RABBI ELIGBERG ASKS:

Do YOU think you've got a prayer?

If we don't communicate, you haven't got a prayer. -God Talk to Me. -God We really should get to know each other better. -God

These were part of a series of billboards that appeared throughout the southern United States a few years ago. While the billboards created a bit of a controversy, they also demanded of the reader that they think, if only for a moment, about God. In particular, these messages raised the issue of prayer, of dialogue with the Holy One.

Prayer is a difficult subject to discuss because it is ultimately a very personal, even intimate experience. At least, that is how it is when prayer works. All too often we come away from the endeavor untouched, unmoved and unchanged. This is true for one who prays daily or infrequently. The difference between the two individuals is best reflected in a story told by Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, of blessed memory.

In eastern Europe, Heschel relates, certain professions were performed by individuals who traveled from town to town, village to village, providing their service to the people who lived there. Amongst these itinerant workers was a watchmaker. Whenever he arrived in a community he would go to the synagogue. That evening anyone who had a watch that needed repair would bring it along when they came to the evening service. The watches were all placed on one end of a long table. The watchmaker would work deep into the night fixing the watches. Those he repaired were placed at the far end of the long table. The watches he could not repair he returned to their original location.

It happened in one town that amongst the people who brought their watches for repair was the richest man in the community, who left his watch at the end of the long table. The next morning the rich man returns to discover that his was the only watch not repaired. He turns to the watchmaker in anger and demands to know why the watch had not been fixed while even the cheapest of the other watches had been done.

The watchmaker calmly picked up the cheap watch and said to the rich man, "When this man's watch stopped working, he was so in the habit of winding it that he kept on winding it even though it was not running. You, when your watch stopped running, you left it sitting in the drawer and the mechanism inside rusted and because of that I cannot fix it.

Heschel's story teaches us that the routine of prayer is valuable even if it not always efficacious. Personally, there are days when I find my prayers to be rushed and perfunctory. These are probably the days when I need the routine of prayer the most. It is on days like these that the process of praying occasionally succeeds in changing my focus and putting me in the presence of the Holy One. At the least, it has forced me to pause and make the effort.

The first and most important step in the process of prayer is being willing to stop what you are doing. We must get into the habit of winding ourselves up for prayer. Being there puts us into the arena where the action will take place.

EXPANSION UPDATE

From Mitch Frumkin, President

We have made quite a bit of progress since the October update that appeared in Hakol. A complete presentation of the expansion will be made at the Congregational Meeting on Thursday, December 12.

As you know, our expansion plans have been on hold for a number of months as we waited for the results of the wetlands analysis for the proposed construction area. In the last month we received verbal confirmation from the State Inspector that a small area of wetlands does exist in that area. We have worked with the Architect to reconfigure the "footprint" of the expansion. The changes that are necessary to avoid the wetlands area will have only a minimal impact on the proposed building configuration . We will also be rearranging some of the parking within the parking lot and realigning portions of the curbing.

We have also had discussions with the Township regarding the need to "reappear" before the Planning Board. Since the building footprint and total parking will be staying essentially the same as originally proposed we do not expect to be required to go before the Planning Board again. Based on these circumstances, it appears very likely that we will be starting construction in the Spring.

The December Dilemma

From mid- November through December 25th, we have a problem. We are reminded that during the this period of time we are outside the mainstream of American life. Christmas music, televisions specials, advertisements, decorations and commercials are all around us. Wherever you look, "the holiday spirit" fills the air. It is a beautiful time of year.

Acknowledging the reality of a different religious experience does not mean it should be grafted on to Jewish family life. In some cases, people even try to replace Christmas with Chanukah. This is ironic since the story of Chanukah is about NOT ADOPTING the dominant culture. Chanukah is a celebration of how we as a minority prevailed against a non-Jewish culture that was being forced on us.

Joel Grishaver, in his book 40 Things You Can Do to Save the Jewish People, says to actively go and visit or participate in a non-Jewish friend's Christmas celebration. Have fun, but know and understand, this is not our celebration...then he says invite your non-Jewish friends to come visit and participate in our parties--a Shabbat dinner, a Passover seder, etc. Celebrate that as a Jew you are different! This is not something to be avoided or to be ashamed of-it is something to be proud of.

We need to teach our children about our Jewish holidays and our Jewish heritage. They will come to understand that each religion has its own holidays and observances. They will also begin to understand that our holidays are not in competition with those celebrated by other religions. A positive appreciation and respect must be encouraged. The stronger the experience of Jewish life, the less the attraction to outside influences. So...be active, be proud, and be appreciative of a diverse, free society.

CHAI SCHOOL "CHAI" LIGHTS

Bend, squat, and pull on a Sunday morning. Is it an exercise class? No, but it was an exercise in doing mitzvot for those in need of food. On Sunday, November 3rd the teenagers in our "Chai" School, along with their teachers, Sara Chvala, Joel Cohen, Michael Friedman, Philip Gordon, Becky Leventhal, Jenny Kagan, Josh Seigle, Kfir Weinraub and energetic parent volunteers: Arthur Biderman and Bobbi Binder, and the high school class of Har Sinai Temple in Trenton harvested food at Giamarese Farms in East Brunswick. They collected one hundred eighty-one bags of collard greens, which amazingly weighed in at 3600 pounds! The New Jersey Farmers Against Hunger truck was there to whisk nearly 2 tons of food to soup kitchens to feed the hungry. Students got down and dirty in the process, but equipped with garden gloves and determination, the task was an exercise of satisfaction in knowing that those less fortunate would 'reap' the benefits of their reaping!!

Their choices: picking a pumpkin, seeing the turkeys, going on the hayride, or taking the school bus. Believe it or not, this class selected riding on the school bus their favorite part of the day!

Special Programs: Interesting, educational, slimy, slippery, but not dangerous, would best describe our recent reptile show. The children were shown an array of snakes, iguanas, lizards, and a huge boa constrictor. They enjoyed viewing and even touching many of the reptiles.


