WORDS OF THE RABBI Rabbi Robert Wolkoff

Miracles!

That's what our Chanukah celebration is all about. When we play with our dreidels, the letters inscribed on the sides are an abbreviation for the phrase "A great miracle happened there." When we light our candles, we bless G-d "who performed miracles for our ancestors, in these days, at that time." When we eat our latkes, or our jelly doughnuts, we are eating foods filled with oil—consuming, so to speak, the very substance of the Chanukah miracles.

The greatest miracle of Chanukah, however, is not the burning of the oil in the Temple, or even the victory of our outnumbered and outgunned ancestors over a powerful enemy. The greatest miracle of Chanukah was the choice by G-d to intervene in human affairs and come to the aid of our people at a desperate time.

As we all know, there are skeptics who will ask, "If there is a G-d who gives a hoot about human beings, why does He intervene so rarely? There's a lot of suffering in the world. Why does G-d show up only now and then, letting most of the evil take its course? Is G-d uncaring? Or too weak to do anything about the situation? Or perhaps the whole idea of G-d is just a childish delusion?

Important questions, to be sure, but not thereby unanswerable. I believe that the reason we celebrate the miracles of divine intervention in our past is in order to instill in us a sense of responsibility to take charge of the world and shape it as G-d would have it. In other words, the correct response to one miracle is not to sit passively and wait for another one. It is, instead, to see what the miracle accomplishes, and then, on our own, to "make miracles happen" by following the path that G-d, through His miracles, blazes for us.

The miracle of Chanukah teaches us with unmistakable clarity that G-d does not abide the suffering of the innocent, the trampling of the poor, and the degradation of the powerless. That G-d is a G-d of compassion, of love, and of joy. We don't need another miracle from G-d to remind us. The light of the menorah should be enough. The burning candles are a reflection of the light of moral and spiritual consciousness, and of intellectual and artistic creativity, within us. We just need to be aware, and to act in accordance with our awareness. Put another way, we don't need the hand of G-d to come down from heaven, whether to free the enslaved or to liberate the mind. We need instead to put our own hands to the task.

And then a real miracle happens. /Our/ hands become the hands of G-d!

Just consider what our hands have been doing here at Bnai Tikvah! The Rejoice Festival. The Answer Cancer service. And most recently, the truly unbelievable L'Dor VaDor concert. When Jews work together, we truly can make miracles happen.

Get used to it! And make yourselves a part of it here at Bnai Tikvah!

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE Ruth Anne Koenick

I am sitting in my hotel in Jerusalem after some post Shabbat shopping and for the first time during my trip, I've had a chance to reflect on something other than work. I had the "gift' of traveling to Israel with two faculty from Rutgers School of Social Work (SSW). I work very closely with the school and in particular with their Center on Violence Against Women and Children. I am fortunate to teach in their continuing education program and work on joint research projects. Rutgers University SSW has a strong collaborative relationship with Ben Gurion University SSW and the trip I am on is just one of the faculty and student exchange programs. I had the opportunity to meet with many faculty at BGU and visit with some of the communities they are working with, in particular those faculty who are involved with research and direct service. For example, one BGU Ph.D. student is doing some qualitative research interviewing families that have immigrated from Russia. They are doing a longitudinal study over 7 years to look at immigrant adjustment and the change in family processes and relationships. Yet another is looking at the increase in blogging by victims of sexual violence and trying to determine if the local Rape Crisis Center, Maslan, should start a blog.

What has been so interesting for me is that no matter what country. what culture, what university, so many of the problems, behaviors and issues are the same. The sameness struck me again this morning when I went to the Great Synagogue of Jerusalem for Shabbat morning services. At Allison's Nagelberg's suggestion, I decided to experience something very different from my B'nai Tikvah Shabbat. I sat in the woman's section in the balcony and met two women who were visiting from the states (one of the women was originally from East Brunswick and her grandparents live in Monroe). The balcony was far away from the bima and I could be very anonymous! No pages were called, everyone knew what to do, and the men's choir was quite phenomenal. At the end of services as I was leaving, a man was ushering everyone downstairs for Kiddush and when I got into what looked like a social hall, the person making the blessings was asking everyone to be quiet and not eat until the blessings were said and most people just ignored him. I certainly felt at home. But mostly I was reminded of my parent's teaching that when you are a stranger in town, go to the closest shull and you will no longer be a stranger.

