A Message From Rabbi Robert Wolkoff



The Jewish world has been rocked by scandal. Again. Not too long ago, we suffered through pictures of rabbis being led away in handcuffs after having been arrested for corruption and money laundering. Now, the front page news involves a rabbi secretly taking pictures of women going to the *mikvah*.

It's hard to find words to describe how disgusting this is. Of course, it is an act of profound sexual impropriety. What makes it worse, though, is that this took place not in a locker room (which, to be sure, would be horrible enough), but rather in a place that in Judaism has always been considered the epitome of sanctity and modesty. It really is hard to imagine anything more stunningly inappropriate. Sacrificing a pig on the altar of the Temple in Jerusalem is about as close as I can come.

There have been all sorts of responses to this latest *shande*, including enhanced security at *mikvaot*; and the insistence that a woman always be present during immersions of female converts.

Beyond the practical question of how we make women safer at the *mikvah* is another debate: What is it that drives rabbis to do such immoral things?

In a recent article by Jay Michaelson, published in the *Forward* on 11/11/14, the claim is made that the insane stresses on rabbis lead them to do insane things. He writes, "...the high (but not fully known) rate of rabbinic scandals—not to mention less dramatic events, like burnout and breakdowns—suggests a systemic problem. Too many good rabbis are making bad decisions, and too many bad ones are causing tragedies." He goes on to write, "I don't know a single rabbi... who doesn't feel overworked, overstressed and under-supported. Some are struggling with substance abuse or with challenging relationships. Many more are just plain tired. To be sure, few rabbis act as unethically as [the rabbi in the *mikvah* case] is alleged to have done. But almost all face the stress that causes men and women to break..."

He suggests, as a remedy for the rabbinic "powderkeg," four approaches:

1. Congregations should take more ownership of their Jewish lives.
2. Congregations should expect higher spiritual ethical standards from lay leaders.
3. Rabbinic education should include courses on time management, staff management, and donor development.
4. There should be better data about the realities of congregational life.

These are not bad ideas (Lord knows, I wish I had been offered some courses in time management). But (with apologies to *Evita*), "Don't cry for me my kehilla...."

Yes it is true that there are all kinds of stresses in rabbinic life. It's a weird job; trust me. But there's another side to it that Michaelson doesn't mention at all. I can't count the number of times that I have heard people say, "Rabbi, you've really made a difference in my life"; or, "Thank G-d, it's the rabbi;" or "I wouldn't have wanted anyone but you to be there for the bris/baby-naming/bar or bat mitzvah/wedding/funeral." "And in the end, the love you take is equal to the love you make," sang the Beatles.

So I think that Michaelson's thesis—not his suggestions, which are all reasonable on other grounds, but his thesis—is profoundly flawed. When rabbis screw up, they do so for the same reasons that *anybody* screws up—shortsightedness, lack of restraint, succumbing to temptation, a failure of thought and thoughtfulness, self-delusion, and sometimes (but rarely, I think) real evil.

Rabbis don't need special handling. We *all* need special handling, with a lot of respect and compassion and love in the mix. And that's something to which all of us at CBT really can aspire.

Chanukah, a time to Celebrate and to Rededicate

I enjoy recalling all the fun of celebrations from my childhood and I love to relive these happy events with my family. Creating memories - authentic, joyous, and serious - informs our lives and the future of our children and the Jewish people.

I grew up, locally, in Metuchen. Simchat Torah was the biggie in shul when I was a kid. The sanctuary and the social hall were set up just like the High Holidays, with chairs as far as you could see. There wasn't room for dancing with the Torah, but we and our fathers paraded around the entire circumference of the room for 7 hakafote. It really wasn't pretty, it was loud and we all waved our flags until they conveniently became swords! We had a blast, running noisily and sneaking treats as the gabbaim tried to restore order.

The tradition of huge celebrations on Simchat Torah has not ended, but it has become more applicable to urban centers, colleges and traditional communities. We at B'nai Tikvah have celebrated with large crowds when the holiday occurs on a Sunday, but that only happens sporadically.

