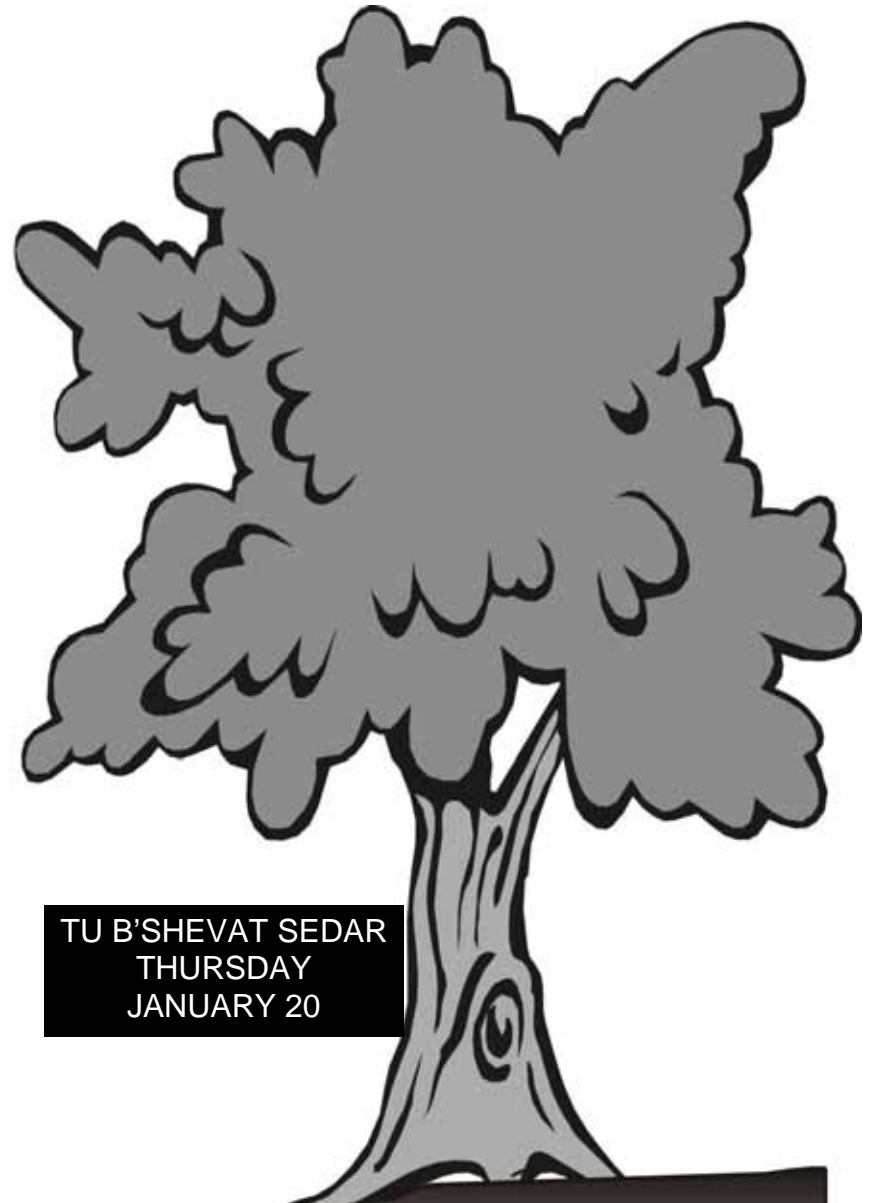

Time to Jew Up

A Message From Rabbi Robert Wolkoff

Virtually every week, we hear another nightmare story from Israel about rabbis behaving badly. Turning the *Kotel*, the Western Wall, into a Haredi synagogue. Declaring that it's all right to murder innocent non-Jews. Segregating men and women on buses.

And now, the latest disgrace, declaring that it is forbidden for Jews to rent property to non-Jews in Israel.

The good news is that, as usual, virtually everybody who is anybody in Israel condemned the rabbis who did this (who are, after all, a tiny island in a vast sea of black hat orthodoxy). But the bad news is that this is what we have come to expect from the incredibly insular, extreme right of the religious spectrum in Israel.

