Just One More Kopek

Here's one of my favorite exchanges from Fiddler on the Roof:

[TEVYE, spoken]
And Nahum, the beggar

[NAHUM, spoken]
Alms for the poor, alms for the poor

[LAZAR, spoken] Here, Reb Nahum, is one kopek

[NAHUM, spoken]
One kopek? Last week you gave me two kopeks

[LAZAR, spoken]
I had a bad week

[NAHUM, spoken]
So, if you had a bad week, why should I suffer?

Ah, the chutzpah! All the delicious charm in traditional Jewish culture can be found in that exchange—which figures, because it's from the song *Tradition!*

We can learn something important if we look at this exchange a little more carefully. Notice what Lazar doesn't say. He never looks at Nahum and says "What are you coming back to me for? I gave you 2 kopeks last week!" Why doesn't he say this? Because he knows that needs are ongoing, and that it's a mitzvah to give tzedakah every time you're asked if the need is pressing.

All this came to mind recently at the Friends of the Israel Defense Force breakfast that we were proud to host here at CBT. (It always gives me great pleasure when I can boast that we are the most actively Zionist congregation in our area!). Howard Gases, Director of the New Jersey Chapter of the FIDF, did the "ask" at the end of the program, and said, "If you



haven't already donated, the envelopes are on your tables." We've all heard similar statements at virtually every charity event we've attended.

But allow me to suggest that this approach is misguided. What would Nahum the beggar say? "Because you donated last week, you're not going to donate today?" Put another way, "Because I could eat this week, I don't need to eat next week?!"

If ever we needed to change our attitude about tzedakah, it's now. Normally, at this time of year, I pull out my list of charities and start writing checks. Lots of checks. And all year long, I get solicitations that go straight into recycling, because I know that next December I'm going to take out my list again and start writing checks. But I realize now that as far as Israel is concerned, that long-term schedule is a luxury neither Israel, nor I, can afford.

The needs now are so unbelievably pressing. JNF is running a 100 million dollar emergency campaign. FIDF needs about 150 million for its emergency campaign. Federation is looking for half a billion dollars.

So who cares if you already made a contribution? Now we all know that money doesn't grow on trees, and none of us have endlessly deep pockets. But no one is asking you to starve in order to give. (In fact, halachah doesn't allow you to give that much.) Next time you find yourself being solicited, the question to ask yourself is not whether you already gave, or how much you budgeted for December. The question is: could I give more? Right now? In all honesty, the answer is almost always yes.

Even if it's just one kopek instead of two.

The Window is Open - All is Forgotten

"These words that I command you this day shall be taken to heart. Teach them to your children; speak of them when you sit in your home, when you walk on your way, when you lie down and when you rise up".

Many of you are familiar with these words from recitation of the *Sh'ma*. What are the words that we are expected to teach our children? We are commanded to teach our children words of Torah, the commandments, the mitzvoth, *all* that is expected of us. Sure, I believe that we are already teaching our children some Torah values, as we understand them. I also believe that we need to know them a little better to teach them.

You may ask, are you telling me that I should teach the Torah to my children? I reply, yes. Each day as we nurture our children, we are teaching these values as we have learned them from our parents and teachers, principles that are based on lessons from our Torah. This is surely a good thing. Though we have been influenced by the teaching of the Torah, it remains unfortunate that our generation has become incomplete in the understanding of Torah, thus we are rarely able to draw on the transcendent message that Judaism provides.

The window for us to change and grow is wide open, right now. But, is the window closing? When the horrors of October 7th were first revealed, with the devastation of the brutal attack on Jewish life everywhere, I, like so many, recognized this seminal moment in our tortured history as an opportunity. This turning point in our consciences would be a game changer. The better Israel defends our existence, the ever increasing calls for our demise seem to grow louder.



The window for our own unity is open. The threat is on our doorstep. We must be united here at B'nai Tikvah-the window is wide open for each of us to forget about our differences and unite in solidarity, with the opportunity to work for the secure future for the Jewish people everywhere. Forget any personal differences; agree to disagree and take on this most important initiative; we must keep the window wide open.

As soon as the attacks began, the wide political gulf between Israelis seemed to disappear, united in hope for the survival of our homeland prevailed. I'm certain that in time, many Israelis will return to their political corners; still what we experienced made us all recognize that this existential fight was ours to battle together. A united B'nai Tikvah is a reminder of our common call, our hope to be a free people in our own country and throughout the world.

