Wear Tallit, Get Arrested

Excerpted from Jerusalem Post

Police and Western Wall officials expelled the Women of the Wall female prayer group from the Kotel area and arrested one of the women, after they attempted to read from a Torah scroll on Wednesday, November 18th.

"We debated among ourselves whether or not to read from the Torah at the Kotel itself or to take the Torah to Robinson's Arch," said Nofrat Frenkel, who was arrested and later released by police.

"In the end we decided that because nobody seemed to mind, we would go ahead and read the Torah at the Kotel."

Under a compromise reached two decades ago with Supreme Court mediation, it was agreed that women

Posting of Shiva Minyan Info

We are using our new email system (Constant Contact) to send out notices of our congregants or their relatives who have recently passed away. It is our intention to get the word out as soon as possible as to notify congregants and friends in time to be able to attend the funeral service.

Most often, the immediate family members have not yet had time to decide on the exact arrangements where or at what times they will be sitting shivah. Also, it is not uncommon for families with mourners who do not live locally, to make arrangements that can change mid-stream. To help avoid confusion by sending corrective emails, all shiva information will be posted exclusively on the B'nai Tikvah website (www.bnaitikvah.org).

The website will be kept up-to-date, as always, and it will continue to provide Mapquest directions from the Synagogue simply by clicking the underlined address. Note that once you are on the Mapquest webpage, you can change the starting address to get precise directions from your current location.

Donations Online

It's now easier than ever for you to make your synagogue donations online. Simply go to the "Giving" section of the website at bnaitikvah.org. There are several options to choose from such as: In memory of, For the recovery of, For the Yartzeit of, In honor of, or In appreciation of. The last two items reveal a "For" box to provide additional information.

If you select the "PayPal" option (which allows you to use almost any credit card), the information is immediately sent to the synagogue administrator or you can choose to print the completed form and mail it with your check. Either way, an acknowledgement will be sent to the party you specify on the form.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE RUTH ANNE KOENICK

At some point our parents, grandparents and those before them, in their own way acted on the commitment to assure the continuity of Judaism—they picked something or things that they wanted to carry into the future. It didn't matter if they were religious or not, conscious of it or not – they handed down something that made Jewish tradition survive in your family and in mine. I know this is true because you and I are here today.

Think for a minute about what it was that your parents and their parents did to get you here today. For me it is filled with things that make me smile and make me cry.

The smell of my mother's kreplach, smothered in schmaltz, crisping in the oven.

The sound of my father chanting El Moyley Rachamen at his father's grave.

The feel and smell of my children as I held them in my arms for the first time and called them by their Hebrew names, Josh named for my father, and Molly for two great grandmothers

It is the smell of my mother's shabbos meal that compels me to make the exact same menu and amount no matter who is coming for dinner...3 people or 15 people, it doesn't matter.

It is the sound of my mother's shoes walking me down the synagogue hallway after catching me and my friends skipping Hebrew school and taking me, just me, not my friends, just me on another trip to the Rabbi's office to be talked to, yet again, about my behavior.

It is the sound of my best friend Bonnie Rosenthal's mother, Ethel, sternly telling me that I would go to college and like it and that as a Jew I personally had an obligation to get an education.

It is the sound of my father blowing the shofar in front of the Russian Embassy during a vigil so many years ago.

We all come to BT for different compelling reasons and this sanctuary is filled with people, filled with people who listened to Irena Sendler's father and in some way have jumped in without question to make sure that they are not the end of this Jewish community. Without them and without you we would not have a Rejoice Festival attracting 4000 people, no Sons of Tikvah, no sisterhood or men's club, no webpage or weekly announcements, no ushers or gabbaim, no family Shabbat and no village to care for us when we need it and sometimes when we don't. No matter how observant you are, if you are here once a week or once a year, someone in your family gave you a piece of Judaism that makes you smile and makes you cry, sometimes together, and BT is the bridge between the past and the future, a symbol of religious freedom, sending a message to the community, that we are important, we make a difference and we are here forever.

I recently heard a story about a young man named Jacob who is living in the city but his parents, longtime members of BT have a ticket for him to join them for the holidays. Not wanting to disappoint them, he drives to NJ but is running very late and knows his parents will be upset and his mother will get a sore neck from trying to watch the door from her seat. As he turns onto Finnegan's Lane, he sees cars parked all the way down the road, and he knows he will never find a parking space. He turns into the parking lot, but sees nothing. In desperation, he turns his head toward heaven and says: "Lord, if you find me a parking place, I promise that I'll eat only kosher, respect Shabbos, and I'll make a large donation

who wished to wear tallitot and kippot and read from the Torah would be allowed to do so at Robinson's Arch, adjacent to the Kotel, and not directly in front of the Kotel, so as not to offend Orthodox worshipers.

Frenkel said that as the women unrolled the Torah scroll and began to prepare to read, officials from the Kotel Foundation arrived and demanded that they leave the premises.

