The wonderful movie *Field of Dreams* tells the story of a man with a vision. In his field in Iowa, a farmer builds a baseball field that allows the ghosts of the greats to come back and play once again. And people come from all around, inspired by his vision. They come, it is explained, because baseball “reminds us of all that once was good and it could be again.”

Perhaps the most touching moment in the movie is when the Iowa farmer sees his estranged father's ghost—not as an old, bitter, man, but as a young ball player in his prime. The farmer says, “I only saw him years later when he was worn down by life.”

It's an exquisite movie, one of the greatest sports movies ever made. But it is a movie, after all. It's not the way we bring back the greatness of the past. It's not the way we grapple with being worn down by life—and we all get worn down by life. We do indeed need to be reminded of all that once was good, and could be good again, but we don't do it in the bleachers.

We do it in shul. In fact, that's what the entire drama of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur is really all about. It is the time when we hit the reset button, roll back the years, start all over again. It's the time when we can return to our true selves—not worn down by life, but invigorated by it.

In the movie, the farmer reconciles with his father by having a simple game of catch. We, on the other hand, have to reconcile with the ghosts of the past by the transformation of our behavior. It takes a miracle to bring back the dead in order to play catch with them. It also takes a miracle to bring back all the actions we regret, all the mistakes, all the missteps, and start afresh.

The difference between the two miracles is that the movie miracle happens only on the screen. The miracle of beginning anew happens in real life. And it happens every year, if only we choose to participate in it.

The miracle is called teshuvah: seeking repentance. But just as in the movies, it doesn't happen by itself. *Field of Dreams* tells us, “If you build it, they will come.” We have to do the building of our new/old selves, and this is what we do throughout the High Holy Day season.

The “first pitch” of this penitential season is the ceremony of *selichot*. This is when we begin to admit to ourselves how we have been worn down by life, and how desperately we need to restore our souls. It is a beautiful and touching ceremony that is held every year, but this year it's going to be something special.

From the Desk of Cantor Bruce Rockman

A Summer Day



A typical summer day in Jerusalem; the sky was deep blue and cloudless with the sun bathing the golden Wall. The plaza was quiet; there were few afternoon visitors. July 4th is an ordinary day in Israel while Independence Day is special for all Americans and is also my brother Spencer's birthday. This day was the last day of Spencer's mission to work with immigrant children in Beer Sheva through soccer. We were all excited that we were going to see him at the Kotel!

I heard an actor say, "Who knew that, at this age, I would still be growing up?" How true is that? This statement is so comforting to me; it reveals that we have so much to learn, so much to live for, and that life's possibilities remain infinite and the opportunity to improve is always ours. Asking God for inspiration is important; finding motivation is not always so easy.

My son Rafi is seven years old and, in school, he has learned about the Kotel and other sites in Israel. The more I try, the more difficult it is for me to explain what I saw that day at the Western Wall. Intuitively, Rafi approached the Wall and gently placed his small hands firmly on the ancient rocks. He alternately swayed and laid his head against the Wall, which is framed by the private prayers of so many pilgrims. Mostly he stood very still, hugging the giant stones. I was witnessing my child experiencing an extraordinary spiritual experience. I was excited, I became emotional. I was surprised.

I watched and wondered what was happening. I have never seen my son do this. He is in shul every Shabbat, most of his time is spent "exploring" B'nai Tikvah with his buddies. Rafi and Bashe pray daily in school, but this was different. I was blown away, Rafi seemed to be transported.

After a bit of time, I interrupted him,. We needed to meet Stacey, Bashe, and his uncle. I promised that as soon as Spencer arrived, we would go back to the Wall with him. Rafi agreed and held me to my word, he needed to pray some more.

He prayed without a siddur and I asked what he was doing... "saying every prayer that I know by heart... I know a lot of prayers!" Later, I asked him how much time had he spent at the Kotel. He replied, "five and a half hours." He believes that. That is all I asked. His experience was his and I thought asking him to explain any more would intrude and possibly confuse the purity of his experience.

Stacey and I had the opportunity and privilege to travel with our children. It was a most special trip for so many reasons. Most of what we did was in and around Jerusalem, where we were staying. We hung out with friends, ate pizza, ice cream, and falafel on Ben Yehuda Street. We went to the mall and shopped for Shabbat in the bustling Machaneh Yehudah Market in the center of the city. We rode buses, taxis, and the new Jerusalem Light Rail. The Israel Museum was very engaging and the Knesset was more interesting and beautiful than we had expected. We loved feeling a part of Israel. The richness of our history is alive in Israel and our pride swells.

