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PRESIDENT'S PODIUM

As I look back on my many hours spent on the Bima during the High Holidays, it brings to mind the behind the scenes activities that take place, which the congregants sitting in the services most likely miss. When we hear the Rabbi call the pages and the Cantor always ready with the next prayer, we do not realize the time spent by them coordinating the services both prior to and while they are on the Bima. Most of us miss the body language between the two clergy as they acknowledge when to start, when to stop, when to rise, when to sit, when to open the Ark, when to close it and on and on.

Add to the mix the hard work done by the Ritual Committee members who constantly search for the people who have Honors to make sure that they are in the right place at the right time. In some instances, juggling takes place when someone doesn't appear and at the last second, the volunteers scurry to find a replacement. Usually, this person sits in the front few rows and has no idea that the Ritur! Committee is about to draft them! Also, what about the members of the Ritual Committee who have spent weeks preparing to lead the introductory services first thing in the morning when the majority of the Congregation hasn't yet arrived!!

Next, I look out into the lobby and around the Sanctuary at the Ushers. These congregants help people to their seats, make sure no one has to stand, make sure no one enters the Services during certain portions, keep the people in the lobby to a dull roar, greet people at the main entrance and make sure that everyone has their tickets. In addition, they are constantly coordinating with the custodial staff raising the temperature when it is too cold, and lowering it when it is too hot, trying to adjust for the comfort of 1100 people.

And how can I leave out the parents who walk into Services at 10:00 with their beautiful young children. Usually, after spending the past two hours waking them and fighting to get them dressed as all of their non-Jewish friends call them to go out and play. At those times, I realize how lucky I am to have the honor of being our Congregation's President. Those times when I can relax on the Bima and just imagine what is going on in my house from the time I leave until the time my family, with their shining, smiling faces appear at the side entrance! *Continued on page 7*

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
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HAZZAN'S VOICE

Dear Friends,

In a previous article, I introduced Debbie Perlman, who composes her own Psalms. Her Psalms appear in her book, <u>Flames to Heaven</u>. Perlman writes Psalms that relate to different occasions, and one of them is Thanksgiving.

Thanksgiving arrives when the fall Jewish holidays are behind us. We have had just enough time to settle into a regular routine when this long weekend blows in like the November winds. The liturgy for Thanksgiving is not fixed. We do not have a mahzor with all of the appropriate passages to recite for this special day. Debbie Perlman has provided us with a text that we may use at our dinner tables:

How easy to praise You, Beloved One, For abundance, for cups brim filled; How can we not delight in Your majesty, Your endless blessings to us.

How simple our thanks, Beloved One, For laden tables, for gathered families, Shoulders touching in the intimacy of the meal You have spread before us.

Teach us to thank and bless Your name, When cups are empty and thirst is great; Put our hands together to replenish, Finding blessing in tiny sips.

Beloved One, to thank and bless You, We find hope in uncertainty And triumph in shaky steps. We recreate abundance for your sake.

Everybody brings different experiences with them to the table. Perlman recognizes that it may be easy to praise God when life is going well. But she asks God for ways to be thankful when life is difficult.

I would like to suggest a ritual for you to use at your Thanksgiving table. Begin with an empty cup. Pass it around to each person. As everyone receives the cup, he/she pours some water from his/her own drinking glass into the cup and expresses something for which he/she is thankful. In this way, the cup is filled with blessings from all of the guests at the table.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL REPORTS

The school year is the beginning of a number of relationships. It is a year of Jewish learning that we hope you will share with your child. It is a partnership between you and your child's religious schoolteachers. It is also a partnership with other families who have the same goals in mind for themselves and their children as they connect to the synagogue.

Being a parent of a child in our Religious School is an important responsibility but can be fun, as well. It's a pleasure to see so many of you present in the school wing, socializing, volunteering to do various activities or simply helping out when needed.

The lines of communication between you and the school are always open, and we hope that you will take the opportunity to familiarize yourself with what's happening in our school. Some suggestions for parents are:

Be interested and ask about your child's class. Open your child's book bag. Display work that has been brought home. Ask what was taught in Religious School. Share your own experiences with your child, and if you are learning things for the first time, share that, too!

