HAZZAN'S VOICE

Dear Friends,

Pesah is traditionally a very busy time for us. There is so much cleaning, shopping, and cooking to be done. There are countless preparations we must make to ready ourselves for this very special holiday. So often, we are caught up in attending to everything that there is not much time for self-reflection.

In the Haggadah, Rabban Gamliel teaches that "In each generation, every individual should feel as though he or she had actually been redeemed from Egypt." This statement truly requires some personal soul searching. The question we must ask is how we can make it meaningful for us. We are not literally in a state of bondage where we are toiling away with mortar and bricks. We did not actually go on that really long trip with the rest of the Israelites out of Egypt. A wonderful Haggadah came out within the last few years. Published by the Shalom Hartman Institute, it is called *A Different Night* and is edited by Noam Zion and David Dishon. I encourage all of you to add it and its accompanying Leader's Guide to your libraries. In the Tzafun section of the Seder, where we search for the afikoman, this Haggadah provides what I believe to be a very useful way to consider how we connect with the experience of being redeemed from Egypt. At this point, I share it with you:

"Pesah is a holiday celebrating our reunion with the lost parts of ourselves. Often hiding and separation are essential stages in our life. In the Biblical story of the Exodus, both Moshe and God played 'hide and go seek.' Moshe was hidden for three months from Pharaoh until he was adopted by Pharaoh's daughter. Then the grown Moshe went out to seek his brothers. The Divine face too was hidden for hundreds of years of servitude until God's revelation to Moshe at the burning bush. Initially Moshe hid his face, but eventually he helped all Israel to encounter God face to face at Mount Sinai. On Seder night we hide and then seek the afikoman, reuniting the two parts separated at the beginning of the Seder. May we learn to discover the lost parts of ourselves, to become reconciled with relatives who have become distant and to find wholeness in [our] Jewish tradition . . ."

It is a form of redemption when we rediscover our inner-selves. We have also been redeemed when we further our connection to our Judaism. My husband, Aaron Lever, joins me in wishing you and your loved-ones, a hag kasher v'sameach, a happy and kosher Passover holiday!

Remembering We, The People

This past Tuesday evening, three members of the South Brunswick Town Council, acting with courage and dignity, voted down a proposed resolution which would have opened the door to religious holiday displays on government property. Town Council Members Carol Barrett, Frank Gambatese, and Edward Van Hessen recognized that a high wall of separation between church and state best serves the multicultural community that they represent. By taking to heart the powerful words of Supreme Court Justice Hugo Black, that the First Amendment rests "on the belief that a union of government and religion tends to destroy government and degrade religion," they acted to protect the religious freedom of our community. Most importantly, they remembered we, the people by placing the best interests of we, the people, ahead of personal preference and by considering the sensitivities of all the people in our diverse community. In limiting the role of government, they insured the freedom of religion, an individual freedom, which benefits all the people.

The Jewish concept of "Hakarat Hatov," of "appreciating those who act to benefit others," demands that we express our gratitude to all those whose voices were raised in the protection of a cherished ideal. In addition to the tree members of the Town Council mentioned above, I must acknowledge the Very Reverend Francis H. Hubbard of St. Barnabas Episcopal Church and convener of the South

Brunswick Area Clergy Association. Reverend Hubbard has remained unwavering in his position that government not intrude itself into the realm of religion, that equating the sacred symbols of Christianity and other religious traditions with Frosty the Snowman and reindeer is both "insulting and demeaning".

I appreciate the eloquence with which Gwen Southgate warned the Council "any display will create another crack in the separation of church and state." She also shared her memories of how the assertion of religious beliefs can isolate individuals within a community. One could not listen to her words without conjuring up the image of wave after wave of people, from the pilgrims to the present day, coming to these shores searching for religious freedom.

Support from all corners of the community, both clergy and laity, was both heartening and humbling. I have seen our multifaceted community join together in our interfaith celebration of thanksgiving, in the communal commemoration of Martin Luther King Jr., and I saw it again in the assertion that actions that disenfranchise anyone injure us all.

Shai Goldstein, Director of the New Jersey region of the Anti Defamation League, reached out to us with moral encouragement and technical support. His visit to our congregation before Tuesday's meeting and the presence of Phil Rosenbach, chair of the Anti Defamation League's regional Civil Rights Committee, at the Tuesday meeting helped us realize that the lofty ideals we have as a nation are ultimately expressed in how local communities treat their citizens.