We are not without our well attended joyous celebrations. Chanukah is huge. Our Chanukah celebrations here and at area bowling alleys are legendary. Simchat Torah marks the conclusion of our major holiday season, which includes Rosh Hashana, Yom Kippur and Sukkoth, all of which are designated in the Torah. Chanukah began much later and is considered a minor but very dynamic holiday.

Briefly, Chanukah is a Jewish holiday that celebrates the victory in 165 B.C.E. of the small Judean nation led by Judah Maccabee over the immense Assyrian-Greek Empire that was attempting to replace Judaism with the worship of idols. After Judah and his small army drove the Assyrian-Greek army out of the Temple (the holiest site in Jerusalem), they performed a rededication ceremony to reclaim their sacred space. In fact, the word "Chanukah" means rededication. Tradition holds that they found only enough pure oil for one day, but that it miraculously lasted for eight, long enough to keep the Temple's sacred light illuminated until new oil could be prepared. And that is the common explanation given for why we light candles for eight nights (courtesy of www.JOI.org).

I asked my kids what their favorite part of Chanukah is. They did not say "presents"!

Please, do you think I believed them? Nice try! Bashe and Rafi agreed that their favorite Chanukah custom is Paul & Ruth Anne's latkes. I believe that like other American winter holiday celebrations, what we all love best is celebrating with our families and our friends.

For me, the most important messages of Chanukah are tolerance, religious freedom, and our rededication to the principles of Torah that will lead to a better world. We have the opportunity to celebrate our holiday uniquely, beautifully and with a totally Jewish flavor. The theme of rededication reminds us of the significance of "*Kedeshaynu B'mitzvotehcha, asking God to instill in us the holiness of Your Mitzvoth.*"

Greetings from Jennifer James, Director of Education



What do Israel and the rainforest have in common? The students in our Dalet and Hei classes could tell you a thing or two about that!

As part of a Judaica curriculum that focuses on living the *mitzvot* through *tikkun olam* (repair of the world) and *gemilut chasidim* (acts of kindness), the sixth and seventh graders in our Religious School spent the past month focusing on the *mitzvah* of *bal taschit*, which commands us not to waste the precious resources of our earth. It is a command that every Jewish environmentalist can identify with, including emerging adolescents who are increasingly aware of and interested in the world around them. As we teach the students, the Torah teaches us all that G-d created our world and that we are partners with G-d in perfecting the world.

To tie this biblical imperative to their 21st century life, their teacher, Carol Winter, and I created experiences connecting *bal taschit* to everything from rainforest preservation to Israeli agricultural technology, from news articles about international environmental preservation efforts to hands-on projects such as recycling our own trash.



If you stroll down our hallway, you will see the beautiful and colorful results of the students' projects on *bal taschit* in tropical rainforests. In case you don't have an opportunity to do that, here is a taste in black-and-white:

To get a taste of how *bal taschit* is put into action in Israel, you might want to check out some short videos on YouTube, including these which the classes viewed and discussed: "A New Leaf: Israel's Green Movement" and "Israel: Leading the World in Water Technology."

Finally, make sure you attend the congregational Chanukah Party on Wednesday, December 17, at 6:00 p.m. in the Social Hall – not only will you enjoy pizza and latkes and candle-lighting and singing with your families in a fantastic communal celebration, you'll also enjoy, first-hand, the fruits of the students' labors: creating art from recycled products!

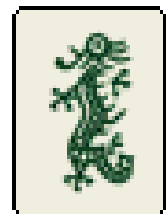

Another Viewpoint



A Buba Meisa

A little woman, small and skinny as a weed, with the stern sharp look of a hawk. But when she smiled, the sun came out and my belly felt warm and I walked lightly and didn't feel where my feet touched the floor. Frail to look at, but stronger than a New York traffic cop, my grandmother, we called her the Buba, was the toughest saint that ever put the fear of God into man.

She talked to God as simply as you would talk to a friend or neighbor. In fact, God was her partner. She agreed to keep up her end of the bargain alright; "But where were you today, Lord? Weren't you watching out for your children? You'd better get back on the job. I can't deal with this mess on my own." And she'd talk to God and reason and cajole Him, so he helped her to live a life full to bursting. Full enough to spill over onto us so that we could warm ourselves in the drippings. And, still so many years later, taste the wine of life of her pressing.

