A Message From Rabbi Robert Wolkoff

For every complex problem, there is always a simple solution.

And it is always wrong.

One such complex problem is anti-Semitism. One such simple solution is “education.”



And that simple solution is always wrong, as would be obvious after just a few moment’s reflection. Have there never been educated anti-Semites? Many of the greatest anti-Semites in history were the intellectual giants of their day (St. John Chrysostom, St. Augustine, St. Agobard, Martin Luther, Voltaire, Wagner, and arguably Karl Marx). The most educated countries in Europe in the 1930’s were also the most anti-Semitic (Germany, France, Poland). The most virulent anti-Semites in America today are not in Montana or Alabama, but in Harvard Square and Berkeley. And it is a widely known fact that the biggest purveyors of anti-Semitism in the Middle East are those with a college (often, American) education.

Simply put, the notion of education as an answer to anti-Semitism is a reassuring liberal myth. In fact, the widespread belief in this myth points us toward the real complexity of the problem of anti-Semitism, and the complexity of its solution.

The real problem of anti-Semitism is not that people are ignorant of Jews (and thus in need of education). Rather, it is that people are driven by myths, often delusional myths, about Jews, myths so deeply held that no amount of education could possibly overcome them.

Allow me to offer one example that has nothing to do with the question of anti-Semitism. Consider this: until recently, the United States was in control of the oil fields of Iraq—arguably the richest spoils of war of all time. Conservative estimate of its worth? Oh, a mere 3.25 *trillion* dollars. And a little while ago, the last American soldier pulled out of Iraq. What was America left with?

The right to buy that oil at the going market price—which is exactly what we had before.

To anyone with an ounce of objectivity, this will be seen as one of the most remarkable events in the history of war, and it will underscore our belief in American exceptionalism, the uniquely American moral stamp on human affairs. No other nation has ever done anything like this.

Nevertheless, at Dial-a-Demonstrator, you still will be able to find endless numbers of “intellectuals” who will condescendingly inform you that “the whole war was about oil.”

Go figure. The issue is not education. They’re real educated at Rent-a-Riot. The issue, instead, is the human tendency to believe in whatever myth is necessary in order to avoid serious thought.

Otherwise known as idolatry.

Our tradition tells us that ridding ourselves, not to mention all of humanity, of idolatrous delusions is no easy task. At the same time, though, it is Judaism’s profound hope that this is exactly what will happen. This hope is underscored at this particular time of the year, as we count the days between Passover and Shavuot. Humanity in the 21st century finds itself in practical terms where we find ourselves, symbolically, in our ritual calendar—between the time of our physical liberation and the time of our spiritual liberation. The wealth and technology of the modern world is breathtaking. It opens for us unprecedented opportunities. It ought to be a time of great enlightenment. Instead, though, the Assads and Ahmadinejads of the world use their wealth only to create more darkness. Overcoming that darkness is humanity’s foremost challenge—and it always has been. As we count the days of the omer, let us make each day count.

"Am I my brother's keeper?"
- Genesis 4:9

As we began to approach Passover and I was preparing for the seders and family . . . I pondered the potential drama that comes with a lot of family togetherness. I was thinking specifically about a story I had heard about a "difficult" sister and the effect her nasty behavior had on another sibling during a holiday dinner. Actually, the word that was used to describe the misbehaved sister was "terrorist" but given what is going on in today's world I felt that a better interpretation and a more appropriate choice of words would be "difficult". Although I am not sure the sibling on the receiving end of the bullying would agree, for the purpose of this article, I'll go with "difficult".

The thoughts I had began with how sad it is when families don't get along and continued on to what happens when someone in one of those families becomes ill.

There are times when an important and happy lifecycle event occurs or on the opposing end of the spectrum . . . when someone takes ill, and one of those two things will bridge the gap between family members. Sometimes the bridge is permanent and other times it is temporary; all too often the bridge is never built or crossed.

I am talking about the bridge, or rather the feelings which create the bridge, between two people which can cause them to overlook their hard feelings, put their emotional injuries or resentments behind them, and perhaps remove the chip on their shoulder so that they can move forward and get along.

That bridge is not always possible. The reasons are endless. It is often complicated. However, the need to be able to come to a place where you can look past your own feelings in order to take care of your own is necessary.

It is with all of that in mind that I set the tone for this article. Whether you are standing on one side of a mountain with a "difficult" family member on the other side or you know of someone in this situation, a bridge must be built.

These are not just words from someone who has had no experience with conflict. Although these are my words and my ideas, doing the work of Bikur Cholim and talking regularly with the members of the committee we have come to a place where we can see first hand how sad and destructive it can be to a person when their own family will not step up and assume the responsibility of caring.

If the mitzvah of Bikur Cholim is important, then isn't the mitzvah of healing in your own family just as important, or perhaps even more so?

As the years behind us grow, the years in front of us shorten. There are a million clichés about stopping to smell the roses; eat dessert first, don't sweat the small stuff, life is short and so on. These are all too true.

Here is a simple scenario: Your mom is ill. You and your mom don't get along. You and your dad do. You help to take care of your mom because it makes your dad's life a little easier. It's that simple.

