# From the Rabbi's Desk

It's early December. Jim Carey's <u>Grinch</u> has already stolen Christmas countless times (not to mention a huge number of moviegoers). TV networks have begun their holiday programming. Bill Murray's <u>Scrooged</u> is ahead of Jimmy Stewart's <u>It's a Wonderful Life</u> in the number of times its been shown. No doubt it will catch up as the December 25th deadline approaches (and if not he can always ask for a recount). Advertisers have been in full force since before Labor Day. Holiday decorations in the stores and the musical accompaniment have been going on long enough so that I look at the parade of mail order catalogs that arrive without immediately thinking "recyclable."


At this time of the year, much of what is hidden becomes overt, especially the degree to which Christian culture and language are dominant within American society. This dominance is reflected in both symbolic and structural ways that pervade...... Let me share two examples from these Supreme Court decisions.

In the case of <u>Braunfeld vs. Brown</u>, the court ruled that "it is common knowledge the first day of the week has come to have special significance as a rest day in this country. *People of all religions and people with no religions* regard Sunday as a time for family activity, for visiting friends... Sunday is a day apart from all others. The cause is irrelevant; the fact exists." The court trivialized the roots of Sunday Blue Laws which originated in and were designed to support Christian beliefs and had the consequence of forcing the Orthodox Jewish plaintiffs to observe the Christian day of rest.

The second case (Lynch vs. Donnelly) involved the public display of a crèche (nativity scene). The Court wrote:

When viewed in the proper context of the Christmas Holiday season, it is apparent that...there is insufficient evidence to establish that the inclusion of the crèche is ... some kind of subtle government advocacy of a particular religious message... The City ...has taken note of a significant historical religious event long celebrated in the Western World. The creche in the display depicts the historical origins of the traditional event long recognized as a National Holiday.... The narrow question is whether there is a secular purpose for Pawtucket's display of the creche. The display is sponsored by the City to celebrate the Holiday and to depict the origins of that Holiday... These are legitimate secular purposes.

# HAZZAN'S VOICE

#### Dear Friends.

I would like to share with you a story that relates to Chanukah. I have adapted from the book Because God Loves Stories, edited by Steve Zeitlin:

During the sixteenth century, there was once a man named Jacobi who went to shul every Shabbat morning and listened intently to the rabbi's sermon. It was a unique situation because the rabbi spoke in Hebrew and Jacobi knew only Spanish. On one particular morning, the rabbi taught how twelve loaves of bread were offered to God when the Temple stood. Jacobi came away with the message that God ate bread. Knowing his wife was a gifted bread baker, he asked her to make twelve loaves, which Jacobi took to the synagogue and left in the ark.

At this point, the shammes (caretaker of the synagogue) came before the ark with a prayer to God. "God," he said, "While I love taking care of the shul, it has been weeks since I was last paid. I need a miracle, please!" Then the shammes opened the ark and found the twelve loaves of bread that would feed him and his whole family. He believed that God had put the bread there for him to find.

The next day Jacobi returned to the ark and discovered the bread was gone. He believed that God had eaten the bread.

For thirty years, they continued in this way. Until one day, the rabbi saw Jacobi putting the bread into the ark. "What are you doing?" the rabbi asked Jacobi. Jacobi replied that he was leaving the bread for God. "But God does not eat bread!" exclaimed the rabbi. "But he has been eating my wife's bread for thirty years," Jacobi explained.

The two men hid to see what would happen to the bread. Soon, the shammes came and took the bread out of the ark. The rabbi grabbed the shammes and stopped him from taking the bread. Then an argument ensued between the three men. In the middle of their bickering, Elijah the Prophet emerged and explained that God had such fun watching as one man gave the bread, another man took the bread, and the Holy One got credit for all of it. Elijah then told Jacobi that from now on, he must give the bread directly to the shammes and believe that God will be just as pleased with him and have just as much fun.



We all have the power to create miracles and receive the blessings that enrich our lives and the lives of those around us. The import of these cases is to remove from the realm of the religious events, icons and celebrations and transfer them into the secular world. This transformation is an affront to those who hold these powerful religious symbols as sacred by stripping them of their meaning. For Jews and other minority religious groups, it creates tremendous pressure to accept and even embrace these newly defined secular American symbols as an expression of our patriotism. Participation in secular activities such as the annual "Holiday" (read Christmas) party, the public school's "Holiday" concerts and plays, and a myriad of other "neutral" social activities are expected.