May we always live in a community that serves as a model of respect and tolerance for the religious beliefs of its residents--a community where the heartfelt expressions of belief shine forth from homes and houses of worship and from the hearts and souls of we, the people.

PASSOVER MITZVAH HEROES

MITZVAH HEROES.... are ordinary people doing not so ordinary things. They are boys and girls, men and women, who, use their own skills and interests and discover unique ways to perform acts of loving-kindness for others. We all have "mitzvah potential," as Danny Siegel says; the trick is to discover how to use it.

Our fifth grade (Gimel class) students are not only mitzvah superstars but also **PASSOVER HEROES**. They participated in a special Passover tzedakah project and discovered their potential to do good deeds. Teachers, Bruce Rockman and Abby Sorrell introduced and explored the concept of the first mitzvah of Passover and emphasized the Jew's responsibility to help others. As "law abiding Jews," especially at Pesach, it is customary to purchase grain or collect money to distribute among the poor (so that they have Matzah) for the holiday.

Maot Chitim, which literally means "Money for Wheat" is a special fund, which provides for people for whom the purchase of sufficient wine, matzah, meat, and fish is an unaffordable luxury particularly at Pesach time. This way everyone can enjoy the holiday at home with specially marked, Kosher L'Pesach foods. This mitzvah of collecting "grain money" is usually an act of kindness that goes beyond the regular gifts to tzedakah that Jews make throughout the year.

Indeed, there are many in our community who cannot afford to enjoy Pesach in the way many of us take for granted. Together as a class, the students decided to give a significant amount of their tzedakah money for Ma'ot Chitim. This will make it possible for the less fortunate to conduct their own Seder and have the essentials necessary for the celebration of Pesach in a festive manner.

Congratulations to our Gimel class. Not only do they recognize the benefit of helping others in need, they also exhibit caring and loving behavior each week in the classroom. Keep up the great work, we are all proud of you!

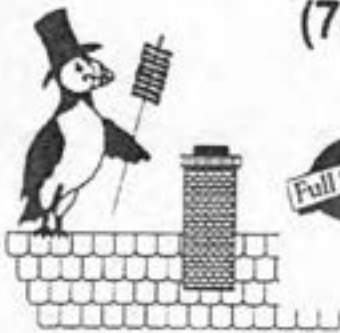

YOM HASHOAH 2000 – A CANDLE IN EVERY HOME

During the *Yizkor* service we are reminded to **Never Forget** those who are no longer with us. In addition to our loved ones, we are also obligated to remember those who were the victims of the Holocaust.

Over fifty years ago, Jews and other people were being put to death simply because they were who they were. The Holocaust death camps claimed six million Jewish lives and the lives of millions more in the ultimate hate campaign.

As the years pass, memories must not dim. That's why the B'nai Tikvah Men's Club is participating in the Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs' Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle Program for 2000. KIM'S KITCHEN

Those of you around last year may remember me complaining about the problems with coming up with good, simple Passover dishes. I don't know about the rest of you, but something has always intimidated me about Passover cooking. Last year, I recommended a dish made mostly of Matzah stuff and mushrooms, and as I learned later (after fielding some complaints), that dish probably wasn't the best to share because so many people aren't big mushroom fans. However, I'll stake my reputation (gulp) on this year's dish.

I've often made this side dish for other events but this will be the first year I make it for Passover. Originally, this **Butternut Squash Bake** was dairy (the original recipe called for 5 oz evaporated skim milk and butter), but I've substituted Rich's Farm Rich Non-Dairy Creamer for the milk and margarine for the butter, making it pareve. A word of warning, when I tested this dish, Rich's hadn't come out with

the Kosher for Passover Creamer but the Rabbi has assured me he has since seen it. I hope you enjoy this dish and Happy Passover.

1/3 Cup Margarine, softened
3/4 Cup Sugar
2 Eggs
1/2 Cup Rich's Farm Rich Non-Dairy Creamer
1 Teaspoon Vanilla
2 Cups cooked Butternut Squash (I steam it), mashed

1. In a mixing bowl, cream margarine and sugar.
2. Beat in eggs, creamer, and vanilla.
3. Stir in squash (mixture w/ be thin and runny)
4. Pour into a greased 7x11x2 casserole dish.
5. Bake, uncovered, in a pre-heated oven at 350 for 45 - 50 minutes or until set.
6. Recipe serves 6 but can be doubled (use a 9x13x2 pan)
