

A Message From Rabbi Robert Wolkoff



The essence of Jewish life is *halachah*. Often translated as "law," *halachah* actually has a much more subtle meaning. Broadly speaking, *halachah* refers to "guidance as we walk on life's journey." Yes, I know, "law" just seems easier. But when we examine the process by which we decide upon "law," the image of journeying is all the more important. We usually imagine that law is something straightforward and clear cut. "The law is reason, free from passion," wrote Aristotle. Sure. In the world of philosophers, maybe. But not out here in the real world, and the Jewish world is, proudly and consciously, a world of real life, not abstract ideals.

One small problem with Aristotle's view: we aren't all that reasonable, and we are definitely not free from passion.

Enter *halachah*, our guide as we try to maneuver through a world of questions on a path that is anything but straightforward and clear cut. Our attempt to find our way is mediated through our Ritual Committee, one of the glories of Conservative Judaism. On the Ritual Committee, I work together with Cantor Rockman and our lay leadership to understand all the twists and turns each issue presents us.

One question we are examining right now: Is it possible for two people to share an *aliyah* to the Torah? The answer is clear for Aristotle, maybe (not that he would think very often about *aliyot*, but that's another story). But for us, the answer is not clear at all. It is profoundly linked to various passions—all of which are in conflict, as passions usually are. Let's examine some aspects of the question.

First, there is the theological aspect (putting G-d first sounds like a good idea, no?). The *aliyah* is for the purpose of reciting a *berachah*, a blessing. It is a moment of high ritual drama, an echo of receiving the Torah at Mt. Sinai. It should be a profoundly serious (although not necessarily solemn) moment. The blessing should be done correctly, and clearly. And when two people do the *berachah* together, it often doesn't come out right at all.

On the other hand (don't you just love that phrase?), there is the personal aspect of the question. Not everyone feels comfortable standing in front of a couple of hundred people and reciting something in a language they don't understand. Perhaps they need the support of another person standing and chanting next to them? After all, we've known from nursery school that it's easier to sing together than to sing solo. And maybe we should be putting those individual needs first. G-d can handle it even if the *berachah* comes out garbled. He's a big G-d. And, then, there's the familial aspect of it. When a husband and wife come up to celebrate their anniversary, or the parents of a Bar/Bat Mitzvah come up to celebrate their child's transition to adulthood, wouldn't we actually *want* them to recite the blessing together?

On the other hand, there is a fourth perspective, the historical one. Our custom at CBT has been to allow only one person to recite the blessing (although couples may come up together). I don't know how it got to be that way, but it got to be that way for a reason. Are we prepared to overturn the custom of our ancestors? Not lightly, I hope. That way leads to chaos. We live at a time of rapid (some might say, maddening) flux in our lives. The shul is one of the few places where we can rely on things being more or less the same. Is it worth sacrificing our continuity in order to have the pleasure of watching two people recite the *aliyah* blessing together?

And, by the way, (issue number five, aesthetics) it isn't always such a pleasure. You would think that people called up for an *aliyah* would know what they are doing. Sometimes yes. Sometimes no. And when it's no, it's *really* no. Painful to listen to, and why should we expect anything different? Uncle Hymie and Aunt Sadie from Seattle are in the *mishpacha*, not in the Mormon Tabernacle Choir. They're here to *kvell*, not croon.

What was that again about reason and the absence of passion?

And the discussion isn't over yet. There's not even enough room on this page to mention all the issues (much less resolve them). But if you would like to participate in the discussion, you're welcome to the next Ritual Committee meeting on February 25th, right after minyan. Come and walk with us a little, as we look for the *halachah* to guide us on life's journey.







THANK YOUNEEDY FAMILY PROGRAM A SUCCESS

This year, we sponsored nine needy families for the holiday. Of these families, two were homeless and recently rented an apartment; one has a terminally ill mother; one is a victim of Storm Sandy, and one has a toddler who is paralyzed from the lip down. Because of our efforts, a total of 39 people will enter the new year with basic things we all take for granted: winter coats, boots, clothing, blankets, pillows, dishes, silverware—and the list goes on and on.

