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I shot a moose. (Not the opening line of a Woody Allen monologue.) A number of years ago while vacationing in New Hampshire, Jodi and I came upon a small town called Gorham, a community with a proper and healthy regard for moose. At the crossroads of the two major thoroughfares, one was greeted by a moose statue as one drove down the Main Street there were a multitude of stores dedicated to moose and moose paraphernalia; restaurants came with moose motifs and décor; one could even play miniature golf under the watchful eve of a mechanical moose.

Jodi humored me when I said I wanted to take the "Moose Tour" that evening. At the designated hour we boarded our little tour bus to go off in search of moose. Our guide explained that as the afternoon waned into dusk, moose would often emerge from the deeper forested areas to enjoy a drink from the streams flowed beside the roads in the area. Part of the attraction for the moose was the

high salt content of the water (a result of the large quantities of salt used on the roads during the winter months.)

We drove for a while along roads that had a history of moose sighting with little initial success. As it grew darker, we had a few brief sighting but no real success. Then, it happened. Up ahead on the other side of the road, about two hundred feet in front of the bus, was a large moose calmly having a drink and munching on some grass.

When the doors of the bus opened, I bolted out of the bus, moving quickly and quietly along the side of the road. I was determined to get as close as possible and get the perfect shot. As I got closer my pace slowed and I chose my footsteps more carefully. I was now directly across from the moose on this narrow two lane road. Large and majestic, it continued its foraging, oblivious to or unconcerned by my presence, I raised my camera and was able

Magnified and praised be the living God, whose existence is eternal. Adonai is One and unique

in unity, unfathomable, and with unending Oneness. God has no bodily form, and is incorporeal: God's holiness is beyond compare. God preceded all creation: Adonai is the First, and without beginning.

Behold the Eternal, whose greatness and sovereignty is revealed to every living creature. Adonai, who inspired with the gift of prophecy those whom God chose to make known God's glory.

Never has there been a prophet like Moses, whose closeness to God is unmatched. A Torah of truth did God give our people, through Moses, the prophet and faithful servant.

to take three shots of this magnificent creature before the rest of the busload come charging up, making enough noise to scare off the moose. I walked back to the bus, holding my camera aloft triumphantly.

When we returned from our travels, I could barely contain myself until our many rolls of film were developed. While I have any number of pictures of moose, those were mine! I flipped through the photos and came to my three moose shots. A dark brown moose against a background of trees and forest at dusk produces pictures that look like an undifferentiated square of brown. Showing my prize photos and describing what they contained to people produced skeptical looks, knowing nods and sympathetic "tut tut's." Seeing is

believing and what they saw did not inspire any certitude.

Talking with a friend who is going to New Hampshire brought the whole story to mind along with a few insights. First, "you had to be there." Only by being present at that moment was I able to be awed by one of God's creatures. That is true of all experiences. We have to be there completely if we are to have authenticity in our lives. Similarly, during our recent celebration of Shavuot, we reenacted the moment at Sinai when our ancestors encountered God. It is not enough to simply read their account of events; we need to experience for ourselves the entering into a relationship with the Holy One.

Second, "capturing the moment" is not always possible. "Is it live or is it Memorex?", is a great line for a commercial but ultimately the answer is obvious. The photos I took evoke powerful memories for me but cannot convey the essence of the experience to anyone else. This is true of our Jewish experiences as well. Our experiences create our attachment to Jewish life but those memories cannot be transferred to the next generation, we must create for them their own treasury of Jewish experiences.

Finally "a picture is worth a thousand words" - or in this case needed a thousand words to replace it. Let us always remember that what is most important is to be in the picture, to experience the moment.

is based on the famous Thirteen Principles of Faith of the great philosopher, physican, and writer Moses Maimonides, (Rambam)

The song "Ani Maamin", which translated, I believe, is often associated with the Shoah. Based on Rambam's teaching of the principles of faith, it declares that with full devotion, we Jews believe in Adonai and that we have hope for our future. Sung even at desperate times our belief endures.

These principles clearly articulate our faith as Jewish people. Upon singing these awesome words we must be moved to do something. We are now full of spirituality, and renewed by our prayer experience. Shabbat is such a wonderful peaceful and restful day, and yes, we are filled with "Joy oy oy"! But what do we do next. Ani ma-amin, I believe!

