From the Religious Committee

COMFORTING MOURNERS

In the October issue of Hakol, President Gary Bergman wrote eloquently about the mitzvah of visiting a shiva house. The shiva period has been shown to be wonderfully cathartic when the community demonstrates its support for the mourners. In his article, Gary noted that this can be uncomfortable, particularly if the mourner is not well known to you. Mourning for a loved one is emotionally stressful; add to this emotional strain sitting shiva for a week and you can have a very difficult situation. Visitors can help to make this period easier, as anyone who has had to sit shiva knows, yet many people feel uncertain of themselves when a neighbor or friend or fellow congregant is sitting shiva. It is important to realize that your relationship with the mourner does not matter; your visit will be appreciated. It is truly a sign of communal caring when you attend a house of mourning, and helps ensure a minyan so that the family may say Kaddish.

Some people are uncomfortable because they do not know what is expected of them at a house of mourning. There are certain rules of shiva etiquette; here are some of the major ones.

Listen for an announcement at the funeral service for the times that the mourners will be receiving guests or check the website (www.bnaitikvah.org/shivah.html). Usually, the options are immediately after the funeral, around the minyanim in the evenings and mornings, or during the daytime. Should you wish to visit at some other time, you may want to call ahead, so that family meals and rest are not interrupted. Some experienced shiva visitors choose to visit toward the end of the seven days, when it is frequently more difficult to gather a minyan. It is equally important to understand when you should leave; the visitation is not a social occasion, and the family should be allowed to retire at a reasonable hour. Do not stay too long. A shiva visit should be no more than an hour. You might come a few minutes before the minyan or stay a bit after. Mourners uniformly report how exhausted they are by the shiva experience;

do not overstay your welcome.

It is customary to enter the house of mourning without knocking or ringing the bell. The mourners are not supposed to greet you, so you should approach them. Find the mourners, and go to them as soon as possible. What do you say? The tradition suggests being silent, allowing the mourner to open the conversation. Simply offering a hug, a kiss, a handshake, an arm around the shoulder speaks volumes. It is best to let the mourner talk about the person who just died. Try to be focused on their loss and not discuss events happening in the world or in the community. If you do want to open a conversation, start with a simple "I'm so sorry" or "I don't know what to say. This must be really difficult for you." Do not tell people not to cry or that they will get over it. Crying is a normal part of the grieving process. And, as most people who have been bereaved will tell you, you never "get over" a loss, you only get used to it. Spend anywhere from a few moments to 10 minutes with the mourners. There will be others who also want to speak with them, and you can always come back. If you are the only visitor, then, of course, spend as much time as you wish.

You may see other congregants or family members whom you haven't seen for a while at the house of mourning and so there is a tendency to make the shiva call an occasion to catch up, often around a table laden with food. This can make the atmosphere more festive than reflective. Always remember that shiva is not a social event; your conduct should be appropriate to the occasion.

As Gary noted, the minyan should be the focus of communal action, for this allows the mourners to say Kaddish. Your presence at the minyan lends comfort to the mourners, and sends a powerful message that the congregation cares for all its members. Indeed, the traditional words of condolence — which should be recited just before leaving the shiva house — “May God comfort you together with the rest of those who mourn for Zion and Jerusalem” stresses that the mourners are not alone in their grief. Personal bereavement is thus seen in the total broader context of the community.

After the minyan or when leaving the home, if the family has put out a container for donations to a favorite charity, it is traditional that you contribute a small amount.

The great genius of Jewish bereavement is to empower the community to be God's partner in comforting those who mourn. In making a shiva call in an appropriate and traditional way, we are the medium through which God's comfort can be invoked.

In learning the art of coping with dying, we are, in fact, learning an important aspect of the art of Jewish living.

To help further understand the Jewish laws and customs regarding the mourning process, you can pick up a copy of the CD recording of Rabbi Wolkoff's Adult-Ed lecture on this topic at the synagogue office. You might also obtain a copy of Dr. Ron Wolfson's book, *A Time to Mourn, A Time to Comfort*.

I will continue to send out homework, news about school events, and monthly updates for each class via constant contact. You will also be able to find this information on Facebook and Twitter.

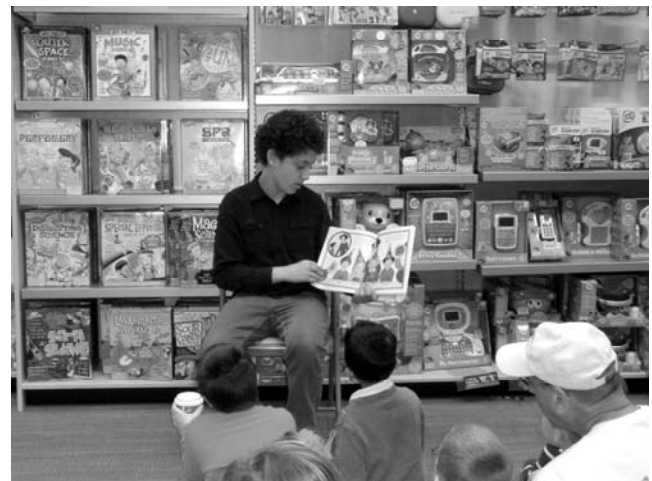
Mark your calendars for another wonderful Chai Breakfast with the Rabbi on Sunday, January 29th. Check your email for the schedule for the day.