Participate in Jewish life. Do at least one new thing to celebrate each of the holidays and try to make part of Shabbat special. Why not create a Jewish component to bedtime rituals? If you would like any holiday/Shabbat or Jewish bedtime stories to get started, please ask at the School Office. If you have any questions or need anything else to help enrich your Jewish family time, we'll be happy to help.

Make friends with the teacher. Get to know your child's teacher by name. Make sure the teacher knows you. It is important that your child's teacher knows about any concerns or problems that may stand in the way of your child's learning. Good communication is the key for a better teacher/parent partnership.

Add Jewish books to your read-aloud routine or to your child's bookshelf. Our Jewish Book Fair that began on Sunday, October 29 and will continue into November is the perfect vehicle to begin a home library...and it supports our school enrichment program, as well.

Don't try to be Jewish alone. Find another family or two to share things with. It is far more enjoyable to go to synagogue when you go with friends. It's more fun to create Jewish memories and traditions with when two or more families do it together.

> May your year at B'nai Tikvah be enriched with good friends, educational fulfillment, and beautiful Jewish memories.



AUTHOR & GUEST SPEAKER DAVID A. ADLER

David Adler is a storyteller, educator, dreamer, and author. In his early years, he was a mathematics teacher, a writer for a financial newsletter, and a senior book editor. His inspiration for his first book, *A Little at a Time* came from a very inquisitive nephew. Adler switched careers and to date, he is the author of more than a hundred books for young readers.

"CONVICTING THE INNOCENT IN AMERICA"

The Men's Club is excited to present at our next meeting, JAMES C. McCLOSKY, founder and executive director of Centurion Ministries. Jim has an impressive resume. He was awarded the Bronze Star with Combat V for his valor under fire. After Vietnam, he worked for a consulting firm in Tokyo. He later established the Hay Group's management consulting business in Tokyo, a very successful enterprise.

At 37, his life took another path. He entered Princeton Theological Seminary and earned a Masters of Divinity. While serving as student chaplain at Trenton State Prison in 1980, he became convinced that one of the inmates, sentenced to life for murder, was innocent. Jim took one-year leave of absence from PTS to work full-time, independently, on behalf of the prisoner. He formed a committee of jurists, attorneys, and clergy, raised money to meet costs and ultimately the prisoner was freed and exonerated by a federal district court.

Jim decided to forgo a pastorate and set up Centurion Ministries devoting the rest of his life to freeing the imprisoned innocent. In the past 17 years, he has helped free 22 innocent people who have spent an average 15 years serving life or death sentences for crimes they did not commit.



From the Rabbi's Desk

There is something magical about sitting in your Sukkah and feeling the sunshine come streaming through the branches overhead. The light and the shadow seem locked in a divine dance, moved by the gentlest puffs of wind. The warmth of the day releases the aroma of the pine. On such an exquisite October day one cannot help but feel enveloped by the joy of the festival. The serenity of the moment makes it easy to understand why the rabbis choose to use the Sukkah as a symbol of peace, harmony, and wholeness.

The Sukkah is also an expression of faith. We leave behind the comforts of our homes for the fragile structures that we build in our backyards.

We have faith that what we build will remain intact throughout the festival; that we won't come out one day to find the top of our Sukkah decorating the floor or the doorway on a side that is now facing skyward.

We have faith that what pours through the top of our Sukkah will be sun and not rain or snow.

We have faith that we will be wrapped in warmth and not in winter coats as we eat our meals under a canopy of stars.


We have faith that we will be able to celebrate the festival to its fullest, to express our gratitude and appreciation to God for the many blessings that we have received.

The Sukkah also reminds us of how fragile things can be; how so many things are beyond our control. We have faith, and so we continue to build our Sukkah. To not build is to give up on even the possibility of that spectacular moment.