Again Rambam has an answer for us. We must do as the words of the Torah teaches us, me must give of ourselves and give Tzedakah. The 8 steps of giving charity, known as "Maimonides Ladder of Tzedakah", are a perfect prescription.

The Ladder

Giving Unwillingly
Giving less than one should but
cheerfully
Giving after being asked
Giving before being asked
Giving without knowing the

receiver
Giving anonymously to someone you now is needy
Giving anonymously to an
anonymous person
Helping a person to help him/
herself

- Giving Unwillingly Lowest on the ladder is the person who gives only because s/ he is forced to do so. This is a gift of the hand but not of the heart.
- Giving less than one should but cheerfully. Of course, one should not five less than one should. Even so, if the gift is made with good will, its smallness is partly redeemed.
- Giving after being asked It is almost as good as giving before being asked, if one gives cheerfully and as much as one can.
- 4. Giving before being asked When we see a need, it is good to give without waiting to be asked. But we may spoil our giving if we make too much of a show of it and embarrass the one who receives.
- Giving without knowing the receiver. The needy person may know from whom the gift has come. But the giver does not know to whom it went.
- Giving anonymously to someone you now is needy This gift is made, but to a person who is known to be needy.
- Giving anonymously to an anonymous person this is the best way to give
- Helping a person to help him/herself. To help a person to find work or learn a trade, to give a person a loan to start a

business, is the highest form of charity.

My first year as Cantor of Congregation B'nai Tikvah has been a very fulfilling experience for me. Yet I know that there is so much more to be done. The summer is great time to plan for our future. We prepare for a new year by taking a personal inventory. Looking forward, incorporating these principles into our daily lives. will make this a better world for all. There is so mush that we can do to help our world improve, this is one way. But try not to be overwhelmed by the possibilities and just do something, anything.

#### THE ABC's of PARENTING

In the Torah, Deuteronomy 6:6-7, are the words which give us the responsibility to teach Judaism to our children: "Set these words, which I command you this day, upon your heart. Teach them faithfully to your children, speak of them in your home and on your way .... " Since ancient times, we have taken this responsibility seriously, making sure that our children receive a Jewish education through the synagogue and home observance and celebration. Sometimes, though, we are so busy making sure that our children "do as we say," we forget to set the example so that they "do as we do."

The ABC's of Parenting by Leah Davies provides us with a list of important things for all of us to keep in mind ---parents and teachers alike. And, what better time to start to reflect on these statements than the summer.

Accept and value yourself and your child.

Be consistent, honest, fair, and firm as you relate to your child.

Concentrate on what you like about your child and comment on it

Develop interests of your own.

Encourage your child to discuss ideas and goals, expressing the belief that he or she can do many things

Forgive your child's mistakes, which are a natural part of learning.

Gladly share your time, affection, and support.

Help your child feel safe and secure.

Interest your child in work by complimenting his or her efforts.

Joyfully take pleasure in life.

Keep harsh criticisms to yourself; avoid using "should" and "ought."

Let your child experience the results of his or her behavior.

Model by example those qualities you want your child to have. Negotiate privileges and responsibilities, avoiding overindulgence.

Offer some choices, allowing your child to make decisions.

Problem-solve with your child, listen carefully to his or her thoughts and feelings.

Quit blaming, shaming, and threatening.

Respect your child's right to grow at his or her own rate without being pushed or compared to others.

Share household tasks among all family members so that your child makes a contribution and feels a sense of belonging.

Take time to read with your child, thus instilling a love of books and learning.

Use a photo album to record pleasant family memories.

Value honesty, kindness, dependability, truthfulness, and caring.

Weather trials together as a family.

X Examine your attitude toward your child.

Yield to professional advice concerning healthy living habits.

Zestfully participate in a variety of family traditions and activities.

I truly believe that to create an environment, which will foster a positive Jewish identity, we must have an environment that allows our children to grow and develop to be the best they can be in all ways.

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

#### RITUALLY SPEAKING How do we assign High Holiday Honors?

Each year, around this time, the Ritual Committee and Synagogue Board set out to determine who will be given honors during Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services. Undoubtedly, we receive questions regarding how we decide who gets an honor. Here is the most current procedure that the Ritual Committee and Synagogue Board follow. Of course, if you have any questions or concerns, please bring them to our attention.