TORAH FUND

The first time I had an aliyah was at my oldest nephew's bar mitzvah over 30 years ago. My brother had the service at his home and outside, overlooking the Potomac River. For the readings we used a borrowed Torah and his good friend Sue Romer z"l lead the service. I had never really been that close to an open Torah and I was fascinated by the look of the letters and the style of writing. Not long after that, my mother, of blessed memory, was at Simchat Torah services at the synagogue I grew up in and someone put the Torah in her arms, the first time a woman held a Torah in that synagogue. She was the oldest of 13 children, had four of her own, and already had several grandsons. To her, holding the Torah was as precious as all those children. I remember her retelling the story of holding the Torah on that occasion over and over because it was such a point of pride.

For most of my life the Torah has been something distant, something studied by others, held by others and read by others. It wasn't until B'nai Tikvah became my home, just 13 years ago, that the Torah became something real, something personal and something within my reach. Two weeks before my daughter Molly's Bat Mitzvah, she asked me to read Torah. Cantor Jodi Sered-Lever told me that she would teach me the three sentences I need to know, in essence help me memorize them, but I had to promise to come back and learn Trope, learning to read the right way. No surprise, I wept through most of those sentences, not just because it was my daughter's Bat Mitzvah, but because of how proud my parents would have been, and how personal Torah had now become. Since then I have read Torah many times and chanted Haftorah, but the greatest joy I have is the honor of serving as Gabbai. Being that close to the Torah for such an extended period of time, helping a proud grandmother wrap and dress the Torah at her grandchild's simcha, and helping assure its safety when a bride and groom are honored, an anniversary is celebrated or a baby is named is almost indescribable. When I do this, the Torah, becomes something close, something personal, something I can study. With all the love and celebrations that surround the Torah also comes the knowledge that they are temporal too, and they wear out. Our Torahs are in need of repair and we need a new one.

Each week I can see the letters become less clear and the stitches that hold the panels together become less perfect. It is for all of these reasons that I have taken on the honor of helping raise funds for a new Torah. In the coming weeks, you will receive information about how you can contribute to this "once in a lifetime experience" and I hope and pray that you will join in this mitzvah.

If you know of anyone who is feeling down, has become ill, or is alone, please let us know. We would like to let each and everyone of them know that we are here for them and that we care.

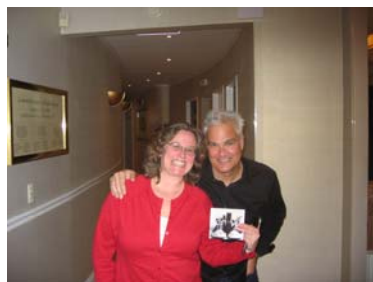
If the needs turn out to be greater than a phone call, please let the committee know and we will try to fulfill those needs.