Humility and pride, anathema to each other were blended into her peanut frame, like the girders and cables engineered into a bridge. Entwined into a work of gossamer appearance, but oh so tough. Tough enough to scrounge for a living in those awful years of the Great Depression that took the heart out of many a man, but she was never too busy to look out for the "poor" people.

Though I didn't know many people who were poorer than the Buba. You would have had a hard time convincing her that she was a pauper. A bed, a roof, some potato soup, and God. "Any fool can see that's all a person needs. Now I have to get busy and do for the 'urmelyteh,' the poor people." So she took her soap box wagon and went over to the bakery on Third Avenue to collect the day old bread. And at other times, she went door to door to collect old clothes to distribute to the poor.

Dear God, what a way to get rich. Out in all kinds of weather. Broiling New York summers and rain drenched in winter, she was always busy carrying something. Never without a bundle or shopping bag, sometimes two. Pneumonia and heart trouble were her constant companions, like wrestlers who traveled together, peacefully tolerating each other, but ready to beat each others brains out when the match starts. Under fed and under dressed, but if you were to suggest that she take one or two of those items for herself, it might fetch you a clout on the ear. It would be a sin against God to take something that was donated for the poor. And certainly she was not one of the poor. Who can say that she was not rich?

When the Home Relief man came from the city Welfare Department to investigate the application that her daughters had filed on her behalf, he did not find a very compliant subject. She felt his questions and suggestions were an affront, threw him out, and turned to honest bootlegging to make a living.

The doorbell rang one afternoon at my parent's home, and I ran to open the door. A wild-looking man carrying two five-gallon cans ran in, put them into our hall closet, and ran out in a hurry. Later, I found out that he was the Buba's wholesaler. How very fortunate that Prohibition lasted through the Great Depression, thus providing her with a means to make a living. To her, the very idea that good hardworking men of her family could not have a schnapps before supper, or celebrate a wedding or a Bar Mitzvah or bris, was immoral, almost like forbidding matzo for Passover.

Women bear children as God sees fit, Jews eat matzo on Passover, and men are entitled to take a drink of good whiskey on occasion. If men or men's laws did not always agree, these tenets certainly did not violate God's laws. So what was more natural than to buy "good" 180 proof grain alcohol and cut it to 90 proof and sell it to her in-laws, cousins and landmen? Or color or flavor it with berries or cherries according to the tastes or interests of the customers. At least they were not in danger of going blind from some "imported" scotch or bathtub gin that was being peddled by the moonshiners of those days.

Who would suspect a stooped little old lady of being a bootlegger? She walked with a shopping bag in each hand; after all, she couldn't always be working for the poor, a person has to make a living also. And when she would come to a busy intersection what policeman wouldn't stop traffic and lead her by the elbow across the street? After we crossed the street, she winked at me and said, "If he only knew what I have in these shopping bags." Wouldn't your belly feel warm if you could remember that you were the grandson who was walking her home. If only those shopping bags could tell the stories of what they had seen.

Years later, when I was older, my uncle Lou told me about an event that occurred one night. He said, "I don't remember where, but it was a cold and nasty night, and in the distance I saw a familiar figure. Could that be my mother? I hurried to catch up with her, and sure enough it was Mama. I said, Mama, what are you doing out here? And she said, "I'm taking these bags to a poor family." So I asked, "On a night like this? Here, let me help you". And she said, "No. This I must do myself. If my children don't do enough for God, then I must do this for them."

So, many years after her death in 1945, she is still so much alive that whenever any of us who were old enough to remember her get together, amid tears and laughter, she will be brought to life to caress us or remind us of our shortcomings. What a monument and what an example.

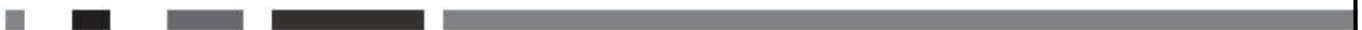
