# Our Feet Were Dancing, **But Our Hearts Were Crying**

We have just celebrated the holiday of Tu b'Shvat, the fifteenth day of the Hebrew month of Shvat. This day is known as "the new year of the trees," and marks the time when sap starts flowing in fruitbearing trees in the Land of Israel.

Although not mentioned in the Tanach, Tu b'Shvat punches far above its weight in the popular Jewish imagination. Millions upon millions of trees have been planted on this holiday by Israeli schoolchildren, part of the JNF project that has greened Israel with a quarter billion trees. One of Jewish folklore's best known songs, "Hashkeydiyah porachat" "The almond tree is blossoming," is linked to this holiday because the almond tree is the first tree to blossom in Israel. I once had occasion to fly to Israel on Tu b'Shvat, and the entire Israeli landscape was dotted with white almond blossoms. It was a magnificent sight to see.

There is, in fact, a blessing one recites upon seeing those first blossoms: "Blessed are You, o Lord our G-d, King of the universe, Who has made nothing lacking in His world, and created in it goodly creatures and goodly trees to give humankind pleasure." In a world like ours, so often alienated from nature, a blessing like that is, well, a blessing, a gift to our jaded sensibilities.

In the middle of Kibbutz Lavi, a religious kibbutz in the Lower Galilee area, there is an almond tree. Hanging from it is a placard with the above mentioned blessing. This is a very practical solution to a very practical problem. The blessing is long-ish, and recited only once a year, so it's easy to forget the exact wording. And since this tree will definitely be the first blossoming tree on the kibbutz, someone decided to make everyone's life easy by reminding them of the text. In fact, in keeping with the principle that "one should run to do a mitzvah," as soon as the tree blossoms, the word spreads so people do coming running, literally, to have the experience and fulfill their religious obligation.



In light of the recent horrible events in Israel, the full horror of which is even today not fully appreciated, cute songs about almond blossoms may seem dramatically untimely, if not inappropriate. But that is a misreading of how the Jewish spirit works. Rabbi Yehudah Gilad, who serves on Kibbutz Lavi, had this to say about his experience of Oct. 7, Simchat Torah, when informed of the massacre, "I fell silent, completely in shock despite not yet knowing the full magnitude of what had happened. I asked if the leadership of the kibbutz and the local emergency team were aware of the situation. He confirmed that they knew; we decided together to continue the dancing. Our feet were dancing but our hearts were crying. I looked around at the spirited dancers, young and old, who were rejoicing for Simchat Torah, without knowing that our country was experiencing one of its darkest hours."

"Our feet were dancing but our hearts were crying." Such is the pathos of Jewish life. We have a great deal about which to cry. But dance we must, and dance we will. And we will plant trees, and watch them blossom, and bless G-d--in spite of it all.

# Knock, Knock Who's there?



Dear Friends,

I have been trying to write to you about something that has been bothering me for some time now. I've been associated with B'nai Tikvah for more than 25 years and I have been a member of the clergy team for 22 of those years. B'nai Tikvah and the Jewish people are always in a crisis. Now more than ever in our lives, we are experiencing an existential crisis before our eyes. I am not asking you for a donation.

We are a pluralistic Jewish community and we are all devastated by effects of the war in Israel. The loss of human life, whether by murderous terrorists or by the right to defend ourselves is tragic, but not equivalent. Our hearts bleed for every lost individual. I cannot pretend to fathom the depth of despair- I worry about and pray for every child of our members, family, friends and all of B'nai Yisrael.

Whether it is a crisis of the magnitude of this war, the need for a new ventilation system or the health and welfare of one of members, the request for a donation will not now or ever solve the issues with which we are confronted.

When tragedy strikes, like most crises, for a moment we forget about our personal problems and want to know what we can do to help Israel, the synagogue or our friends. Again donations seem to be what is being requested, and that is important, but why? And why do we care about our holy promised land, our synagogue, or one and another?

Because we have all be taught the value of Tikun Olam, that it is our responsivity to help to heal the world.

I find it much easier to write a check than to make a phone call. I know that I miss the mark often. I'm devastated about the loss of lives in Israel but I'm more accountable for the lives that I've harmed by neglecting to call a person in crisis.

Until we stop treating our responsibilities like a dreaded homework assignment, we will not be able fix the world.

Please do not forgive me for neglecting to call you; I pray that I will make amends. Please know that we all need to do much better. We are a pluralistic Jewish community and we are grappling with whatever that means. One thing that it does mean is that you have to get involved in doing acts of kindness, both in your daily lives and as a community.

We always see those requests that offer to double or triple our donations. Reaching out to a person in pain, community charitable initiatives are much greater than that. In order to be a thriving Jewish community, we need to take action and do for others. Tell me what you need. I believe that we need to explore and learn how B'nai Tikvah can make a difference and create a reservoir of good deeds.

