New Habits For New Purposes

(Please enjoy some music while you read this article. Relax and let your mind wander between the music and these words. Thank you for your kind indulgence.

New habits are difficult to create; they are probably just as hard to create as breaking old ones. The key to making a change in our lives is motivation. Someone cannot just tell you to BECOME motivated. Our personal motivation comes from many places, including prayer. What do you do, to connect with Adonai, the God of Israel, our Rock and Redeemer, the Host of Hosts, our Protector, the One?

I know how difficult it is to stay focused and I am grateful that my schedule helps me listen. I'm grateful that I am obligated to write an article each month for you to read in Hakol. I enjoy writing articles about upcoming events, as I try to express my passion through these important and hopefully exciting happenings. Still I know that a few time each year that I must express my yearnings to you. I must appeal to you for your hearts.

Singing brings me great joy. Singing prayers with you is even better. It seems to me that praying is a difficult routine to create. I'd love to sing prayers with you three times a day if that would make it easier. I'd love to sit with you and study our prayers, if you think that would be helpful. What do you think I could do that would help you?

You may expect that my ultimate appeal is to ask you to give minyan another try, but this is not what I'm attempting to sell today. Our prayers express and describe our aspirations as Jewish People. We praise God, we look for guidance, ask for protection and healing. We ask God to "hear our prayers".

Debbie Friedman recently wrote about her recent collection of songs from our morning service. "I have always imagined people on the subway or in their cars riding to work, I have imagined people on the Freeways of California sitting in traffic at a stand-still on a long commute or on the trains from the suburbs to the city, people exercising, or maybe just having those few minutes alone in the morning when they can finally gather themselves and acknowledge the moments of quiet, the moments when they can have a sense of the divine. To be able to transcend the traffic and the hustle of the daily routine and begin the day by immersing oneself into consciousness this, I believe to be the purpose of these prayers. Begin the day by acknowledging the

magic of each day, the miracle of our lives, our bodies, our breath and our minds. Once we can begin to appreciate ourselves as living, breathing miracles we can celebrate and give thanks to The Creator of All That Is, That Was and Will Be.

It is a challenge to immerse oneself in the "magic" of the day and to appreciate ourselves as miracles and to live that consciousness ... to reshape the vision of seeking the divine presence"

Can you imagine yourself doing this? Time is precious, with so much to accomplish, we must make time, find a space in our lives to enrich our souls. Our tradition offers a righteous path. We all know that taking the first step can be the most difficult. So today I'm suggesting that you listen to music. Debbie Friedman's, "As You Go On Your Way, Shacharit-The Morning Prayers" may be a good place to start and a method to pick up a new habit.

A Little Friendly Conversation

I sat at the table with a few friends from our CBT family. The conversation, as it often does, turned to Israel. "Isn't the situation terrible", "Can you believe the way the media has been treating Israel over their actions in Gaza", "What happened to unbiased reporting?", "How can Hamas get away with their behavior and not be the villain?"

The conversation drifts to the growth of anti-semitism in Europe, the obvious, and often openly hostile, slant in news reporting by the BBC, by the AP. The U.S. press picks up the stories and follows quietly along without concern over responsible "balanced" journalism or fact checking. Anti-semitism is growing in the United States too and our vaunted 4th estate, our free press, has become a collection of money focused, big business conglomerates and does nothing but fan the flames more concerned about ratings and ad revenues than true and honesty.

So the conversation goes on . . .

My mind wandered to thoughts of a not really so long past time; Days spent holding minyan in front of the Russian embassy to protest the treatment of Soviet Jews. Solidarity marches in communities across the country against anti-semitism, in favor of peace treaties between Jordan and Israel, Egypt and Israel. A march that ended in a rally in a park and Pete Seeger was there, my G-d Pete Seeger was right there our own flesh and blood Tom Joad, singing "We Shall Overcome" and we believed we would.

Anti-semitism and anit-Israel sentiment is on the rise right here and we talk in the sanctuary, in the social hall, at family gatherings, at tables with friends. We shake our heads and cluck our tongues against our teeth describing and defining the problem. We are appalled, dismayed and disturbed yet the streets remain quiet.

We raised our voices and ourselves, stood up and

walked to bring notice to issues, to influence public opinion, to shine a light into the dark corners, back in the day, back in the day...

Where has our righteous indignation gone? Where is the hew and cry, the voices in the street, needing to be heard. Who is to pull back the curtains and expose the hidden reality?

Have we ceded the responsibility to the Anti-Defamation League, Federation, the AJC? Here's \$36, you complain for me, I'm too busy. Are we truly so caught up in our Thoreau-ian "lives of quiet desperation" that we can no longer get angry enough to cry out? The streets are so quiet.