Over the years, I have had families come to me to discuss what to do about their child's desire to visit Santa Claus or have a Christmas tree. Not one of these children ever believed that Christmas, Christmas trees, or Santa Claus were anything other than Christian. As one of our students recently remarked in class, "They can call the tree that is put up in our school 'a Giving Tree' or anything else they want to, it's still a Christmas tree."

In its ultimate expression, this secularization of the religious results in a denial of differences. This leads many Christians to consider Judaism to be just another manifestation of Christianity and Hannukah simply the Jewish Christmas.

Our best response is to keep our holiday in its proper perspective. On the Jewish calendar, Hannukah is a minor festival. When we try to make into something more, to keep pace with the swirl around us then we are falling into the trap of the so called "Holiday Season". We celebrated our holiday season - Rosh Hashannah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Shmini Atseret and Simhat Torah - over a month ago. We can look forward to a second season with Pesach and Shavuot in the Spring. We have to make the most of each of our holidays; giving ourselves and our families the fullest and richest religious experience possible.

That does not mean we should ignore Hannukah. On the contrary, let us celebrate it as what it truly represents; a dedication to living Jewishly. Sarah will grow up with the same tradition that I did. She will receive a small gift each night of Hannukah - a Jewish puzzle, a Jewish book, a simple Jewish game - each of them designed to create an opportunity for family interaction.

May the Hannukah lights we kindle reflect our dedication to living authentically as Jews and celebrate our ability to express our beliefs freely.

The traditional gift for Hanukah was gelt, shiny coins. Gift giving was modest; more elaborate gift exchanges took place on Purim. As a result of the influence in living in a commercialized Christmas-oriented culture, Hanukah presents have become more elaborate. As a result of the increased emphasis on presents, the religious significance of Hanukah has become obscure for many American Jews.

For some families what to do about gifts has become a major concern. I would like to suggest some "presents" of mind - giftgiving suggestions this year that will link our past and present to make an even brighter Jewish future. Each of these gift ideas is based on FUTURE POWER. They are gifts with significance today which will be appreciated even more tomorrow!

> Assemble a family photo album. Buy Israel Bonds Start a family scrap book Expand a Jewish record, tape or book library Take a formal family portrait Parents: Tape an oral family history as a living legacy for the future. Start a coin or stamp collection Open a Hanukah Savings Account for a future trip to Israel Create a family heirloom by presenting your child(ren) with his/her own Hanukiyah.

Here are some other suggestions for recasting gift giving into a less materialistic context:

1. Have four (4) nights for giving and four (4) nights for receiving. A family discussion might take place on the "giving nights" to decide where the family's Tsedakah money should go.

Have one night of Hanukah designated for each family member - gifts should be handmade and that person gets special privileges.

# Everything you need to know for lighting your chanukiyah

Reprinted in part from The How To Handbook For Jewish Living by Kerry M. Olitzky and Ronald H. Isaacs published by KTAV Publishing House Inc., Hoboken NJ.

Place one new candle in the chanukiyah for each night of Chanukah, increasing one candle per night (plus the shamash). Candles should be placed from right to left. Say the following blessings first. Then light the shamash first and use it to light from left to right.

On each night:

# בּרוּך אַתָּה ד׳ אַלהֵינוּ מֵלָך הָעוֹלָם, אַשֶׁר קַדְשָׁנוּ בַּמִצוֹתֵיו וְצוְנוּ לְהַדְלִיק נֵר שֶׁל חֲנָכָה.

Baruch atah Adonai elohaynu melech ha'olam ahser kidishanu bemitzvotav vetzivanu lehadlik ner shel Chanukah.

Praised are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of the Universe, who has made us holy by mitzvot and instructed us to light the Chanukah candles.

#### On each night:

בּרוּך אַתָּה ד׳ אַלהֵינוּ מֶלֶך הָעוֹלָם, שעשה נסים לאבותינו ביסים ההם בוסן הזה.

Baruch atah Adonai elohaynu melech ha'olam she'asah nisim lavotaynu bayamim hahaym bazman hazeh.