Why? One deliciously perverse explanation is that rabbis in Israel are free to say what they truly believe, as opposed to rabbis in the Diaspora, who need to worry about "the goyim." As Donniel Hartman (a brilliant Israeli thinker) wrote of this explanation, because of the establishment of the state of Israel, "Jews today can be uninhibited and free to finally descend to the moral insensitivity and bigotry to which we always aspired but were prevented from doing"

Which, of course, is nonsense.

The real reason for this craziness is the polarization of Jewish life. Almost the first thing we are taught in the Ethics of the Fathers is "be moderate in judgment." Our rabbinic ancestors knew that balance, rather than radical extremism, is the secret to our survival. But in a polarized Jewish society, there is no balance. So the extreme black hats can reinforce each others zealotry, forcing Judaism to descend into a frumer-than-thou maelstrom (just as the extreme secular academics can indulge in an orgy of unfettered self-hatred and corrosive "intellectual" critique of Israel and of Judaism).

From a spiritual perspective, the radical polarization of the Jewish community is one of the worst things to have happened to the Jewish people in modernity. We find ourselves today divided between those who are ritually oriented and those who aren't; those who are Jewishly educated and those that aren't; those who live in contact with "the real world" and those that live

in a self-imposed ghetto; and between those who face their Jewish future with confidence and enthusiasm and those who experience only fear and anger.

The result of this polarization is a disjointed, almost perverse, perception of reality. There was (perhaps) a time that Jewish communities acted in concert, their most radical elements tempered by the need to keep the community working together, their oddest perceptions tested and re-evaluated in the search for community consensus.

And what do we have in the absence of Judaism's traditional "strong center"? Weirdness. And not just any old weirdness, but disgraceful weirdness. Hateful weirdness.

Chillul Hashem weirdness.

There is perhaps a dim glimmer of a silver lining in this dark cloud of medieval obscurantism. It is a wakeup call to the vast majority of Jews, both in and outside of Israel, that we have no business offering our financial support and social capital to the cause of those whose views are anathema to us because they are "religious." They are *not* "religious." Bigotry and benightedness are not religious values. And it is a wakeup call to Conservative Jews in particular, whose task it is to represent Judaism's strong center, which combines awareness of the world with loyalty to tradition.

Time for us to Jew up!

PS: Don't think for a second that I have forgotten the fact that the Palestinians, for decades, have forbidden *under penalty of death* the sale of land to Jews. Nor have I failed to note the hypocrisy of the world, that made front page news of the views of an ugly but small group of rabbis (is a group of rabbis a rabble?), but that ignores the official policy of the Palestinian Authority to make Palestine "judenrein".

It's just that a huge grotesque immorality on the other side does not justify even a small grotesque immorality on our side.

Ron engaged us, as few can, with his poignant and amusing “true stories” as he inspired us to rise as a spiritual community and strengthen our relationship with God.

B’nai Tikvah is a perfect place for a populist scholar like Ron Wolfson to extend his message, because we have already bought in to his welcoming philosophy. We are doing the work and in the process of doing even more. Whether it is a scholar or a performer, L’dor Vador will make you think and become more involved in the future of Jewish life.

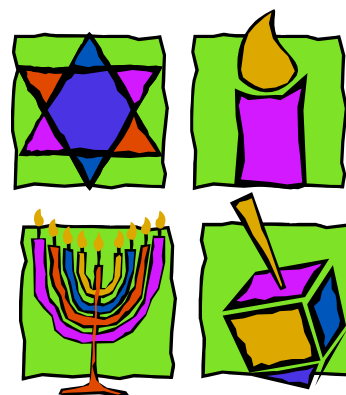

SHIVA THANK YOU by STACEY ROCKMAN

Over the past ten years, I have seen letters and what almost seemed to me, testimonials, about the kindnesses that have experienced in our Bnai Tikvah community during times of need or loss. I suppose I have even taken part in those kindnesses, by holding people's hands, making shiva visits and the like, but until this fall I really did not "get it."

Over the past few months, as I experienced some of the most difficult times of my life, my Bnai Tikvah family has come out in force. You have made sure I had child care help and pounds of pasta to eat. You made phone calls, sent me emails and texts and never let me sit alone at services. You have offered me good counsel and strong shoulders. You have helped me with the practical and the emotional. I have been protected by a warm blanket that is my community. Over and over again I have told people how blessed I feel to be a part of such a great family.

The shiva experience was particularly amazing.