Knock, Knock Who's there? G-d Please answer my prayers.

# A LITE LOOK ON THE WORLD Charlie Valan

As you're all reading this, hopefully I am recovering successfully from surgery to replace my left hip. Having been a competitive runner from the time I was 9 years old till my last real race in 2009 could have contributed to this being my second replacement (right one was replaced 7 years ago), but bottom line is my surgeon told me he's doing hip replacements on such a wide variety of people of all body types and histories, that there is no real pattern. It just happens. I have two friends that have been running for over 60 years (yes, that long) and both of them are still going strong.

I would like to thank everyone for their words of strength prior to my operation and all those with their kindness after. What I will say is bodily pain is no way to move through life and if there are solutions, research them all thoroughly and do something. Don't wait or put it off, because we are in such an incredible place with procedures now and having a pain free life should be a desire of all of us. I'd be more than happy to discuss my journey with anyone, just reach out.

But with all of that said, I went through this and realized that there were many humorous similarities between CBT and my surgery and hopefully by the time you finished reading this, it will at least bring a little smile to your face. First let's begin with the preparation. There is a well detailed manual that I had to follow specifically. Kind of like picking up the Siddur on every Shabbat service and knowing the flow will be the same. We don't part far from what we do and for surgery; they instill that you should follow along and make sure you don't miss a step, from the day before prep to hopefully all the steps they undertook during my operation.

When I was wheeled into the operating room, it was "temperature chilled", kind of like our sanctuary for services. How many times have people approached us during services and said, "its cold in here"? Well it was freezing in that operating room. I will say, we are trying to balance the temperature, but in most cases, yeah, it's chilled.

I looked around the operating room and counted over 10 people in there with me. Right away I thought, "This is a good day, we have a Minyan". So I knew right then and there that my surgery had meaningful devotion and most importantly, all the steps in fulfillment were there. I must also admit that with so many people, I figured no one would need my help so I decided to just sleep this one out, with a little help from the magic of an I.V. mixture. Wonder if it comes in an over the counter version? For the record, I never fall asleep in the cold room of our sanctuary, so this was a little different I guess (LOL).

After the surgery was over and I was fully awake, I was greeted with a meal. Not your typical Kiddush Lunch following services, but the food was more than satisfying given all the time spent going through the preparation and procedure. From there, that leads to all the rehab and physical therapy that I will now undertake and hopefully by the time we hit the month of May, I will be fully recovered and resume a life; pain free and active.

At the end of the day through all of this, my individual journey couldn't have happened without an entire village. The same way our fulfillments of our traditions come through the benefit and hard work of an entire CBT Community. Each of us don't have to be an "expert" on every aspect, but each of us can serve a role that is critical for each individual to accomplishment and achieve. And in person was sure more effective than Zooming this, that's for certain.

We have so much planned here at CBT over the next bunch of months and everyone is encouraged to sign up, participate, volunteer, but most importantly, share in what our community has to offer. As with an operating room of a Minyan, each of those individuals had their area of expertise, but together; a whole, united, and strong community accomplishing at the end a task that brings joy to the entire group, especially me.

Now more than ever, we need our community.

In closing, I'd also like to recognize and proclaim my unwavering love to Laurie who never left my side (well, she didn't come into the operating room) and even slept in my room overnight at the hospital to ensure I was well cared for during the two days I was there. I am truly blessed!!!



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

# Let's learn more about the 2024 Gala Honorees Marty and Marci Abschutz!!

The theme of this year's gala is "Sweeter than Wine". The committee landed on this theme quickly knowing that Marty and Marci are very enthusiastic about wine. We asked how this came about and learned a lot.

Marci and I became interested in wine as far back as our honeymoon in 1975 in Honolulu, Hawaii. We were introduced to a Riesling from Germany at the Third-Floor restaurant in the Hawaiian Regent Hotel. Other notable patrons that night included basketball legend, Wilt Chamberlain; he did not have the same wine that we did.

Over the years we had some favorites and some not-so-favorites. Our appreciation for wine began to blossom after we met our good friends, Rori and Steve Reiss, in 1987. They freely shared many tasty and different wines from various parts of the world. We were still finding our wine palate.

As we became more interested in California wines, we decided to take a trip to the Napa and Sonoma regions. During that trip, we were introduced to several wineries that impressed us. Among these were Elyse and Papapietro-Perry wineries.

The strange thing that we noticed at Elyse was that (not only did they spell it the same way as we spelled our daughter's name) they used the same exact font that we used on Elyse's Bat Mitzvah invitation. (It's really a small world.) When we stopped in for a tasting, we learned that our Elyse was older than their Elyse.

