CHAMETZ SALE

It's never too early to start thinking about Passover!

According to Jewish law, you are forbidden to even possess chametz (leavening) during Passover. This prohibition applies not only to food but to the dishes and pots used to cook & serve. Because discarding such materials may entail great financial loss, it is customary to sell such "non-disposable" chametz to a non-Jew (who has a house) prior to the Passover holiday.

If you would like the Cantor to serve as your agent for the sale of chametz this year, please complete the form below and return it with six dollars to the synagogue office, no later than APRIL 16.

For the purpose of this agreement, chametz is considered to include, but not be limited to, leavened bread, cakes, biscuits crackers, cereal, coffee substances derived from cereals, wheat, barley, oats, rice, dry peas and dry beans, and all liquids which contain ingredients of flavors made from grain alcohol. A mixture of chametz is defined as any substance, edible or not, which contains or is joined to any chametz in any quantity whatsoever. I understand that the sale will take place at noon on Friday, April 17, 1992.

A MESSAGE FROM RANDY SOLOMON Educational Director

Dear Parents,

We hope you have already mailed in your children's Religious School registration material for the next school year.

In addition to attendance at Religious School, a recent report entitled "Jewish Identity Formation in the Family" by Perry London, Dean of the Graduate School of Applied and Professional Psychology at Rutgers University, states:

"To raise children with strong Jewish identity, parents probably must learn how to address the following points (I think in descending order of importance):

* First, the creation of visible ritual practice in the family;
* Second, increasing familial preoccupation with Jewish things;
* Third, extending family practice into Jewish community agencies -- synagogues, camps, and experience with Israel.

London recognizes, however, the multiple barriers that stand in parents' way. Personal and

work pressures on parents and competition with the surrounding culture and the secular school for the child's time and interest all play a part. Ignorance, too, or a feeling of not knowing what to do may also contribute. We must remember, however, that the home and one's personal life-style -- not the school or the synagogue -- is the core of Jewish Living.

We therefore encourage each family to make a conscious committed effort to increase the visibility of Jewish practice in their home and with their family. We also encourage children to go to Jewish camps, join Jewish youth groups, attend services with their families, and attend Religious School programs through high school.

This will help to ensure that Judaism as well as each individual child, will flourish and prosper.

GHOSTS OF SEDERS PAST

Throughout my somewhat eclectic religious upbringing, there were few Jewish holidays or festivals which I knew of until I was in Hebrew School. And by then, those holidays held little intrigue, other than to go home and educate my parents as to what they were missing... (you may as well know that "testing" my parents was a favorite pass time of mine.)

In any case, there were two 'holiday seasons' where Judaism played a major roll in my home. first the was High Holidays, when my parents closed their dry cleaning stores, or had others running them. We all went to shul and when my mother and sisters fasted, my father and I feasted (I being too small to fast, my father hating to see me eat alone -- we took our annual sojourn to an ice cream parlor on Liberty Avenue.)

The second holiday season (and it was a close second), was Passover. I still wonder what made Pesach so important to my parents. What, out of all the Jewish holidays and festivals brought them to their feet and made them quite observant for this holiday.

Let me illustrate. From the beginning of my memory, every year at this time we would search for the "chametz" throughout our Queens home. Since I was not the best of cleaners, I was assigned the important task of uncovering crumbs in our living room. After being told to pay special attention to the couch, I felt particularly useful.

Then we'd take out everything in the refrigerator and throw away all the 'traif'. It is at these times in my history, when received small important) lessons in kashrut. After all, we would have to throw out all the bacon, the ham and other cold cuts, along with any leavened products. Anything that cast doubt, was cast into the basement. cans of food, and the nonperishables would go down the stairs along with the annual Baskets which Easter mothers' (Jewish!) sister insisted on bringing us each year. To my parents credit, my two sisters and I had to wait until after Passover ended to even touch these baskets...no matter how the holidays fell out on a secular calendar.

Following all of our preparation, my father would go to an Orthodox Rabbi in Brooklyn, and pay him to be our agent in selling the chametz. Apparently, he only trusted an Orthodox Rabbi to do this as he continued the practice while we were full dues paying members in a reform congregation on Long Island.

Then came the seder preparation. I read our Maxwell House Special Edition Haggadahs to my mother to make sure she got everything correct on our seder plate.

I learned the four questions, and taunted my sisters with which one of us was the wise child, the wicked child, etc. (Being the youngest, I was usually able to start a fight without actually being in it.)

Of course, it was the seder itself, the culmination of all our preparation which caused the greatest arguments in our home. It was always around the second cup of wine, when invariably, someone would say "can we eat now?". Understand, our seder table traditionally had non-Jewish guests...they never asked this question. Our gentile visitors were always fascinated and seemed to enjoy taking turns as went around the table reading the story of "DeMille's Ten Commandments."

It was my family members, who waited long enough for this meal. Who waited long enough and were ready to find out once and for all if my mother's matzo balls would be soft, hard or perfect this year.

Perhaps it was that enormous scholarly document (our Haggadah) which Maxwell House put so much effort into, that caused such incredible hunger pangs amongst mv family members. In fairness to this coffee company, even when we used a better Haggadah with commentary and decent English, spent the evening passionate discourse on what can be eliminated.

My argument was always: "if we didn't fight, we'd be able to get through the entire Haggadah in less time than all the debating took.

Today, as my husband and I experience each holiday for the first time as parents, we are forced to evaluate our own pasts. We struggle to shed what is negative to us and

remember the positive aspects of our individual upbringings.

As I look back on my past Passover holidays, I realize that rather than being the "wise" child, I was in fact the "simple" (ok, perhaps the "evil") child. After all, having more than two Jews at a table and not debating, is almost unheard of.

And the lessons I learned at Passover time were far more extensive than the story of Exodus. It was a week of exploration for my entire family. learning It was rudimentary kashrut; it was the realization that we pray and praise God in our homes, not just in the Synagogue; it was the sharing of our heritage and our traditions with family and friends. But, most of all, it was sitting down at the seder table and discussing -- no -fighting, about what Judaism requires. And it was learning how each of us will take the same sentence, and interpret it in our own unique way.

It may have taken me three decades and my own child to really seek the affikomen. I'm not saying my search is over. It's just that I've begun to look again and I'm enjoying the hunt!
