OUR PURIM CELEBRATION IS COMING!

The Jewish month of Adar is known as a month of celebration and happiness, Adar contains the joyous holiday of Purim that takes place mid-month. This year Adar comes back for seconds. The Jewish leap year, occurs approximately once every three years. To assure that the lunar months of the Jewish year stay in sync with the solar calendar, an additional month of Adar is added. Purim is celebrated in the second Adar. We will be celebrating with the whole megilla, hearing and experiencing the story of Purim, with costumes, karaoke and more on Wednesday evening and Thursday morning, March 23 and 24.

In addition to Purim miracle of survival, Adar is considered to be a month of good fortune for the Jewish people. The zodiac sign for Adar is Pisces, fish or *dagim* in Hebrew. In Jewish tradition, fish are a sign of blessing and fruitfulness. Also, just as fish live in water, the Jewish people thrive when immersed in the Torah, which is compared to life-giving water. My sweet daughter Bashe, my cool brother Ron, and I were all born during Adar. The Rockmans love a good party, Adar is a very happy time of celebration for us!

A Message From Rabbi Robert Wolkoff



The upcoming holiday of Purim takes place in the month of Adar. Our tradition teaches: “When Adar begins, we increase our joy.” The Hebrew word for “increase,” “*marbim*,” is active and reflexive. It’s not just that our joy somehow increases. We are tasked with *making* our joy increase.

This manifests itself in two of the special mitzvot for Purim, *mishloach manot* (known traditionally as “*shloach manos*”) and *matanot levyonim*, giving gifts to the poor.

There is a special quality to both of these mitzvot: they build relationships.

Matanot levyonim, gifts to the poor, are not your normal charity. In fact, if you set aside a certain percentage of your income for charity (“tithing”), you aren’t allowed to use that money for *matanot levyonim*. And if you fulfill the mitzvah of *matanot levyonim*, you do not thereby fulfill your mitzvah of giving *tzedakah*.

Also, the second highest form of *tzedakah* is where both the giver and the receiver are unknown to each other (the highest form of *tzedakah*, in case you’re wondering, is where you arrange for the poor person’s employment, so he or she won’t even need *tzedakah*). *Matanot levyonim* is different. Here, the giver and the receiver should actually meet face to face. The giver needs to know there are people in need, and the receiver needs to know there are people who care.

Mishloach manot is also not charity, and is also not anonymous. Here, you give people a couple of different kinds of ready-to-eat food (for example, a Jaffa orange and some *hamantaschen*), not because they are in desperate

need of it (although I have felt myself, on occasion, in desperate need of an apricot *hamantaschen*...), but simply because you want to give a gift for the sake of giving a gift.

The impact of these two mitzvot, *matanot levyonim* and *mishloach manot*, is perfectly clear. They aren’t about

“problem solving.” They are about building community through building relationships. These are *mitzvot* that were formed in the crucible of communal persecution, when the life of the Jewish community was hanging by a thread. Right now, thank G-d, we are not similarly threatened. Nevertheless, we are obligated each year to take active steps in order to enhance our communal solidarity and create harmony in our Jewish society.

And this is a principle that is not limited to Purim. We need to constantly refine and strengthen our communal relationships. The fact that we can increase our joy implies that we can decrease it as well, if we are not careful.

If, for example, we are not careful about the way we speak to each other, we run the risk of doing permanent damage. Allowing our words to be shaped by our moods is foolhardy at best.

A mood can change in an instant. The impact of words can last a lifetime.

So, too, is our unwitting neglect of even our friends’ deepest feelings. A story is told of a conversation between two friends.

“Do you love me?” asked one.

“Of course I love you!” said the other.

“Do you know what hurts me?” asked the first one.

“No, I don’t know what hurts you,” answered the second one.

“If you don’t know what hurts me,” replied the first one, “how can you say you love me?”

And so, finally, there is our inclination to be critical and unforgiving. We have a tendency to expect others to be better than they are. We also have an inclination to think ourselves better than we are. It should be the other way around. We should expect a great deal of ourselves, and much less of others.

On Purim, we can give gifts to the poor and *shlach manos*. All year round, we can give the gifts of gentle speech, empathic love, humility, and forgiveness. And in so doing, we will continually “increase our joy.” Have a wonderful Purim!

CBT Religious School and CBT Chai

Jennifer James, Director of Education



Because my role at B'nai Tikvah as Director of Education often has me acting as a teacher, it may surprise many to know that I consider myself first and foremost to be a learner. Learning new things is always exciting to me. Learning more deeply about Judaism, and learning new ideas for how to bring Judaism to life for others, is more than exciting -- I find it energizing and deeply meaningful, and it helps me to be a better educational leader. I experienced a wonderful opportunity for such learning when I recently attended the annual conference of the Jewish Educators Assembly.

The JEA is the professional association of educators and educational leaders for the Conservative movement. At the recent conference, Jewish educators from across North America gathered to share ideas and new approaches, to swap stories about our schools, to brainstorm solutions to challenges that face us all, and to worship and form friendships and strengthen professional relationships. One of the best things, for me, about such an experience is having the opportunity to talk with others who have responsibilities at their schools that are similar to my responsibilities here at B'nai Tikvah. I get a window into how different and also how similar our experiences can be. For example, at lunch one day I sat with an educator from a large conservative congregation in Michigan and also an educator from the tiny Jewish community of Winnipeg, Canada. Based on my previous experiences at professional conferences and seminars, it was no surprise to hear, from educators in such different communities, common challenges such as how we can fit thousands of

years worth of prayer, tradition, holidays, and history into only a few hours a week, over nine months of the year. This is the reality in synagogue education, and a challenge which I love to address. And every time I have a conversation such as the one I had at lunch, I come away with a new idea from my colleagues or a spark for my own imagination that could work for us here in New Jersey. I also feel a sense of optimism for both our school and for the future of the Jewish people.

I love these conferences, too, because of the Jewish learning I receive for myself. At the recent JEA conference, I was able to study with the Chair of T'filah Education at Gratz College in Philadelphia and with the Dean of the Davidson School of Education at the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York. Their teachings -- particularly on the subject of teaching Jewish values through the language of t'filah, to bring Hebrew to life and meaning to prayer -- I found moving and inspiring. When I continue my own personal Jewish learning, I feel anew how privileged I am to be a Jew and how deeply I love our traditions. Having new insights helps me appreciate them all the more.

In the end, I came away from the JEA conference with pages and pages of notes, some new books and materials for our teachers to use with their classes, and a sense of excitement and energy for the work ahead. As we schedule more meetings for the Tikvah Talk listening campaign, and as I plan for how to implement the feedback I receive from those meetings into Religious School next year, I look forward to sharing these thoughts and ideas with you.