My house was full the entire week. Minyan time (both morning and evening) had standing room only. My house was taken over by crews of people who gave of their time to help me through mine. When the house was finally empty the last morning of shiva, I did not feel a sense of relief, just a sense of where is my security blanket going? But as the days have passed, the support has not. You continue to be my people, and I am so proud to be a part of this family.

In my father's memory, and in honor of you, I would like to start a shiva committee. This committee will help to organize people for things like the food set up and clean up and make sure that the mourner need not worry about the details. 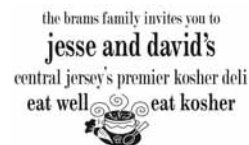

Know Your Rites

In an effort to enhance everyone's participation and spiritual fulfillment while attending services, the CBT Ritual Committee will publish an article each month dealing with some aspect of synagogue life. If you have a topic about which you want additional information, please send your questions/comments to ritual@bnaitikvah.org. Of course, all questions of a *halachic* (Jewish law) nature should be addressed to Rabbi Wolkoff directly.

YashAr Koach

Did you ever notice the glow of folks when they descend from the *bimah* after having received an honor? We can multiply that effect by the simple act of saying **yashar koach** (literally straight strength, which reflects the medieval practice of reading the Torah, in which the reader was required to hold the Torah upright with the text visible to the congregation) when the honoree is near your seat. Strictly speaking, this is a masculine form of the congratulatory phrase. Some, but not all, people use the feminine form (**yashar kocheych**) when expressing the same sentiment for a woman, and **yashar koch'chem** when addressing a group of people (sort of a Jewish *y'all*). If possible, a handshake should accompany this (a fist bump or high five for the younger generation can be substituted). If you are not near the person during the service, congratulations can be given during the kiddush or Oneg. This act is especially meaningful when addressed to a visitor or newcomer to Congregation B'nai Tikvah.

Try it the next time you are in *shul*! By the way, if you are the recipient of a *yashar koach*, the proper response (if speaking to a man) is **baruch tihyeh** or (if speaking to a woman) **barucha tihiyi** ("may you be blessed"), although a "thanks" or "*todah*" will do in a pinch.

Another Viewpoint The Peddler

Like the photographers who worked the streets of New York with a little pony and took pictures of children sitting on the pony for family albums, there were other trades and businesses that have since disappeared in this age of high tech and mega retail stores. The depressed economics of the late 1920s and 1930s forced people to look for any legal or (illegal) means to pay the rent and buy food. One of these entrepreneurial enterprises was called customer peddling.

Aunt Helen was a customer peddler. The customer peddler would go to your home with a bundle of sheets, pillowcases and towels, from which you could pick out what you needed or wanted (actually, few people brought what they wanted, they bought only what was strictly needed). If you wanted blue and the peddler had pink, the peddler would come back with the bundle the next week and schlep it up the four flights again and hope that the customer would be satisfied with the new presentation.

Payment was another matter. It was almost always on the installment plan. There were no charge cards then, and charge accounts at major stores were only for the financial elite. If you were to see a Macy's ad from 1935, today, you would be impelled to laugh. For about five bucks you could buy sheets, pillows, and pillowcases for a double or twin beds. Don't like your pillow stuffing? I remember a store in the Bronx where for a few cents they would aerate the feathers in your pillow, or, if you preferred, for a bit more they would replace them with new goose down.

Seldom did the housewife have enough cash to pay for the new purchase. The honor system was the basis for most transactions. Most new clients were obtained by word of mouth (go see

my cousin Gussie in Flatbush). So if you got a referral for a friend or relative, chances were that the new customer was good for the money, otherwise word would get back to the referrer and that would not look good for the family. The buyer and seller would agree on a mode of payment and the peddler would return weekly or monthly to show something else like maybe a new towel set or a table cloth.

Today we would call this the underground economy. Actually, as far as the government was concerned, very few of these entrepreneurs made enough money to pay taxes anyway, but it did help to pay the rent and the local grocer, who often ran a book with each page showing a customer's name and current account.

Sometimes it became an ongoing game. As the purchases were made on credit, and almost none of the transactions were on paper, a peddler had to be careful not to extend too much credit or risk going broke or not being able to pay their wholesaler. It was a tough way for a middle aged woman to make a living.

