From Rabbi Robert L. Wolkoff

For the Love of G-d

HAKOL



We have entered the Hebrew month of Elul, at the conclusion of which we celebrate Rosh Hashanah, the beginning of the new year.

A new beginning. And the question is, "beginning of what?"

The rabbis have a delicious answer to that question, based on the very name of the month Elul. They saw the name as an abbreviation for "I am my beloved's, and my beloved is mine." (It works in Hebrew, trust me).

Put another way, Elul is the month of reconciliation. Over the course of time, it is natural to drift away from those around us—from friends and family, from classmates and business associates, from ourselves and from G-d. The kabbalists referred to this world as "alma d'peyruda," the world of division, difference, disunity. It is as if the centrifugal forces of life pull everything apart. Perhaps we can call it social and spiritual entropy.

The new beginning is our opportunity to bring all things back together, to realign our lives with the Source of All Life. It is a time of introspection, a time to ask ourselves, "Have I drifted away from that which is most valuable to me?" And the follow-up, "What do I need to do to restore my relationships, to reconcile my differences, to experience, once again,

the feeling of loving and being beloved?" Where to begin? Whatever the reason for our distancing and alienation, it's a reason. It doesn't just disappear because we want it to. Think about a conflict with a friend. You were friends for a reason. There was a disagreement for a reason. Now what? Here's a suggestion from Ralph Waldo Emerson: "Never lose an opportunity of seeing anything that is beautiful; for beauty is G-d's handwriting—a wayside sacrament. Welcome it in every fair face, in every fair sky, in every fair flower, and thank G-d for it as a cup of blessing." To which I would add, look for the beauty in yourself. And then be prepared to look for the beauty in the other—whoever the other may be. These, too, are cups of blessing. And then look for the beauty in G-d.

With beauty comes wonder, and with wonder, love. And with love, comes an awareness of anything that disrupts that love, the flaws and habits we all have that get in the way of our relationship with our beloved—human or divine.

With that awareness, teshuvah, the possibility of repentance and reconciliation, looms large.

Overcoming distance, changing direction in our lives, is not easy. We are as addicted to our bad habits as those who struggle with substance abuse are addicted to drugs or alcohol. Beauty, wonder, love, teshuvah can help us change all of that. We can relearn that we are G-d's beloved, as G-d is ours. And from that love, flows everything.

From Cantor Bruce Rockman

You May Be Uplifted

Psalm 27, the additional reading that we add to our morning and evening services from the month prior to our High Holy Days through the conclusion of our holiday season, maps out the pathway to genuine teshuvah, repentance, for us. By reciting and understanding it, we are able to travel that path (toward repentance). The psalmist begins with an expression of complacent self-assurance but that is only the starting point. The tone grows darker, progressing from expressions of yearning for G-d's presence and protection to petitions conveying insecurity and fear of abandonment. Then, in verse 13, to the edge of the abyss: "Had I not the assurance that I would enjoy the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living . . . "—the concluding ellipsis express the terror inherent in what is left unsaid. Based on an article by Alan Cooper JTS Professor of Jewish Studies.

For so many years, I've read this prayer and I've depended upon its reminder that we are in a period of reassessing the year soon to be completed, and anticipating the new year, surely preparing to pledge to do better. It is amazing how we go through our ups and downs, and still we are blessed with an opportunity for a do-over.

I guarantee that we have all performed some *mitzvot* this year. While falling short at times, the promise of repentance from G-d and each other is so reassuring. This is a reason for praying and what this psalm, in particular, does for me. You know me by now and my optimistic approach. It is both organic and is still developing. As the psalm explains, I have my moments of doubt and, of course, my life is not devoid of missteps. Still, I look forward to what can be and see so much good and so many blessings in the world.

I'm sure that you have heard the expression that the definition of insanity is doing the same thing and expecting a different result. Well, call me crazy, but there are a lot of things that we must do until we get them right. It can take a long time before we "get it", but I think that there are times that we have to trust the process, thus repeating an action multiple times. Coming to services and praying is one of those sort of "crazy" things. Why do we do the same prayers everyday, every Shabbat? Ultimately, out of the process of gathering, seeds are sewn and beautiful community grows through the nurturing "Presence"-G-d and our traditions.

Prayer is a not only a method of community building but also an avenue to spiritual and creative growth. It is a wonderful path to search for inner peace, possibly helping us cope with our daily challenges. And while alone with my prayers, I'm reminded that I am standing with you and G-d.

I suggest that you spend time somewhere; here at the synagogue, at home or anywhere that you can access Psalm 27. Read it, think about it daily, and let's see what it does for you. It's not really crazy and you may be uplifted.

The Ghost of CBT

Recently, Bruce Springsteen wrote an incredible new song called, "I'll See You In My Dreams". Whether or not you're a fan



of his music, I'd encourage EVERYONE to listen to it once. If you're REALLY resistant to listening to his music, at the very least, Google the lyrics, because the words in it and the story it tells opens up visions in your mind of those we will always love and care about, and while physically gone, their impact never fades, because, "we see them in our dreams".