Rafi's moment at the Kotel was what the legendary Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heshel refers to as "Radical Amazement." Pay attention, cherish these exquisite moments, slow down and you, too, may become inspired.

Dear God, Draw us Closer. Help us convert our convictions into conduct and our commitments into deeds. Help us to narrow the gap between our principles and our practices, between our aspirations and our actions. Keep us from blaming others for our faults; help us to heal the wounds we have thoughtlessly inflicted.

L'shana Tova Tekateivu, May you be inscribed for a healthy, happy, and meaningful New Year.

ANOTHER VIEWPOINT

A Buba Meisa



A little woman, small and skinny as a weed, with a stern sharp look of a hawk. But when she smiled, the sun came out and my belly felt warm and I walked lightly and didn't feel where my feet touched the floor. Frail to look at, but stronger than a New York traffic cop, my grandmother, we called her the Buba, was the toughest saint who ever put the fear of God into man.

She talked to God as simply as you would talk to a friend or neighbor. In fact, God was her partner. She definitely agreed to keep up her end of the bargain. "But where were you today, Lord? Weren't you watching out for your children? You'd better get back on the job. I can't deal with this mess on my own." And she'd talk to God and reason with and cajole Him, so he helped her to live a life full to bursting. Full enough to spill over onto us so that we could warm ourselves in the drippings. And still so many years later, taste the wine of life of her pressing.

Humility and pride, anathema to each other, were blended into her peanut frame, like the girders and cables engineered into a bridge. Entwined into a work of gossamer appearance, but oh so tough. Tough enough to scrounge for a living in those awful years of the Great Depression that took the heart out of many a man, but she was never too busy to look out for the "poor" people.

Though I didn't know many people who were poorer than the Buba, you would have had a hard time convincing her that she was a pauper. A bed, a roof, some potato soup, and God. "Any fool can see that's all a person needs. Now, I have to get busy and do for the 'urmelyteh,' the poor people." So she took her soapbox wagon and went over to the bakery on Third Avenue to collect the day-old bread. And at other times she went door-to-door to collect old clothes to distribute to the poor.

Dear God, what a way to get rich. Out in all kinds of weather. Broiling thru New York summers and rain drenched in winter, she was always busy carrying something. Never without a bundle or shopping bag, sometimes two. Pneumonia and heart trouble were her constant companions, like wrestlers who traveled together, peacefully tolerating each other, but ready to beat each other's brains out when the match started. Underfed and underdressed... but if you were to suggest that she take one or two of those items for herself, it might fetch a clout on the ear. It would be a sin against God to take something that was

donated to the poor. And certainly she was not one of the poor. Who can say that she was not rich?

When the Home Relief man came from the City Welfare Department to investigate the application that her daughters had filed on her behalf, he did not find a very compliant subject. She felt his questions and suggestions were an affront and threw him out, and turned to honest bootlegging to make a living.

The doorbell rang one afternoon at my parent's home and I ran to open the door. A wild-looking man carrying two five gallon cans ran in, put them into our hall closet, and ran out in a hurry. Later, I found out that he was the Buba's wholesaler. How very fortunate that Prohibition lasted through the Great Depression, thus providing her with a means to make a living. To her, the very idea that good hardworking men of her family could not have a schnapps before supper, or celebrate a wedding or a Bar Mitzvah or bris, was immoral, almost like forbidding matzo for Passover.

Women bear children as God sees fit; Jews eat matzo on Passover; men are entitled to take a drink of good whiskey on occasion. If men or men's laws did not always agree, these tenets certainly did not violate God's laws. So, what was more natural than to buy "good" 180 proof grain alcohol and cut it to 90 proof and sell it to her in-laws, cousins, and landsmen? Or color or flavor it with berries or cherries according to the tastes or interests of the customers. At least they were not in danger of going blind from some "imported" scotch or bathtub gin that was being peddled by the moonshiners of those days.

Who would suspect a stooped little old lady of being a bootlegger? She walked with a shopping bag in each hand (after all, she couldn't always be working for the poor; a person has to make a living also). And when she would come to a busy intersection, what policeman wouldn't stop traffic and lead her, she 'd wink at me and say "If he only knew what I have in these shopping bags." "Wouldn't your belly feel warm if you could remember that you were the grandson who was walking her home? If only those shopping bags could tell the stories of what they had seen.

