WHAT IS SCRIP?

Scrip is a gift certificate issued from your favorite food stores (i.e., Shop Rite, Edwards, Foodtown and Pathmark). This scrip may be issued in denominations of \$5, \$10 and \$20.

HOW DO I USE SCRIP?

If you go food shopping, scrip is easy to use. Each dollar of scrip is worth one dollar of cash. When you shop, you pay with the scrip. No messy checks to write, no ATM records to enter into your checkbook register. Using scrip is painless to you and it benefits our synagogue.

HOW DOES CONGREGATION B'NAI TIKVAH BENIFIT?

Our synagogue receives 5% from the sale of the scrip. Think of all the ways our synagogue could put extra funds to work without the added inconvenience to our wallets!

HOW CAN I ORDER SCRIP?

- Call the synagogue office at (732) 297-0696. If you get the answering machine, do not hang-up. Press #5 to leave a message. Or,
- Call a committee person; a full list of committee members is below.
- Purchase at your favorite B'nai Tikvah organizational meeting (coming in the future).

No matter which method you select, just let someone know which store and the amount of scrip you want to buy. If you get an answering machine (at the synagogue office or a committee persons), leave your name, telephone number and your address.

HOW WILL I RECEIVE MY SCRIP ORDER?

Someone from the scrip committee will contact you to make personal arrangements.

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
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
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AN INTRODUCTION TO TISHA B'AV


Tisha b'Av, or the ninth of Av is a fast day commemorating numerous tragedies in our history. It commemorates the destruction of the first and second Temples. It also commemorates the day that G-d decreed after the Exodus, that our ancestors had to wander for 40 years in the desert before entering the land of Israel. In addition it marks the fall of Betar, the end of the Bar Kochba revolt, as well as the plowing under of the city of Jerusalem.

A three-week period of mourning that began on the 17th of Tammuz, a minor fast day (sunup to sundown), ends with the fast of Tisha b'Av. The 17th of Tammuz has its own list of tragedies. It is the date on which Moses broke the tablets at Mt. Sinai. The daily offerings in the first Temple were suspended. The walls of Jerusalem were infiltrated prior to the destruction of the second Temple. A Roman general burned a Torah scroll, and Jewish traitors erected an idol in the Temple.

During this time of mourning, no weddings may take place and one is not supposed to buy new things, listen to music, or celebrate a simchah. During the last nine days, some people refrain from meat and wine, and others refrain from shaving.

The fast of Tisha b'Av is a full day fast, from sundown to sundown. It is traditional for the congregation to sit on the floor or on low stools as the book of Lamentations is read by candlelight. No leather is worn. No tallit or tefillin are worn, and all adornments are removed from the synagogue. On Tisha b'Av only passages relating to the destruction of the Temple can be studied.

According to the Talmud, these fast days will be rededicated as days of rejoicing after the future redemption of Israel and the rebuilding of the Temple.





Therefore, you can convey information to him on these days at the synagogue during scheduled service times, by calling him immediately after Shabbat or Yom Tov, or by sending someone to his residence. 

SUKKOT - NO KIDDING!

Sukkah Building

Once there was a man who wanted to build a Sukkah. He went to see his rabbi and knocked on the door. The Rabbi, who was studying Talmud at the time, looked up from his book. "Come in," he said.

"Rabbi," said the man, "forgive me for disturbing you. But I want to build a Sukkah, and I don't know where to begin. Can you help me out?"

"This is a most auspicious question," replied the rabbi. "For at this very moment I am sitting here studying Masechet Sukkah, the tractate of the Talmud that deals with Sukkot. And here, right on this page, Rabbi Yohanan has a long statement about how to build a Sukkah. Here, take a copy of this folio page. Go home, follow these directions carefully, and you will have a beautiful Sukkah, and a wonderful place to celebrate the festival with your family."

The man was delighted. He took home the book, propped it up on a rock, and began reading: "Do this for four cubits, do that for six cubits...." Two days later the man had completed his Sukkah. He gathered his family together so that they could hang the beautiful decorations that had been prepared. After hanging the first string of fruit, the Sukkah began to wobble. The man and his family rushed out just as the Sukkah fell to the ground.

Frantic, the man returned to the Rabbi. "Rabbi," he said in a quivering voice, "I followed the instructions and do you know what happened? As I was putting up the decorations, the Sukkah fell down!"

The Rabbi looked up from his Talmud. "What do you think the Talmud is-the daily newspaper? No! The Talmud is a holy book and it must be studied carefully. Obviously, you were rushing. Here's what you should do. Get a friend to read you every direction as you go along, and you

should say each direction back to him, just to be safe and completely certain that you are following the directions exactly. Now go and build your Sukkah."

The man went right to work. This time it took over a week to build the Sukkah, as his friend read every direction and he repeated it back to him.