When a family bands together to rally around an illness there is a special force that enhances the healing process. It is this feeling that will fortify and strengthen the attitude of the patient. It is no secret that the more support and comfort a family member has, the better their chance to overcome adversity.

The range of caring is in perspective to the depth of the illness. Sometimes it is short-term and other times it is terminal.

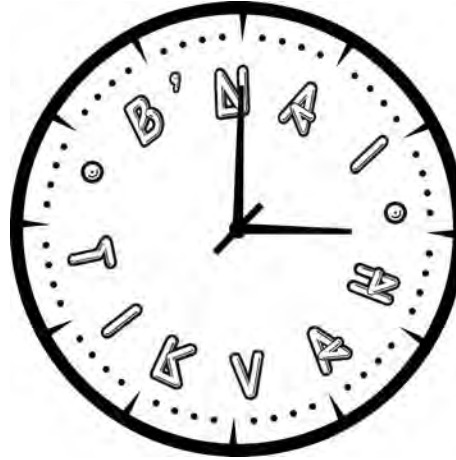

The nominating will meet shortly to ask people to be on the board of directors.

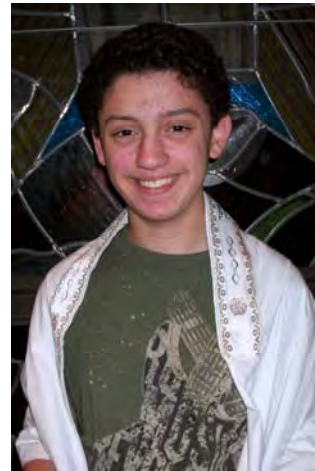

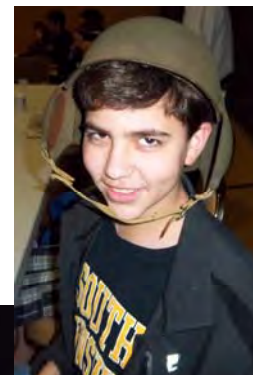

Webmaster

Is the subject line appropriate?

I was looking for an anonymous example for inspiration to write this month's webmaster's article. I couldn't find anything until I inadvertently messed one up myself. Having been very active on the "Usenet" back in the early 90's, it was a common mistake for someone to change the topic in a bulletin board without changing the subject line. As a result, it became difficult to find information on, let's say: "French cuisine" without having to wade through people's comments about parking facilities at well known restaurants and complaints about valet service.

Those were the pioneering days of the internet, where the only way to search for information was to subscribe to the appropriate Usenet group and search by "subject line".

This practice continues today in the form of "email lists". When the subject matter in the body of an email changes mid-stream into something else, it would be most helpful to those following the thread to have some clue, before opening the email, that the content has absolutely nothing to do anymore with the original posting.

Fortunately, our synagogue's email list (eGroup@bnaitikvah.org) is fairly clean in that regard. You can also search the body of the text for specific words or phrases. Any congregational member can sign-up to post and/or receive message from the group but, in order to search the archives (back to August 1999), you need access to the website at "groups.yahoo.com/messages/bnaitikvah"

Due to Yahoo's security policy, only fully registered members can access the archives. If you need help in obtaining a Yahoo-id and/or linking it to the eGroup, let me know and I'll be glad to help.

Did you read past the headline?

The supermarket giftcard program is NOT being abolished. Gift card purchases are a major source of income to B'nai Tikvah and, because it is targeted towards things you need to buy anyway, there is no cost to you to participate.



The following changes take effect August 1st 2012:

Gift card purchases will no longer be required to supplement dues and, therefore, you will not be obligated to participate in this program. And because the program will be totally voluntary, there will no longer be any limits imposed on how much you can benefit from it.

The more giftcards you buy (for things you need to buy anyway), the more you can benefit as credit towards your dues. Should you decide to make a habit of buying ALL your groceries with gift cards, the discount on your dues can be quite significant. To look at it another way, if you convince a few friends and relatives, who are not B'nai Tikvah members, to purchase giftcards in your name, you theoretically can get a check at the end of the year instead of a bill for dues.

The statement in last month's article was editorialized and not based on fact with regard to any possible dues increase. No meetings or decisions (at the time of this writing) have been made by the budget committee regarding this matter.

We apologize for any confusion.

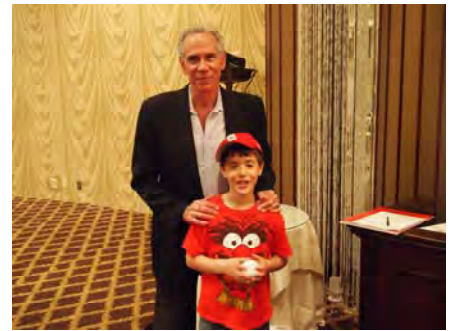

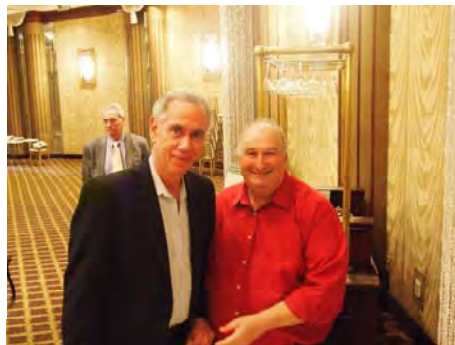