Years later, when I was older, my uncle Lou told me about an event that occurred one night. He said, "I don't remember where, but it was a cold and nasty night, and in the distance I saw a familiar figure. Could that be

Dear Parents and Students:

As we begin this year, some things will change and some things will remain the same. What will never change are the values that Congregation B'nai Tikvah Religious School holds dear. The commitment to the students will always be a constant. The Religious School will continue to work hard to create an environment where children can develop strong, positive, Jewish identities. Our dedicated staff will provide the students with a stimulating learning experience.

Last year's programs that were successful will remain and some will get tweaked to make them even better. The Aleph Naming Ceremony, The Aleph Consecration, The Gimmel Mock Wedding, The Dalet Tallit Program, The Dalet Bar/Bat Mitzvah Program, and The Hei and Chai Graduation will remain. The popular Yad Program will return for our Hei students. If your child did not make a Yad last year, please contact me so that he/she will be able to participate this year. The Jet Programs will continue for our K-Grade Two parents. Junior Congregation will continue to be an integral part of the curriculum. Your child will participate in The Bet Service, The Gimmel Service and The Dalet Junior Congregation Service. We will be taking another trip this spring. Monthly updates and specific information for all events will continue to be sent home via Constant Contact. Please make sure we have your correct email address.

New this year will be parent discussions with Rabbi Wolkoff. The Aleph Consecration which takes place on a Friday evening now will be preceded by a dinner and the Hei/Chai Graduation will take place on a Sunday morning followed by a brunch. We have added a "Moving On Up" ceremony on a Sunday morning for our Grade Two students. New courses have been added to our Chai School program. We have expanded our K-Grade Two Program. Grades K- One will meet Sunday mornings from 10:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m.

There is an optional, free piece for the K-Grade One students. They may opt to come from 9:00 a.m.-10:00 a.m. Grade Two will now meet from 9:00 a.m.- 12:00 noon. We will end the day on Sundays with a coming together of all our students in the gym. The goal is to give the students a sense of community. The Religious School is now enrolled in the Behrman House Online Learning Center. This center will provide a resource library, communication devices for teachers, students and parents, assessment tools, and more.

Teachers will continue to evaluate students twice a year. Parents will be informed if their child needs help. The Toranim and Mrs. Goldschmitt will be available to work with students who need additional help in their Hebrew studies. Report cards will be given out in January and in May. Our primary grade students will receive a progress report in January and in May. We will have our Parent-Teacher Conferences in January. The teachers will be involved in a new program – "Teachers Mentoring Teachers" - in which teachers will be paired up to support and help each other.

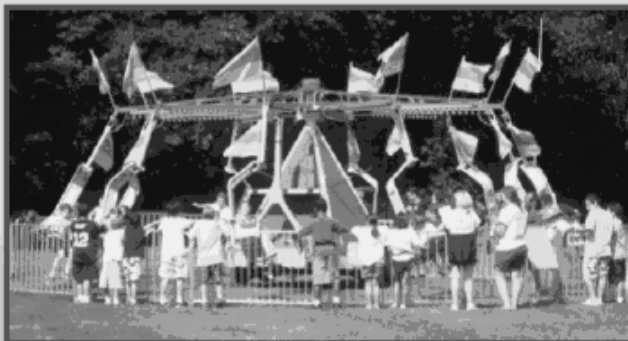

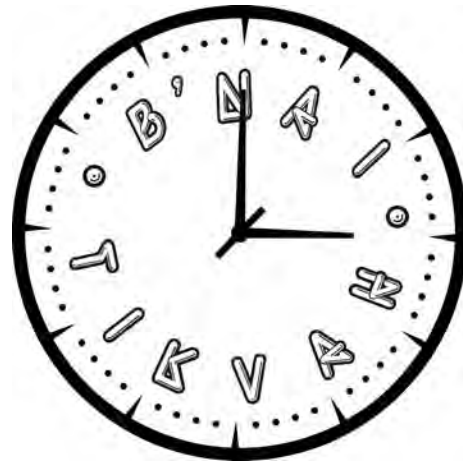

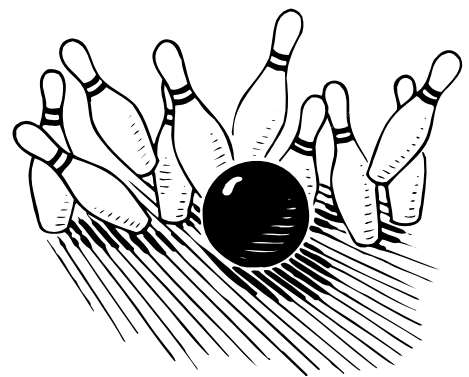