In our liturgy, we read the passage "spread over us Your sukkah of peace." It is emblazoned in Hebrew on one of the sanctuary tapestries. That the rabbis chose the sukkah as their metaphor for peace, harmony, and wholeness should surprise no one. Peace, after all, is a fragile structure built out of hope and faith. It takes very little to topple what was so painstakingly cobbled together.

Recent events in Israel teach us this painful lesson. I do not know what the days and weeks ahead will bring for our people in Israel. The one thing I am certain of is that the status quo is not a viable option. It is eating away at the fabric of Israeli society and devouring the soul of our people.

Without the certainty of success they have faith and continue to build even as we pray that God will bless Israel and spread over it His sukkah of peace, speedily and in our own day. Amen.

FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT WAYS & MEANS...... A MESSAGE FOR THE NEW YEAR

This past Spring I had the enlightening experience of serving on the B'nai Tikvah Budget Committee. Our challenging task was to recommend a budget for the current fiscal year. We had to balance the fact that if money was allocated to one area, we might have to cut from another. The desire to keep any dues increase to a minimum was always a driving factor. \$300 of expenses equates to \$1 of dues per family. If the cost of utilities or postage increased or we needed a capital improvement, we had to figure that in to the equation. It was a difficult process, as quite frankly, there was not a lot of play in the numbers.

During board meetings, we often have lengthy, sometimes agonizing discussions over proposed expenditures – small and large. When we finally achieve a consensus & decide to go ahead the inevitable question has to be asked. Where is the money coming from? Many times we simply can't come up with the answer and the expenditure has to be postponed – even if it is something that may be important. The bottom line: money is always a precious resource here.

The good news is that we have programs that with just a few minutes effort can not only help make the budget this fiscal year but if taken seriously can go way beyond that. The dollars we receive from fundraising activities help to maintain our facilities, support programs, keep dues and religious school fees stable and offset the expense side of the budget. Many dedicated volunteers give hours of their time to the administration of these programs. However, they need your participation to be successful.

The first program I am going to mention is not new. Grocery Store Scrip is simply a gift certificate issued by food stores such as Edwards, Foodtown, Grand Union, McCaffreys, Pathmark, and Shop-rite. It's available in denominations as low as \$5. Each dollar of scrip equals one dollar at the grocery store register. This is how it works. If you purchase \$25 in scrip at B'nai Tikvah, you take it to the grocery store register and it buys \$25 worth of groceries. In other words, it costs you nothing to participate; you do not pay 1 penny more for your purchase. It's that simple. 5% of each dollar goes directly to the Synagogue. You can even pay for scrip by credit card (this does cost us 3% of the 5% profit but we would rather have 2% then 0%).

Grocery store scrip is always in stock and easy to obtain. Just stop by the synagogue office or call with your order. Please leave a message if you reach the answering machine. Committee members will deliver to your door. There's also a table in the synagogue lobby on Sunday mornings during Hebrew School hours. Rachel Shaneson, the chair of the committee, has done an amazing job organizing and orchestrating the program and is assisted by Jay Scheuer.

There are many ways you can use scrip – of course, for your weekly grocery shopping. You can also be creative and send it to your kids in college, give it as holiday gifts to teachers, housewarming gifts, put it in a baby basket for new parents or perform a double mitzvah and donate it to a soup kitchen or needy family.

During the fiscal year that ended on July 31, 2000, \$98,000 scrip was sold for a profit of \$4,700. During this time, only 87 families out of 450 made purchases. Out of those 87 families, only 37 bought more than \$500 for the entire year.

Just imagine ...

If 200 families averaged \$100 week in scrip purchases for just 25 weeks a year that would be \$25,000 pure profit. If they purchased the same amount for 50 weeks a year, that would be \$50,000 pure profit. We could go on from there. It's easy to see how much we could and should be earning from grocery store scrip.

The other program that I am asking you to support is Retail Store Scrip.

