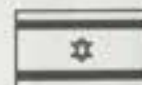

About Us

Local Federation's Jewish Star Our local Jewish Federation expressed it clearly with their arresting back page in the *Jewish Star* of February 22, 1991. The page featured the chilling photograph of Ellen Malinovsky, a new immigrant from Russia to Israel. She is pictured wearing her gas mask. Federation points out that we have helped her family leave Russia for Israel as part of Operation Exodus, and her intention had been to play Queen Esther at Purim for the very first time in her life. But, the gas mask is not what we or she had in mind as a part of her costume. Astoundingly, immigration from Russia and from Ethiopia did not cease during all the wearying and frightening weeks of SCUD attacks and tension. Your gifts (and loans via Israel Bonds) help with critical human needs for those like Ellen; needs like housing, beds, food, schools, and yes, toys.

Netherlands More than 50,000 supportive postcards have been sent from Dutch Christians to Israelis displaced by the attacks and missile damages.

Texas Texas A&M Professor Arnold Kramer has revealed that captured German documents presently stored in government centers around the United States contain the secret of turning coal into oil, which is how the Nazis used to fuel their military during World War II. (World Jewry Magazine)

Washington, D.C. The Jewish War Veterans National Museum has assembled an exhibit entitled *A Salute to Jewish Military Chaplains*, which is available for display. The JWV, which was the first veterans organization formed in this country, after the Civil War, has also paid for a special printing of 1,000 pocket sized bibles sent to Jewish servicemen and women serving in the Persian Gulf.

Talmud-to-Go The World Jewish Congress reports that a daily Talmud class is now given on a morning Manhattan-bound Long Island Railroad train. And passengers who travel El Al can now study Talmud on one of the plane's audio channels, in either English or Hebrew.

Music Hath Charms Those of us who read the story were thrilled to know about Isaac Stern's recent exploit. We are all aware of his overwhelming talent on the violin. Now, we can add to that talent his amazing courage. When sirens erupted during his recent concert in Tel Aviv, the orchestra left the stage, as instructed, for safer quarters. Mr. Stern and much of the audience remained, and he continued to play until the All Clear was sounded, when the concert continued.

Argentina Argentinian Jews are encouraged by a recent study in densely populated Buenos Aires. Researchers found no great increase in mixed marriages. Approximately 80% of the Jewish families are connected with some Jewish institution, and 60% of the children attend Jewish Schools, with half of these going on to Jewish secondary schools.

American Muslims Islam, it seems, is America's fastest growing religion, with an estimated 4,000,000 members. If the trend continues, within ten years Muslims will outnumber Jews in the United States. (Dateline: World Jewish Congress)

Minyan Minus

The daily evening Maariv Service at the synagogue, a twenty minute service which starts promptly at 7:30 P.M., is occasionally *minus* a minyan. That means that the required quorum of ten (which includes men and women at or above the age of Bar or Bat Mitzvah, respectively) is not reached and that results in no recitation of kaddish by mourners and yahrzeit observers.

In an attempt to create a special awareness — and sensitivity to the above problem, the Ritual Committee will be sending to each family a postcard which will request your participation by any *religiously obligated* family members on a particular date of the month.

Based on the size of our Congregational Family, and assuming full participation, this would mean *one* appearance approximately every month and a half. Of course, it is the Committee's hope that we can get away from the numbers game and that the daily evening Maariv Service will be self-sustaining insofar as a minyan is concerned; and, moreover, that it will become, if not already, an integral part of our being... not just another obligation in our busy lives.

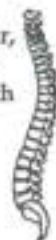

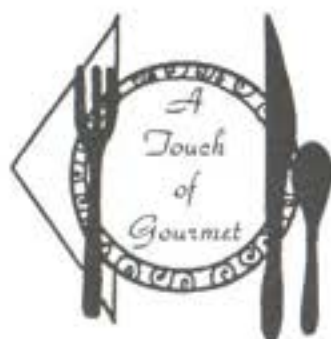

Celebrated on the 27th day of Nisan; established by the State of Israel.