The High Holiday Committee, consisting of the Ritual Chair, High Holiday Chair, Past Ritual Chairs, President, and Executive Board representative, contacts the synagogue executive board, Rabbi, Cantor, school administrator, and heads of major committees. At this point in the search, the committee is seeking input regarding congregants who have, in some fashion, contributed their resources to the synagogue and/or the community and who are deserving of an honor. So, now is the time to bring to the attention of the synagogue or various organizations leaders those whom you feel are deserving of an honor.

The Committee considers all of the honorees suggested by the various arms of the synagogue. The following criteria are also considered:

- Have the recommended honorees been given an honor during the past 2 years? Basically, there are enough honors to assign to approximately 1/3<sup>rd</sup> of the congregation each year.
- Current year Board of Trustees
- · Current year Executive Board members not coming back for another year
- Cohane Aliyot and Leviim Aliyot are assigned to each tribe, respectively
- Torah honors (Yisrael Aliyot, Lifting, Wrapping, Holding, Reading, and Gabaiim), Chanting Haftarah, are given to those congregants who have been selected to receive a high honor
- New members

#### Additionally:

- Past Presidents of B'nai Tikvah and its predecessor synagogues and the Current Executive Board will each hold a Torah during Kol Nidre Recitation
- USY will lead Ashrei
- Cantor will honor congregants by asking them to assist in leading services.
- Shofar Blowers are assigned to those who can
- The previous year's B'nai Mitzvah students are honored during Havdallah Services

The Committee then meets to assign the honors. Letters are mailed out during the summer, responses are tracked, and the honors list is created. The letters inform the honoree that they have been selected for an honor and ask that they respond to the committee either to accept the honor or to respectively decline. Many congregants decline honors for various reasons (don't want, unsure, travel). We try to track declines so we can offer them honors again in the future.

Unfortunately, many congregants accept their honor and do not show up at the front of the sanctuary, closest to the ramp, at the designated time, which is one or two pages before they actually need to be on the bima. Those honors are quickly filled at the discretion of the Ritual Committee Ushers.

All in all, the process seems to work. Of course, we sometimes overlook the obvious, so if we have, please contact us as soon as possible. We will make every effort to accommodate those opportunities that arise.

Thank you all for making this process a successful one. We look forward to, once again, enjoying the High Holidays together as a Jewish Community and honoring those that have served us well.

## Sending a message of support to Israel

Eleven hours on an overcrowded bus and four hours withering in sweltering heat.

What could possibly have possessed me, or about 100,000 other people, to voluntarily endure such conditions?

Our love for Israel.

Earlier this month, throngs and throngs of Jewish and non-Jewish enthusiasts from across the United States gathered on the lawn in front of the Capitol Building in Washington, D.C. As a 14-yearold Jew from South Brunswick, I was just as important to the cause as every other supporter in attendance.

From the moment I departed the bus, I was met with an incredible sight: Lining the streets as if waiting to purchase sold-out concert tickets was a sea of humanity, slowly drifting through the capital. Blocking traffic and awing bystanders, the procession continued toward the common destination. As I ambled along with the rest of my group, I could overhear tidbits of conversation blended between Hebrew and English. Peering skyward, I spied numerous signs blaring out bilingual proclamations. What a spectacle it was to be surrounded by Hebrew in the heart of the United States!

Nearing the Capitol, I was overwhelmed by the mass of people crowded together in such a small area. If I strained my ears, I could barely detect the melodies of people joining together in song, and though I did not know the words, I was compelled to sing along.

Hand in hand, my group proceeded toward an entrance to the grounds. Waiting patiently, we noticed the line was not moving. To our dismay, we discovered our admittance had been barred, as the lawn was full.

After traveling so far, it seemed that five uniformed men were going to exclude us. Yet, we were undaunted.

Like thousands of others also turned away, I contributed to the congestion of the area circling the Capitol. Everywhere I looked was somebody with a sign, a pamphlet or a pro-Israel shirt, and though I did not hear a single word uttered by the moving speakers, I was there and I was counted. That was all any of us had set out to accomplish, for we could have just as easily listened to the speeches from the comfort of our living rooms.

Together, we wanted to send a message of support to the people of Israel -- as they continue to stand in the face of terrorism and danger.

Thus, as I blindly cheered along with the crowd, I could not prevent my mind from wandering to Israeli friends who had recently spent two weeks in South Brunswick. I could not help but recall the fear I had seen in their eyes as they discussed the prospect of leaving their houses alone, something I take for granted.

And for this reason, I knew I had to cheer louder so that just maybe they could hear me and somehow feel safer.

I can only pray the message was received.