ANOTHER VIEWPOINT *Aaron Rosloff*

Hearts of Love

How many times have you called for some kind of service only to hear a recording say "Due to an unusual volume of calls we are unable to take your call, please call back later." Whether you call at 10AM or 10PM it's always the same excuse. The following story tells how things have changed.

When I joined the Army Air Corp in June of 1942 they sent me to a post outside of a small town in South Texas called Victoria. The air base was called Foster Field, where we trained fighter pilots.

Mili and I became engaged shortly before I joined the Army and we wrote almost every day. A few months into my stay at Foster Field I tried to make a long distance call to Mili. I gave the operator Mili's number and explained that she was my fiancée. The operator gave me a choice. I could wait outside the phone booth for her to call me back, or I could hang on while she tried to patch through the call. Dial phones were still new in 1942 and could only be used for local calls. Any calls outside of the immediate area had to be handled by the local operator.

I decided to listen in while she worked on the call and was introduced to one of the most poignant times of my life. Forgive me if I don't recall the exact words of the operator, but the following is close. "Hello Houston, I have a soldier boy here who would like to talk to his girl in New York. Do you have any open lines for me?" "Well let me see what I can do. I think I'll try Texarkana." When Houston reached Texarkana she repeated the same story that the first operator had told her with as much urgency as she could. And so it went hop scotching across the country for twenty minutes. I felt as though the whole telephone company was working for me. By the time that Mili's phone rang I was so filled with wonder that I could hardly speak. The love that I could hear in those voices, the desire to help a lonely soldier boy, could not have been more real than if those women were my sisters. Fortunately, when Mili heard my voice, I didn't have to talk. Mili did fine for both of us.

That was the time that Mili suggested that we get married whenever I could get a pass. It really took some doing. We were chronically short handed at the field. But I was finally able to generate enough sympathy from my superior's to get a five day furlough.

Our families got together and planned a very nice wedding, but time was tight. One day for travel north, three days for the wedding and honeymoon. (It was Passover so it included a Seder also) and one day for the trip back to South Texas.

Whenever I think of the wedding, I think of those wonderful, caring women who worked so hard to patch together a line to my love. Can you imagine today, some operator in Tennessee or Ohio pushing so hard to patch together a line to your love?

Yeah, right!

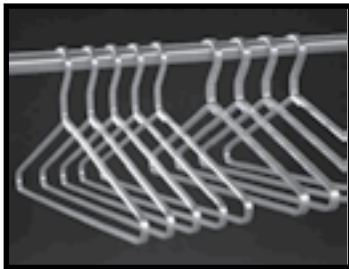

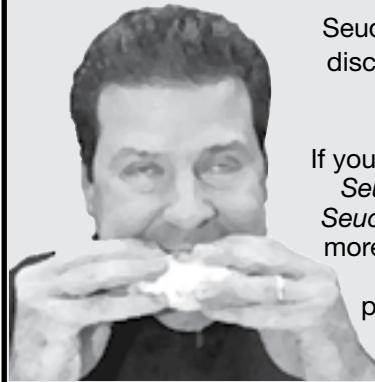

Mrs. Najjat Al-Hajjaji, of Libya representing the host Muammar al-Gaddafi.

Statement to the conference chair delivered by Ashraf Ahmed El-Hojouj;

Thank you, Madame Chair.

I don't know if you recognize me. I am the Palestinian medical intern who was scapegoated by your country, Libya, in the HIV case in the Benghazi hospital, together with five Bulgarian nurses.

Section 1 of the draft declaration for this conference speaks about victims of racism, discrimination, xenophobia and intolerance. Based on my own suffering, I wish to offer some proposals.

Starting in 1999, as you know, the five nurses and I were falsely arrested, prosecuted, imprisoned, brutally tortured, convicted, and sentenced to death. All of this, which lasted for nearly a decade, was for only one reason: because the Libyan government was looking to scapegoat foreigners.

Madame Chair, if that is not discrimination, what is?

On the basis of my personal experience, I would like to propose the following amendments regarding remedies, redress and compensatory measures:

One: The United Nations should condemn countries that scapegoat, falsely arrest, and torture vulnerable minorities.

Two: Countries that have committed such crimes must recognize their past, and issue an official, public, and unequivocal apology to the victims.

Three: In accordance with Article 2, paragraph 3 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, such countries must provide victims of discrimination with an appropriate remedy, including adequate compensation for material and immaterial damage.

Madame Chair, Libya told this conference that it practices no inequality or discrimination.

But then how do you account for what was done to me, to my colleagues, and to my family, who gave over thirty years serving your country, only to be kicked out from their home, threatened with death, and subjected to state terrorism?

How can your government chair the planning committee for a world conference on discrimination, when it is on the list of the world's worst of the worst, when it comes to discrimination and human rights violations?

When will your government recognize their crimes, apologize to me, to my colleagues, and to our families?