So far, I've been to the Kotel twice, once before Shabbat, standing there in the rain for an hour and then back earlier today until sundown. While sitting on one of the stone benches in the women's section, I spoke with a young woman who was spending a year in Israel. On my other side was a woman feeding her children who told me that I should go to the table and eat. Her Hebrew and my English came together over food and her kindness. I thanked her and walked over to the table area for women and was handed a plate of food. Food is such a connector between people that it immediately made me feel part of the community.

Rabbi Wolkoff has asked me to share some of my experiences at a Friday night service and I hope to do that in the coming months. Clearly what I got to do was far from the regular tour itinerary and gave me a rare opportunity to get a better understanding of issues impacting victims of violence and the cultural issues that can at times support and also place barriers in front of those who need services.

Although it is good to be home, I count the days until I can return.

ANOTHER VIEWPOINT

Sometime Justice

As a boy growing up in the Bronx, New York, I was so used to the background sounds of anti-Semitism that I seldom paid attention to it. It was just something that you get so used to that you don't expend much time worrying about it. That is, until the stories and photos of Nazi atrocities began to appear in the daily newspapers. Not until I was mistaken for a Mexican in Texas did I really feel the whip of discrimination.

Mili and I were married in April of 1943, when I got my first furlough with permission to leave Victoria, Texas, where I was stationed. I returned to my post after a short honeymoon, and Mili followed me to Texas two months later, in June. While Mili was on the train going south, I went looking for a room for her to live in. To my dismay, I found the town overcrowded with G.I. wives and children, and a severe shortage of living spaces for them.

Desperate to find a place for her I tried knocking on doors with no success until I came to a large old colonial house, where the housewife said she had no rooms but that I might try continuing down the street. I followed her directions and soon found myself out of town with only a few small Mexican houses in sight. I felt kind of stupid because I must have misunderstood her instructions, and turned around, walked back into town, passing her house on the way. I was tempted to knock on her door again, but was too embarrassed to do so.

Feeling down and desperate, I returned to the local housing office in hope that something would have come in while I was out. A few minutes later, an elderly gent entered the office. He had apparently made a few stops at the local bars, as he was in a high mood and asked if I was looking for a room. In response to my enthusiastic yes, he put his arm around my shoulder and took me to his home. The very house where the woman had directed me toward the Mexican section of town.







CHANUKAH

When I was growing up, Chanukah was a minor, happy holiday. It was simply a time for candle lighting, dreidel games and Chanukah gelt. It was never a gift-giving holiday. In our attempt to counteract the lure of Christmas, we have, over the years, added extensive gift-giving and the sense of this being an important holiday, rivaling the High Holy days and the festivals.

Chanukah is many things but it isn't a holiday where we take off from work or school. Only during the candle lighting do we not work. Chanukah is not generally celebrated in the synagogue. The holiday, however, is historical and commemorates the victory of the Maccabees and Jewish survival. We celebrate the victory of the Hasmoneans to remind us of the achievement of religious liberty and the rededication of the ancient temple in Jerusalem.

Chanukah has no biblical origins and the story of the oil that burned for eight days is not found in the books of the Maccabees. It is written, however, in the Talmud many years later.

Many of the ways in which we observe Chanukah was written in the Shulchan Aruch which is a written manual of halacha (Jewish law), composed by Rabbi Yosef Karo in the 16th century.

This is what is written:

- Eat and be merry. Linger over your meal and join in songs and tales of the miracle.
- Buy a menorah of silver to reflect the shining light.
 Each light should burn at least half an hour.
 Set the menorah where all can see it.
- Place the eight candles in a straight row, since no day of Chanukah is superior to another. Only the shamash, the guardian and the kindler of the lights, stands above the others.
- Kindle the lights before any member of the household goes to sleep.
- Light the shamash and recite the blessings. Kindle the first light on the left and move to the right.
- Men, women and children may kindle the menorah.
 In some households, each person has their own menorah to kindle.
- Add to your usual contributions of tzedakah at Chanukah time, so that all may share in the happiness.

The link between Chanukah and Christmas represents an on-going challenge for North American Jews. Aside from the two holidays occurring at

approximately the same time, they have virtually nothing else in common. If, indeed, the Maccabees had not been able to sustain their commitment to Judaism, the history of our people would have ended then and Christianity would not have emerged as it did.

