From Rabbi Robert L. Wolkoff

If Only We Could Put G-d First



There is a well-known sign that can be found in many offices. It reads something like this:

"Rule #1: The boss is always right.

Rule #2: When the boss is wrong, refer to Rule #1."

This is the stuff that the comic strip Dilbert thrives on: unrestrained ego, job tyranny, hierarchy, orders.

There is another sign, much less well known, but infinitely more palatable. It was seen on the desk of the CEO of a shoe company. It read:

"G-d first. Shoes second."

The ability to put G-d first is truly a gift, a gift that we give not only to others, but also to ourselves. An inflated ego is not a sign of power or status, but rather of weakness and pretension. Recognizing this is a blessing in every way. At the very least, such recognition would keep us from sounding silly. This is illustrated by a story told of the famous socialite Dorothy Parker. She once found herself at a cocktail party at which someone praised another prominent woman by saying, "She's very kind to her inferiors." Dorothy Parker responded, as only she could, "And where does she find them?"

How much healthier it would be if we could only put G-d first and everything else—including ourselves—second! If only we could learn to act consistently with *derech eretz*, with basic decency! If only we could see in each person a little bit of the divine, rather than a mere object on which we can try to impose our will!

In its most radical form, pretensions of superiority can lead to murder. The endless school shootings, and other examples of mayhem and murder are perfect illustrations of this. On a smaller scale, though, we can see the impact of these pretensions in our day-to-day interpersonal relations.

All of us, at one time or another, take upon ourselves the role of guardian of some high moral principle. We may indeed be justified in doing so. We may indeed be sincere. But that's not necessarily enough to keep our egos in check. Sometimes we espouse our principles at the sacrifice of the respect for the personal integrity of the persons to whom we are speaking—or, more accurately, pontificating.

The insistence on morals and standards is important, to be sure. Especially at this time of year, we should be thinking of such things. But putting high-minded principles ahead of flesh-and-blood people is usually getting things exactly wrong.

There are, of course, some exceptions. It's all right if you step on a person's foot or feelings when you are trying to save a life. You can always go back and apologize to the guy you pushed out of the way in order to save a baby from traffic. Usually though, what's really happening is much less dramatic, just a variant on good ole' Rule 1: The boss is always right... and when we say "the boss," we usually don't mean G-d.

Let us keep in mind that the purpose of our principles—and the principles of Judaism as a whole—is to help build a just and holy society. Societies aren't possible unless people are willing to stick together. Walking off in a huff of righteous indignation, or inducing others to do so, just doesn't add much derech eretz to our lives. And, as we prepare to start the new year, derech eretz is at a premium.

For all the long-winded sermons that pop up like mushrooms during this time of year, this message can be boiled down to three simple Yiddish words: *zei a mensch*. "Be a decent person." We might expect something more profound for the High Holy Days. When all is said and done, though, these are perhaps the most important three words any of us will ever hear.

From the Desk of Cantor Rockman

Israel: Our Land of Determination and Beauty



For the second time in recent years, I was in Israel during extraordinarily troubled times. The 2014 Israel-Gaza conflict, "Operation Protective Edge," was the first and now, Stacey and I (and our daughter Bashe who was already on a Camp Ramah teen program) were in Israel as the Covid crisis re-escalated.

In retrospect, and to anyone watching, our judgment may have appeared reckless. It was not. We complied with every protocol, including multiple tests, masks, and quarantine upon arrival and before we left. We were well supervised and our sense that we were in a safe place was consistent. We experienced Israel, though challenged, in all of its broad strokes of determination and beauty.

The purpose of the JNF World Conference, "Planting Hope for the Future," was for us to become ambassadors for the cause — the JNF mission of building a better, safer home for the Jewish people, improving the quality of life for its residents, and increasing understanding throughout the world of the modern Jewish State. We learned about JNF initiatives and technological contributions developed in Israel and shared worldwide by Israel, our homeland.

Let me tell you a little about our mission. Each working day was long. We were on the road starting during the 7am hour and often returned to our hotel between 10 and 11pm. We traveled north to Mount Bental on the Golan Heights and met with military heroes on the battlefield of the 1973 Yom Kippur War. We later visited the Hula Lake Park. What a beautiful place! It would be ideal to be there during the crane migration.

In the south, we visited Beer Sheva which is the "Capital of the Negev" and the country's fastest growing population center. This is where the new JNF-USA Israel Education and Technology Campus is being built. We then traveled further south to Halutza, which is located in the Northwest Negev on Israel's borders with Egypt and Gaza. Halutza was founded by a group of families evacuated from the Gush Katif communities of Atzmona and Netzarim during Israel's disengagement from Gaza. Today it is the home of hydroponic greenhouses and lush green fields in the middle of the desert, which are cultivated thanks to methods invented and developed by dedicated agricultural engineers, our modern Israeli pioneers.

