From the Desk of Cantor Bruce Rockman



With Help from God, You Can Do Better....Still We are all sinners. Each year, at this season we gather to cleanse our souls. It is an awesome time, Jews everywhere pour out their deepest regrets to directing their prayers to God while also attempting to make amends with the physical world.

It has always seemed odd to me that we pay so much attention to requesting forgiveness from God above, who we understand to be all forgiving, while we should be pleading our case to the person that is sitting next to us.

Liel Lebowitz in Tablet, the Jewish online magazine wrote "Judaism differentiates among different degrees of being bad—

- 1. Cheit, a sin performed inadvertently.
- 2. Avon, a sin committed under the sway of wild desire.
- **3. Pesha**, a hardened and deliberate rebellion against God.

The first category calls for abundant compassion; the word **cheit** literally means "missing the mark," suggesting that the sinner is more of an errant archer than a smooth criminal.

The third category, naturally, involves stern retribution, as rising up against the Lord isn't something to be trifled with.

The second category is the most difficult to understand. The Rambam addresses this question in his Mishneh Torah, and it finds him in a gentle, forgiving mood: Speak softly and kindly, he counsels of anyone addressing those who've committed an **avon**; show the sinners respect, and speak so as to benefit—never to humiliate—them".

The challenge for each of us therefore extends beyond our visits to the synagogue, praying as a community is the genesis of being forgiven. Forgiveness, surely, can be a very difficult process. Forgiveness is NOT denial, is NOT pardoning our behavior, NOT excusing your actions, such as "But it was not my fault!" Forgiveness is certainly NOT condoning what we did, as "you didn't do anything wrong!" Forgive and learn is good approach, but forgive and forget is NOT forgiveness.

Forgiveness IS a decision to release your negative feelings, it is a response, choosing a more positive answer to a mistake. Forgiveness IS an attitude, by having a forgiving attitude, you can change your life and the lives of the people you care about most. Forgiveness IS a process; you can get started now, it can take time to heal old wounds. Forgiveness IS a skill, it is learnable, emphasize your compassionate nature. Forgiveness IS a behavior; forgiveness is the way that you think about things, being an understanding person, looking for the good in people.

Liel Lebowitz recounts "The Hasidic master's Hasidic master, Reb Zusha, born in 1718 in Galicia, was an expert in many things, most impressively the ability to see the divine spark that burns even in the darkest transgressions.....We all mean well. We all try. We all fail. The point is to keep trying. Zusha understood that perfectly. On his deathbed, goes another story, the old rabbi sat and wept bitterly. His students, gathered around him, speculated about what could make their rabbi so despondent. "I bet he's crying," said one, "because he fears that when he meets God, the Almighty will tell him he was not quite as righteous as King David." "No," argued another, "it's because he fears that God, when he meets him, will tell him he was not quite as holy as Moses." Overhearing the conversation, Reb Zusha lifted his head and smiled. "The only thing that truly frightens me," he told his students, "is to meet God and have Him tell me 'Zusha, you have not been the best Zusha you can be." We should all share the same concern. Nothing else truly matters.

Forgiveness IS an emotional change, forgiveness has many facets. In our petitions and offers of forgiveness we are sure to include God, our family, our friends, our acquaintances and we must also learn to forgive our OURSELVES.

I wish you a sweet, peaceful, healthy and meaningful New Year.

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A Message From Rabbi Robert Wolkoff



"Lord, open my lips, and my mouth will declare your praise."

These are the words, always spoken in silence, that we say before we recite the Amidah prayer, a high point of our daily services. It calls our attention to the paradox at the core of prayer. On the one hand, we presume that when we pray, we pray. It seems that if we choose to pray, we are the ones who initiate it. Putting the meditation before the Amidah tells a different story. It tells us that if we pray, it is because G-d has helped us to do so.

Of course, it doesn't feel like that, at least not initially.

And yet, we still pray.

We pray to be part of a community. When we hear Cantor Rockman chant the melodies that are so familiar to us—kol nidrei, ad-nai ad-nai, romemu—we know that we are where we are supposed to be. And with the people we are supposed to be with. We build community when we kibbitz with our neighbor, too, and that's important. That's why we always have a whole kibbitzing room set up for the High Holy Days. But kibbitzing with our neighbor is not as communally binding as praying with our neighbor. When we kibbitz together, we stay on the same level. When we pray, we rise to a higher level.

On that higher level, we find another reason to pray: to communicate. We pray in order to "declare." We declare our praise, and our needs, and our gratitude. We declare our beliefs, our hopes, and our visions. We declare who we are.

But that leaves open the question of who we should be.

And that brings prayer to a higher level still. For prayer is an opportunity to still our internal dialogue, our constant and endless narration of our lives (the stock market, the weather, the game last night, the to-do list....) and instead let G-d speak to us. This is the most difficult aspect of prayer for most of us. Our minds are cluttered. We are literally full of ourselves. And that crowds out the voice of G-d. This level of prayer offers us stillness and rest. It allows us to become mindful.

Community. Communication. Contemplation. The world of prayer. Community is social. Communication is cognitive. And contemplation is, well, contemplative. Each of us finds ourselves in a different place in the world of prayer, and each of us is on our own journey, moving in our own direction. But we move together, sharing a tradition, a liturgy, and a sacred space. In the year to come, my hope is to help people along on their journeys, to better understand how prayer can enhance our lives on every level, and bring us even closer together for a wonderful new year at CBT.