The B'nai Tikvah community ALWAYS responds to calls for help and assistance. When asking for twin mattresses for two people who were sleeping on the floor, one congregant had a contact and was able to get new mattresses and box springs donated.

Other congregants had extra beds they offered to donate which were given to a mother and son who recently moved into an apartment from a shelter. The mother told the social worker that they are the best mattresses she has ever slept on and that she had been planning to buy an air mattress instead. She was so extremely grateful. Another congregant donated a dresser to this mother.

On December 19, six vans and a pick-up truck came to my home and loaded their vehicles with all the purchased goods.

Last year, I reported that the social worker told me that, as she was looking at all the gifts for a particular family at the beginning of the school year, she realized something: one of the boys was sharing one pair of uniform pants with his brother! So she used part of our donation to buy a second pair of pants. She stated that our gifts will make a significant difference in this family's daily life.

This year, as she was picking up the gifts for another family, she told me that the gifts we provided last year's family were **LIFE CHANGING**. 

A gift of Time

In January, I reported for Jury Duty as summoned. In previous times, I was either easily excused for valid reasons or just fortunate not to be assigned to a case.

This time was different. I was chosen early to be on a case that was estimated to take about three weeks. There seemed to be a large enough pool of potential jurors but, I was among the first selected to sit in the jury box.

The selection process was into its 2nd day and I was, unknowingly at the time, joined by another B'nai Tikvah congregant. The congregant pointed this out to the judge and after, conferring with both of us, concurred that neither of us would be influenced by the other and we would both remain on the jury. A short while later, one of the defense attorneys apparently disagreed and excused the other congregant.

Now I was sure my fate was sealed and, if the jury selection process was any indication, I would be obligated to serve for three weeks and perhaps longer. But then, about an hour later, another attorney said "dismiss juror #12" [me] without any explanation, according to procedure.

Although I couldn't help but feel insulted for a very brief moment, I suddenly felt as though I was given three extra weeks of life to do with as I please. I hadn't felt this way since the day I was discharged from the Army.

But, now, with this new-found freedom, I felt obligated to do something with this gift of three weeks. It truly did feel like a "gift" and I spent the drive home pondering how I would use it wisely.







Respect



Respect for parents is to me as natural as eating and sleeping. There can be disagreements and disappointments and even misunderstandings, but should never be at the cost of disrespect. Certainly, I never saw disrespect in my home growing up. To me it was totally alien.

When I was about 19 years old and before Mili began to take me seriously, I was introduced to a girl who was the daughter of one of my father's lanzman. The families had been friends since Europe before WWII and so I was made welcome in their home. The girl, whose name escapes me, was a natural blond, as was her younger sister, with light blue eyes and skin like milk. A natural knockout.

She introduced me to her friends who were a bit older than me and somewhat more sophisticated, which made me a bit uncomfortable, but not enough to turn me off. Home telephones were still not common in those days, and neither of us had one. But what was usually done was to simply knock on the door and say hello. Although I was much welcomed by the family due to the long-standing relationship with my parents, I was never sure how I stood with their daughters.

The relationship with their older daughter had never matured further than attending a few house parties with her friends, when one evening I went over to visit. A few months after we had met we sat in conversation, her father came over to ask her something and she showed her annoyance with his intrusion. I can still remember how in that moment I was turned off in an instant. I went cold. I had never seen anyone of my generation speak so disrespectfully to a parent. I left and never went back.

I saw her again about ten years later. It was after the war (WWII), and Mili and I had been married and by that time had children. It was at a dinner dance fundraiser run by my father,s Jewish Society. As I danced on the floor with Mili, the blond passed nearby and we locked eyes and waved to each other. I was never happier. Here I was dancing with the love of my life; Mili was still blossoming and the other was beginning to show signs of fading in her appearance.

When I thought of the respectful and loving relationship that Mili had with her parents and with mine, and that we had with each other, it was like a renewal of my life with life.

The degree of respect that one shows for another; friend, family, or stranger, is to me a scale on which to measure the nature of another's character.

Show me a little respect and I'll give you a lot. Show me none and I'll give you snot. It's not Longfellow, but that's how I feel about it.