We walked a lot, and saw so much, including the compassionate work JNF does, such as the JNF sponsored LOTEM project. LOTEM is the leading organization in Israel offering accessible hikes and educational nature activities around the country to children and adults with special needs. Experiences such as these helped us understand the depth and commitment of JNF-USA to every individual in Israel.

JNF-KKL was founded by Theodor Herzl with a vision of reclaiming our Jewish homeland, inch by inch, acre by acre, creating a safe haven for Jews, threatened and dispersed throughout the world. The dedication of generations of dreamers and pioneers since the end of the 19th century to today's selfless pioneers is securing a future for our children's children, one coin in a blue box at a time, one tree at a time.

Israel and the work that the Jewish National Fund are doing are inspiring. We were blown away, we had a great time, were filled with hope and purpose, and we felt welcomed and at home. And, of course, we did plant a tree.

May you too find purpose in all of your endeavors.

From President Marty Abschutz

Dear Friends:

During the past 18 trying months, our COVID-19 Task Force has continually met with the primary goal of setting parameters to keep our members, staff and visitors safe. With that continued goal in mind, the Task Force met again, last night, to review the current pandemic situation in Middlesex County and to establish the policies for the coming High Holy Day services.



As a result of the discussions and decisions made during that meeting, Congregation B'nai Tikvah will hold in-person services with streaming options available, as follows:

- Everyone entering our building MUST wear a mask AND MUST SHOW proof of full vaccination
 - There will be NO EXCEPTIONS. If you are not eligible for the vaccine (such as children younger than 12), you cannot enter the building.
 - You must be two weeks past your second Pzifer or Moderna or your single J&J
 - Proof can be:
 - Showing your Docket app on your phone, with the "immunization records" screen open, or your vaccination card to the greeters at the check-in table
 - Uploading your vaccination record to the CBT portal no later than Monday, August 30, 2021, using this link: https://bnaitikvah.org/vaccine-registration/
 - Bringing your proof to the Office, no later than Monday, August 30, 2021
 - Consider bringing your proof with you, in case of a miscommunication
- Social distancing between pods will be observed; as has been our practice for several months, the curtains to the Social Hall will be open, regardless of how many people attend
- In recognition of the need to limit the amount of time people are gathered indoors, all services will be limited to two and a half hours or less
 - English readings will be limited
 - High Honors, such as aliyot, Torah and haftorah will be assigned in advance
 - Members in attendance will be invited for other honors
 - Speeches will be time-limited with full written transcripts available on our website

We plan to have 60- to 90- minute Torah for Tots and Junior Congregation services outdoors under a tent; further information will be forthcoming. Visit our website to see the various streaming options that will be available as we get closer to the Holidays.

Thank you to everyone who participated in our August High Holy Days Survey; based on the survey results, we expect upwards of 100 (and, perhaps as many as 200) vaccinated and masked people will attend services at one time or another. Everyone should assess their own risk factors. Speak with your personal physician(s). The medical professionals on our Task Force have agreed to be available to discuss the general issues surrounding COVID-19.

I thank everyone who has, and continues to participate, in this critical CBT community service: Rabbi Wolkoff, Cantor Rockman, Gordon Heit, VP, Ritual, Neal Gittleman, DDS, Steve Levin, MD, Howard Waksman, MD, Melissa Kessler, Co-VP, School & Youth, Charlie Valan, VP, Administration, Kevin Krane, Ritual Committee & former VP, Administration, Kim Riemann, Webmaster & Board member, Ben Gottesman, CBT Streaming, and Lesley Lewkowicz, CBT Administrator.

No matter how it is that you intend to join us for the High Holy Days--stream, zoom, or in person--we welcome celebrating a new year together as a loving and safe community. Marci and I wish all of you, your families and your friends a Sweet, Healthy and Happy New Year (5782).

Making a Difference Despite the Challenges

When I embarked upon reestablishing the Social Action Committee almost one year ago, I had ambitions, though I remained realistic due to the restrictions Covid imposed upon us and everyone in our area. I learned a lot and continue to find myself bewildered by the limitations on charities and social service organizations' operations, directly impacting those in need. Finding recipient organizations for some of our collections was challenging, because some were not allowed to accept anything, not even if we dropped them outside. One remains closed due to Covid still today.