On behalf of Ruth-Ann and our children, I wish you a *shanah tova umetukah*, a sweet and healthy—and prayerful—new year.

The holidays are too early, the holidays are too late, how come no one ever says they are right on time? After all, with the Jewish calendar, we all know that each year, holidays move around the secular calendar and don't always start when you want them to. This year, Chanukah starts on Christmas Eve and ends on New Year's day....who ever heard of such a thing? A few years ago, it started on Thanksgiving (the classic "Thanksgivukah"), which made for all types of creative latkes and turkey-shaped menorahs. But no matter how much we complain, Chanukah is always on the same date of the Hebrew year - 25 Kisley and the first day of Rosh Hashanah is always on the 1st day of Tishrei. So why is it always a surprise? Ruth Anne's father, of blessed memory, was born on the 5th night of Chanukah but when he came to this country as a young boy, his birthday became December 5th. Of course half the family became Koenick and half became Cohen, but that is for another time.

No matter when the various holidays arrive, there is always so much going on at our congregation – religious, educational, social and spiritual – and always with that special B'nai Tikvah spirit. On Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, our sanctuary and social hall are filled to the brim and at Ne'elah, everyone has a few moments to say a special prayer before the open ark – as individuals, as families, and

as communities of friends. Chanukah brings a night of community celebration and candle lighting. This past year, we added to our Passover festivities a 3rd Seder, a night of song, prayer, good food (yes, Passover food can be good) and a strong feeling of community. In between an array of programs reinforcing our commitment to and love of Israel, we also had an amazing gala, a Purim pub crawl, baseball games, movies, picnics, Sundaes on Saturday, and so much more.

So start the Jewish year off right, get involved, join a committee, Sisterhood or Men's Club. Come to a congregation meeting and have your voice heard. Volunteer to help sell scrip or help the office with mailings. Come to Shabbat services and feel the spiritual companionship. This year, the Rabbi is focusing his educational programs on prayer. So many of us pray, but aren't so sure why we stand or sit during certain prayers, or even what we are saying. Why do we lightly tap our chest over our heart during the Yom Kippur confessional? So many questions, and because we are Jewish, so many answers and opinions. There is something for everyone at B'nai Tikvah. We look forward to seeing everyone take part and growing together.

CBT Religious School and CBT Chai

"Turn it on turn it and turn it again, for everything is in it."

What is the "it" in this rabbinic sentence?" "It" is Torah! And every week in religious school, our students turn it and turn it again, trying to see how, even in their young modern American lives, everything is in Torah.

Each Sunday morning, every one of our religious school classes says the blessing for Torah study and then engages with the weekly Torah portion the partial a shovel. Our young learners in kindergarten and first and second grade learn the stories, talk about what they thing the stories are telling us and what they stories make them feel, and often do projects that are both fun and helpful memory tools. From Kitah Alef (third grade) on up through CBT Chai, the students engage in increasingly sophisticated discussions about the meaning of the weekly parsha. Our teachers choose an aspect of the parsha that they think might spark interest in their learners, or lead to drawing a connection between the Torah and their own lives.

Here is an example from Mrs. Winter's Alef class on the first day of Religious School recently:

This week's parsha was Shoftim which means "judges." It starts by telling us something that seems very obvious. The Torah tells us that we should have "judges and policemen in all of our cities." We spoke about what the children think our world would be like if there were no rules, or if they were not enforced. This parsha is all about justice and forgiveness (between people, cities, countries, and even justice for the earth we live on). This Torah por-

tion can also be greatly connected to the upcoming holidays of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur because it is all about justice and forgiveness, and so is Yom Kippur.

Parsha Shoftim also says that we have a responsibility to take care of our environment as Jews. I asked the class how we can do that? Their answers were great-- pick up garbage, don't litter, recycle, don't pollute, and plant trees and take care of them.

Other classes focused on the repetition of certain words in the parsha and talked about the possible meanings of repetition in Torah; and some older students talked about dispensing justice ethically, and how that might look different today than in ancient times.

Many Jewish religious schools approach the Torah as a grade-year subject: in third grade the children will learn about the stories in B'reishit (Genesis), and in fourth grade they will learn about the stories in Sh'mot (Exodus) . . . and then pretty much leave it at that, without ever reaching the other books in the Torah or revisiting those first two books. We choose a different approach at B'nai Tikvah. We choose for our young Jews to engage with the Torah on the same cycle with all Jews everywhere. When a portion is being read on Shabbat, that same portion is being examined by our Religious School students the next day. This increases awareness among our students that we are not learning in a vacuum, and exposes them to far more aspects of the Torah. There are lessons to be learned and connections to be drawn from even the most seemingly arcane parsha in Vayikra (Leviticus), Bamidbar (Numbers) and D'varim (Deuteronomy).

No matter how many years our students go through this cycle of studying Torah, they will never run out of new things to learn and interesting ideas to consider. They will turn it and turn it and turn it again, and hopefully find out for themselves that everything is in it.



Weekday evening services only take about 15 minutes of your time. Weekday morning services last about an hour.

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

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
