Rafi Revisits the Kotel

We are all searching for understanding and inspiration; at least we aspire to this lofty goal. My experiences in Israel are special to me. Israel helps me find my spiritual center; I think that I understand myself better, thanks to my connection to Israel. July, 2012, we visited the Kotel and experienced the wall's great influence. I wrote about that experience for Hakol. I've decided to share that post again on my blog, which you can find with my other posts in the "cantor's corner" or in "synagogue news" at www.bnaitikvah.org. I am reposting this piece because of its focus and I believe it helped me by rereading it; maybe you'll like it too.

This summer's visit was different and always special. Through Rafi's young eyes, I recognize how very difficult it is to make these special connections. Now Rafi is 10, he is still my little man...but not so little! Once again, Rafi was very excited to pray at the Kotel but, it seemed to me, that this was a more complicated visit. I still saw his awe and he seemed to be secure of his place at the Kotel, but I was not sure.. he was doing a lot of observing as well as praying.

One month later, I asked Rafi about his experience; what he told was again enlightening. He was returning to a place of comfort with the knowledge that this is the place where he can be himself, not judged by other people. "The first time I went to the wall, I couldn't wait, I heard so much about the Kotel, and it was great. This time I knew what to expect; it was still great but different," Rafi continued. "When you pray in shul or at camp, people listen to you, and I feel judged. They say why is he praying so loud, why is he moving like that, or stuff like that?," Rafi continued, "At the Kotel, you can just be yourself; people hear you and you hear them, but you feel like its all right and they don't mind what you do. One guy just walked up the Wall, kissed it, and walked away; that was cool, I'll never forget that."

Purity and honesty... as we get older, even from 7 to 10, our inhibitions and insecurities mask our feelings and desires. We all feel judged, we're always limiting our expectations and experience because.....just because. You wouldn't think that it would be difficult to get a minyan at the Kotel, would you? I'm sure it's not actually difficult except, how do you find the right minyan at the Kotel? But with so many different Jewish perspectives, the minyan to the right, to your left or right in front of the Kotel, there always seems to be someone searching for number 9 and 10 at the Kotel, not unlike our daily minyan at CBT.

As we pray together this year, let's just strive to be our best selves, no judgments from each other, and continue to be present for each other.

I thank God for Israel, my family and the Jewish people, I love you!

A Message From Rabbi Robert Wolkoff



Dear Secretary Clinton:

I am an American congregational rabbi, writing to you as the presumptive Democratic presidential candidate. Under normal circumstances, my support for you would be virtually automatic, even enthusiastic. Your position on health care, your defense of women, your concern for economic inequality, your desire for a sane immigration policy—all these and many more are areas of agreement between us.

Nevertheless—and it pains me to say this—my support for your candidacy is in doubt. During the years of the Obama administration, in which you served, I have felt insulted, in fact assaulted, by a relentless disdain for the State of Israel's legitimate concerns, concerns I share intensely, intimately, and personally.

The evidence for this disdain is extensive, but please allow me to mention just a few examples.

When President Obama made his famous Cairo speech, he had the opportunity—perhaps, even, the duty—to underscore that the Jewish presence in Israel goes back nearly 4000 years; and that, for Jews, the return to the Land was quite literally a homecoming. Instead, the President emphasized the suffering of Jews in the Holocaust, thereby reinforcing the Arab perspective that Israel is nothing more than an illicit European attempt to compensate for the Holocaust on the backs of the Palestinians. It was a stunningly insensitive comment, made yet more insensitive when considering what a monumental opportunity was missed.

President Obama made the comment that during the Bush years, "nothing got accomplished," and therefore he needed to create "more daylight" between Israel and his administration. I remind you that during the Bush years, Israel uprooted thousands of its citizens from Gaza—one of the most traumatic events in Israel's history—at a cost of well over a billion dollars.

But to President Obama, this is "nothing."

President Obama has given the impression that it is Israeli settlements that are the main impediment to peace with the Palestinians. They may be an impediment to the peace *process*, but to peace? In my view it is the constant and obscene incitement to raw hatred and anti-Semitism by the Palestinian leadership—both the Palestinian Authority and Hamas—that is the ultimate impediment to peace.