I'm the first to admit I'm Zoom challenged though, with practice, I've improved. The waiting room, my unstable connections, trying to manage us not speaking over each other, the impersonal nature of it all.... I was eager to hold "real" meetings. The reality is that not everyone is comfortable yet with in-person meetings. So, on August 5th, we held our first "hybrid" meeting, which is new for me, but happening all over the world. Four of us met in person, while others Zoomed in. This is another challenge for me. Thanks to Cheryl Crick for running the Zoom, I could just talk and listen. It was a step forward, and chatting with each other face to face (though masked) before and after the meeting was refreshing.

Thanks to your generous donations... we have been able to help our fellow congregants in need, and have given to Elijah's Promise Soup Kitchen, North Brunswick Food Pantry, JFS Kosher Food Pantry, South Brunswick Senior Center, Chandler Health Center (New Brunswick), Interfaith Rise, Women Aware, Arc of Middlsesex County, and Homefront (Lawrenceville).

What's been happening: Over the summer we purchased high school graduation gifts in the form of gift cards for five young women who are the first high school graduates in the group of immigrant and refugee families that I Rise has resettled since they were formed just a few years ago. They are all beginning college this month.

By the time you read this, we will have met in front of CBT and created Birthday Parties in a Box for up to eight immigrant children, including small gifts, and all the essentials.

Looking forward: Clean your closets! From October 1st through 31st we will be collecting children's, mens' and womens' winter coats in good condition. No sweaters, sweatshirts, lightweight jackets or other clothing will be accepted.

Our B'nai Tikvah Children of Hope Little Pantry is coming along, although more slowly than I had wished. A repurposed wood chest will be our pantry. It is primed and ready to be painted. As of this printing, the search continues for talented painters to give it a warm, welcoming artistic touch . We need volunteers to help with publicity, phone calls, and social media tasks, and to restock food and hygiene items as necessary. USY and Sisterhood have joined this effort. Hunger continues to rise. Consider this: Elijah's Promise served 7,990 meals in July 2019, 18,060 meals in July 2020, and 33,432 meals in July 2021.

Hot meal drive up: Cheryl Crick has read about other local houses of worship cooking hot meals during Covid, having those in need drive up, and volunteers placing the meals in the trunk. She thought we can be doing this too, and called me to discuss it. Of course, I was all for it. There are challenges, but with some out of the box thinking and teamwork, we can overcome them. This project is in its infancy, and all help and ideas are welcome.

Our own Holocaust Memorial Garden: Last, our Holocaust Memorial Garden, installed by then Eagle Scout Matthew Katz 14 years ago, is very much in need of beautification. More importantly, Matthew and his parents obtained two bricks from the Warsaw Ghetto at the time of the garden's installation, but they have not been placed in the garden. We seek ideas for displaying them, preserving them, and creating a plaque for them. The garden is lit and can be a place for meetings, classes, minyan, quiet conversation, and contemplation. Gardeners of all levels are welcome. Will you join us in this mitzvah of taking care of a neglected part of our building?

As we approach Rosh Hashanah 5782, I am grateful for the compassion in our community May our acts of Chesed increase like the seeds of a pomegranate.

Thank You For All Your Support

This past year the Sisterhood asked the CBT community to help on many social action projects and no matter what we asked, you always came through. In September 2020, Sisterhood held a School Supply Drive which benefited the Middlesex County Care Management Organization. This non-profit coordinates and supports Middlesex County families that care for youth, up to age 21, who present with moderate to high levels of behavioral and/or emotional needs and/or developmental disabilities. We donated many supplies and gifted five students with \$20 gift cards to help pay for new back-to-school clothes.

In January 2021, Elijah's Promise posted an urgent call for help on its Facebook page, and Sisterhood was there to help. Elijah's Promise was in need of premade snack bags. These bags are handed out to the homeless community during hot meals at Elijah's Promise. Sisterhood asked members to assemble snack bags at home and then drop them off at CBT. We donated over 200 premade snack bags!

The Garden State Regional Women's League for Conservative Judaism launched a social justice initiative which ran February-June 2021, called "Project Stock the Shelves." In support of this project, each month Sisterhood suggested different food items and collected monetary donations for those who wished to participate that way. Each month food items were donated to the North and South Brunswick Food Pantries, and we gifted all monetary contributions to the East Brunswick Food Pantry. The support for this project was incredible!

This coming year, Sisterhood plans to hold another back-to-school supply drive, and we will be collaborating with CBT's Social Action Committee on a few projects.




I am, by no means, an expert in the field, but I met a few people who are and I learned some interesting facts about my heritage that otherwise would have been lost.