This week, at the Geneva Summit for Human Rights, Tolerance and Democracy, the five nurses and I will present our complaint and compensation claim against Libya, filed with the UN Human Rights Committee, the highest international tribunal for individual petitions.

The slogan for this Conference is "Dignity and justice for all." Does this include your own country's victims of discrimination?

Thank you, Madame Chair.

On Monday April 20th, as Jews began their observance of Yom HaShoah, Mahmuod Ahmadinejad addressed the UN conference on racism by delivering an invective filled diatribe condemning Israel, the Jewish people, the United States and any and all who might support them. Fortunately many of the most important, influential nations walked out and left the conference, intent on making a statement. Unfortunately in the absence of the most important, influential nations the conference, left in shambles, truly accomplished nothing.

Oliver Worth a student at the University of Manchester in the United Kingdom, published in the Jerusalem Post;

Sometimes it's easy to forget that behind the games and rhetoric of politics lie real lives. Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad will go back to Iran and continue calling for Israel to be pushed into the sea, the boycotting delegations will return to the real world, and our Jewish organizations will return from their mission.

However, the homosexuals being persecuted in Iran, the oppressed people of Tibet, and those being brutally murdered in Darfur will be left once more without a mandate for their protection. The very people for whom this conference was supposed to exist will neither recoil at the tirade of Ahmadinejad, nor rejoice at the ensuing boycott; rather, they will be left once again to continue their struggle unaided.

There is only one thing worse than a conference aiming to end discrimination failing, and that's the pathetic pretense that something was achieved when it wasn't. Before any similar conference occurs again, real thought must go into how the world's most barbaric leaders can be marginalized and prevented from hijacking our human rights agenda. If we are to be the proverbial "bigger man," we must drive forward our ambition to end human suffering. Our desire to cease pain must be greater than theirs to cause suffering.

Stopping the damage this conference could have done is not nearly enough. It is imperative we now go out and achieve what was supposed to be done at the conference. Right now, this is a stalemate, and the people of Darfur, Tibet, Cuba and Iran are still suffering. If we let this be the end, Ahmadinejad will have won after all.

MAY I HAVE YOUR ATTENTION?

How's that for a double entendre?

The May in this title does have two meanings. May refers to both the month of May as well as the first word in a polite request. I do mean both Mays. It's not that I'm so nice, but I'll give a polite request when it refers to raising funds for Congregation B'nai Tikvah (CBT). In this particular case the funds being raised is with the Supermarket Gift Cards (SGCs). I can guess many people have become frustrated, even downright irritated, each time the call for donations. This goes beyond CBT. How about those calls from the PBA, American Diabetes, Girl Scout cookies, etc., do they get to you, too? As much as you and I would like to help each cause, it isn't always possible. You get the idea by now.

The selling of SGCs should be considered the easiest fundraiser at CBT – unless of course you either don't eat and/or shop at any of the participating SGC vendors. However, many of you still don't get the idea. First, as a reminder the stores include: A&P, Acme, Pathmark, Shop Rite, Stop & Shop, Whole Foods as well as Lox, Stock & Deli. I bet that all of you do eat and do most, if not all, of your grocery shopping at one of these seven establishments. If so, we members of the SGC committee would like to serve you with our noted gracious and prompt customer service. We offer free delivery service upon request and we can provide you with large orders (when ordered ahead of time). All you have to lose is nothing. You purchase food anyway, so why aren't you using the SGCs?

If you are a CBT member, then you are paying dues that climb up every year while it seems less is being offered in return. That could be, but one way to get more for your money is to buy a sufficient amount of SGCs covering your monthly food budget. Multiply that amount by 12 and CBT would be the beneficiary of some substantial funds. Even if you buy \$100 per month of SGCs, multiply that by 12 months, the total sales = \$1200 per family. Now, if at least 100 member families (of which CBT has more than that number) duplicate this, then \$120,000 would be sold. CBT retains up to 5% of these sales; so the more that is sold; the more CBT's treasury will grow. Now isn't



this easier than dreading those phone calls/letters that asks for outright donations? You've donated \$1200 per family, per year and it hasn't cost you an extra dime. You can pay for the SGCs with check, credit card or good old fashioned cash. YOU FOOD SHOP ANYWAY, SO DO IT THE SGC WAY!!!

Now that you know that SGCs will not place an extra strain on your wallet, how about it? This is how you can buy your SGCs:

- Stop by the SGC committee table during Sunday religious school hours (IT'S SUNDAY, BUT THERE IS NO SCHOOL. NO PROBLEM: VISIT THE SYNAGOGUE OFFICE BETWEEN 10 – 11 A.M. AFTER MINYON. SOMEONE FROM THE COMMITTEE WILL BE THERE.)
- Visit the synagogue office during regular weekday business hours