This wonderful fundraising opportunity for the congregation again only involves a minimal effort and **no extra expense on your part**. Purchase gift certificates to many of your favorite stores & earn 2-18% of the sale for B'nai Tikvah. There are over 50 well known retailers in the program. The amount of money we can make on this is exciting. Please keep in mind that these stores issue attractive gift certificates or gift cards. They make wonderful presents for friends, family, teachers, coaches, etc.

Ordering is easy. Blank forms are available on line, in HaKol, in the office & on Sunday mornings during Hebrew School hours. Orders are faxed every Monday & usually arrive on Thursday. Please refer to the flier in this issue of HaKol for more details.

Both Scrip programs are the easiest, most painless way to help our synagogue thrive.

I hope that you will also support the 2001 Entertainment Book, the B'nai Tikvah Credit Card, and Wild West Casino Night coming up on March 3, 2001.

In the New Year, I challenge each of you to think a little differently. How many times do you say no when you really can say yes? Instead of thinking of reasons why you can't, won't or just don't feel like it, think of reasons why you can't, won't or just don't feel like it, think of reasons why you can't, won't or just don't feel like it, think of reasons why you can't, synagogue. Show your appreciation to the volunteers that give so much of their time – not just by saying thank you but by taking part in these programs. Stop by the scrip table on a Sunday & place an order or contact one of the committee members. Next time you are at a store without scrip, think about how much the synagogue lost.

We must all share in the responsibility of our financial security. This is after all, our house and our community.



What's New in Jr. Congregation

Barry, our Jr. Congregation facilitator, is also introducing a prayer board and prayer cards to distribute prayer leadership during the service and help eliminate "down time" between prayers. The prayer board shows the order of prayers and the page on which they appear in the siddur.

Religious Service Credit

RELGIOUS SCHOOL PARENTS TAKE NOTE: We can't imagine why anyone would want to attend service any where other than B'nai Tikvah, frankly. However, in the event you attend services elsewhere, send a note to Barry Safeer's attention indicating the date and location where your child attended.

Please check the board in the school wing or Bnaitikvah.org for an update on your child's attendance count. If there is a discrepancy, contact Barry. AFTER JANUARY, NOTES FOR ATTENDANCE BETWEEN SEPTEMBER AND DECEMBER WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

Stay on Track of Attendance

As a guide to help "stay on track" of the religious service requirement, divide the total number of times required by 9 months. For Dalet students, as an example, that comes to 2. Therefore, Dalet students should be attending Jr. Congregation twice a month.

Keep in mind that the bulk of the requirement must consist of Saturday services. Friday night service will count up to five times. After five, they will no longer count towards your requirement.

CHAI SHABBAT MEMORIES

The Origins of Congregation B'nai Tikvah (Reprinted from the Jewish Historical Society of Central New Jersey April-May 2000 Newsletter)

Jews in South Brunswick in the 1930's were a small percentage of the total population and were few compared to the number of Jews in the township today. They were, I believe, divided mainly into two communities. There were a number of families living along Davidson's Mill Road and nearby, and the rest were in the Dayton area.

No formal houses of worship existed. Solomon Engoran of Davidson's Mill Road had a small building near his house, which he used as a shul during the high holy days. People walked to this shul from all over the township. The Beckenstein brothers trudged over five miles from Friendship and Miller Roads near Dayton. Mr. Rothbard with his son, Jack, and daughter, Beatrice, walked from his tavern, the White Rose on Georges Road. The Steinberg girls and their grandmother, Mr. Seidenstein with Lester, Blanche, and Evelyn were also amongst those who attended services at the Solomon Engoren's shul. The Durmasking family came from Church Lane, while the Lukacs and Rosenfeld families walked from Riva Avenue.

Mr. Engoren obtained a Torah from a shul in New Brunswick, and after the holidays, money was collected to donate to that New Brunswick shul.

For a few years in the late 1930's, services were conducted in the Rosenfeld home on Riva Avenue. Then in1940 and 1941, a small group began to meet at the Rothbart's White Rose Tavern to plan the building of a synagogue. By this time, the population of Jews had grown. Jews from Germany had begun to arrive by 1938, and were placed on farms by the Jewish Agricultural Society.

