Hanukkah



One of the signs of intellectual growth is the realization that the grade school version of history just ain't so. The adult version is almost always more nuanced and uglier than the G-rated version. At the same time, it is almost always deeper, and more relevant to our lives.

Such is the case with Chanukah. There is probably no idea more common, and more oversimplified, than the notion that "Chanukah was a struggle for religious freedom—in fact the very first such struggle!" It's understandable why our leaders and teachers would want to assert that idea, particularly in America.

The very idea of a ragtag army fighting for religious freedom is quintessentially American, and nothing bolsters the notion of Jewish-Americanism than the image of (our guy) Judah Maccabee fighting with a copy of the First Amendment in his hand.

But it just ain't so (sorry to disappoint). The very first act of the Hasmonean Rebellion was a Jew killing another Jew who chose to sacrifice to a Greek god. I don't think that's what James Madison had in mind.

So what were the Maccabees fighting about? Simple. They were fighting for our right to be ourselves. To follow our traditions, our way of life. They were...wait for it...ethnonationalists.

Now, I hasten to mention that ethnonationalism is a dirty word these days. It is often associated with thuggish right-wing populists like Hungary's Viktor Orban and Brazil's Jair Bolsinaro. And they are in turn linked to the most despicable perversion of ethnonationalism—Nazi Germany. Murderous xenophobia hardly seems like a model worth emulating.

But the message of the Torah is that true ethnonationalism need not take such an ugly turn. Unlike Nazi fascism (or for that matter, Russian Communism, or Isis Caliphate aspirations, or, most important for us, Greek Hellenistic imperialists), true ethnonationalists are not interested in conquering the world, or even conquering their neighbors. They are interested in living out their own lives, and letting others do the same.

Returning to Chanukah, the challenge our ancestors faced was the Greek Hellenistic culture—a culture so powerful that it succeeded in destroying the thousands-of-years-old Egyptian and Babylonian cultures. That Hellenistic culture offered our ancestors the chance to "be like everyone else."

The Maccabees said, "No thank you. We would rather be us." Antiochus said, "I'm not giving you the option." And the Maccabees said, "Good luck with that."

Now, the Maccabees did not live in a cocoon. They were clearly impacted by the Hellenistic *zeitgeist*. But they did not abandon their Jewish culture to experience it. Instead they looked for ways in which to enrich our Jewish culture with the best of the outside world. We should learn to do the same.

Have a wonderful Chanukah!

It's an odd feeling, a yearning for tradition while living in a rapidly changing community. Holiday celebrations that we so desperately want/need to perpetuate challenges the recognition that our reality posits challenges to our perceptions.

I'm referring to life at B'nai Tikvah, So many of you are working so very hard to maintain our community. Sisterhood, Men's Club, Bikur Cholim, the Social Action committee have never been more engaged and dedicated as they are now. Our needy family program and Chesed for Chanukah are all well supported. But, if it was the only time that I came to shul, then shul would only be about saying kaddish and remembering the sorrow of my losses. Going to shul is about everything that is good and wonderful about being Jewish and a part of our Jewish family. Going to shul is about singing and laughing, talking with friends and sometimes we rest our eyes. Shul is a place where we receive the sparks of the Torah every Shabbat and we are inspired by the insights of our Rabbi. Shul is a place where we can be alone with our hopes and dreams. We thank G-d that we are so fortunate. We are able to do all of this and more with the support of our friends and our traditions.

How in the world can I make this a better experience for us, especially when we cloak ourselves in sadness, remorse and obligation when we enter the doors of our shul? How, I really need to know, because I can do better.

"Imagine there's no synagogues...... It's easy if you try....."

How's that for an opening? Well, when you're living within an area where your Jewish population is indeed shrinking, this is a real threat for any and all of us looking for a religious place to call our religious home. But it's even more than a population shift. It's the conflict being created by those who have come out from deep under rocks, believing that a social voice of hatred, antisemitism, and bigotry is now acceptable in our society. It was never more on the stage of life as recently for all of us when an individual became an FBI target by threatening synagogues in the entire State of NJ. Thankfully, he was caught quickly. But, bottom line, this was an unprovoked attack on our houses of worship. It was a direct targeting of the entire Jewish Community.

If any of us think of B'nai Tikvah as only a house of worship, you are indeed mistaken. We are first and foremost a community. When we all step back and look at the world at large, all of us find discomfort in social media and real attacks against "The Invisible Human." What do I mean by "The Invisible Human"? I mean bucketing an entire group by a similar thing in common and generating negativity towards them without any sense of the individuality contained within the larger group. It wasn't about the B'nai Tikvah Building in the above or other buildings like B'nai Tikvah's. It was the fact that this is the place where "that community" is plentiful and together.

My personal draw to CBT has always been "the changes to community." You see, growing up and as a member of a few different synagogues, it only meant one thing: religion. Sure, every once in a while we had a gathering. But usually those were circled around Jewish Holidays or targeted events. There was never a moment that I remember where we had a synagogue hike, bike ride, open house, picnic, golf outing, etc... Sure we had "a community," but in too many ways from my memory, there needed to be a purpose or obligation as opposed to, "Hey, let's just do something together." This to me has always been "The Secret Sauce" of B'nai Tikvah. The fact that I have always felt that sense of a community. Not just a synagogue to pray.

Recently, B'nai Tikvah has really been stepping up our game in options, events, gatherings, etc... I can't begin to tell you how blessed I feel every day sitting in meetings

with my fellow board members and listening to their passion and desire to ensure our calendar is full of options that any and all can enjoy. It saddens me at time to hear some say they feel, "disengaged." While these are most certainly in the minority, it does matter to all of us who are trying to spark togetherness, especially after such a challenging time in the history of not only our country, but community, here at CBT.

As we get older, we realize the importance of belonging, participating, and living life to its fullest. It doesn't matter how young you are at the moment or whether you feel old or seasoned. Every day is a gift and enjoying life, stepping out into the world... this all must matter. If it doesn't, it should. At CBT, we recognize that everyone has circles of friends, obligations, and events outside of CBT. This is wonderful and meaningful. But we all should know that our CBT community here would love to share a moment in each of our lives as a connection as well. Many reading this might say, "What is he talking about?" That's good!!!! You're embracing wonderful things when you're connected to it at CBT. But some reading this, if you haven't attended one of the many things we're offering, I have to ask, "Why?"

We never get to know others without coming out into the world. You'll never climb a mountain in your house (stairs don't count). Food doesn't have taste if it's being served miles away (like in our building). A warm embrace (or even a fist bump or forearm connection) doesn't touch on Zoom. When I first joined CBT, I knew very few people. But attending more and more functions here allowed me to meet so many people and share in a community I recognized won't be the same without the embrace of togetherness.

I love our Jewish Community. We should all love our Jewish Community. All of us would love nothing more than living in a world where hatred and bigotry just didn't exist. While that might never happen, when you embrace a community, a haven of togetherness, and contribute towards its continued existence..... well, it's an amazing feeling. The world doesn't always reach out to any of us. Sometimes we all need to reach back. Come to a service, join a group, volunteer even a moment of your time once or often. All of this is about our community. If those attached to Judaism don't stay close as a tightly bonded group, no one will make it happen. We are all in this together.

"Imagine a world with no synagogues..... Imagine a world with no Jewish Community....." It isn't easy if you try, only if we all neglect the value and importance of it. As long as we as a community engage and stay strong together, you'll always find a warm home right here at CBT.






