of my car with relief pouring off me, I tried to find out what had happened, but she refused to look at me or speak. I took her into the house, made dinner, changed her and put her to bed. I would have to wait until morning to find out what happened.

In the morning, after she was bathed and dressed, her mood changed and she was more her old self. She knew that she had behaved badly. When I asked her why she had been angry with me, she shrugged and said she didn't know. I asked her how she had gotten home, she dropped her eyes and said "I hitchhiked." I turned cold when I heard that. She said that she went to the exit and stopped a woman driver and asked for a ride home. "Didn't she want to know why you needed a ride?" I asked. Mili looked up with that mischievous smile that she saved for special occasions and said "I told her my boyfriend didn't show up."

I couldn't help myself, I cracked up. It was the best laugh that I had had in months, and she joined in. She had been confused, but she was never stupid. Mili knew that I had been hurting and her old self came through as she tried to comfort me.

These memories continue to be my Mother's Day gift to myself.