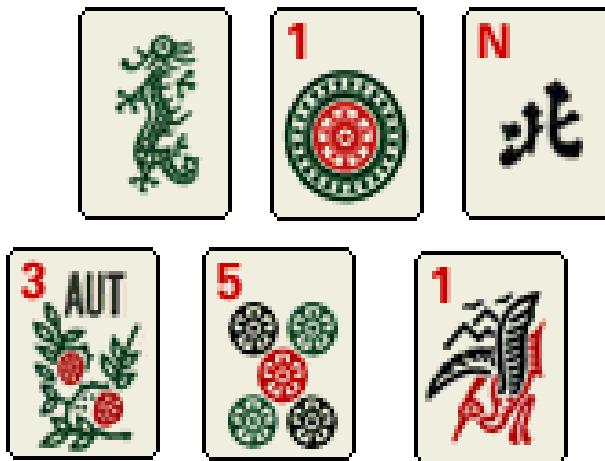

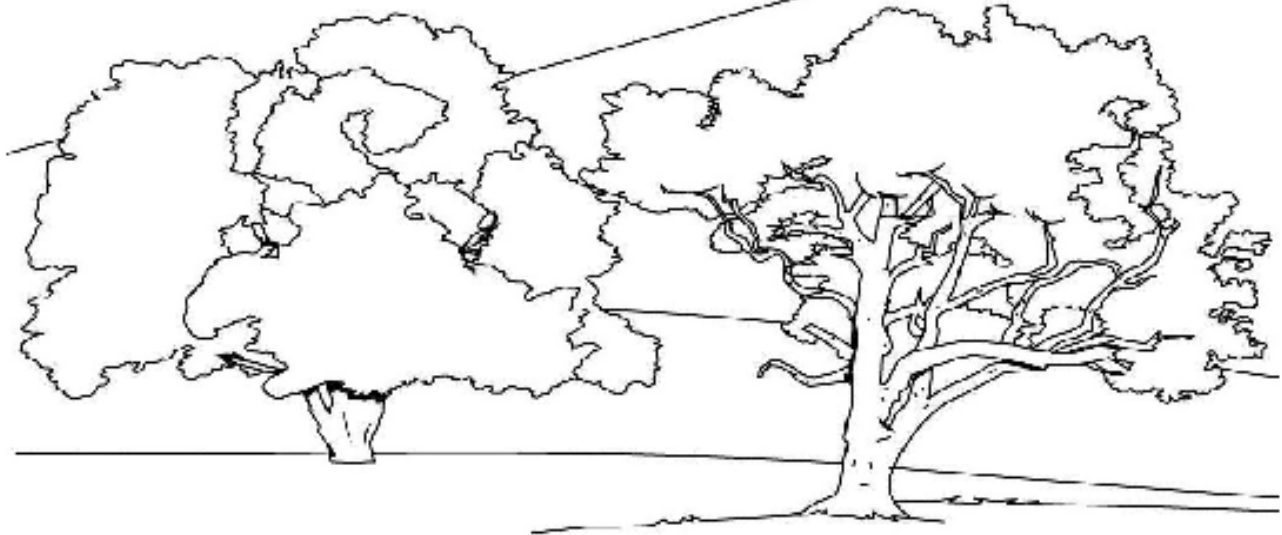

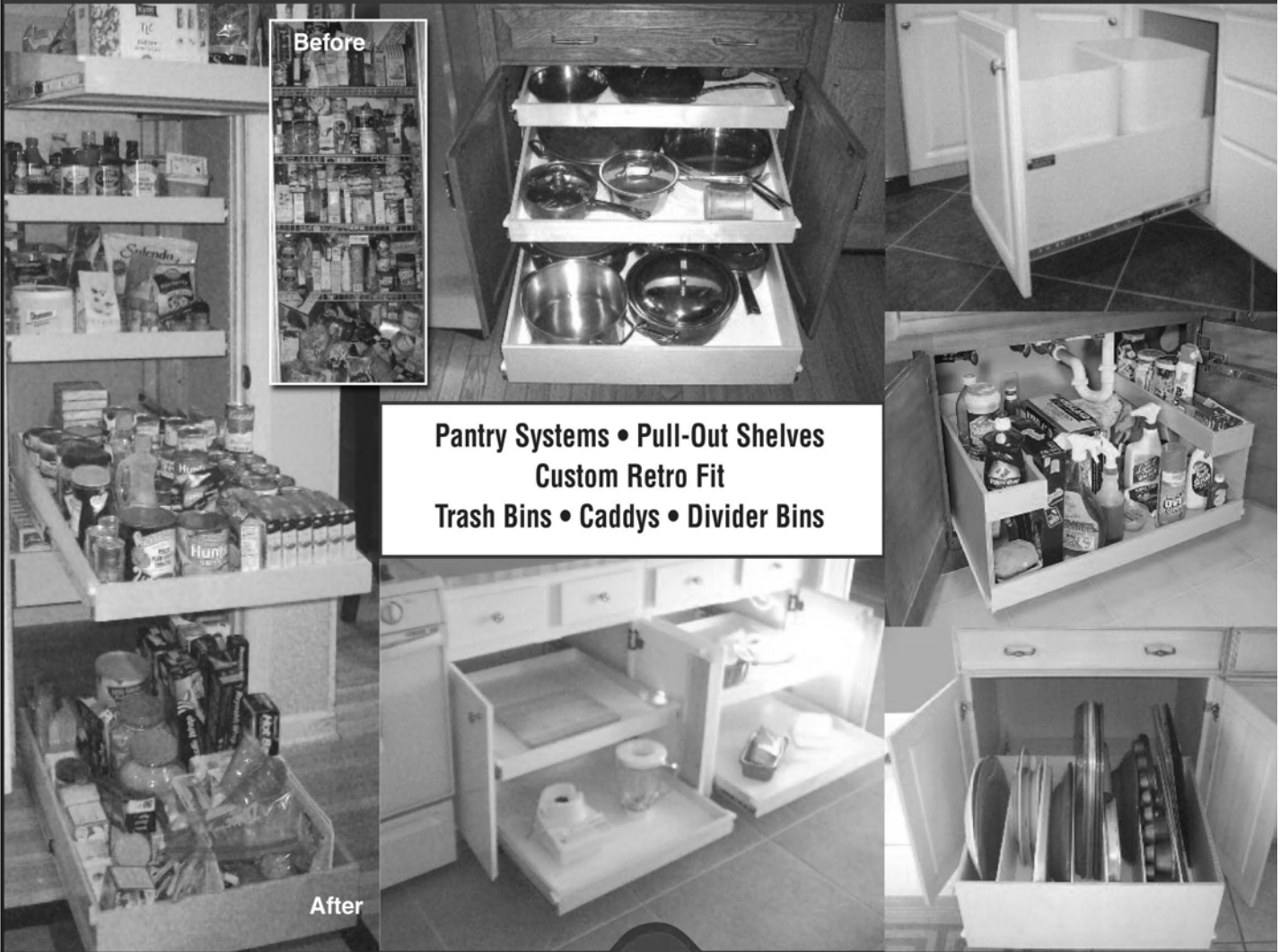