From my family to all of you, I wish you a Chag Sameach!! Enjoy lighting your menorah and eating latkes!!



She stood in the vestibule staring at me, as her husband led me upstairs and gave me my choice of two furnished rooms. I paid him the first week's rent, made a few minor changes and left. As I reached the stairwell, the woman stood at the bottom and waited for me to descend. When I got to the bottom, she said "I want to apologize; I thought you were a Mexican". I was flummoxed.

For the first time in my life, I really felt the full force of what discrimination was about. There I was, in the uniform of an American soldier, and she felt that she had the right to treat me as a lesser person because my complexion had been darkened by the strong Texas sun. There was nothing I could do. If I said what I had in mind, Mili would arrive with no place to stay. I was stuck, but that moment has been burned into my consciousness and returns to visit me when the question of race or ethnicity is mentioned.

Mili arrived by train on the following day and quickly got a job as a secretary on the post. There she met and became friends with a young Mexican woman who worked as a tailor at the post PX, customizing uniforms. In time, Mary, whose last name I no longer recall invited us to visit at her parents' home at the edge of town. The house was small and neat, surrounded by a half acre of land on which they grew much of their food.

Mary's parents were poor, but not poverty stricken. We were met with grace and warmth and quickly felt at home with them. Yes, they were poor, but they were people with class and elegance and it angered me that they were not treated as being as worthy as anyone.

That was over sixty years ago and most of these people have gone on to their rewards, but when I read and hear about what is being said about Mexicans today, how they are referred to as though they are a plague or vermin instead of struggling people, human beings, who are just trying to find work to feed their families, and find a better life, I feel that we are also diminished.

Are they here illegally? Yes, many of them are, but only because they are employed illegally and knowingly by Americans. Where is the justice in only punishing the poor?

My conservative friends will chide me for being too liberal. I say not so. Our constitution does not discriminate. Everyone has the same rights under the law. Unfortunately, the law is not being applied evenly. Our Pledge of Allegiance says "with liberty and justice for all". Well, not always, it seems.

- the sharp turn to the right in the Orthodox community; while 78 percent of Jews supported Obama, about three quarters of Orthodox Jews supported McCain.
- the fact that supporters of Obama were harassed at some yeshivas and some synagogues
- the fact that graduates of Jewish day schools and yeshivas are increasingly not interested in applying Jewish values toward creating more just, peaceful, environmentally sustainable societies.
- the emphasis on ritual matters, and downplaying among many Jews of Jewish teachings on preserving the environment, conserving resources, pursuing peace and justice.
- the fact that it is easier for a bigot or reactionary person to be accepted in some synagogues than someone who wants to apply Jewish values toward the creation of a better world;
- the general failure of the Jewish community to act as a "light onto the nations," as Hashem's witnesses, as pursuers of peace and justice.
- the failure of many religious Jewish groups and individuals to adequately respond to the many horrors at the Postville, Iowa glatt kosher slaughterhouse.
- the failure of Jewish leaders to consider our arguments for vegetarianism and the many moral issues related to our diets.

Richard Schwartz:

I discovered the writings of Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, and relished his radical analysis of Judaism and his criticism of 'religious behaviorism". Reading a book about the writings of Martin Buber reinforced my emerging belief that it was really the distortion of religion that I was so much against. I concluded that, to some extent, my religion had been "stolen", since so many observant Jews seemed to be locked into ritual, without seeing or applying the deeper values that could be related to challenging the status quo. I found that all my social ideals were included within Judaism, and that Judaism provides a structure for leading a meaningful and involved spiritual life. I also read Jewish history and was amazed to learn how the Jewish people maintained their beliefs and practices in spite of severe persecutions in many lands and times. I became convinced that Jews had a mission to work for tikkun olam, a healed and improved world...

The book will be VERY positive re Judaism but also

respectfully very critical of those who are failing to apply Jewish values to societal problems at a time when they are needed more than ever.

It will point out the positive things that some Jewish groups are doing and positive charitable efforts on the part of many Jews. A main theme will be:

look at how beautiful Judaism is, how powerful and relevant its teachings are and why it is essential that there be a reevaluation and a shifting of priorities in the Jewish community.

Do you share these concerns? Are our values and priorities in need of a shake up? Is the application of Judaism in our lifes relevant to the expectations of true Jewish teaching and values?