I read in the financial paper that more and more people today are becoming individual entrepreneurs after they are let out from a steady 9 – 5 job, with almost no hope of getting the same kind of work again soon. Even the great malls are shutting down, and the few family run grocery, hardware and dry goods stores are as quaint as the horse and buggy. But with individuals looking for ways to pay their expenses while they wait for the economy to turn around again, who knows, the customer peddler may see the light again.

BAR and BAT MITZVAH

Bar Mitzvah means “son of the commandment.” Bat mitzvah means “daughter of the commandment.” They are now old enough to keep a fast day, to be responsible for any vow that they may make and to exercise self-control. The boy receives this status at the age of 13; the girl at the age of 12 plus one day. Bat mitzvah celebrations started in France and Italy before moving to other Countries.

Q. What's worse than Daytime TV? A. Watching it from a hospital bed.

A newly formed Bikur Cholim Committee was put together this past summer, closely overseen by Rabbi Wolkoff. The idea was born from a need to support the members of our synagogue who are experiencing any type of illness, as well as the family members of those who are ill.

We are prepared to visit with patients and/or their families, organize volunteers to help with things including but not limited to: visiting the hospital, delivering meals, dropping off or picking up kids, visiting the home and more.

The rabbi typically receives information first but often, people neglect to inform the synagogue until after the need for our services have passed. A special email group is setup for this purpose. If you know of someone who is ill or if you have information to share in confidence, please write to bikur@bnaitikvah.org and we will respond.

Confidentiality is of the utmost importance. The committee will discuss individual situations with the rabbi before deciding what the role of each committee member will be to aid them.

At minimum, a Get Well card is sent to the home of the patient. A committee member will reach out to the contact person of the patient to help determine the needs of the family. Do they want a visit at the hospital, do they need a meal, are there children involved? These are just a few of the many questions we ask to be of service. There are times when simply talking on the phone with a family member may be enough and they are thankful we are here and have offered our ear, our words of comfort and support, and our time.

Although we are a tightly bound group who communicate regularly to ensure the consistency in what we provide, we are not offering a cookie-cutter service. Each situation is completely individual and is treated accordingly. Some families need more than others and each patient has their own preference as to how involved they would like us to be.

We recently acquired some laptop computers equipped with DVD drives and wireless access. If the hospital room is equipped (as many now are) with wireless access, you can watch movies or your favorite TV shows on-demand via a Netflix account donated by one of our members. So if you're stuck in a small room with no one to talk to, at least you won't have to endure daytime TV.

Bar/Bat Mitzvah Program for Children with Special Needs

Masorti's Bar/Bat Mitzvah Program for Children with Special Needs has been recognized by one of Israel's foremost national social service organizations working to support and highlight the needs of individuals with disabilities.

The Masorti program – unique in Israel – has won the coveted 2010 Shalem Foundation Excellence Prize, awarded each year to a project, program or staff benefiting this population. The Shalem Foundation was established in 1983 by the Center of Local Authority in collaboration with the Ministry of Welfare.

In accordance with the Shalem Foundation's vision to integrate those with cognitive challenges and disabilities into mainstream life, the Masorti program offers Israeli special needs youngsters and their families the only avenue to celebrate this Jewish lifecycle event and thus experience the joy of full acceptance by Jewish community.

Within Orthodox congregations, there is an absence of any formal bar/bat mitzvah prepara-

tion for children with special needs, and they are marginalized by Orthodox religious authorities.

The Shalem Foundation described the Bar/Bat Mitzvah Program for Children with Special Needs as an innovative model and a breakthrough, citing its role in pioneering the development and utilization of state-of-the-art alternative communications devices, such as computerized sound kits; sign language for Torah reading; and visual pedagogy. In addition to readying youngsters for group bnai mitzvah, which take place in Masorti kehillot, the program also provides a course of Jewish enrichment, lasting three to six months, through the special needs schools the children attend. Eligible children are identified by their schools, and the Masorti movement provides all services, including teacher training, at no cost to the schools or to the families

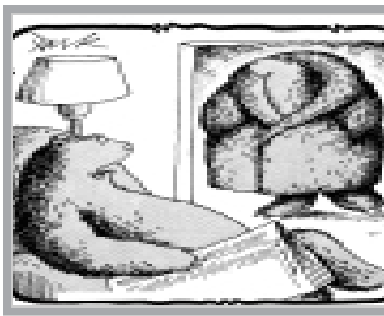