I appreciate every month having this space to express to all of you. Those who know me know that I'm an inspirational writer. No matter what I author, I need a spark of energy to begin. Events in my world over the last month have brought me to today.

At Shabbat Services recently, I heard my mom Sherry's voice. It was a moment, but from my spot on the Bima I looked out and didn't see her. After all, she physically left all of us in 2017. But I heard her. Not sure why, but I did.

It reminded me of when her name was installed in our sanctuary on our memorial board above that of my dad, sister and grandparents and the Rabbi turned to me, "There are no other spaces underneath; you might consider moving them all". My reply without hesitation, "Rabbi, you know my mom (she assisted in the office for 10 years)...... You don't think when my time comes and if my plaque is on the other side of the sanctuary, I won't hear her yelling at me?" as we both broke out in laughter. I only feel for whomever is in the sanctuary many years from now, concerned because they hear voices of two people yelling at each other across the room. Yeah, that will be Mom and me.

Knowing the many legacies we have here at B'nai Tikvah, I have to believe I'm not the only one who hears and sees the many that have passed through the doors of our synagogue. Not just family, but friends as well. I will often look at the memorial plaques and see the names of so many people who were physically here when I came through the doors for the first time in 2003. Sad indeed, but when you look at those walls, many of those were the people responsible for CBT moving ahead and those that built a new brick daily to the life of the environment all of us enjoy today.

Let's even go deeper than that, beyond just CBT. We are all where we are today because of those that gave us all life at one time to breathe, eat, drink, dance, entertain, laugh, cry, pray..... etc..... well before we became independent in the way we are now defined. At some point in all of our lives, we needed help, assistance, and support. Many of the times we turn to family and friends. Yet sometimes it's not just those folks that come to our aid. At times, we hire or engage with those we might have never met previously to do things or help in ways we can't do alone. Everyone is at one time, "Unknown to us". But at some point in our world, one turned into many.

The synagogue we all know today as B'nai Tikvah was not founded as B'nai Tikvah. Three area synagogues decided to unite as a community to share: Share in religion, community, mission, and a desire to be surrounded by many more "just like them, but different." Just like them in their appreciation of Judaism, we all are different. Not any more different than those that we might say are in our "inner circle." We each have our own uniqueness, but we all also have similarities. The beauty of the world is someone can offer something at any given time that might help others when they can't help themselves, but between those moments, enough to enjoy who each other are.

The Many Ghosts of CBT are some of those who built CBT. Thankfully, we still have some of the builders with us here who are proud and devoted and will continue to beam in pride when looking at CBT. Why did they build it? Because the things that were similar were the things that brought them together and that in itself justifies the statement, "Together, we are stronger." You can find many of those names on the walls, halls, boards, classrooms, sanctuary, social hall, spirit, and love, which every day grew and should continue to thrive in our building. Do we believe that all of these folks were "best friends?" Maybe or maybe not. But they worked towards growing a community that found commonalties to share and the desire to recognize that only "those in the know" could offer many of the elements to be there for each other, as a group at times or when someone needed them. Social Action's Chaverim (friends) program launched in February in collaboration with Jewish Family Services (JFS) to promote social connection and support good nutrition among our members aged 60 plus. Improvement in social interaction and nutrition have the potential to positively affect health and quality of life. JFS provides the Kosher lunch, from area restaurants, alternating the meals between meat and dairy, and Social Action funds the programming from your donations. We meet ten times a year. The lunch is provided through a state grant which does not fully cover the cost of the meals, so although there is no charge for the meals, an \$8 donation is suggested and greatly appreciated.

Laurie Boehm, Director of Senior Services at JFS is always present to greet our attendees, check them in, chat, and serve them lunch along with another JFS staff member. They are thrilled to spend time with us and Laurie says that we have the nicest congregants! I am always present along with the great volunteers, two Shelly's- Talmud and Wistreich, to make sure the room is set up properly, to greet our Chaverim, welcome the presenters, help serve lunch and clean up. I am privileged to team up with all these wonderful ladies, and to meet new people and grow my relationships with those I already know.

At the five Chaverim gatherings we've held, I've watched old friends all sit together for lunch and catch up on each other's family news, and people who knew nobody be warmly welcomed and invited to share a table. 

I remember watching the movie, "Witness" back in 1985. What I remember in the movie was the scene when the young couple in the Amish community was married, and as an entire community contribution, EVERYONE helped build a barn for them in a day: The men were constructing, the women were making lunch and dinner for the builders, and the children even had roles and tasks in the process. Each of those participating weren't necessarily the "best friends" of all the others, but the community came together in common need and made something special and continued to be there for each other. That was also demonstrated in a bunch of other scenes; a community there at any given moment to support and be there for each other. Bottom line, without everyone's contribution, that barn doesn't get built in one day.

Every generation hands the keys to the castle of life to the next generation.