Praised are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of the Universe, who performed miracles for our ancestors at this season in ancient days.

On the first night only:

ברוך אתה ד׳ אלהינו מלך העולם, שהחינו וקימנו והגיענו לומן הה.

Baruch atah Adonai elohaynu melech ha'olam shehecheyanu vekimanu vehigiyanu lazman hazeh.

Praised are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of the Universe, who has given us life, sustained us, and helped us to reach this day.

After you have lit the candles, read the following prayer called Hanerot Hallalu.

הצרות הללו אנחנו מדליקין על הנסים ועל הנפלאות ועל התשויטת ועל המלחמות שעשית לאבותינו בימים ההם בזמן הזה על ידי בהעיר הקרושים. וכל שמונת ימי האהה הנרות הללו לדש הם, ואין לנו רשות להשתפש בהם אלא לראותם בלבד, כדי להודות ולהלל לשמר הגדול, על נשיר רעל נפלאותיר רעל ישרעתר:

In order to recall the miracles and wonders that You performed for our ancestors through the agency of holy priests, we kindle these lights. We hold these flames sacred throughout the eight-day Chanukah period; we shall not make any profane use of them. Instead, we will simply look at them so that we may recall Your reputation as a God who makes miracles, does wonders, and delivers our people.

#### Remember:

Load from the right; light from the left.

Place your chanukiyah in the window nearest the street so all can see.

Candle holders in traditional chanukiyot are all on the same level, with a higher or separate shamash.

On Shabbat Chanukah (December 22" and December 29th), light the Chanukah candles before you light the Shabbat candles. Candle lighting should be at 4:17 and 4:23 PM respectively.

Light your candles after nightfall but early enough so that people can see them.

At the end of Shabbat Chanukah (December 23rd), do Havdalah first and then light the Chanukah candles

Don't use the lights of Chanukah for practical purposes, like reading.

Together, the students and USYers will engage in trips and activities that provide entertainment and a deeper look into the heart of a culture that all participants study intensely. # THE STORY OF HANNUKAH IN BRIEF

Reprinted from Siddur Sim Shalom.

After the return of the Jews from their exile in Babylon, they succeeded in reestablishing themselves in Palestine under the wise leadership of Ezra and Nehemiah. Under the rule of the Persians and later the invincible Greeks led by Alexander the Great, the Jews were permitted to live in peace and happiness although subject to foreign rule. When Alexander died, his empire was divided and Israel became part of the kingdom of Syria.

About the year 175 B.C.E., a new king, Antiochus Epiphanes, ascended the throne of Syria and, urged on by Hellenized Jews, attempted to force the Jews of Palestine to abandon their religion and language, to accept the Greek idols and Greek language instead. When the Jewish people resisted, Syrian soldiers were sent to enforce the King's orders, even venturing into the Temple in Jerusalem to set up idols and to offer pagan sacrifices on the sacred altar. Resistance brought martyrdom to many Jews including the aged sage Eliezer, who was killed when he refused to eat swine meat; and the Jewish woman Hannah who lost her seven sons when they refused to bow to idols.

Open revolt against this savagery began in the town Modi'in when an old priest named Mattiyahu and his five sons broke up an attempt to enforce idol sacrifices, and with the slogan "Whoever is for the Lord, follow me!", scattered the king's soldiers and then fled to the hills. Around this family of Maccabees grew up a company of fearless patriotic men who waged guerrilla warfare from the caves in the mountains. When the aged Mattityahu died leaving leadership to his son Judah Maccabee, warfare was taken into the open in a series of successful battles with the great victory of Emmaus. The Syrian armies were routed. Right had won out against brute might. The powerful kingdom of Syria had to recognize the independence of the little state of Judea. The walls of the city of Jerusalem were repaired, the holy Temple was cleansed and rededicated to the worship of God, and peace and order were restored to the land.

The story is told that at the rededication of the Temple, no pure oil could be found with which to light the great sevenbranched Menorah. At last a little cruse of holy oil was found in the corner of the Temple. Miraculously this oil burned eight days instead of the short time expected. To remember the brave Maccabean family, their heroic struggle for freedom against tyrauny, the feast of Hanukkah (dedication) is celebrated beginning on the 25th day of the Hebrew month Kislev and candles are lit for eight days.