The Berk family, on Georges Road, contributed a piece of land, and with the aid of a loan from the Cranbury Bank and financial assistance from the Jewish Agricultural Society, the synagogue was built in 1942. It was then known as the Jewish Farmer's Community Center of Deans, and later became Shari Shalom.

The J.F.C.C. Congregation grew as the Jewish population of South Brunswick increased. We were plagued by some physical problems as exemplified by the following article, which appeared in the J.F.C.C. *Tidings* in the late 1904's.

"Well, Well, Well, by David Kutliroff

On Friday evening, October 8th, the Board decided to do something about the well. The following Sunday morning, the members met at the well. It was a hectic morning that extended well into the late afternoon and what happened can be described as follows:

'Twas a balmy autumn morning and a goodly crowd was there.

The board had come to fix the well, 'twas a delusion and a snare.

The mighty Berk had seen them come and with boots up to his hip, he plunged into the well with a mallet in his grip. Belaboring rock with might and main, from spirits to arouse, he cried, "By God there's be water here to feed a thousand cows.

The blows were struck, a hole was found, a pipe was thrust therein.

The excitement had been too much for an old and trusted friend. The pump had broke its casing, we were foiled in the end.

INCIDENTALLY, SAM DASHEVSKY HAS INFORMED US THAT THE PUMP HAS BEEN REPAIRED BUT THERE IS STILL NO WATER.

There was no organization like the U.S.Y., which would help bring Jewish people from various parts of the township together. So in 1938, the Jewish Agricultural Society introduced us to the Jewish Rural Youth Association (R.Y.A.) and under the leadership and advice of Sophie Dobin, we met for socials at each other's homes, planned trips to the beach and to other places and events that were interesting. Several of the friendship we formed became permanent. Millicent Steinberg and David Kutliroff plighted their troth as a result of their R.Y.A. experiences as did Beatrice Rothbart and Alfred Karge.

A group of Jewish families formed an organization called the Jewish Country Club. Families belonging to this group were: Moses Beck, Sam Adler, Jacob Schor, Sam Kutliroff, Morris Squire, Max Kuthroff, Morris Kaplan, Morris Rothbard, Abraham Friedman, and Jerauchine Steinberg.

One of the first activities was the purchase of a cemetery section from the Washington Cemetery. Since 1946, Millicent Kutliroff has supervised these cemetery plots. Max Kuthroff, then secretary-treasurer, gave her the job in 1946. This cemetery section has recently been accepted by B'nai Tikvah in the interest of continuity. Since Lawrence Stoller passed away, Millicent Kutliroff was appointed to replace him as caretaker of the B'nai Tikvah Cemetery.

During the early years of the Jewish Farmers Community Center, we did not employ a rabbi. We had a group of elders like Louis Stabsky, Simon Schultz, Frank Vinicor, Morris Gibbs and Sam Durmaskin. They conducted services until we hired our first rabbi. We employed several rabbis until we hired a young student, Rabbi Andrew Warmflash. He lived at first in a motel within walking distance. After he married Beth, we built an apartment for them as a second floor on top of the Synagogue, Rabbi Warmflash stayed with us for seventeen years until he accepted another position in Newton Center, Massachusetts.

As the Jewish Farmers Community Center grew, inhabitants of Kendall Park began to apply for membership. Abe Dobin, who served for nine years as President of the J.F.C.C., refused to accept these applications. The charter of J.F.C.C. stipulated that members were to be Jewish Farmers. Abe Dobin, a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Rutgers Agricultural College, was employed by the Jewish Agricultural Society. It was his responsibility to help lace Jewish Holocaust refugees on farms and the J.F.C.C. was there to welcome them into membership.

Kendall Park residents, therefore, purchased a Kendall Park home and converted in into a small synagogue called Beth Shalom. The Shari Shalom building was sold to the Moose Lodge in 1980 and we joined Beth Shalom in Kendall Park for a short interval while B'nai Tikvah was constructed and then both communities plus a group from North Brunswick became part of B'nai Tikvah in 1982.
