Chanukkah at the White House

On December 14th President Barak and Michelle Obama hosted their eighth and final Chanukah party in the White House. It was a strictly kosher event, as this party has been since President George W. Bush hosted it. Although I was not present, I felt as if I was there in spirit. The President's words were inspiring. Presidents Bush's and Obama's embrace of the Jewish people is reassuring and I'm confident that President-elect Trump will continue this important and significant tradition. Events like this are a great diversion from the news and controversies of every day and an example of that diversity is a strength of our great country. I will continue to be optimistic and pledge, like we all should, to do daily acts of loving-kindness. We are so blessed to live in a country where a kosher affair is a big deal.

On a very personal note, I am the proud uncle of Chanan Weissman, the White House Liason to the Jewish Community, who organized this year's event that brought together some of the most consequential American Jewish leaders to the President's Hanukkah celebration.

As we celebrate Chanukah, Israel and America, we are strengthened by the knowledge that the Jewish people are recognized and appreciated for our very many great contributions to society and the world. We can continue to strive to be the best citizens of the world by being the best Jewish people that we can be, always a light unto the nations.

As the light of the menorah intensifies, so does our resolve to speak out against injustice and teach our children by our words and our deeds.

Thank you. Cantor Rockman,

"Today in the White House, as you will soon do in your homes, we recall Hanukkah's many lessons: How a small group can make a big difference. That's the story of the Maccabees' unlikely military victory, and of great moral movements around the globe and across time. How a little bit can go a long way, like the small measure of oil that outlasted every expectation. It reminds us that even when our resources seem limited, our faith can help us make the most of what little we have. The small State of Israel and the relatively small Jewish population of this country have punched far above their weight in their contributions to the world. So the Festival of Lights is also a reminder of how Isaiah saw the Jewish people, as a light unto the nations.

This is the season that we appreciate the many miracles, large and small, that have graced our lives throughout generations, and to recognize that the most meaningful among them is our freedom. The first chapter of the Hanukkah story was written 22 centuries ago, when rulers banned religious rituals and persecuted Jews who dared to observe their faith. Which is why today we are asked not only to light the menorah, but to proudly display it -- to publicize the mitzvah.

This Hanukkah, let us take Hillel's vision of increasing the light seriously, and work to ignite and fan the flames of justice and freedom within our hearts and hands. May the memories of those we have lost, the commitment to legislative battles yet to be won, and the burden and yoke of our work keep the fire in our souls burning and ascending long after the flames of the Hanukkah Menorah are extinguished.



In the Talmud (Yoma 69b), there is a stunning and cryptic discussion about how we grapple with our *yetzer hara*, our evil inclination. The rabbis ask why we have an evil inclination at all. The answer suggested is that we receive reward for resisting our worst temptations. To which the rabbis respond, "We want neither the evil inclination nor the reward for resisting it." And then something extraordinary happens. A written tablet comes down from heaven for them, inscribed with a single word: "Truth." From which Rabbi Hanina concludes that the seal of the Holy One is truth.

The story goes on to say that the rabbis succeeded in capturing the evil inclination, but the world started to collapse. They "looked in the whole land of Israel for a fresh egg and could not find it."

To sum up the story: Passions are unavoidable, and even necessary. But they must be balanced, and tempered, by the truth.

This is a view which, under current circumstances, must give us pause. Because if there is anything clear about the state of the world today, it is that truth is in short supply. Instead, in the words of Steven Colbert, we have "truthiness," things that sound vaguely real but have no relationship with the facts.

There is history here, and shared blame. It starts on the Left, which introduced us to the concept of "narratives." According to this view—endemic on college campuses—there is no firm, absolute, objective truth. Everyone sees things their own way, and in particular sees things from the perspective of their own power position.

Simply put, "One man's terrorist is another man's freedom fighter."

Which is decidedly wrong, and incredibly dangerous. And—to boot—is a recipe for endless conflict, since it means that narrative "truth" shifts as power shifts, and power always shifts. In other words, instead of fostering restraint of our worst inclinations, transforming truth into self-centered "narrative truth" serves only to aggravate and accentuate those inclinations.

That was bad enough. In recent times, it has gotten worse. Those who propagated the idea of "narrative truth" at least attempted to rely on facts. They interpreted those facts in their own way, based on their own judgments and prejudices, and ignored the facts they didn't like, ("all the news that fits, we print"), but for the most part they tried to stick to the facts. Now, the buzz-word is "post-factual." It used to be that truth was based on how well-informed a person was. Now, "truth" is based on how intensely one feels. And that has two perverse consequences. The first is that "fake news" has become just as real as "real" news. The bizarre conspiracy theory about a pizza shop in Washington D.C being a cover for a pedophilic ring led by Hillary Clinton—which almost got people killed when a vigilante walked in with a rifle to "investigate"—is just the latest example of "fake news"

And the second consequence is perhaps worse. People actually avoid looking for and understanding facts, because facts that contradict preconceptions may be emotionally troubling. Which traps them even further in a world divorced from reality.

This, when put in religious terms, is a good description of idolatry. The seal of the Lord is truth, said Rabbi Hanina. When we cast truth to the ground, either to support our narrative or to coddle our emotions, we blaspheme. We make of our feelings and our prejudices an idol to be worshipped. Everyone has a right to their opinion. No one has the right to distort or ignore the facts. Because to do so allows us to justify evil with some "truthy" explanation, and that is an open invitation to our yetzer hara, our evil inclination, to bring out the worst in us.