President Obama saw fit to insult the Prime Minister of Israel over new construction in Jerusalem—including releasing the details of your conversation with Mr. Netanyahu—but said nothing when the Palestinian Authority, on virtually the same day, honored a terrorist who murdered 38 people (13 of them children). Building homes in Jerusalem is an insult to the United States, but honoring a terrorist is not? President Obama has consistently called upon Jews and Israelis to "search our souls" and "engage in serious self-reflection"—as if there were another group of people on this planet more self-reflective than Jews, and Israeli Jews in particular. One need only pick up an Israeli newspaper to see the agonizing self-reflection and soul-searching that goes on every single day. And, meanwhile, exactly how much "self-reflection" have the Palestinians been asked to do by our administration?

When Jews were murdered in Paris, President Obama referred to them as "a bunch of folks" who were "randomly shot in a deli," even though the terrorist himself admitted that he specifically wanted to kill Jews. By refusing to recognize the unique Jewish identity of the victims, President Obama once again allowed the world to ignore the link between anti-Zionism and anti-Semitism. At the same time, the President demeaned the victims who, in fact, died because of their faith. Imagine, Madame Secretary, the insensitivity of claiming that the victims of lynchings in the South were "a bunch of folks" who were "randomly" murdered—as if racism had nothing to do with it. To hear such words from the President of the United States is simply chilling.

Most recently, in the wake of the Iran nuclear agreement, the President has made thinly veiled references to American Jews as disloyal foreign agents, which is nothing short of disgraceful.

I don't wish to belabor the point with more examples. I want to point only to the consequences of this unremitting animosity from "the bully pulpit": a recent survey indicates that 47% of Democrats consider Israel to be a racist state, and only 48% believe Israel wants peace two propositions I find as repugnant as they are incomprehensible, and, of course, untrue.

I understand that Israel and the United States, as close as they may be, will still have disagreements over policy. The interests of even the closest of allies are never identical. But my concern is not about policy per se. It is about the insidious delegitimization of the Jewish state, with the inevitable consequence of the delegitimization of the Jewish people, to which President Obama has contributed mightily.

I find all this profoundly frightening.

The policy issues I mentioned earlier, on which we agree, are important to me, and, I daresay, to millions of American Jews. But the delegitimization of the State and people of Israel is not an *important* issue. It is an *existential* issue.

So, Madame Secretary, I need to know—clearly, without equivocation or spin—is it your intention to continue this indefensible and dangerous campaign against Israel? Is that what your presidency would be about?

Because if it is, I will not support you. It is as simple as that. What will you do differently?

THANKS FOR THE MEMORIES!

In the latter part of 1948 my group of friends rallied to the call for Blood Donors from the Red Mogen David. Israel was at war, and so we *schlepped* into central Manhattan from the heart of Brooklyn on three occasions to do our part.

Fast-forward four decades to another call from an Israeli: Hadas Elami, then CBT's Administrator, thought it would be wonderful if our South Brunswick Community Blood Bank could run a winter blood drive right there in the synagogue's lovely catering hall. We did, and found it successful enough to continue having a drive each January for the next five years.

Hadas pushed for adding a summer drive, and we capitulated the rest is history. Rabbi Warmflash helped support us financially, Rabbi Eligberg was a continuing donor, as was Rabbi Goldstein. Our caterer allowed us use of his cable TV connection so our donors could watch NFL playoffs each January while they filled their collection bags.

I want to thank my wife, Shirley, for her support and for working every drive with me. And our thanks go to so many CBT synagogue members who pitched in with registrations, escorting donors, and manning the refreshments table. And, of course, to all those who've been our regular and/or occasional donors.

And so it's continued these 27-years, with a final total of 1,573-units collected...and since one pint of donated blood can potentially save three lives, we can assume we've helped 4,719 folks back to health.

We're now retired from the Blood Drive game. The billboard and its companion curbside sign are in the temple's storeroom.

We hope some younger adults will pick up the torch and carry on this *mitzvah*.





Krav Maga, paddleball, football, and Maccabi Games will be the vehicle for learning about Israel's history and culture through sports.

Cooking will be the vehicle for learning about the Jewish relationship with food – not only kashrut but also the ethics of GMOs, animal ethics, and the Jewish response to ending hunger.

A special "mini-mester" on Holocaust studies, culminating with a trip to the Museum of American Jewish Heritage in New York City.