The rituals for this day are still informal and vary from place to place.

In Israel, the day is observed by the closing of entertainment facilities, schools and businesses.

In Israel, as well as in the United States, there are memorial observances marked by mass meetings with speeches by survivors and public officials, readings of Holocaust accounts, and memorial prayers such as Kaddish and eil maleh rahamim.

Although it is uncertain as to why the Knesset picked the 27th day of Nisan to commemorate Yom HaShoah, it is appropriate that the date lies between the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising and the creation of the State of Israel.

Religious School

At this time of year, as we think about Passover and all it means for us as Jewish people, we also begin to think about Religious School registration for the next school year and what it means to be able to study and practice our religion in freedom.

You will be receiving by mail all necessary registration information which will include timelines and procedures. Please be sure to read them carefully and call if you have questions.

We are extremely proud of all our Religious School programs from Kindergarten through High School.

We have had record numbers of children attending our Kindergarten, Primary I and Primary II programs this year. It is our goal to have every eligible child registered. Our curriculum and programs are sequential and begin with Kindergarten. We have continued to expand the scope of our younger age programs. Many of your children have attended the outstanding nursery school programs at B'nai Tikvah and we urge you to continue their Jewish education.

At the other end of the spectrum is our Bayt Midrash High School program. All students should give serious consideration to registering for our weekly class which meets Sundays from 10:40-12:05. The topics differ each semester and have covered such courses as: Judaism and the World's Religions, Jewish Attitudes Toward Peace, Jews in America, Jewish Decisions About the Body, and Jewish Beliefs and Practices. Many subjects are not appropriate to be taught to younger students and unfortunately we do not have the time to cover as many subjects as we would like by the end of the Hei year. It is therefore of the utmost importance that students continue on in our High School program.

We also offer a monthly "Breakfast with the Rabbi" program, which meets from 9:00-10:25 on Sundays so that students can attend both the

breakfast and the weekly class.

All 8-11th grade students should register for a High School program.

We look forward to working with each and every family and student in order to provide them with a comprehensive Jewish education.

Please help us work toward this goal by ensuring that all students who will be in Kindergarten through 11th grade next school year register for our programs.

Should you or anyone you know not receive registration materials, please call us. Any non-synagogue members who plan to send their children to our programs in September should join the synagogue as soon as possible and register at that time to ensure their choice of Religious School sessions.

The Holiday of Shavuot

The Shavuot festival known as Pentecost (fifteenth day) or feast of Weeks, was celebrated in Biblical times as a day of thanksgiving for the wheat harvest; it falls seven weeks after the barley harvest, when an omer of the new produce was offered. The Torah refers to Shavuot as Hag ha-Katsir (the feast of the harvest) and Yom ha-Bikkurim (the day of first fruits), observed by offering the best ripe produce of the fields. Beginning with the second day of Passover, seven weeks or forty-nine days are carefully counted and the fiftieth day was celebrated as the beginning of the wheat harvest or the first fruits. Hence the Sefirah (counting) period observed to this day between the second day of Pesach and Shavuot.

In the course of time, as a result of the transformation of the agricultural festivals into historical commemorations, the additional significance of Shavuot as the Festival of the Giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai completely overshadowed its original significance. Though the Bible does not identify Shavuot with the anniversary of the giving of the Ten Commandments, the tradition, undisputed in the Talmud, has been that the Torah was given on Shavuot, the sixth day of Sivan.

The observance of Shavuot reflects both the historical and agricultural aspects of the day. The Ten Commandments are read in the synagogue on the first day. Plants and flowers reminiscent of the slopes of Sinai decorate the bimah and the Holy Ark. The book of Ruth is read for its description of a summer harvest in Israel. Milk dishes are the customary foods, symbolizing the Torah which is likened to milk, according to the allegorical interpretation of the *Song of Songs* ("Honey and milk are under your tongue")