Frenkel said that the women agreed to roll up the Torah scroll and take it to Robinson's Arch. But on their way out, Frenkel, who was wearing a tallit and was carrying the Torah, was seized by police.

About 40 women who had attended the prayers formed a procession and followed the police and Frenkel through the Old City to Jaffa Gate, where they congregated and sang songs until Frenkel was released.

"It is ridiculous that in a Jewish state that is supposedly democratic, women cannot pray the way they want to and only one definition of Judaism is accepted," said Rabbi Felicia Sol, of the B'nai Jeshurun Synagogue on Manhattan's Upper West Side.

"It is sad that many secular Israelis are distanced from Judaism because in Israel, religion is seen as a

for the YK appeal." As he starts out the driveway, he sees an open space that is right there in front. He turns his face up to heaven and says, "Never mind, I just found one!"

Clearly all of you found a parking space, perhaps through divine intervention or some other way and you know when I get up to speak on Yom Kippur, where this is going. We've given a lot of thought about how to do this differently and here are some of the ideas for how to raise the budgeted amount of \$35,000 understanding that our dues are less than 1/2 of our total budget. Everyone who asks if I have written my speech donates \$100, ask twice and it is \$500. Danny suggested we ask people to pay to not have him do a haftorah next year. We've thought of personal phone calls before the holidays and eliminating the talk and we've talked about asking people to sponsor a day at BT or pay for Shabbat babysitting, or cover the cost for one ritual event such as Torah for Tots. I even thought about a story a president at another congregation told about her grandfather who was a Rabbi. He was responsible for the high holiday appeal and had an interesting approach. He'd say something like, Mr. Goldstein, you, in the front row in your nice new suit. How come you didn't give any money to the shul last year? Not surprisingly, her mother went to 14 different schools before she graduated from high school. The list is endless and if you have one, please email it to me at president@bnaitikvah.org. But today we are doing it the old fashioned way—making sure that our village continues—not just here, not just now, not just us, but for all time and for others.

May you each be inscribed in the book of life and have a year filled with good health, joy and laughter.

negative, divisive force instead of being compelling and meaningful."

Anat Hoffman, chair of the Women of the Wall, said that "Times have changed and women should be allowed to have a more central role in Jewish expression".

Kotel Rabbi Shmuel Rabinovitz said in response that the women's actions were "a desecration of the sacred."

"They brought dissent and infighting to a place that is supposed to symbolize unity," said Rabinovitz. "And that is a desecration. They behaved like [biblical] Korach and his assembly."

However, Frenkel, who belongs to a Conservative congregation in Israel, said that her sole intention was to pray to God.

"We were not trying to cause a provocation," said Frenkel. "I am not a political person. I come to pray and perform what is written in the Torah 'Speak to the Israelites and tell them to make tzitzit on the corners of their garments,'" said Frenkel, referring the biblical verse that teaches the commandment to wear a tallit.

Jerusalem Police said that they arrested a woman after she donned a tallit while praying at the Western Wall.

According to a police spokesman, the woman was approached by officers after putting the prayer shawl on, which police said caused an outcry from other worshippers.

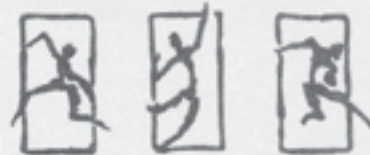

It may be considered a minor holiday compared to other Jewish holidays, but as a young girl growing up in a predominantly non-Jewish community, it thrilled me to no end to hear about Jewish miracles AND to eat my Bubbie's latkes. For almost 22 years it has been my pleasure to pass on that tradition to my son. One day I hope I have grandchildren to whom this tradition will continue.

Where do you buy your Chanukah candles as well as potatoes, onions, apple sauce, chocolate gelt, and all of your holiday ingredients? As a reminder you can purchase most of your needs, including wrapping paper and tape, at any one of the following stores: A&P, Acme, Pathmark, Shop Rite, Stop & Shop, Whole Foods. Even Lox, Stock & Deli (LS&D) and Jesse & David's (J&D) carries some of your holiday food items. It is my pleasure to announce that J&D has entered into our program so that there are two, not just one, deli/restaurant where we can enjoy good Jewish food as well as support CBT. Now that you know where to find these items, let me once again tell you to use SGCs to purchase those things. Don't forget to purchase enough to cover your purchases. If you have a large order, you should pre-order the specific amount

so that you may be guaranteed the full amount. For any reason that precludes you from personally picking up your SGC order, the SGC committee offers FREE delivery. Just contact one of the lovely committee people from the list, contact them, make arrangements and then go shopping. Remember you can purchase your SGCs by:

"Police calmed the situation down and took the woman in for questioning," a statement from the spokesman said.

Responding to the incident, on behalf of the Masorti movement in Israel, Yizhar Hess, the movement's executive director & CEO, condemned "the scandalous arrest of one of its members," adding, "The Kotel must be freed from the obstructionist Orthodox establishment. It is inconceivable that a Western democratic nation such as Israel does not allow religious ritual freedom for its Jewish citizens. The Kotel must be liberated."