We found Papapietro-Perry ("P-P") while being driven around by a driver, we hired to show us some wineries. (This is the preferred way to enjoy any wine tasting adventure, since you have the designated driver paid for.) P-P specializes in the Pinot Noir grape. We learned that we love Pinot Noir wines. We joined their wine club, which meant that we would accept three deliveries of wine throughout the year, at a discounted price. We remain club members all these years later. In fact, their wines are so good that The Reiss's and CBT's own Kim and Chris Riemann partner with us on an expanded number of bottles three times a year.

In more recent years, we have discovered the Finger Lakes (NY) wine region. Once again, we hired a driver to drive us on a tasting adventure. Among the wineries we visited was Sheldrake Point Winery, on the west shore of Cayuga Lake. We like several of their wines. In conversation with their wine club manager, Marty discovered the AIDS Ride for Life that supports the Southern Tier AIDS Program. He even learned that Sheldrake had a cycling team that participates; he was asked to join and has ridden with them for several years. In fact, he has brought along several of his biking buddies to the ride, including CBT's own Bobbi Binder, Dave Shultz and Kim and Chris Riemann.

Most recently, we have added Forge Cellars to our wine list. They have great dry Rieslings. They are a Finger Lakes Winery, too, located on the east shore of Cayuga Lake. We have fun bringing friends to Forge for a tasting around the same time as the AIDS ride. The interesting thing for us is that Marci is not a huge fan of dry Rieslings, yet she loves Forge's wines.

When you see us feel free to ask us about our wines. Of course, my motto is that there are only two kinds of wine: wines you like and wines you don't.

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



# **Needy Family Fund - Results and Thank You**

### RESULTS OF 2023 NEEDY FAMILY PROGRAM

We recently completed our 22<sup>nd</sup> year running the "Needy Family Program". We decided to continue to run a hybrid program- those who felt comfortable shopping shopped and those who didn't made financial donations used to purchase gift cards and needed items. This year was a different one as our hearts; prayers and support were directed to Israel. We were not sure what the 2023 Needy Family Program would look like. Once again, this congregation came through for the needy in our area. We were able to sponsor 19 families! We collected \$9013.75!! Sixteen families were each given \$500 gift cards to Walmart, one family was given funds toward purchasing bunk beds and 2 families (16 people) were given clothing for each person, towels, sheets, blankets, silverware, dishes, etc.

### A little about the families we sponsored....

One family we sponsored was a mother with three children who is struggling financially as her husband died two months ago. Another mother, sole provider for her son, had to temporarily take off work as her young son is recuperating from brain surgery. Several of the families are living in a homeless shelter or a domestic violence shelter. One family was displaced due to a house fire as well as having a terminally ill two year old who passed away three weeks ago.

Please read Doris Cruz's thank you letter. She is the social worker who has been working with us since the inception of this program. It truly expresses the impact we make.

Dear Congregants of B'nai Tikvah,

Thank you so much on behalf of the 19 families of Redshaw School that you sponsored for the Holiday Gift Program.

The Congregants of B'nai Tikvah definitely put into practice the Hebrew phrase Tikkun Olam which means repairing the world. The gifts and the gift cards you provided helped others in a profound and meaningful way. It instilled hope and a belief in the kindness of humanity. It brought a sense of dignity where there was embarrassment and shame of their level of poverty.

There is a family that came to the U.S. on asylum and had suffered tremendously in their country. They came with great uncertainty and fear of the unknown. They were living in a bare apartment with no furniture and no beds. Some congregants donated dressers, a table and chairs and funds were used to purchase a bunk bed so they all could have a place to sleep. Initially this family would not allow me into their humble apartment due to shame of not having a place for me to sit and having their clothes in bags on the floor. Once the donations arrived, everything changed for this family. They went from living like refugees to living like regular people with furniture and with their basic needs taken care of. It greatly elevated their mood and their spirit. They proudly invited me to their home to show me everything neatly organized. The children are learning English and are thriving in school. Everyone is resting peacefully and comfortably at night thanks to many of you who cared enough to contribute and to make a difference in the lives of others.

Many of the mothers who received the gift cards burst into tears of joy, flabbergasted by the generosity of strangers. I made sure to explain the gifts and gift cards were donated from your congregation. They said they will pray for you and your families and are also praying for those suffering in Israel. Thank you for helping to provide food, hygiene products, clothes and other household items to the families in need. Your kindness has a lasting impact on these families. I ran into a family that you had sponsored many years ago. The mother spoke to me about the impact of this program. She said that it inspired them to want to do better for themselves. Their daughter is studying nursing and will be graduating in May 2024. The daughter went into nursing due to a strong desire to help others. This family has gone on to pay it forward and have helped others in need the way you have helped them.
