

A Message From Rabbi Robert Wolkoff

October 2011

Judaism has made numerous contributions to world civilization. After all, any culture that could come up with Jonas Salk, Mandy Patinkin, Hank Greenberg and gribenes can't be all bad. At the very core of the creative dynamo called Judaism is halachah, Jewish law. The relationship between halachah and Hank may not be immediately clear. But the exactitude, the intensity, the passion, the celebration of nuance and subtlety, the interface between idea and reality, between people and principle that characterizes the study of halachah is the driving force behind every Jewish accomplishment.

Well, maybe not gribenes, except in the sense of wringing the very last drop of flavor (and cholesterol) out of a chicken.

In a word, halachah, and our relationship to it, makes us who we are. Some of us are acutely aware of this. Others of us may not realize how the archetypal force of the divine is playing out in our lives. But our tradition teaches us that all of us, knowingly or unknowingly, are participants in the covenant.

The assumption that permeates all Jewish legal thinking is simple in description and endless in complexity: every aspect of mundane life is an opportunity for holiness. That is why, for example, we so often recite blessings with the words, "who has sanctified us by His commandments and commanded us to...".

So Jewish law really matters. But how does it work? Who decides how it applies? How does a four thousand year old tradition address an ultramodern reality? All through the year, I'll be discussing this topic in our adult education program. We will review responsa, that is, rabbinic essays, which address virtually everything under the sun.

And this is where you come in. We can't tackle it all. I need your help deciding which topics we will be discussing this year. Once we decide, I'll send out selected responsa to the whole congregation, so everyone will have a chance to review them.

Please look at the list below, and let us know which issues are of greatest interest for you. Remember: we will only have time to discuss a handful of them, so choose carefully from among the following:

- May an atheist lead services?
- Can you have a virtual minyan?
- Can you tape Shabbat services?
- Can you call a non-cohen up for the first aliyah?
- Can two people have a joint aliyah?
- May Christian groups use the synagogue?
- Does milk need to be labeled "Kosher for Passover"?
- Is a K kosher?
- Is all wine kosher?
- Are tattooing and body piercing permitted?
- Do the laws of family purity and mikveh still apply?
- Are joint Conservative-Reform religious schools permitted?
- May a charity accept ill-gotten gains?
- Is anesthesia permitted at a bris?
- What is the status of a convert whose conversion was not halachic?
- Should we investigate conversions?
- Should there be a special ceremony to recognize a first-born female?
- Are we obligated to donate our organs?
- Is stem cell research permitted
- What options are permitted in end-stage medical care?
- How do we respond to miscarriage and stillbirth?
- How may we use preimplantation genetic diagnosis?
- Is assisted suicide permitted?
- Are violent and defamatory video games permitted?
- What is the status of intellectual property?
- Is computer privacy protected in the workplace?
- What are the halachic obligations of workers and employers?
- Is whistleblowing required?

Certainly I have regrets and I resolve to do better. I will love my family with passion and be a better friend. I will love God and protect God's gifts. I will be more available and understanding to those in need. And remember to care for myself.

I am grateful to our loving God above all. I am humbled to know that I/we stand before God who has granted us the marvels of a world filled with possibilities and the means to accomplish so much.

Another Calendar

It's New Years in June. I don't mean early Yom Kippur or any other religions' New Years Holiday. I'm talking about the first of the deluge of calendars that I receive from charities and other organizations every year. In today's mail, June 23rd, I opened a heavy envelope with a beautiful color picture 2012 calendar.

From now until the end of the year I will receive 20 or 25 calendars. Some from Jewish religious organizations, some from secular Jewish organizations and some from military, medical, social and some organizations that leave me puzzled as to what their missions may be. All of them come with requests for donations.

Donations to charitable organizations have always been part of my family culture and budget, but it looks like my name has been sold to every charity in the business. One way to check out the legitimacy of a charity is to check with the State of New Jersey Attorney General to see if they are registered in New Jersey and if so, you can find out how much they have collected and what percent is spent on administration or advertising or on the actual service they claim to provide.

As I said above, charity has always been part of my family's culture but it is beginning to look like a new field for enterprising individuals. It seems like every week I receive an invitation to become a member of a new museum.

Now they are either already in business or in the planning stages of a museum for every branch of the military and every war that has taken place on these shores or overseas.

As a World War II veteran, I have deep feelings for all those that have given their lives or health and died in the service of our country. However I would much rather that the effort and finances needed to erect, and maintain these museums, be directed toward the support and rehabilitation of the soldiers, sailors, airmen and women who come home with physical and psychological issues. So many damaged young veterans are wandering the streets of our cities and towns of our country.

Yes, there are some people who simply can't be helped because they will not accept any assistance. But for those who are struggling to put their lives back together and find themselves unable to deal with issues of health, families, physical disabilities, finances, and bureaucratic fences to be climbed, every effort and resource should be directed toward their needs.

Why we run this program? The following is an excerpt of one of the thank you notes we received on behalf of a family we sponsored: "This family has never experienced such great generosity. 

School is off to a great start. Adjustments to separation from parents have been made.