We are all B'nai Yisrael, the Sons and Daughters of Israel. We are also B'nai Tikvah, the Sons and Daughters of Hope. B'nai Tikvah is a diverse group of Jewish families with a variety of points of view. The goal for us is to create a vibrant place where our understanding of Judaism is studied, nurtured, amplified and valued.

Over the last few months, we have seen so many incidents that are beyond "human like". We have seen so many fabrics of "Jewish Life" being impacted that I sometimes need to really control a bit of my own anger. The one that is really standing out to me was the incident in Philadelphia with Goldie Falafel and the group that chose to protest outside like this incredibly devoted business that has existed in the Philadelphia community for years is at the center of anything more than serving Kosher food to an accepting city. Sorry, whatever position you choose, this was pure anti-Semitism to the core. Historically, people with knowledge said, "This was what happened in Germany pre-war."

It really doesn't matter how large the Jewish population is anywhere in the world or how it's broken down geographically. What it does speak loud and clear to is how important it is for us as Jews to support our Jewish Community in any way, means, or involvement we feel we are devoted to invest. But the most important word in that entire statement is 'Community'. A community is not a single family or can truly be defined as several families. It's many families like what we have right here at CBT. A community like CBT always should remind us that in our Judaism, we are not alone. There are many supporters and there is strength in the numbers when you walk into our building and know that in your Judaism, that love is right here.

But a virtual experience is not a community and Zoom wasn't intended to be an escape from togetherness.

At this moment in time, it is more important than ever for all of us as a community to be together, support one another, offer a variety of gathering opportunities, and to show the entire area that we are an incredible village of compassion, sharing, caring, and love. When we were all together on December 3rd, you could see the smiles, feel the community, and not only gather together, but share in a religious experience that indeed defines our uniqueness. No one will ever do that for us but us. Our community depends on all of us being in this together.

But I want to state again how important it is for all of us, for our entire community, to Come Belong To Tikvah and when we say come belong, it means to gather right here together. Because now more than ever, a strong Jewish Community is our best support network.



Missed Connections by Laura Waksman

On Sunday, November 19th, I had planned to attend the Sisterhood of Salaam Shalom east coast conference at Rutgers for the first time, as a nonmember, never having attended any of their events. The Sisterhood, as I wrote in last month's Hakol, is a national Jewish Muslim women's peace organization with chapters in Canada as well. Well, we know what happens when we make plans. My husband Howard tested positive for Covid the day before, and though I tested negative, I chose not to attend and potentially spread a contagious virus that I might be brewing. All was not lost. I remembered reading something about attending virtually, and with one email Saturday night, a wonderful staff person got me set up to attend via Zoom.

My impression throughout the day was that, although learning and thought-provoking speakers and discussions were an important part of the day, during these precarious times it was, (and is), fostering connections that was the key message at the conference. And I missed out on that- completely.

Had I been there in the room of 160 women, observing facial expressions, and sensing the emotions around me when Roberta Elliott, the Jewish board president, and a daughter of a Holocaust survivor, and Tahija Vikalo, the executive director, a Muslim from Bosnia, and survivor of the siege of Sarajevo spoke, I likely would have been in a state of emotional overwhelm. You can see a moving brief video of an interview with

NBC news they did after October 7th on NBC news' YouTube channel. Put Sisterhood Salaam Shalom in the search bar. Roberta and Tahija talked about this being a very painful time, and that without each other and the Sisterhood they could not get through this. At times when they don't want to talk, they push through and keep talking because they know the importance of seeing humanity in each other.

Wendy Goldberg spoke inspiringly of the Tri Faith Initiative (Trifaith.org), a synagogue, mosque, church and community center which sits on 38 acres and which she co-founded in Omaha, Nebraska in 2020. Its mission is "To cultivate inclusive environments to advance interfaith relationships and understanding." As she spoke of her background and realized dreams, I know the "wow" feeling I felt and that must have been expressed on my face, would have been reflected back had I been observing the 160 women attending in person.

Despite missing out on all the opportunities of in-person attendance, I still sensed the energy of the day and grasped the takeaways. We must cultivate more empathetic societies. There is a crisis of dialogue. We cannot ignore the rise in hate and other "ism", as this will determine the public health of our society and children for years to come.