We are awaiting more participants for our Mommy & Me and Toddler Fun classes. Please pass on this information to family or friends so we can start these programs soon!

Our 3's and Pre-k classes went to Giamarese Farm in East Brunswick last month. They went on a hayride and picked apples, just in time for Rosh Hashannah...

We started our free Shabbat Together program for children (ages 18 months to 4 years old) along with a parent, grandparent or caretaker. It is an hour program from 10:45 to 11:45 on Friday mornings once or twice per month. The first half hour is with Morah Phyllis (Denenberg) where the children learn about Shabbat or a holiday and then create an art project. The second half is spent in various classrooms joining their individual Shabbat Party or the school wide Shabbat Party. Both Rabbi Wolkoff and Cantor Rockman participated in this program. We have started our **Kidstuff** coupon book sale. We sold some of them at the Rejoice Festival. They are similar to the Entertainment books. Families save money on clothing, shoes, sporting goods, toys, activities, electronics, food (including Shoprite) and more. They make a great gift. The cost is \$25.00 per book and is available in the school office.

Our upcoming fundraisers include "<u>Fun Pasta</u>", and in December, the Barnes & Noble Book Fair and our Chanukah Regifting Boutique.

Please check out some of the new items we purchased with our fundraising money. In our "backyard", you will find a section of the playground that is now covered with "Wondergrass". We also have two new benches; one in the playground area and one in the "grassy" area. The grassy area was used by our day camp in the summer and will be used by our classes during the school year. I have spoken to Mrs. Nimberg, the Religious School Director and have offered use of the grassy area for outdoor Religious school classes.

WAS YOUR FAMILY'S PROPERTY TAKEN DURING THE HOLOCAUST?

If you or your family owned movable, immovable, or intangible property that was confiscated, looted or forcibly sold in countries governed or occupied by the Nazi forces or Axis powers during the Holocaust era and you or your relatives received no restitution for that property after the Holocaust era, you may be eligible to participate in the Holocaust Era Asset Restitution Taskforce project (Project HEART).

Project HEART is a nonprofit initiative of the Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI), with the support of the Government of Israel, Project HEART—aims to provide the tools, strategy, and information to enable the Government of Israel, the project, and its partners to bring about a small measure of justice to eligible heirs of Jewish victims, the victims themselves, and the Jewish people. Project HEART is focusing on identifying individuals with potential claims. regarding the following types of private property for which no restitution was received after the Holocaust era: (1) private property that was located in countries that were controlled by the Nazi forces or Axis powers at any time during the Holocaust era; and (2) private property that belonged to Jewish persons as defined by Nazi/Axis racial laws; and (3) private property that was confiscated, looted, or forcibly sold by the Nazi forces or Axis powers during the Holocaust era.

"Many victims of the Holocaust returned to their homes to find that they had no ability to recover their own property," said Natan Sharansky, Jewish Agency for Israel's Chairman. "This is the first time since the Holocaust that a general comprehensive program is being launched to gather information with the eventual purpose of receiving compensation for property looted, stolen, or forcibly sold during the Holocaust. This will be an opportunity for many people to finally receive compensation for property that was taken from them and their families during the Holocaust era."

Jewish Holocaust victims and their heirs worldwide whose families owned movable, immovable, or intangible personal property that was confiscated, looted, or forcibly sold in countries governed or occupied by the Nazi forces or Axis powers during the Holocaust era are eligible. The only limitation for application is if restitution has been made to a victim or the victim's heirs for that property after the Holocaust era; then they are not eligible for further restitution in connection with that property.

"It is not necessary to have evidence of property ownership to be eligible. If individuals believe they owned or were beneficiaries of such property, they should fill out the Questionnaire," stated Anya Verkhovskaya, Project Director.

Eligible properties for Project HEART include private properties of all kinds:

- (1) IMMOVABLE PROPERTY, an item of property that cannot be moved without destroying or altering it. This includes items of real estate such as developed land, including any buildings on it, and land without buildings.
- (2) MOVABLE PROPERTY, any property that can be moved from one location to another. This may include art, Judaica, livestock, professional tools, precious metals, precious stones, jewelry, and other movable property.
- (3) INTANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY, personal property that cannot actually be moved, touched, or felt but instead represents something of value. This may include negotiable instruments such as stocks, bonds, insurance policies, savings accounts, registered patents, dowry policies, and other intangible personal property. It may also include negative assets—debts and liabilities owed to the individual—such as outstanding loans and mortgages.

"Because of the immeasurable damage that was done to Jewish individuals and communities from the time their property was confiscated, Project HEART was put together as an initiative to reach out to those whose pain we can never imagine, but whom we can assist in the process of gathering data, which will hopefully and ultimately aid them in retrieving what is rightfully theirs," said Bobby Brown of JAFI.

"Belated, yet vital steps to partially redress the terrible wrongdoing committed during the Holocaust era in relation to asset restitution are now being taken with Project HEART.

A simple eligibility process has been established. To participate, individuals only need to fill out the Questionnaire that may be found on the website www.heartwebsite.org.

Questionnaires will be processed based on agreements with relevant governments or authorities in their efforts to achieve restitution.
